MEMORANDUM FOR RECORD

Lt. Col. H. L. Shaftoe:

The "Iba Sector, Special Company", a guerrilla unit under command of Captain Jorge Josafat was not favorably considered for recognition for the following reasons:

1. Evidence submitted fails to show that said unit served in the field as a complete unit and there is no evidence that communication with higher echelon was carried out.
2. The unit spent most of its time evading the Japs and since it had practically no weapons or ammunition, offered very little actual resistance to them.
3. The unit never functioned as a fighting combat unit before or after the arrival of the Americans.
4. Members of the unit were absent for long periods of time during which time no resistance was offered.
5. The unit claims activities which are unlikely since other units were dominant in the area in question.

Dear Mr. Josafat,

The Iba Sector Special Company, purporting to be a guerrilla organization under your nominal control, has not been favorably considered for recognition as an element of the Philippine Army.

A set of general requirements for guerrilla recognition, established by General MacArthur during the liberation of the Philippines, has been used as a guide in considering the record of this unit. After careful investigation and full consideration of all available substantiating records and testimony of witnesses having pertinent knowledge, recognition of this guerrilla unit is not deemed to be warranted because of reasons mentioned below:

- a. The unit was not maintained satisfactorily in the field in opposition to the enemy, during the occupation.
- b. Activities of the unit did not contribute materially to the eventual defeat of the enemy.
- c. Unit did not show satisfactory continuity of activity and organization.
- d. Many members apparently lived at home, supporting their families by means of farming or other civilian pursuits, and assisted the guerrilla unit on a part time basis only.
- e. Record of service was not established by sufficient acceptable evidence.

It is requested that you comply with the provisions of Executive Order No. 68, by the President of the Philippines, dated 26 September 1945, copy attached.

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

They are guerrillas of the WESTERN LUZON GUERRILLA FORCES of 1942 up to the present, thru the order of the late Capt. RALPH McGUIRE, Commander of the western Luzon Gaerrilla Forces, now falls under Col. Merril of the Iba Sector.

Whereas, it has been noted that scores of names of those who actually helped, aided and supported in many ways the operations of the 38th Division, and the 6th Army, in clearing the province of Zambales of Japanese resistance, are not among those included in any roster of recognized units falling with the command of the Zambales Military District.

Whereas, on the grounds of fairness and equity, the undersigned believes that due recognition and such privileges now being enjoyed and exercised by their more fortunate compatriots must, by all means, be extended to them by Administration, if only to compensate the sacrifices and their unselfishness to serve the common cause;

Whereas, from the standpoint of patriotism, valor and courage, the achievements of those otherwise forgotten names of theirs could proudly be compared with any of those included in the roster;

Wherefore, the undersigned respectfully request your good office to include them in any recognized units with the end in view of giving merits and consideration to them who should fittingly be among the members of the recognized guerrillas.

**BRIEF HISTORY OF THE ORGANIZATION FORMERLY KNOWN
AS THE WESTERN LUZON GUERRILLA FORCES, UNDER THE COMMAND OF THE
LATE CAPTAIN RALP MCGUIRE, IBA SECTOR ATTACHED TO 152nd INF. 2nd
BN. AND THE SIXTH ARMY AND ITS ACTIVITIES.**

It was on the month of July, 1942 that Capt. Montalla and Capt. Josafat did their best to organize the guerrillas in Iba and also all the towns of Zambales up to Bolinao, Pangasinan, which comprises the Zamba Les Area and Capt. Montalla, Inspector General through the order of the late Capt. Ralph McGuire, commander of the Western Luzon Guerrilla Forces.

During the guerrilla operation, our camp at Cabanbanan, Iba Sector, Nov. 25, 1942 was raided by the Japanese soldiers with some spies acting as guide. Resulting to killing of one civilian, son of Mr. Arabejo. They burned the houses that we have left behind with household furnitures and other things. Those members of the organization and civilians captured in that raid by the Japanese soldiers were tortured to the extent of applying their inhuman methods of punishing the victims so as they will squeal the members of the organization. Those victims who were fortunate were released and those unlucky ones meet their doom in agony. After the raid we transferred our camp at Manibayucan, sitio of San Agustin, Iba, Zambales. A few days, it was December 2, 1942 that our camp in Manibayucan or Dingding as the y called it was again raided by the Japanese soldiers and constabulary men, burned the cottages within the sitio and took all things we have left such as typewriters, clothings, food, etc., and after the raid we were forced to be scattered on account of the fact that we were attacked by malaria, influenza, etc, and in the absence of medicines for many months, we were unable to recover from such kind of sickness. Capt. Montalla and an American named Sgt. Red and company proceeded to the south and Capt. Josafat proceeded to the north and company too. A day or two confirmed news reached us that a detachment of Japanese soldiers will combed the mountains of Iba hunting us and that a prize was being put on our head if ever they caught us dead or alive. On or about the midnight of December 4, 1942, we proceeded to Tambobong, and just at the neck of time when leaving our place that a company of Japanese soldiers raided our place and they found nothing except few remaining things left. While we were on the high seas Japanese patrols on motor boat were trying to inspect the sailboat on which we rode but were unable to go near us the fact that we were sailing at shallow water. Upon arriving that said place, we, Capt. Josafat and company and others who were sick with malaria, influenza and typhoid were met by Capt. Fabie and Dumlao, both of San Narciso; then the following captains came later namely: Basilio dela Rosa of Palauig, Simplicio Streeter of Palauig too, Bonifacio Gutong of Magalawa, Palauig, Lazaro Cawagas of San Narciso, Conrado Estrella and Andres Eclevia (dead) both of Masinloc, all of Zambales province. For many weeks we were there conferrring and organizing with the barrie people and because of the scarcity of food and other means of living some of the captains moved to another palce which was more better and secured for higing. We contacted Capt. Miller who was the organizer in that region and consulted tohim if what steps would be taken and when will the reinforcements come and because he was a pure American and we, believing that he had contacted submarines within his area (Bolinao) he said that they are coming and don't lose hope and they are sure to come. Just after a few days of the contact, we were again raided on our evacuation place that was January 10, 1943 at about 2:30 AM. Our runners were too active in that place that before the Japanese could come to our place we have gone to the wilderness. They combed the mountains but again in vain their hunt for us. Then they assembled

