My dear Friend:

It is a great privilege to so address you. Nothing in recent years has touched me as deeply as the lovely message I received from you on the occasion of the Jewish War Veterans' dinner where I was tendered the gold medal. I shall always treasure that warm greeting from you.

One of my great regrets is that I haven't had the courage to go to Tokyo and visit with you -- and of course, it has been impossible for you to come to America. But there isn't anything written about you that I don't devour every word. I have wanted to see you, but my job here has been a handicap, and besides that I am not a naturally easy flier. However, we never know what will happen, and perhaps I may be blessed with the chance to shake your hand soon, whether in Tokyo or here. There will always be a prayer in my heart for your well being.

Our mutual friend, General Julius Klein, and I, were happy to drink a toast to a very fine bust of you which I have in my office. This bust was brought to me by a friend from Australia, and was made by an Australian at the time of your landing there.

I see our mutual friend, the only living ex-President of the United States, whenever I go to New York.

May God bless you and watch over you. America is proud of you, and I am not the only one that feels you are one of the great Americans of all times.





CAMPING COMMITTEE

Camp Program  
1950

Because of established camp problems of locality sanitation, food, and staff - the camp committee decided to offer a "trip camp" experience for the summer of 1950. The trip would give Girl Scouts an opportunity to live together for a week, to learn about the culture of Japan, its scenic beauty, its religion, its agriculture and history, its unique industries, and to further international friendship through their interest and good will.

Plans so far include the following itinerary-Osaka visiting Osaka Castle, Nakanoshima Park, Dotonbori Street and if possible the planetarium.

Kyoto, Hall of Thousand Buddhas, Higashi Hongenji Temple, Golden Pavilion, Nippon Silk Factory, Nijo Castle, Kyoto Old Palace, Heian Shrine and its garden, Kawashima Weaving Factory, Chion-In Temple, Yasaka Shrine, Maruyama Park, damascene, lacquer, and cloisonne industries. Nara, visiting Kofukuji, Deer Park, Kasuga Shrine, Big Bell, Daibutsu etc.

Mikimoto Pearl Fishery.

Nagoya, visiting Nippon Ceramics Factory, Tokugawa museum and ruins of Nagoya Castle.

Gifu, cormorant fishing in the evening on flat-bottomed barges on the River Nagara.

Kofu, if possible arrangements will be made to visit crystal mines and cutting factories.

The cost of the trip will be approximately \$60.00 although every effort is being made to reduce this figure. This cost includes train fare, sleeping and meal accommodations, admissions bus fares, and gratuities.

A nurse and doctor will accompany the girls and if necessary, medical care could be secured at military installations en route. One adult will be assigned to each group of five girls for supervision.

Sleeping and meal accommodations will be at approved places.

There will be guides to explain what is seen, and the Japan Travel Bureau is co-operating to make sure that sightseeing runs smoothly.

Daily contact will be maintained with the Scout House in Tokyo, so that parents can call in regarding the progress of the trip.

Details will be circulated later as to the type and amount of clothing and baggage which should be brought, and the exact itinerary.

INTRODUCED BY CONGRESSMAN ROMUALDEZ

EXPLANATORY NOTE

This bill proposes to create a new municipality in the Province of Leyte to be known as MacArthur by separating the barrios of Tarragona, Casuntifigan, Capudlusan, Osmeña, Causwagan, Palale, Batug, Kiling, Bugho, Binulho, Danao, General Luna, Liwayway, Pinocawan and San Isidro from the municipality of Abuyog, Province of Leyte. Pending the next general elections, the President of the Philippines shall appoint elective officials who shall hold office until their successors shall have been duly elected and shall have qualified. The seat of the municipal government shall be the barrio of Tarragona.

The income of the barrios that shall comprise this new municipality is more than enough to pay for the salaries of its officials and employees without affecting the financial stability of the mother municipality. The conversion of these barrios into a new municipality will surely encourage trade and industry among its inhabitants.

In view of the foregoing, the approval of this bill is earnestly requested.

*Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives  
of the Philippines in Congress assembled:*

1 SECTION 1. The barrios of Tarragona, Casuntiñgan, Ca-

3 ho, Binulho, Danao, General Luna, Liwayway, Pinocawan  
4 and San Isidro in the municipality of Abuyog, Province of

6 constituted into a new municipality to be known as the  
7 municipality of MacArthur with the seat of the government  
8 at barrio of Tarragona, Leyte.

9 SEC. 2. The officials of the newly created municipality

Dear General MacArthur:

I am sure you would like to know of the very eloquent and effective presentation of Mr. Jiuji G. All of us here wish that it were possible for you to return to the States and personally transmit to America what you believe are the answers to the problems as they are there developing.





# Reds Rebuffed By MacArthur On U. S. Bases

## Calls Inquiry 'Provocative Impertinence,' Says U.S. Set 'for Any Eventuality'

TOKYO, May 4 (UP).—General of the Army Douglas MacArthur rejected today as "a provocative impertinence" a Russian inquiry about the development of American military bases in Japan and Okinawa.

The Supreme Commander replied to Lieutenant General Kuzma Derevyanko, Soviet member of the Allied Council for Japan, who asked for information concerning the bases in a letter Monday.

Okinawa is not under international jurisdiction and what goes on there is of no concern to any one except the United States, General MacArthur said in reply.

American and British bases in Japan will be maintained in "complete readiness for any eventuality," he continued, adding: "military details affecting them are matters which concern only their commanders."

