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

This will acknowledge receipt of your letter dated 25 June 1946 to the President of the Republic of the Philippines, which has been forwarded to this headquarters for necessary action, and in which you request the official recognition of the Red Cross First Aiders' Unit of Bolong, Zamboanga City.

Special press and radio release from Public Relations Office, AFWESPAC, dated 1 February 1946, stated that no applications for recognition of guerrilla units would be accepted by this headquarters after 15 March 1946. This information was given the widest possible publicity. Your request for the recognition of the Red Cross First Aiders' Unit of Bolong, Zamboanga City, was received at this headquarters with your letter dated 25 June 1946, after the closing date for submission.

It is generally considered that all concerned had ample opportunity by 15 March 1946 to prepare applications for recognition. By direction of the Commanding General, therefore, your request is not considered favorably.

I have the honor to request official recognition of the Red Cross First Aiders' Unit of Bolong, Zambosnga City, which was organized officially by Major Manuel Jaldon on August 18, 1943, by virtue of General Orders No. - 4, dated August 18, 1943, by headquarters 121st Inf 10th Military District (Guerr). This request is made in conjunction with the official recognition of the WAS organization of Misamis Occidental under the leadership of Mrs. Josefa Capistrano and the Red Cross Chapter organized in Lanao province under the leader-ship of Mrs. Mabel Morrision, all of which are allied and similar organization to that of the Red Gross First Aiders' Unit of Bolone, Zamboungs City, of which I am the organizer and the leader.

Meedless for me to state here the exploits of this organization but it certainly gave assistance to the Guerrilla movement in Zamboanga City. With scanty and inadequate medical facilities which generally consisted of improvised facilities this organization forged thru all the years of bitter struggle side by side with our patriots guerrillas, not mentioning the bolstering of the morale of the troops.

To give credit in any form that the Government may extend to these ardent social workers and for the sake of fairness and justice it is respectfully and earnestly requested that this organization be officially recognized.

In connection hereof, attached herewith are pertinent papers relative to this organization, with which I hope that fair and just judgement be deducted from for the final recognition of this organization.

A detachment of First-Aiders has been created in the Municipality of Bolong with-in the 2nd and 3rd Battalion area, 121st Infantry for the purpose of giving first aid attendance to any Army personel who might be inflicted with wounds during any skirmishes with the enemy.

This detachment will function directly under the supervision of the Commanding Officer, 2nd and 3rd Battalions 121st Infantry. They will serve the units most proximate from their designated area in case of emergency.

For the purpose of training, the Battalion Surgeon, 2nd Bn. 121st Infantry will from time to time supervise their activities.

Mrs. Asuncion C. Bello is here by designated In-Charge of this detachment.

# THE UNKNOWN VOLUNTARY WORKERS OF BOLONG ZAMBOANGA FROM AREA \$ 0 \*

When the Japanese Imperial Forces invaded the City of Zemboungs on March 2nd, 1942, and the USAFFE Forces were stationed at Bunguiso, the people began to wonder what became of the group of First-Aiders that underwent extensive training in first aid methods, before the outbreak of the Lar, under the supervision of the Red Cross personnel sent to Leabourga, for that very purpose.

Increase persons began to spread gossips that the covernment wasted a great sum of money in providing the First Aiders with kits containing first aid medicine and surplies which after all were never used during an emergency but, probably for the personal benefit of the First iders, and their respective families. When the USAFFE corces in Zemicanga surrendered to the Japanese Forces on 15, 1942, the First Aiders were entirely forgotten by 11.

The great majority of the USAFFF had surrendered. The few who remained preferred death than surrender. Despite the reverses already suffered by the United States in Correlator, Bataan and elsewhere, their undying and unfailing fate and alligiance to America continued; they still recognize the supreme authority of the United States in the Philippines; and that after a couple of months they had that firm belief, that America would recooperate her losses from

Stripes to fly proudly over the Islands. Therefore, they used that supreme decision in their lives to stay in the countsins factoreses and continue fighting at all cost. They decided to leave their wives and children, their parents, prother and sisters, their sweethearts and their beloved ones to uphold the honor, dignity and prestige of the United States and the Commonwealth of the Philippines among nations. They knew they lacked arms and accumitions; they lacked food and clothing; they lacked aen; and to continue fighting was hard (futile.) And yet they had as do that firm resolution to fight and fight to the last man rather than to submit themsalves to the inhuman treatment of their enemy, - the Japanese. Thus came into existence in Zambonnas - "The GENERILLA." The custrilla Cutfit was organized at Bunguiso, Solong, Zambonnas itsy on Soptember 27, 1942.

During the encounters with the enemy, even how careful our soldiers were, there was always that risk of being wounded or hurt. During patrol duty, due to scarcity of food, lack of sleep because of long nights of vigil and unadequate clothing, our soldiers fall sick on the way. They are far from their families and seleved ones. Theirs, is a pitiful and sad plight unless someone came to their side.