all men they could see within the sitio near the seashore and surrounded them with guards and in front of the crowd they place a machine gun, fired a clip of the ammunition to frighten those civilians and members of the organization and altho they were frightened and shivering from fright, the crowd remedied the situation swearing before the Japanese officer declaring that they were not guerrillas but volunteer guards. The Japanese officer nearly convinced of the explanation and pleas, the officer apologized before the barrio lieutenant saying that they have disturbed the barrio people and it was the fault of their spies and D-I. Two or three weeks later we moved to Agno, Pangasinan fearing that additional troops were coming to hunt for us in that region as our runners informed us. In Agno we were welcomed by our co-members informing us that lots of spies were in that place, but we were too fortunate that we were housed in a secluded place unknown to almost all the people in that place. During these times the Japanese were becoming serious of their hunt for us and sent lots of their spies to our supposed hideout and upon reaching us this information we have to move again to our former place in Tambobong and stayed there for three months. On May 25, 1943 our place was raided again and a member of the organization named ~~Canide~~ Arás was shot by the Japanese ~~soldiers~~ soldiers on account of the conflict between the deceased and the one Bonifacio Alcaid, who was a spy of the Japanese, disclosing that he (deceased) possesses a pistol and a telescope. Because of this accident and fearing that the aggrieved party will be forced to disclose our identity we proceeded again to our place where we come from with firm determination to ~~fight~~ fight the common enemy.

It was in Sept. 1942 that the heavy encounter in Pastac, a sitio of Botolan, Zambales between our forces and Japanese soldiers fought fiercely, killing more than 100 Japanese soldiers and capturing Japs rifles, sabers, pistols, ammunitions and other supplies of the enemy. In this fight the Japanese knew before had that guerrilla activities in Iba and the neighboring towns were now active. Since that time they were very suspicious of every men to be partaking in the underground movements for lots of incumbrances were discovered by the Japanese soldiers.

December, 1942 that five members were captured by the Japanese soldiers, because of the spies that showed the places of those members resulting to their executions at Panibugan, Iba, Zambales, namely: Amado Flordeliz, Feliciano Adona, Marcos Aquino, Marcos Pamplona and Aniceto Flordeliz both of Amungan, Iba, Zambales.

In October, 1944, two American aviators were rescued by our off-shore patrol, when bombing on Japanese aircraft carrier along the coast of Palauig. Their plane was forced down because the tail was heavily damaged, causing the dive bomber to drop at sea and they have to bail out and because of their life-saver they were able to get ashore. Then they were taken by our men and were brought to the camp for proper care and treatment. A week or two of recovery they were brought to Sawang where they were taken by an airplane.

December, 1944, when the retreating Japanese soldiers reached San Agustin, Iba, Zambales, they were attacked by our men capturing three Japanese aviators and when investigated by our intelligence officer, they confessed that their plane was shot down at Bolinao, Pangasinan and were not hurt when the plane crashed.

In February, 1945, in the sitio of Tagal-eb, Bangantalinga, Iba, Zambales, a company of retreating Japanese soldiers happened to be there on account of the sound of the wooden sugar cane crusher that they heard while proceeding to the south. Believing that the sound produced by that wooden implement was the the buzzer of a real radio and they determined to look for it. Upon arriving to the place where the sound come from, they were astonished that it was only a mere wooden sugar cane crusher. Those civilians who were unaware of there coming were frightened and left the crushing of canse. The Japanese soldiers finding out that the place in which they were was in abundance of food and everything they wanted were convinced to stay there for some time just to while the time and fatten themselves. The fact that they were fully armed and were in company, we were forced to hold in abeyance our attached to them because of the limited arms and ammunitions we have on hand. We have to survey their weakness first, before we should raid them and that it would not be a failure of ambushing them. A day or so a brave runner of ours was caught by the Japanese patrols and he was brought to the Japanese camp. For sometime he was serving ~~them~~ and very faithful to them, but when his opportunity to comes he succeeded and he revealed to us that almost one-half of the Japanese soldiers were sick with malaria, fever and their feet swollen because of continuous walking and this was high time for us to attack them. It took us a week or more to wipe out and those who were seriously ill with malaria were bolced by our men. Our men got all their things and those dead ones were undressed still.

From time to time lots of Japanese stragglers roam within the suburbs of the town of Iba, Zambales, and when our men saw them, they chased them like animals being run after until, one by one of them were hacked to death.

The above-mentioned activities were accomplished inspite of the limited arms, as in most cases our men used talibong, spears and bolo against the enemy. Other minor encounters were not included in this brief when the enemy loses one to two only. All men took active part in wiping out the enemy the fact that their hatred and grievances toward the common enemy could not be erased from their minds because of the inhuman acts and cruelties done to our men, women and children in general.




