Dear Mr. Manipon:

The Commanding General has directed that you be informed that Squadron 45, "C" Company, Eusebio Aquino's Regiment, Baktalabap, purporting to be a guerrilla organization under your nominal control, is not favorably considered for recognition as an element of the Philippine Army.

A set of general requirements for guerrilla recognition, established by General MacArthur during the liberation of the Philippines, has been used as a guide in considering the record of this unit. After careful investigation and full consideration of all substantiating records and testimony of witnesses having pertinent knowledge, recognition of this guerrilla unit is not deemed to be warranted because of reasons mentioned below:

- a. Record of service was not substantiated by sufficient acceptable evidence.
- b. The unit was not maintained satisfactorily in the field in opposition to the enemy.
- c. Activities of the unit did not contribute materially to the eventual defeat of the enemy.
- d. Adequate records were not maintained (names, ranks, dates of enlistment or joining, dates of promotions, and necessary related information).
- e. Performance of the unit did not indicate adequate control by its leaders.

It is desired to emphasize that each claimant member of the unit is considered to have had just and adequate appraisal for recognition when his services were evaluated concurrently with this study of the unit with which he claims membership. Individual requests were not necessary nor appropriate then, or now, as their acceptance would in effect constitute unjustified duplication of consideration of one individual by this headquarters. However, this does not preclude submission for casualty recognition by those individuals who are

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qualified and feel justified in entering such claims. Upon request by interested individuals, appropriate forms will be forwarded.

Your attention is invited to Presidential Executive Order No. 68, Commonwealth of the Philippines, copy of which is attached, for any necessary action in connection therewith.

Report on the Hukbalahaps

1. The following report concerns the overall command of the Hukbalahaps, consisting of approximately eleven (11) Regional Commands. A physical investigation of the unit in the field was not made, nor considered necessary or desirable, for the principal reasons that the Hukbalahaps are still at large and are occasionally looting towns and fighting the Military Police of the Army of the Philippines. Top guerrilla leaders and other persons having pertinent knowledge of the units activities were contacted, and their statements are reflected in the findings.

2. A few of the subordinate commands of the Hukbalahaps had supposedly broken away from the overall command and submitted separate requests for recognition. It is believed that the purpose of the "break away" was to enable the units to submit their requests for recognition separately with the hope of being considered separately from the overall command of the Hukbalahaps. The following is a list of units which filed separate requests for recognition:

- a. Banal Regiment (suppl)
- b. Hukbalahaps, Southern Luzon Force (suppl)
- c. Co C, 2nd Bn, Banal Regt (recognized roster)
- d. Co, G, 3rd Sqdn, Hukbalahaps
- e. Co, G, 45 Sqdn, Aquino's Regt
- f. 1st Bn, 2nd Regt, Mamaselang Regt (recognized roster)
- g. Hukbalahap

3. ALLEGED HISTORY: (See Attached unit files, and also Team Leader's Report by 1st Lt. Edmund P. Ryan).

4. FINDINGS: a. The following persons were interviewed and their statements are reflected in the findings:

b. Record of service towards the war effort was not substantiated by sufficient acceptable evidence. The service rendered by the Hukbalahaps was anti American, Anti government as well as Anti-Japanese. The "Guerrilla Resistance Movements in the Philippines", a collection of monographs previously published by the Philippine Sub-Section, G-2, General Headquarters, Southwest Pacific Area states that the Hukbalahaps is a semi-political, semi-bandit organization, and that it owes no allegiance to the United States, the Philippine Commonwealth, or Japan

and that it has constituted a problem not only to the Japanese but to loyal guerrilla organizations and intelligence nets. These facts are further reiterated in the statements of top guerrilla leaders as discussed in paragraph 4-g.

c. Activities of the unit did not contribute materially to the eventual defeat of the enemy. On the contrary, the activities of the Hukbalahaps retarded the eventual defeat of the enemy by their unwarranted attacks on active guerrilla units and preying upon the civilian populace.

d. Performance of the units did not indicate adequate control by their leaders, because of lawless acts committed against the civil population, and unwarranted attacks on other guerrilla units.