In the town of Bolong, some 35 kilometers from the city of Eampoungs, some public-spirited citizens, realizing the unbourable situation of our soldiers, decided to do something to alleviate their sufferings and alments. Under the initiative and able leadership of Mrs. Asuncion C. Bello, a graduate in First Aid Course, men and women, young and old, were immediately mobilized and set into action. On october 2, 1943 the "Red Cross First Aid" was organized at Bolong, Lembosnga City, for the purpose of cooperating the newly organized Guerrilla Outfit.

A great problem, however, loomed shead of these Voluntary First-Aiders. How can they administer first sid to the wounded without any medicine, gauze, tape, bandages, etc.? It cost a great deal of money to buy all of these needs. Even if funds were available, the first sid medicine and supplies were no longer obtainable. What then should be done such trying circumstances? The old maxim runs thus: "IT TIME IS A WILL, TAPE IS A MAY." Our voluntary workers insediately started a house to house campaign for old and unservicesble clothes and garments for making puze and bandages. The response of the people was instantaneous. Not only old clothes and garments were freely liven, but food was also offered for the hungry soldiers. For medicine for the wounds, native herbs had to be resorted to. Such was the manner our voluntary First Aiders were guiped when they stepped into the rield.

at the catset, it must be some in mind that our voluntery First Aiders were not given official recognition by the local military authorities. They had taken that hazardeous and the

tank of treating the wounded and ouring for the sick volunterily upon themselves. They had taken stlently in their nearts that Florence Hightingsle's piedge to treat and labor for the sick and wounded and ease the sufferings of the moldiers. They decided to forgo personal conveniences, lay saide pleasure, and work ceaselessly, expecting no reward or remuneration from the military authorities in return of their labor and sporifices. Thus, thereafter until the present the sick were being taken cared of, the wounded were being togeted, the hungry being fed, and the distressed being consolated. Every home became a housen, the place of consolation of wounded, sick and hungry soldiers.

Design Hannel D. Jaldon, then Communing the 121st Intentry, recognizing the unselfish labors and appreciating the work of this group of voluntary First Aiders, by General cracer No. 4 issued on August 1d, 1943, formally created a Labouniest of First Aiders in the Municipality of Polong, within the 2nd and 3rd Battalions area, 121st Intentry, forming as nucleous of said detachment, the voluntary First Aiders under Mrs. Bello. In appreciation of her devotion to unty and because of her training along said line, Mrs. Bello was designated by Major Jaldon as in charge of this detachments. The First Aiders formally took their each of office before the Major on August 18, 1943, while another group was enrolled and took oath before Mayor Juan A. Bello, of molong on August 21, 1943. This was the group of voluntary

workers under Mrs. Bello given official recognition by the local Military Authorities. Said official sanction of their unselfish labors gave the First Aiders further incentive and encouragement to work harder and harder until their sacred mission is fully accomplished. They had their physical examination under Dr. Bugarin Silos of the 2nd Bn. 121st Infentry.

The existence of these First Aiders in Bolong did not escape the attention of the Japanese Military Authorities. The Japanese are sparing no efforts in tracking down the manners. However, in spite of the threat on their lives, the First Aiders are not dishearted. The threat only spurred them with renewed vigor and enthusiasm to carry on their notice and humanitarian work. On March 1944, the office or the Red wrose First-Aid, was bonbed.

buring the early part of key, 1944, a big group of Japanese soldiers, with no intent whatsoever except to harrass and demoralize the defendless civilians, arrived in the Municipality of Bolong. They practically reached all the nocks and corners of the Municipality, through the side of some guides. All civilians found, whether men or women, young or old, were put to death immediately. Because of the gruesome and oold blooded murders they had committed here and there, these Japanese soldiers were known by the inhabitants of Bolong as "INDUMENES." (bandits)

As soon as the people became aware of the presence of

the Munduhins", men, women and children, scampered and fled away from their houses - some in caves and dug-outs, others in the bushes, while still others hid in any nature hide-outs available. Terror was then reigning, death seems to lurked everywhere. On the lips of the women and children was nothing but fervent prayers for their salvation, while the men stood by the side of their wives and children, and beloved ones, ready to shed blood and if possible, to give up their lives for their protection.

Efforts to report immediately the presence of the anduhins" to then Lieut. D. J. LeCouvre, Commanding the 1st Separate Battalian, in Curuan, proved fruitless because the telephone lines were cut by the enemy. A runner was therefore promptly dispatched, The moment was these, the people breathless, while awaiting for our soldiers, arrived at midnight in Manga and immediately took charge of the situation. He instructed his soldiers to make intensive and extensive search of the "Munduhins" and punish them without mercy. That was the beginning of the fight between our soldiers and the Japanese "Munduhins."