"Your professed anxiety with reference to Japan proper, which is subject to limited international supervision, is quite groundless," General MacArthur said. "So far as the Japanese are affected, the demilitarization directed by the Far Eastern Commission has been

locally accomplished. Japan indeed is entirely demilitarized.

"As for bases and installations for the forces of occupation, both American and British, they are—and will continue to be so long as the occupation lasts—maintained in condition of such adequacy and preparedness as will insure the full and most complete readiness in eventuality."



## Communism in Japan

Despite the Egyptian tone of its announcements, General Douglas MacArthur often packs a deal of solid, earthy sense. Not in some time have we seen a more cogent elucidation of the nature, technique and aims of Communism than was contained in the Supreme Commander's statement, on Tuesday, to the Japanese people. This was, in effect, an attack on the Japanese Communist party. It suggested—but did not demand—that the Japanese people give thought again to the question of illegalizing the party. Obviously any such action would have far-reaching repercussions. The move should not, in any case, be taken without the most careful weighing of pros and cons. In exposing the inner character of Japanese Communism, General MacArthur has provided a starting point for deeper discussion of the problem.

For reasons of expediency, the Japanese Communists followed, during the early years of the occupation, a milder methodology than their brethren in other countries. As in China, this encouraged in many minds the idea that perhaps the Japanese Communists were fundamentally "different"; perhaps they were potential Titoists; perhaps they could even be weaned away from their devotion to Moscow. These wishful hopes have been dampened somewhat by the party's compromising reaction to recent pointed rebukes from the Cominform world. Although the uproar over tactics still rages within the Japanese Communist leadership, General MacArthur has no doubt as to the party's basic position. The Japanese Communist party, he says, has now assumed the role of "an avowed satellite of an international predatory force and a Japanese pawn of alien power policy, imperialistic purpose and subversive propaganda."

Japan's precarious stability is dependent, for the present, on the American occupation and on American support of the Japanese economy, both heavy burdens on the American taxpayer. The problem is how to remove these props without exposing Japan to the double threat of economic collapse and Communist revolt. Obviously it is desirable to push Japan more rapidly along the road to self-sufficiency, though without restoring her to her old-time dominance. The peace treaty question is at the center of the dilemma. It may be that General MacArthur's sharp statement on Japanese Communism is designed to show a way out of one of the difficulties in the way of a satisfactory solution to the overriding peace treaty problem.

CHRISTIANITY, A WAY OF LIFE  
FELLOWSHIP WITH JESUS AT THE CENTER

What a Friend We Have in Jesus, could have been the subject of the inspiring talk that Dr. Clifford H. Richmond of Chevy Chase Methodist Church gave at the CFO meeting on April 27.

Christianity is not orthodoxy, and not experience, Dr. Richmond said. It is not the church and what is found there, nor is it the sacred sacraments of the church. Christianity is a Way of Life, and that Way is found and lived through fellowship with Jesus and in the friendship of Jesus. His way of life is the Way of Love which brings convictions and beliefs, and causes transforming changes in the lives of those who find and follow. As in the life of Paul, this friendship can bring about a oneness with Jesus where 'to live is Christ', and this oneness comes through an abiding in the love of the risen Master, which means literally spending time every day with Jesus, being from moment to moment in the consciousness of the presence of the living Christ.

This walking the Way with Jesus is not accomplished in a day, but is a gradual and glorious constant growing. As helps in cultivating this 'abiding in the love of Christ', Dr. Richmond gave seven suggestions.

- 1 - Spend much time in the gospels. Read them in the second instead of the third person in this way making Jesus seem really present here and now.
- 2 - Memorize a hymn about Jesus, singing or saying it over and over again.
- 3 - Write a letter to Jesus just as you would to any friend.
- 4 - Talk to Jesus, out loud if you are alone.
- 5 - Repeat the name of Jesus; keep saying it again and again.
- 6 - Look at pictures of Jesus, thinking of some of his attributes as you claim his presence.
- 7 - Say often and earnestly, 'Jesus I love you.' This is helpful if there are resentments from which you must free yourself.

Friendship with Jesus, this seeking first the kingdom of heaven brings the fulfillment of every real need and makes each step a continuing adventure along the path of unfolding reality in the Way of Love.

Following Cliff Richmond's spirit-feeding talk, Ward Hurlburt conducted a prayer period which gave every one a joyful sense of Jesus' presence. Each was asked to re-create in his own mind a scene from the life of Jesus, thinking of himself, as participating in the event.

Several shared their experiences which came to them. Then opportunity was given to serve the World through the power of prayer, and personal friends were brought into the healing circle of love.

In the quiet and silence before the general meeting, the Creative Writing group in meditating on Isaiah's words, "In returning and rest shall ye be saved", thoughts were written that left no doubt that creation continues today. The whole writing room seemed to be filled with The Presence, and this knowledge stayed with each one as he went into the big room for the general session. In the quiet, strength had been claimed and in confidence, God had made his presence known.

These bare facts are unable to re-create the unity and harmony and spiritual power which united all hearts the whole evening. Those who enlarge in such true prayer, know that power is at work in and through them. They grow in such an atmosphere, and life has new meaning for them thereafter.



My dear General,

You will be surprised to receive a letter from Atlanta, Georgia, from a humble citizen, but I "must" express to you my appreciation on the occasion of your reply to Russia with reference to military bases on Okinawa and elsewhere in Japan.

