Dear Mr. Amar:

The "Volunteer Guards of Himmeylan", purporting to be a guerrilla organization under your nominal control, is not favorably considered for recognition as an element of the Philippine Army.

A set of general requirements for guerrilla recognition, established by General Mearthur during the liberation of the Fhilippines, has been used as a guide in considering the record of this unit. After careful investigation and full consideration of all available substantiating records and testimony of witnesses having pertinent inculadge, recognition of this guerrilla unit is not deemed to be warranted because of reasons mentioned below:

- a. The unit was not maintained satisfactorily in the field in opposition to the enemy.
- Activities of the unit did not contribute materially to the eventual defeat of the enemy.
- adequate records were not maintained (names, ranks, dates of enlistment or joining, dates of promotions, and necessary related information).
- d. Many members apparently lived at home, supporting their femilies by means of farming or other civilian pursuits, and assisted the guerrilla unit on a part time basis only.
- e. Record of service was not substantiated by sufficient acceptable evidence.

The American High Commissioner, Manila, Philippines, Through the President of the Philippines, Manila.

Dear Sir:

The undersagned, Commander-in-Chief of the volunte Minimaras in the Municipality of Himmanaylan, Province of Magnos Occidental, Philippines, to the American High Commissioner of the United States of America in the Philippines, respectfully submits the following:

- 1. That the Volunteer Guards in this Ennicipality had been organized since December 11, 1942, the darkest days of the war when
 both the army and the loyal civilians were hidden in the thick of
 the forests with no means and help from anybody. These loyal people,
 seeing the need, immediately organized this body to help the Army
 unconditionally. They were then employed to look for supplies, (rice,
 fish, meat, etc.) hauling them from one place to another in paril of
 their lives.
- These Volunteer Guards were employed in the construction of buildings, bivouacs, headquarters and hospitals of the army which frequently were moved from one place to another in order to mide from the enemy.
- 3. These Volunteer Guards had been employed in guarding the roads day and night to warn both the army and the Civilians of the approach of the anemy and some of them were killed by the enemy, some were wounded, leaving oxphenys and widows who are at present found in the most miserable conditions. Homeless, naked, hungry and some of them are sick.
- 4. These Volunteer Guards were used in transporting the firearms, ammaintions and other supplies of the Army through pathless mountains without using any means of transportations but their shoulders. They toiled hard for sometimes during fifteen days, hungry, worn out, some of them got sick, others died, or some of their families were buried before they came home.
- All orders of both the Army and the Civil Covernment in the mountains were executed by Volunteer Guards with no compensation at all.

THEREFORE, the undersigned appeals to your Excellency for any help that can be extended to these Volunteer Guards for the sad conditions of life in our communities, among the sick, the homeless, the unemployed, the mentally defective, how little do many of our leaders know or care.

The last war took a toll of many thousands of Filipino lives voluntarilly offered as material sacrifice for our cause, out when liberation came so little is thought of their human rights and priviledges and opportunities and so much of profits and duvidends.
