
From our contacts with Army enlisted men, we believe this writer voices the feelings of all Army men of the ranks.



Dear Sir & Comrade:

I have the honor, and it gives me great pleasure, to transmit to you the following resolution which was unanimously adopted at the 29th Annual Encampment, Department Veteran Army of the Philippines, United Spanish War Veterans, held on February 22nd, 1938, at Manila, P. I.:

RESOLVED: That the 29th Annual Encampment of the Department, Veteran Army of the Philippines, United Spanish War Veterans, in Convention assembled, convey to our Comrade Major General Douglas MacArthur, and his distinguished wife, the cordial congratulations of this gathering, and of the comrades in general, upon the birth on February 21st, 1938, of a son and heir who is to bear the name of Arthur MacArthur, a name well known and dear to each member of this organization, and who, we hope, will in due time become another General MacArthur.

Dear Lord Ailesbury

I am much interested in Wiltshire as in the Peninsula, and should much like to have a glimpse of Corporal Knight's memoir, if you could possibly lend it to me for a few days. I can promise to return it without delay.

Two companies of the 3/95th under a captain Eeles were attached to Adams' brigade, and six companies of the 2/95th.

On the 16th the brigade was billeted in villages west of Ales, was alarmed at 10 A.M. and marched by Ales and English to Broom-b. Court which it reached at midnight, having had the distant thunder of Zante-Bros all the afternoon. Marching on Rivellon ^{at dawn} they reached it at 7 in the morning of the 17th. They found the place full of scattered companies of Zante-Bros - walking wounded, transport, Hockel etc. The brigade halted till noon at Rivellon and then marched by the great chaussée, in Frenching rain, to Brasie l'Alende, and bivouacked at nightfall on the slope north of Hougmont. No French were seen till dusk, when the columns were visible beginning to arrive on the slope and hitting by la Belle Alliance. There are

good accounts of the driving of the two companies of the
S/pt in Siberian "Dachau" letters.

I think that Corporal Knight means
Mordell when he talks of "Kleines", as it was taken
that Adams' Brigade came upon Zuck's Brown
barracks and Kumpfer moving across country. On
the 16th, the previous day, the brigade had been for
anywhere near the action of the 14th of September, but
was on the road between Bryansk & Combe which
Zuck's Brown was being fought.

I have a few more Walter's translations,
but none can see Corporal Knight - probably it
is a scarce book.

Dear Lord Alesbury

As I have given my last lecture for term, and have some spare hours, I have had Corporal Knight at once, and return him.

His memory is very good, especially for place names, and some of his statements are infallible. e.g. he says that the companies of the 3/95 were 205 strong on the morning of Waterloo, and had 172 casualties, including five out of their six lieutenants. Unfortunately the regimental return gives 180 present, with casualties 1 captain 3 serj. killed, 1 major 1 captain 2 lieutenants wounded, with 36 serj. wounded and missing - total 60 not 172! This is a sample.

p. 13. 'Thorp' must mean 'Ath' road which Adams' brigade was certainly posted on June 15. But this is many miles from the frontier, and it is incredible that the 3/95^s could have exchanged drill-ground with French troops. Probably he means Belgium.

p. 16. Marching from Ath at midnight of the 15th-16th the 3/95 can not possibly have gone anywhere near Tournay, nor even the French in possession there, so that the confusion would have to 'run for it'. They really marched Ath - Braine la Courte. They could not possibly have passed over 'the place where the French bivouacked' on the 15th, and fought on the 16th - i.e. under Braine. But the day after Waterloo they did bivouack somewhere near Braine Brv.

p. 19. In 'leaving Flourens on the night' read (I think) Nivelles. The village where the Hussars caught the marching column on the 17th 'Mont Reville' is probably Montlivre on the road Braine - la Courte to Braine l'Alleud.

The narration of the actual battle of Waterloo is better, but can be accurately worked out from the narration of Captain Esler of the 3/95 in Siborne's 'Waterloo letters'. This officer was left in command at the end of the day.

p. 24. The 'Prussian' who came up at the end of the day on the left of Adams' brigade were really Chassé's Dutch-Belgian - all in blue like the Prussian.

p. 26. The incident of the 42nd being cut up by French cavalry belongs to Zouave's case! Although rather doubtful remains cases, but quite interesting. Best thanks for a sight of this.