The United States literally paid an awful price for the glorious victory which was made possible by your courage, your ability and your loyalty, along with the other generals, soldiers, sailors and marines. Excuse me, please, sir, it is somewhat sickening to a native American, a native Georgian, to have to admit that we have never won a peace, although we have never lost a war.

You probably will receive other letters from other citizens; you may not. But I want you to know that our days are happier, and our sleep is sweeter, and our security is more priceless because you are there. I hope that you will pardon this letter. Two of my sons were in this last war.

May the time soon come when neither Russia nor any other power will feel like it can toss "provocative impertinence" at us with impunity.

My dear General MacArthur: I have long waited for an excuse to get better acquainted with you, personally. By way of introducing myself, I might say that I am Californian born and bred, widow of Lu Maxwell, a West Virginian, who was called into the Forest service, under Theodore Roosevelt, with Gifford Pinchot, chief forester, we shook the hands of both the President and his wife. In reading of good literature, I have always been interested in you, and would clip the article, and when the wars came I followed you from the Philippines, to Corrigedor, through the south seas to Australia, and you bypassed the Japs at New Guinea, and when you boarded the battle ship Missouri, and you signed, your officers signed, and the poor bedraggled Japs signed --- I have them all made up into a scrap book, which I presented to my younger son, Alexander. My other son is Selby, who, when I was a broken widow brought to this Old Peoples Home, where I have been since 1941. Miss Willmarth, our ex-Superintendent presided at Sunday School this morning. Our lesson was from Moses, that unfortunat young prophet who had such an unhappy time with his wife and children. She asked what in our opinion was the thing the people most needed in his day, and our day. I waited for some one to say "Moral courage", no one said it. When I read the report of the interview of J.P. McEvoy, with yourself, published in Reader's Digest, I said to myself, "There's a man who has what I'm looking for "Moral Courage". And I think that the thing it's going to take to take to win the "Cold War" with Russia. Don't you feel the same way?





Mr. Seth W. Richardson, Chairman of Review Board of Loyalty Cases, Washington, D.C., had through the press asked for the peoples advice as to how to go at this home problem of Communism.

I am sending you a copy, hoping it will give you and all peoples a better understanding of this problem, by your studying of it.

We can not entirely blame the people or groups, those thinking that they were standing on their rights of the Constitution when they protested to the officials in Washington.

As there has not been any official in Washington, in a position, or possible of understanding, and able to explain to the public, the peoples obligation to those seeking protection, and their signing an Oath of Loyalty to the principles of our forefathers for a Unity of the States- known as the United States, and especially so- in case of emergency.

We are not necessarily signing an Oath of Loyalty to any present political system, but an Oath of Loyalty to the principles of those giving these states law, and a United freedom for our protection, and protection for those in the armed forces for our protection, and those signing their oath for our protection, when they entered the services.

We must attribute this misunderstanding or condition, due to the fact - of all the confusion as we know it at present, and past.

I also believe our churches or religious denominations of their particular beliefs should realize the seriousness of this present situation - and those peoples not to being reluctant in signing an Oath of Loyalty, thus giving their religions and beliefs a chance for survival, from aggressor nations.

We as a religious and peace loving nation--should abhor war, and conduct our aims and purposes for the peace.

But after proper precautions, and proper preparedness, and statesmanship have preceded the necessity of an emergency or war, and we having accepted the way of society of mankind without question as to the schooling of our children and we adults, to omitting the basic - spiritual understanding of life unbiased and not injuring any particular religions and we not having set an example to the world in such teachings of the constructive thought.

So if a war is a necessity we should not be reluctant of putting our all into the purpose for the survival of this - democracy.

Those having religious convictions are entitled to their convictions and arrangements are made for such in our armed services.

Following is the copy of the letter that was sent to-- Mr. Seth W. Richardson prior to all this trouble in Korea.



May 22, 1950

Dear Sir:

I feel that since we people of today do not know by good judgment, or let's say by the present condition of confusion, we people are in today, we are not totally aware of the fact of why our constitution and its amendments were drawn up and made law, to safeguard and give the people of this United States security of those principles stated in our Constitution.

As I understand of late, we are not able to distinguish the difference of safeguarding our principles of beliefs for the people against subversive acts or thoughts of a foreign element.

It seems as if our leaders are asking for a definition or, I would say, a verification of those laws of protection and principles that were made law, and verified by our past leaders.

Our Constitution does not necessarily have to state, that we people are not to tender any subversive acts, thoughts or deeds.

We must accept our Constitution for what it is -- The backbone of this United States of America. We cannot uphold our Constitution and have any subversive beliefs of a foreign element.

Thus we people, swearing allegiance to our flag, Constitution, and laws, are entitled to the security of those benefits and laws. We people, admitting these facts-- cannot have divided beliefs as to one having a true belief or faith in the principle of our America as laid down by our forefathers, and we could not possibly accept the aims or injurious intentions of any foreign country, especially one considered to be a potential enemy.

It must be remembered our Constitution and laws safeguarding the people of this United States were drawn up and made law, by the necessity of such; leaving no doubt whatsoever of whom is to benefit by our Constitution and our laws safeguarding the principles of the people of this country of which our Constitution and laws were drawn up for.

We cannot safeguard our principles of protection by arguments or confusion as to the meaning of our Constitution - and its component laws and amendments.