e. Adequate records were not maintained (names, ranks, dates of enlistment or joining, dates of promotions, and necessary related information). The Hukbalahaps had submitted only rosters and requests for recognition of their units as evidence and records. The rosters contribute to the confusion of the Hukbalahaps in that aliases were used by many members of the organization.

f. The unit was not maintained satisfactorily in the field in opposition to the enemy. Not only were the Japanese the enemy of the Hukbalahaps, but so were the armed guerrilla units. One of the main purpose of any activities against the Japanese or guerrilla units was to get possession of arms and ammunition for their political army. The areas of operation of the Hukbalahaps was also dominated by the Luzon Guerrilla Army Forces, Bulacan Military District, Bruce Guerrillas, East Central Luzon Guerrilla Area, Anderson's Guerrillas, President Quezon's Own Guerrillas and Marking's Fil-Americans.

g. Many of the guerrilla leaders who were interviewed preferred not to give signed statements, but were willing to give verbal statements.

(1) On interviewing Major Robert B Isphan, he stated that he believed the Hukbalahaps were not organized for the purpose of defeating the enemy, but rather to organize an armed force which would eventually overthrow the government by force if necessary, and set up their own Socialistic-Communist government. This was more or less proven by the fact that the various subordinate units of the Hukbalahaps had their own political advisers and during the occupation they would gather the people of the various barrios together and the political advisers would deliver communistic speeches. Their communistic viewpoints were again proven when the Hukbalahaps elected their own governors in the provinces of Central Luzon, and attempted to overrule the governors appointed by the President of the Commonwealth Government. Major Isphan further stated that the Hukbalahaps could not be classified as a friendly unit, for they caused as much trouble for other guerrilla units that dominated the area as they did the Japanese. One of the primary purpose of the engagements of the

Hukbalahaps with the Japanese as well as the guerrillas, was to get possession of arms, which they would later use to their own advantage. Major Lapham reiterated that the Hukbalahaps was a troublesome organization, for they were constantly raiding and looting the barrios, the same as they are today. The various guerrilla units, such as the Luzon Guerrilla Army Forces, and Luzon Guerrilla Forces attempted to come to an understanding with the Hukbalahaps, but the Hukbalahaps would never keep any of the agreements. The Hukbalahaps eventually got so troublesome that the other guerrilla units had to engage them in encounters to prevent the Hukbalahaps from extending their area of domination. Major Lapham claims that there may have been some worthy members within the Hukbalahaps, but it is impossible to determine who they were, and it is evident that they would never attempt to screen their rosters.

(2) Lt Col Anderson stated that the overall Hukbalahap organization was definitely Anti-Japanese with a strong tendency to Anti-American and Anti-Philippine Commonwealth. The leaders believe in the principles of communism, but it is questionable among many of the followers, for some were forced to join the organization, and others were willing to fight to protect their own personal needs and property. Col Anderson further stated that the Hukbalahaps, in Central Luzon, did not render effective service during the occupation, nor did they actively resist the enemy, although there were times when the Hukbalahaps were forced to fight the Japanese. An example of the non-cooperation of the Hukbalahaps to render effective service was that they knew that certain guerrilla units, such as Major Lapham's and Col Anderson's, had direct contact with General MacArthur's Headquarters, but yet they, the Hukbalahaps, refused to submit their intelligence reports for transmittal. Col Anderson said that the main program of the Hukbalahaps was to promote an "Education program", which actually wasn't an education program but rather a political program having communistic principles. Col Anderson could not recommend any further recognition of the Hukbalahaps, nor could he recommend any revision for those already recognized, for the only service actually rendered to the common cause and the United States was by the men of Banal and Villagas who were attached to the American Forces, and subsequently recognized.

