

- Nr. Alfred Cobb has requested compensation as guerrillas for services rendered in 1942 and 1943 on Falaman Island by himself and deceased brother Faul. A succinct report of their activities is as follows:
- a. Alfred and Faul Cobb, American mentione, ran a cattle ranch on Dumaran Island in Northern Falzama before the war. In April and Blay 1942 they organized a Home Guard Organization and were able to restore order and local forms of government in their area, Northern Falzaman. In September 1942 Alfred Cobb visited Cayo Island and contacted several Americans there who had been members of the £8th intertal Squadron. Some of those American solidiers joined his unit and at the end of 1942 the Cobb brothers had an estimated force of 150 ms.
- b. Concurrently with this organization the Gobb brothers, Alfred in particular, were experiencing difficulty and friction with the local constabilary forces. - c. There is a conflict of testinony at this point. IF. Gobb in latter states that in May 1943 be went to Ouro Inland and proceeded to Australia. The Green Book states that Medamba was Milled in self-defense by one of the Gobb brothers in June 1943. Hr. Baldomero Gercia, Lacouthew Officer, Nalessan Opecial Bn, states that Medamba was murdered place Cobb's departure for Kustrulia Sensetime effect 19 June 1943. He arrived in Parwin Australia on 6 January 1944. Faul Cobb was purportedly drowned at sea in December 1943 in an endower to reach Australia.
- Lt Col Gilbert, Director, RFD has opined that Mr. Alfred Cobb cannot be considered as a USAFFE soldier in that he was never inducted.

C/N "Request of Mr. Alfred Cobb," (Cont'd):

- 3. Claims Service has advised the GAD that there are no claims filled for the ranch or cattle belonging to the Cobb brothers and that they can not entertain a claim from Hr. Cobb for his cattle insamuch as the guerrilla unit which would have used them is not recognized.
- 4. The War Damage Commission has a claim on file by Angelica Cobb de los Santos, administratrix and heiress of Ira D. Cobb, the father of Alfred Cobb, for personal effects, 4 bulls and 20 cows. Mr. Alfred Cobb mentions a Roland de los Santos as one of his men.
- The Cobb brothers definitely do not qualify for guerrilla recognition as they cannot meet the recognition criterion in that.
 - a. They do not demonstrate continuity of activity.
- b. Their unit was disarmed and disbanded by the Constabulary forces in May 1943.

c. They engaged in inter-unit quarrels and fighting detrimental to the resistance movement.

Conclusions

- The guerrilla activity of Mr. Cobb, however indicative of patriotic endeavor, does not satisfy our constant guerrilla recognition criterion.
- The decision rendered by RPD precludes the possibility of remuneration to Mr. Cobb as a USAFFE soldier.
- A claim for the cattle owned by Mr. Cobb has been presented to the War Damage Commission which precludes further action in this regard.

Recommendation:

That the AGO Dept of the Army be given the following information:

- a. Mr. Alfred Cobb cannot be recognized as a guerrilla.
- b. That a claim has been filed with the War Damage Commission for the cattle lost during the occupation, which if approved would warrant Faul Gobb his proportionate share.

Honorable Sir:

I, Alfred Cobb, 42 years of age, imerican citizen, and now residing at Scarborough Road, Scarborough, New York am writing on behalf of myself and my deceased younger brother, Faul Cobb, also an American citizen.

At the outbreak of World War #2 my brother and I were living in Dumaran Island, Province of Falswan, Fhilippine Islands where we had a cattle ranch. We are sons of the late Ira D. Cobb, an American citizen, who died in the Santo Tomas concentration camp in Wamila, Fhilippine Islands in October, 1943. Said Ira D. Cobb was a Spanish American war weteran who saw service in Cubs in 1898 and in the Fhilippine Insurrection of 1901 to 1903. He was a native of Farin, Arkansas and was born in Hill County, Texas, near Forth Worth.

Being the only Americans in that part of the Fmilippines at the outbreak of the war (my father was in Manila), we most naturally felt that we must do everything we can do of whatever we can. Sea transportation to Wanila and Iloilo or Cebu were immediately impossible because almost over night the Japanese were all over the Fmilippine waters. We were, therefore, bottled up in Dumaran Island and in the mainland of Falswan which is only about one mile across the channel from Dumaran



Island. Things went worse every day and just before Corregisor surrendered, we scuttled a few motor Issunches that were within our reach. Peeple shandowed their villagues and settlements all along the coast and took to the hills and into the interior.