If a definition of our American laws is necessary, or a simple and practical way of determining the loyalty of each individual must be necessary -- without question or controversy we might use the lower, "Communism Unchecked".



COMMUNISM UNCHECKED.

There seems to be some discrepancy today, as to our jurisdictional rights not being clearly defined or explained, thus creating a condition to arise of which leaves our constitution in an awkward position. Thus permitting communism to flourish unchecked.

As I was taught to understand, our constitution was drawn up and made law for the sole benefits and laws safeguarding the ideals and principles of the people of this United States.

We, being citizens of this country, are entitled to those benefits and laws of protection.

That should be clearly understood. This constitution was drawn up and made law - not for the advantageous objectives of persons in sympathy with any foreign element, especially those of a potential enemy we are spending millions to curb.

It is amazing how some citizens of this country can reverse conditions or laws and use them as a guard for their convictions of which must be considered to be detrimental to the best interests of this country.

Persons of right and just intentions would not be sacrificing any part of their American heritage by submitting their views openly or declaring their faith in our American principles - by signing an oath of loyalty to these principles.

It should be considered a privilege to uphold and stand by our constitution the way it was meant to be for the laws of protection for those swearing allegiance to our flag.

It cannot be impressed strongly enough, the necessity of an (oath of loyalty to be signed by our educators,) and people in charge of -- and educating those (seeking protection and their rights and security) laid down in our constitution of this United States.

Let us not reverse the main purpose of our constitution, and use it as a shade for our subversive thoughts and acts.

In all seriousness, we might use the lower as a concrete base to solve the problems on this issue.

If the Communists of Russia are considered to be contemplating a criminal act of aggression or war with this United States, causing us to spend billions of dollars to counter attack such a criminal act.

Men in control - or positions of control in our United States and said men permitting other positions of control to be held by Communists, no matter how few.

Said person must be considered to be an accomplice or accessory to this criminal act.

An after-thought: - - - - -

Simplicity is that mostly needed - but bestly overlooked.





### Addition OF THE FACTS

This is going to be a very difficult article to write-- and explain things without injury or causing ill feelings among you readers.

I also realize I may jeopardize your interest in reading and understanding other writings, but I feel it is my patriotic, as well as obligation, being a duty of submitting this article of which is strictly unsolicited, so will you please bear with me and I hope I will use my best efforts to explain with least regret

Understanding people as we do, we must admit--we have a natural tendency to being influenced by the press, of which I must explain--members of the press individually are very considerate, while omitting journalism, but as a group, they forget their individual or personal feelings, and we know the press must, for patriotic reasons, and welfare of the people, carry through the aims of any present administration--unless for the benefit of all people--a change might be necessary.

But getting back to us people, as a whole--we are very much influenced by our own groups, or I might say, by statements-- being falsehoods being circulated by us people ourselves.

It might be remembered that so many stories were in circulation during, and after the kidnapping of Mr. Lindbergh's child, I regret that this subject must be brought out, but people even today have an angerant feeling toward a man who in sorrow of losing his child, had to stand the blunt of public criticism. It must be remembered that just a few years before this occurrence, he was accepted as one of the world's greatest diplomats--for his achievements and sincerity of purpose and mission accomplished, all being beneficial in bringing countries closer together at that time, all countries accepted him for constructive thought, and accomplishments. People would do well to read the book, WE.

I do not mean to elaborate or personalize a person as a hero, but give due credit for achievements.

But why do we have a tendency to discriminate a man, and ask for more circumstantial evidence than if this man had not received publicity? And us not knowing the facts and how this man shunned publicity as much as possible.

It could be well answered in a psychological way.

It must be remembered-- the press always stands to gain for financial reasons by making or enlarging a case where there is a notable involved, and in most cases a notable of lesser achievements, and the public are responsible for this also and they should reconsider.

Now is the time for the press to rectify the injustice and humiliation that this man was caused to bear--in all of his grief.

And then this man being black-balled by politics for sound judgment given to this government.

It must be remembered, Billy Mitchel was also shunned by politics for sound advice given to this government, so it does happen and jeopardizes our preparedness and safety.

We do not necessarily consider or conjure this man to be a hero, unless politics was the contributing factor in making him so

If people would only reason and follow or check the sound advice given to the government by this man.

But at that time professors and their theories were most prevalent and more easily accepted, leaving us nothing in a constructive way, or prepared for the coming war that was at hand.

ADDITION OF THE FACTS (continued)

It would be well to check on these things, and understand reasons or causes for a man of practical thought--and constructive ways, surely would be a great boon to this United States in time of a crisis.

I would like to explain why, to the best of my belief and knowledge, for the welfare and protection of all people, we must consider and understand-- that we people must return to practical thought and accepting a merit system, and constructive thought and deeds.

You will note that the original manuscript compiled in years--1947--1948 and 1949 deals quite extensively on subjects pertaining to all the falsehoods, national trends, and propoganda and theories, and how far we were going in these trends or I might say accepting these falsehoods with too little question.

If you will remember that during years of 1948 and 1949 this government and all people were, it seems, living, I would say, superfluously on propoganda and wild or erratic statements published at that time.

Some of us realized these things, and that is why you will find many of my contradictions to these falsehoods, and the general trend the government and the people were taking and accepting too easily, or it might better be stated this way--We were quite immune to some of these serious problems confronting us people, as we, at this present time, are faced with.

Will you please check writings of the original manuscript--and you will note I understood this government to be going overboard on atomic preparedness, and relying solely on the largest club or that science which would be quite impractical for us to use in this present conflict, even though the largest appropriations were allocated for this science.