(3) Col A. G. Gabriel, a recognized guerrilla with PCCC, who had operated in Central Luzon, and at present G-2, Headquarters, Army of the Philippines, stated that he had personal knowledge of the Hukbalahaps and he could not find any justified occasion to qualify them as Anti-Japanese. They openly fought the Japanese when they were cornered, however, upon analyzing the conduct and behaviour of the Hukbalahaps, their actions against the Japanese was only a defence, whereas their main purpose was political and economical, in which they were determined to propagate communism and convert the people either by persuasion or terrorism. Col Gabriel said that the Japanese did not consider the Hukbalahaps as guerrillas, but instead they classified them as bandits. For reasons of jealousy and the determination to fight the guerrillas who were not

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sympathetic to their communistic ideas, the Hukbalahaps were determined to liquidate all who were opposed to their ideas. For example, Col Gabriel knew of two occasions where the Hukbalahaps had invited the men of Lt Col Braines and Col Farhardo for a conference to discuss unification and coordination, but while enroute to the conference, Braine's and Farhardo's men were ambushed by the Hukbalahaps and their fire arms were taken. The personal opinion of Col Gabriel is that the Hukbalahaps in Central Luzon do not deserve recognition, with the exception of those recognized by attachment to U.S. Forces, and that those recognized should not be revised. Col Gabriel commended the Hukbalahaps in Laguna, but he stated that they have at present accepted Taruc as their leader.

(4) Upon reviewing the intelligence reports submitted by Major Roy S Tuggle to G-2, Headquarters, Army of the Philippines, regarding the Hukbalahaps, many interesting facts are brought out. Major Tuggle was formally the assistant executive officer of the Luzon Guerrilla Forces, under the command of Col Merrill, and he had personal contact with the Hukbalahaps throughout the occupation. Major Tuggle states that the Hukbalahaps was designed to establish its control over the Philippines, through terrorism, murder, robbery, confiscation of crops, and the elimination of those who opposed the Socialist-Communist organization. Major Tuggle states that from the middle of 1942 on, no action of an aggressive nature was ever taken by the Hukbalahaps against the Japanese, although there were a few instances when slight skirmishes occurred, but these were the result of accidental encounters between Japanese patrols and Hukbalahaps bands, which usually resulted in little or no casualties. In fact Major Tuggle claims to have ample reasons to suspect that the Hukbalahaps were operating under an agreement with the Japanese Military authorities (See G-2 report, dated 3 October 1945, subject Hukbalahaps). Major Tuggle stated that some of the men of Banal and Aquino did resist the Japanese, and contributed to the defeat of the enemy, but still they were followers of Taruc, and believers of communists views of the Hukbalahaps.

Col Ramsey stated that the Hukbalahaps were a troublesome unit, and did very little towards the war effort. He further stated that the Hukbalahaps was strictly a political army to encourage communism through force, and no further recognition should be granted. However, Colonel Ramsey believed that the units already recognized should be revised, because when the United States voluntarily recognized the Hukbalahaps, they acknowledged their services during the occupation - (This however, is not the case, for the Hukbalahaps were recognized for their aid to American Forces during the liberation, and not because of their activities during the occupation.

5. POLITICAL ASPECTS:

The political aspirations of the Hukbalahaps is widely known, and therefore need not be discussed in detail. Yet it should be reiterated that the primary purpose of the Hukbalahaps, today as well as during the

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occupation period, is to eventually overthrow the government and replace it by their own socialistic-communistic form of government.

6. CLARIFICATION OF UNITS ON FILE:

a. Banal Regiment - The Banal Regiment under the command of Bernardo G. Poblete (alias Jose Banal) is within itself a great deal of confusion. On 25 July 1945, Bernardo Poblete submitted a request of recognition for the "Banal Regiment", consisting of 956 officers and enlisted men. On 1 August 1945, Lt Leo S. Wortman Jr, a Contact Team Leader from the Guerrilla Affairs Section, contacted the Banal Regiment and realizing that it was a much larger organization, and was to some extent effective during the liberation recommended that 1029 members be recognized. On 14 November 1945, Poblete submitted another request for recognition of the Banal Regiment, and this time claimed a strength of 27,000 members, but the rosters accompanying the request consisted of only three battalions. This request was investigated by Lt Campbell, and although he had rosters of only three battalions in his possession, he investigated the entire unit, and recommended that the unit be not favorably considered for recognition, and that no further action be taken on any additional roster submitted. Poblete, alias Jose Banal was notified that the Banal Regiment was not favorably considered for recognition by letter Headquarters, AFWESPAC, dated 7 December 1945. From the date of the investigation of Lt Campbell up until 15 March 1946, Poblete has submitted various supplementary rosters for recognition, but no action was ever taken upon them on the basis that the letter of 7 December 1945 constituted the decision of the whole unit including any supplementary rosters later submitted. The Banal Regiment has received the following recognition by either the using forces or by AFWESPAC.