In one of our trips along the coast toward Poerto Princesa2



in July, 1942, we encountered a detechment of Japanese soldiers at a "Barrio" (settlement) called Tanabag, about 40 miles up the coast from the Japanese garrison in Puerto Princess. We allowed a boat-load of them to reach the shore before we opened fire, since we had the advantage of occount tress for cover all along the beach. We accounted for 8 Japanese enlisted men and one Japanese Lieutenant that were left dead on the beach. Only two Japanese got back to their launch by

swimming and the launch immediately put out to sea. In early September, 1942, word came to me that there were nome 50 Americans stranded in Coyo Island, about 100 miles by sail boat from Palawam Island. Wy brother and I with some of our men went to this Dayo Island to fetch the Americans since they were absolutely helpless there, Cuyo Island being one of those very small islands in the Sulu Son with me forest at all. We used a Japanese fishing launch that we were keeping for just such an emergency, for the over-night run to Cuyo Island. (This Jap fishing launch was captured from a bunch of Japanese fishermen by the Coron Guerrillas in another surprise attack a little to our North and we were beering the Japanese launch in the inland maters of Northern Palaman Island. Later, we had to set fire to this launch or lose it to the Jaranese.) Unfortunately, when we got to Curo Island, the Japanese had already been there shead of us and about one half of the Americans had already surrendered. This, of-course, satisfied the Japs who thought they had all the Americans and did not take the trouble to look for the rest who scattered themselves in the other side of the Island. This group of Americans were all enlisted men in the U. S. army. Their only officer

surrendered with the other half to the Japs. Their outfit was the 48th Material Squadron, U.S. Army Air Force. They were mostly Technical Sergeants. These 26 remaining men were naturally very glad to join us and that night we sailed back for Falawan Island where we were doing our Guerrilla activities. These men stayed with the Cobb Guerrilla up to the time when I sailed for Australia in late 1943.

In May, 1943, in a quick trip to Cuyo Island for quinine and other medicines we could find which were desparately needed, I ran into Major A. K. Whitehead of the 26th Gavalry, U. S. Army. Major Whitehead had three Filipino soldiers with him. He had recently escaped from a Japanese prison camp in Iloilo. We joined forces with Major Whitehead and with most of the Americans in our group, we made a trip to Tablas Island, off the Northern coast of Panay Island, intending to secure a big enough sail boat on a plan to get most of the men down to Australia. The plan did not materialize, which was perhaps lucky because a big sail boat is almost surely to attract the attention of the Japanese. So we broke up into smaller groups in small native fishing sail boats, and each group set sail for Australia. I learned later that William Young, Maurice Mc Gee, Willie Wigfield and George Marquez, all of the 48th Material Squadron, U. S. Army Air Force were captured in their sail boat and put to death by the Japs in Iloilo. Major Whitehead and I and a party of three were able to work our way back to Palawan Island in easy overnight runs till we got to Balabac Island off the coast of North Borneo. From Balabac

Those orders arrived at our headquarters when Hajor Whitshead and I were in our sail boat on our way down to Australia. (The original orders which I have in my possession today, together with some other papers that were being kept in our Guerrilla Headquarters in Falswan Island were sent to se to San Prancisco. where we were operating, and their activities, I know, are in official reports to the U. S. Army of persons other than myself; Major A. K. Whitehead, presently with the Hq. 1st. Squadron, Sth Cavalry, Tokio (A.P.O. 201, c/o Fostmaster, S. F. Calif.) and William G. de Carbonell, Lisutenant, U.S. Mayy Reserve.

Our timely arrival in Australia by sail boat with all the first hand information that we possessed of actual existing conditions in those parts of the Fhilippines where we were engaged in our Ouerrilla work, organization, and intelligence, was of incalculable assistance to both the U.S. Army and Navy.

Our properties in the Philippines, homes, ranch and all the other tangible assets are hopelessly damaged and gone, not to mention my father who died in Santo Tomas concentration camp and my own brother who lost his life at sea, in the services of his country.

I eincerely believe my brother Faul and I are entitled to compensation for Fhilippine Guerrilla activities we have rendered, if such services rendered during the war against the Japanese are being recognized and paid for by the Government.