It seems because most of us were mystified in this science.

So you see--we are told today of the higher taxes to be imposed upon the people--of which is necessary, but understanding amounts appropriated for atomic warfare, does not serve in case of necessity of basic fundamental armament needed in exacting circumstances, we are told beyond our control, or that action that might have been deemed necessary after second world war.

We must get behind this thing now, but by understanding the many mistakes in the past, helps us to better visualize and correct situations that might arise in the future not giving aggressor nations the opportunity for conflict.

We have a tendency of elaborating on the fact of other nations having aggressor intentions, but even so--we must understand, that with sound, practical administration of preparedness, prohibits those with aggressor intentions from being an actual aggressor.

It might be remembered--we did have a Pearl Harbor and a Korea.

We are almost inclined as a matter of fact, to believe that the isolationists were right in believing in full preparedness of this country and all our possessions, thus we could not have had aggressors as an actuality.

That was the main contention of those believing in isolationism. Although our present status being accepted, because of the--present eventualities not foreseen by all, total isolationism now might be in question, but mostly adhered to.



ADDITION OF THE FACTS (Continued)

A few months ago, preceding this Korean situation--we had a number of Representatives--stating publicly they did not know whether by accepting Alaska into the statehood would be a financial liability--or an asset.

So I guess we have reasons to believe that politics does not offer too much cooperation in coordinating our own possessions in a position to adequately be prepared for any eventuality of these so-called aggressor nations.

Now I have mentioned these past mistakes, hoping you will realize the necessity of placing a man as commander-in-chief who is adequately prepared in a military way, and this man, being not too militant, but well prepared in all phases of aircraft of which is a main item in proper preparedness, and this man is also prepared strategically and geographically returning to this country some time ago after mapping airways, all pertaining to the better welfare of this United States in peace time as well as in time of conflict.

And I might state--it probably would not have been necessary to use the tax payers' money for congressional investigations as to appropriating funds for a certain type of aircraft, and then questioning the necessity of such, as we witnessed some time back.

That is another reason why we need men adequately prepared, or those having an all around knowledge of aircraft strategy and those realizing the important position aircraft holds in any conflict that contributes to the protection of this nation and protection of those we place in a position of protection this United States and our possessions.

But as I stated--it would not be wise to consider a man who is too militant, as that might work against any cause, or a definite purpose of peace negotiations or contribute to such wholeheartedly.

It would be about the same as placing one too ill-equipped in military strategy to properly defend, or realize--peace or lives must be considered before leaders' convictions.

I will also give reasons for practical beliefs in a man of his type and capabilities being one adequately prepared, and has proven his good judgment on many things, creating employment at one time in a certain field. And also our government benefitting much from his knowledge and practical experience even up until the present day. We will remember his efforts were shunned by our past political regime'.

This country accepted him at one time for his proven ability in a mechanical nature of which is more than some of our present day politicians have done. Regardless of whether he was a national hero or not does not deflect from his good judgment and capabilities.

It is a sad state of affairs when the greatest country in the world will proclaim a man as national hero - for sound judgment and achievement, and then the people let politics black-ball him for contributing sound advice to our government, for the protection and benefit of the people of the United States--and his advice not being accepted, it seems because he did not carry a political label. And it must be remembered this man shunned publicity as much as possible. We only have to read history to see the facts I am writing of.

This man, by his skill and achievements was able to fly, inspect and quote size of our to-be enemies' airplanes and their preparedness for war. But when he put his knowledge of such to the dis-

posal of this country, he was shunned, called Nazi, and all such things. Only for us to see after war this very government hiring German scientists to show us how. A person wouldn't think that could happen in this country, but it did; much to the integrity of the people of this United States.

This man was also well advised as to conditions and preparedness of our army to carry airmail, when airmail contracts were cancelled by our past political regime. And he stated army was not prepared; they were making a mistake, of which was proven afterwards. If I remember right, a dozen or more army fliers lost their lives in a few weeks. But this man was black-balled for giving sound advice That is history.

Now this man did not have to fly an airplane or cross the Atlantic in one to prove his good judgment. If this man had been flying an airplane, riding a horse or sled, he would have arrived at Pearl Harbor, before the Japanese did. Please excuse my expression

How do you think this man felt about this country black-balling him when he was once proclaimed a national hero for his knowledge and achievements. If there ever was a "Lone Eagle", this man earned the title.

It must be remembered, flying the Atlantic Ocean, by this man, is almost overlooked by the achievements of him and his wife flying all over the world and his mapping and knowledge of air strategy.

So, we must not doubt his ability as to his good judgment as a whole. The only disadvantage would be his not being schooled in present day politics, of which should be a great asset to a man of practical thinking.

There will be pros and cons on this issue, but let's give it much thought. We need some definite change in our politics, if communism is not to have an open road to travel on, due to stalemated conditions of our present system of politics, of which is as we see it.

Now, does not this great country have any ideals, or believe in a merit system or electing a man who could be an example of achievements and an ideal for the youth of this country to so help to develop their minds on a constructive or merit system by sound judgment and practicability of that accomplished by our to-be next president, Charles A. Lindbergh

Now, if the people of this great country believe in a merit system and standards of ideals to conduct their lives on, and want to do justice, to a man who has proven his ability at adapting himself to any condition, even to the extent of being a national hero at one time, and point of ridicule by a group of selfish politicians under the same flag, let's save the face of this great country and elect this accomplished man for the benefit of all people. Charles A. Lindbergh.