Because of the extensive territory, our band of gallant soldiers had a hard and difficult time intercepting the energy. It was a game of "hide-and-seek" with our soldiers after their prey. The "hunduhins" had a certain pecularity in that they remained in hiding places during day time and came out during the night to plunder and murder. Nights

Were turned into days by our soldiers in their ceaseless efforts to locate the enemy. The weather did not favor our soldiers, the nights were pitched dark while rain continously fell. Our soldiers, aside from being sleepy, tired and hungry, were soaked to the skin.

Lieut. LeCouvre, having always at heart the welfare and well-being of the civilians, and considering the seriousness of the situation, took personal command of our soldiers. He too, did not sleep during these dangerous nights, he was also tired, hungry, wet and shivering from cold, and yet he did not abandoned his soldiers. The presence of their commander was an inspiration to our soldiers. They entirely forgot sleep; they entirely forgot hunger; they entirely forgot fatigue, and in their hearts was only determination, to meet the enemy and mete out the punishment they long deserved.

In Manga, and elsewhere in Bolong all the houses were practically abandoned and unoccupied. The people remained all the while in the caves, bushes and other hide-outs. Some even went to the extend of killing their dogs and chickens fearing that they might be factors leading to their location by the "Munduhins" in such hiding places.

Old folks and children became sick and pale and yet, they would not dare leave their hiding places for fear of being met by the "Munduhins." However, in a particular house, the fires in stoves were kept burning throughout the night. Seven First Aiders, unmindful of the danger whead of them, but having only in aind the pitiful condition of our soldiers, were busily occupied preparing food and hot coffee and doing other things for the soldiers. It was surprising to note that despite all the perils and dualers around, our young girls especially kept on working cheerfully and uninterruptedly as if doing an ordinary work. That was the crucible moment in their caree as First Aiders.

As stated elsewhere, our First Aiders wern not provided with hits where modern medicine could be found. Every bit of resourcefulness had therefore to be resourcefulness had therefore to be resourcefulness had therefore to be resourceful to. To prevent our soldiers from establing cold and to keep their bodies werm throughout the night, the First Aiders made a liminent, a good substitute for Slean's consisting of coconut oil mixed with hot pepper (astumbal). Their have used liminent was constantly rubbed on the bodies of our soldiers by the tender and gentle heads of young ladies (who therefore, had not done similar work even to close relatives.)

In justice to the seven First Aiders, the young girls in particular, who stood side by side with our soldiers during those perilous moments, he it said that they had helped a great deal in checking out the Japanese Munduhins. They shared the fate of our soldiers; they too missed sleep for eight long mights. They too, withstood the coldness of

the night. They too faced death. In their beautiful faces, one could not trace signs of complaint, of tiredness or of fear. On the contrary, on their lips were all smiles and words of encouragement which inspired our soldiers with renewed vigor and determination to drive the Japanese "Munduhins" out of Bolong, as fast as their feet could carry them, after suffering heavy losses on their part, thus cutting short their ignoble and fiendish mission to Bolong.

Recognizing their already many accomplishments and in further appreciation of their endless endeavors toward humanity, the members of the detachment of First Aiders were authorized to assist in the Regimental Aid Station which was opened in Manga recently. The opening of this station was made possible thru the initiative of some officers and It.

F. Evangelists, R. N., and approved by the Commanding Officer of the 121st Infantry, Capt. D. J. LeCouvre. This station is under the direct supervision of Lt. F. Evangelists. The members are at present rendering service at said Regimental Aid Station.

Aside from the multifarious work and responsibilities, to First Aiders still find time to lead in other social work in their locality. They take charge and initiative in proving social entertainments for visiting officers and soldiers and the public as well.

True to their favorite saying: "Ready, Willing and able," when there is no emergency, the public in general is being attended to and accommodated by the First Aiders. One

of their remarkable and outstanding accomplishments was the saving from drowning of a 5-year old boy, in Manga. Before the First Aiders arrived at the scene, the parents of this boy gave up all hopes and considered the boy dead. Through the untiring efforts of the First Aiders the boy at last wave sign of life. The poor mother fainted of joy. The parents could not find words to express their thanks and gratitude to the saviors of their boy.

The First Aiders are available any time of the day or might by anybody in need. They do not charge anything. They will merely say "( SERVE" which is the motto of their organization. This organization was originally composed of 12 measures. At present, there are 43 ready, willing and able measures, who served humanity in the past, is serving humanity at present, and will serve humanity in the future.

Conscious of the fact that should the American Forces invaded Zamboanga, there will be lots of First aid work to be done, the First Aiders are sparing no efforts to face such situation. In fact, if so ordered by the Regimental Commander, they are always ready to march hand in hand with our soldiers upon invasion of Zamboanga. They want to be among the first souls to witness personally the redemption of Zamboanga from the Japanese soldiers. With their firm determination, nothing can stop them in reaching their goal. Everybody is looking forward to the day when the Stars and Stripes shall be unfurled in Zamboanga when the services of the First Aiders

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