It is recommended that the Banal Regiment be considered as complete and no further recognition or revision of the unit be granted. - Although the Banal Regiment is at present "Black-listed" from the Hukbalahaps, their activities during the occupation were on the same principles as discussed in the findings, and therefore no consideration should be granted them for the activities during the occupation.

b. 1st Bn, 2nd Regt, Dimasalang Force: - This unit was found in the pending files, but upon examination it was discovered that it is a duplicate roster of the recognized unit file at Headquarters, Army of the Philippines. It should be noted that there are 300 names on the roster, whereas the recognition letters, dated 3 December 1945, and

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20 May 1946 constitutes only 280 members. A check with the fiscal records could be made and if the 300 members have been paid a correction in the strength could be made by this headquarters. - No revision of recognition dates is recommended, in that this is an integral part of the Hukbalahaps, and falls in the same category as those discussed in the findings. Appropriate action has been taken to place this unit in the "Favorably Considered" file, rather than pending.

c. Co "C", 2nd Bn, Banal Regt. - This unit's roster is a duplicate roster of the recognized unit found in the files of Headquarters, Army of the Philippines. Appropriate action has been taken to place this unit in the "Favorably Considered", file, rather than pending. No revision of recognition dates is recommended, in that this unit is an integral part of the Banal Regiment and the same reasons apply to this unit that apply to the Banal Regiment.

d. Company C, 3rd Squadron, Hukbalahaps, has submitted a separate request for recognition, but it is found that this unit is an integral part of the Aquino's Regiment, which in turn is a component part of the overall Hukbalahaps, therefore this report takes this unit into consideration as well as the overall command.

e. Company C, 45th Squadron, Aquino's Regiment, Hukbalahaps - is in the same situation as the preceding unit (d).

f. Hukbalahap, Southern Luzon Command, under the command of Pedro Villegas, (alias Nasin), operated in the province of Laguna, and it is claimed to be one of the better organized Hukbalahap units, which caused less disturbances among the civilian populace and guerrillas. But it must be noted that this unit is a follower of the principles of the Hukbalahaps, and they accept Taruc as their overall command. This unit is also known as the Eleventh Regional Command, and copies of the roster are found in the rosters of the overall command; therefore this unit is considered an integral part of the Hukbalahap Command, and hence they follow the general principles of the Command, they too should be treated in the same manner. The Hukbalahap, Southern Luzon Command has had approximately 395 members previously recognized for their liberation service. Revision of recognition dates is not recommended, in that their principles during the occupation was the same as that of the overall command, and even at present they are still intact, throughout the province of Laguna.

h. The overall command of the Hukbalahaps was submitted for recognition by Mariano P. Balgos, who claims that he was given command of the Hukbalahap units in the provinces of Balacan, Tarlac, Pampanga, Laguna and Nueva Ecija. The rosters consisted of approximately 28,200 members commanded by Luis Taruc. It is noted that these rosters contain the Banal Regiment (known as the 7th Regional Command) and the Southern Luzon Command (known as the 11th Regional Command), as well as many other subordinate units of the Hukbalahaps. Therefore any action taken on this unit should be passed to Taruc, rather than Balgos.

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The following units of the Bukbelahaps have been previously recognized, and it is recommended that their dates of recognition be not revised:

- (1) Banal Regiment:

7. RECOMMENDATIONS: It is recommended that the Bukbelahaps, or any of its component units be not favorably considered for recognition, and that no revision be granted to those units of Bukbelahaps previously recognized.