We must not overlook the qualifications of this man, and also remember this man has humanitarian interests at heart, you will remember this man worked on the mechanical heart, and we also will remember an article released to the press some time back by this man, Mr. Charles A. Lindbergh, stating his views, and his understanding as to the care that should be taken in acknowledging how this mechanical age, is far beyond the advancement of goodness of mental thoughts and constructive acts.

Now we hear arguments as to idealistic views both pro and con.

But let us not detour from ideals that would be a contributing factor to sound, practical administration of affairs of this United States in peace time as well as when we are in an exacting position or crisis, that definitely requires the best in constructive thought, and proper preparedness by those being adequately prepared to handle the positions or presidency of this great United States that merits proper leaders.

I advised Mr. Lindbergh some time back as to the ill effects as to being affiliated with any present political party, and we do not definitely accept, or require the votes or backing of any subversive or foreign elements.

It might better be explained this way--The Republicans are the ones who break the pump handle off to keep the Democrats from pumping the well dry.

Let us not thirst because of opposed political systems.

We people must realize the benefits to be gained by a capitalistic system contributing to the better living conditions of us peoples being the initiative, that elevates us in our standards of living above most nations of the world today.

We also accept the capitalistic system with moderation, by that I mean--

The few seeking financial interests will not dominate or rule beyond the realization that labor, and our armed forces, or these peoples being the majority, caused to contribute to the welfare and protection of all peoples and letting finances jeopardize their plans to be carried out and safeguard their lives as well.

But we accepting the capitalistic system with modification, Also this system not being chocked to the place, where we are forced to submit alphabetical systems as a substitute for that better economy, being the most constructive, and us benefitting years afterwards by constructive thoughts and deeds.

Now I have proposed that Mr. Charles A. Lindbergh be put in a position of nominator and elected president, because of the practicability and necessity of having a man of the peoples' choice and this man not being put up for nomination by any political systems, thus pressures from these groups would not over-rule better judgment.

And the laboring man would benefit, by such a man not being influenced by pressures of parties opposed to certain benefits for the people, and their protection, although it is strictly your prerogative to vote for whom you choose, but your reading of this article should surely cause you to realize that now is the time

we people must direct our ways of voting for the practical and constructive.

Regardless of the way you vote after your reading of this article, and many others reading this article, will help us to vote for a constructive form fo government.

I would like to make it clear, my proposal was strictly unsolicited. I stand to gain nothing personally by the proposal I submitted.

And I also informed Mr. Charles A. Lindbergh I had or have no intentions of personal gain, and would not accept any such measures condoned on me.

But by realizing the condition at this present time, I realize for better and constructive thoughts and deeds being a necessity at this time, we must start at home base, being the government of the people, for the people, or that source of which we people are influenced in our daily life.

NOTE

There are no intended reflections on state politics in this article. Any reflections would be on the Federal politicians, being those parties that rely on State politics for their own security and protection--in case of emergencies by poor foresight and also these parties not being very well informed as to their poor administrative policies and their premature assurances of peace and then, bang\_KOREA.

By all necessity we should have an informative government, if we place them in a position of protecting by governing this United of these states.

As I understand it is our great American heritage to vote for whom we choose. That is our purchased freedom--not necessarily to being tied to systems or other such forms of encroachment on our civil rights if they could be termed that by the nature of the present procedure used in presenting their candidate for our electing.

So one may submit his or her choice on the ballot being one of our many privileges of freedom in these United States. But do so, with discretion; doing so for that unity that is mostly needed at this time above all opposed or partisan parties.

Forgive me for making this proposal, but I believe I have written enough material or subjects on science, gravitation and life that merit such a proposal.

And all must admit some kind of proposal is due and necessary in our preent state and condition. With our prospects for the future something to be ignored because of the unforeseen eventualities that might occur, being that of which enslaves life to the long misfortunes of war and its aftermath. 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## A QUESTION SOMETIMES ASKED.

Why was wrong doing or sin permitted to happen after creation? To answer this properly, I must explain or define the word intelligence. But in short-- the person having intelligence has developed his thought to practical terms and deductions, knowing the difference between right and wrong--by the party observing and absorbing many things, thus drawing conclusions, unbiased, or solving true length by different angular positions --being able to use better judgment while using his ability in looking at situation or condition from all angles.

Our brain was created like a balance to govern our thoughts and acts, pertaining to this life. The Bible says man was created to rule and be the governor of all things on this earth. Thus man was endowed with that superior intelligence, not like instinct of lower forms of life.

You will note how man governs animals much larger than himself, or let's look at it on a proportionate basis, the small body governs the large, because of man being created entirely superior with that ability of acquiring intelligence of which in no way could be connected with cell life of lower forms than man.

After so many years of wrong doing, our intelligence has ebbed to the place where it would be impossible for us to really understand or comprehend the intelligence Adam and Eve were created with. The reason for this is, we people, realizing the ways of mankind today, is one verification, and also we will note that men, in the beginning were of great stature and lived many years longer than we do, after so many years of wrong doing, causing mental deficiency and deteriorated effect on the body. Thus our minds are not even in a condition to comprehend the full meaning of this life, or the intelligence Adam and Eve were created with.

So Adam and Eve were created with the intelligence to know right from wrong. We today are ordinarily born with a pure mind and mind being born in perfect structure and cells and we must acquire that intelligence. But we must accept the ability of acquiring intelligence under most exacting conditions of the world today- as man being influenced in wrong doing from the beginning and the stage or date of today being a much longer length of time of wrong doing, and also the deteriorated effect of the brain cells and body. ~~But~~ getting back to the beginning and Adam and Eve. I would like to draw a proportionate measure in making you understand how it was possible for Adam and Eve to sin, understanding the intelligence they were created with, and not question why our Creator--God, you might say, let it happen.

We know man was created with an intelligent mind, in the beginning, thus being able in dividing his ways of right from wrong. I would like to state it this way:

God,, creating life to be reproduced as it is. If I am wrong, I pray to be forgiven--but all indications of that time, and our present day of living, to me verifies as to the best of my knowledge as to what I am going to write very conclusively.

As I stated, God created life to be reproduced as it is. God knew that to reproduce, a satisfaction was necessary, thus man and woman could share mutually in the greatest thing there is on earth child birth. We are not in a position to understand or realize how completely and beautiful God created man and woman and their ways of reproducing life. God must have also realized if man had not been created with that satisfaction, reproduction of life might not have reproduced so aptly.

It will be remembered the Tree of Life or Good and Evil was placed in the center of the Garden of Eden. The Tree of Life being the Tree of Reproduction of life-- and center-meaning center of all life--of which a tree was used as having branches, or children and descendants.

Now Adam and Eve were told to wait when they could partake of the Tree of Life, meaning good and evil-- even as we recognize it today. But I will give explanation of our present ways later. Thus we accepting these ways, after sin, leaving us no alternative but to conduct our sex habits as we do-- but properly confined and restricted to family life.

Although Man must understand and judge for himself, I believe that now is the time the Bible should be better understood for the benefit of all people.

The question is today whether it is better for these things to be explained as explained in this article, or how much good has the past explanation been in helping people to clearly understand the problem at present and their having a better explanation of wrong doing from the beginning of which runs true to form up until the present time. It must be remembered that many things and ways of illustrating subjects were used in writing of compiling the Scriptures.

There are other points substantiating the Tree of Reproduction as follows:-

Adam and Eve were ashamed bodily, also women would suffer at child birth, and our largest problem of today also verifies such. But the deduction we are able to make as to Adam and Eve not waiting, and -- being ashamed is due to the fact, child birth was started in the wrong time of cycle or time of position of this earth in its orbit of travel in space.

We have seasons by positions, planting of crops by positions animals live by positions or changes in seasons, fish lay eggs by positions. Our bodies are governed by sleep at night by positions, breakfast, lunch and dinner governed by time or positions. Most everything on this earth is governed by positions of this earth causing day, night and seasons. Now -- if the body in its daily habits is governed by time of positions, surely that body should have been conceived or born in a certain position. This is in no way connected with the present day astrology.

Now let us use lesser forms of life, they being governed mostly by instinct-- not intelligence.

Now what would happen if fish laid their eggs out of season, or wrong position of earth in the orbit of travels, the eggs would not develop. (As an illustration): Animal forms would eventually be deteriorated of their being or perish. So man also reproduces and was told to wait until God would tell them the time.



A QUESTION SOMETIMES ASKED. (cont'd)

As I said, in the beginning, man was of great stature--and lived many years. But now we have a deteriorated condition of life physically and wonder at our times. I have had to detour and explain some things, but getting back to original subject. Why was wrong doing, we will say, permitted, after a perfect creation of earth and nature.

As I stated, man was created with an intelligent mind to divide his ways, or a balance I use the term balance as meaning, God gave man full control of himself and intelligence to balance this control. In other words if man had been created without full control of balancing himself with intelligence, he would not have needed an intelligent mind, but could have survived with instinct-like lower forms of life. And since man was told he was to be the ruler of all things on the earth, thus man needed the superior intelligence. So in the beginning God made man with full control to be master with intelligence of himself. Not being handicapped of lesser intelligence like animals, but full control. (As an illustration) because a horse has less intelligence and more instinct.

We with the superior intelligence to rule all animals, must put a fence around this horse to govern the horse.

God could have placed restrictions on us, but we were created with that ability of greater intelligence and full control of balance without, as I said restrictions.

As man was to be ruler over all things on earth--thus needing that full control-- or higher intelligence not restricted by fences, thus not letting him stray because, of not being created of lower intelligence. As a simple illustration: Could a horse do any wrong inside a fence?-- or if he could, could he be punished? knowing he was not created with that intelligence of knowing right from wrong.

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Now understanding that as a fact, we are the ones that can be punished because we have that balance to govern ourselves.

Now as this earth was created for the man to be, we will note the proportions of this earth to that of the one to rule its surface, or man. So man was given that privilege of superior intelligence not fenced in--or the human brain caused to be lowered to that of animals--knowing then men would do no wrong, or could not be punished for such. Now knowing the proportions of this earth that was created for man to be. We might compare the proportions or magnitude or manner of which this earth was to be populated.

So God made ways as beautiful as possible for this reproduction of life. But God knew by giving man these privileges of which were of much importance or a large part of man's life, man might be tempted and partake before God had planned it.

If man had not been created this way, we would have had to sacrifice the intelligence-- giving birth by instinct or sacrifice the satisfaction, as man is superior to animals. Remember, man was created with both. So could man blame anyone but himself, when man was given such privileges?

Now let us try to understand our sex problems of today. I believe one of the main reasons why man has shunned from trying to explain the story of Adam and Eve is because it is a very touchy subject as compared with our behavior today.



### A QUESTION SOMETIMES ASKED. (cont'd)

But I would like also to leave with the question being answered by each man by his own will and reasoning, but understanding is wisdom. Relations without the mind being disturbed after knowing of the facts.

I feel I am not putting in this article that touch-- or that understanding with beauty and graciousness that the things written in this article merits. So I hope later on I will do this subject justice.

As I stated before, this part of our lives, and reproduction of life were created by God in a very beautiful manner, and man was expected to understand it as such.

Understanding the time that has elapsed since creation of earth all nature man, and reproduction of life created by God all in beauty, and this elapsed time since and wrong doing by man over a period of so many years-- by law of averages or facts to be between seven and eight thousand years, has caused us people to accept these things without us being prepared mentally of understanding just how beautiful this phase or carriage of life was created to be.

Accepting the fact our minds are quite immune to fully understanding, we live this life quite disconcerned as to our carriage or understanding of these things.

But understanding we of today are a part of life, long after creation places us under, or I might say, to being almost governed by this period of time, as a (matter of fact) meaning as to factual, after sin in the beginning Adam and Eve had condemned themselves and all descendents after them to accepting these present conditions of our relations, and to accepting the punishment or deteriorated effect of man and the ill effects as we know them, as the Bible states they would be.

But that definitely does not place us to an advantage point of overlooking this mistake, and the fact we must strictly confine and conduct our affairs and relations in a manner beneficial to the best interests of mankind.

Carriage of such relations to being that of which binds, or ties those parties in respect by marriage, marriage being that institution-- that creates for the spiritual- or that standard of marriage of peoples that contributes for the best interests, being the manner of which life love and childbirth can best be glorified by God and respected by all people, and marriage contributing to the higher level and best security of mankind.

#### RELATIONS OUT OF WEDLOCK.

There were only a few cases, or advice given in the Bible, where as to certain restricted cases as told, -- not favoring, but advice given; advice given by wise men but given with reluctance as to relations out of wedlock.

But understanding and wisdom must be used giving us that measure of our conduct. This has been a very difficult subject to write, but I leave it with you as each man to use reason, knowing there are certain cases excepted, but with reason, and and surely only by necessity of such.

### NOTES

The number seven(7) being a number quite frequently used in the Bible-- and days of the week being seven, has also governed man's thoughts in using number seven in most cases. Body cells change every seven years, being a decided factor of all life being governed by number seven such as maturity, etc.

It might be noted, number seven is an odd number. Thus, not being equally divided of which leaves on doubt as to benefits gained in a certain cycle, by odd number being the decided governing factor.

As an illustration:

A boy or girl, will under normal conditions, show a definite change in maturity in two or second seventh year period.

Now if the number had been even six or eight, we would have doubt as to an overlap by even numbers by sooner or later maturity. But the odd one number must be considered the governing factor, leaving no doubt as to all life being governed by cycles or periods. And sin started in the same way in wrong position of cycle of the earth in its orbit of travel in space. Energy of wall of energy surrounding earth being decided factor as to all growth of nature and habits of man on this earth.

Our whole life is governed by certain positions of earth in its travels. Even breakfast, lunch and dinner must be considered habits of man, accepted because of certain positions of earth-- causing day, night and noon

Thus Adam and Eve, partaking of Tree of Life-- speaking of Tree of Life being placed in center of Garden of Eden, meaning center of all life or reproduction of life.

They took upon themselves and must be considered to have been in wrong cycle or position of earth in its travel in energy.

We must consider night and day being governed by energy, and energy of inergitation working to this earth as explained in other writings is the basic principle of this life we live.








### *Did you know?—*

The Reserve Officers Association was formed in 1922 in Washington, D.C. It was then, and is now, an independent organization of Reserve officers who were primarily civilians with the points of view and interests of civilians. By 1940, the Association had approximately 35,000 members and 729 chapters throughout the United States. In January, 1942, following the outbreak of World War II, the Association was turned over to a Board of Trustees and all memberships were frozen for the duration of the war. It was reactivated in May, 1945 with a membership of approximately 20,000. By April, 1947, the total membership reached almost 140,000. After that time, as more and more Reserve officers relaxed their vigilance to turn their attention to civilian pursuits, membership began to decline. In June 1948, the Reserve Officers Association and the Reserve Officers of the Naval Services, (originally founded in 1945) were merged. Today the membership of ROA is approximately 80,000.

The Americans that I have talked with are quite proud of your accomplishments and we all pray that God in His wisdom will grant you and yours a very long and happy life.





A copy of Volume III, "Engineer Intelligence," the third volume published of our historical series of the "Engineers of the Southwest Pacific, 1941-1945" is forwarded herewith.

This volume supplements Volume I, "Engineers in Theater Operations," and Volume VII, "Engineer Supply," previously furnished to you.

The mission of Engineer Intelligence was a major and difficult one. The operational areas in the Southwest Pacific embraced millions of square miles, little of which was charted and much of which was unknown. The means for rapid accomplishment of aerial photography and map production and reproduction were always meager for the tasks. Advance Engineer Intelligence interpretation of unknown and enemy-held areas was difficult; yet, maps and charts had to be provided and intelligence studies completed prior to each projected operation if intelligent planning and successful operations were to be achieved.

This volume describes the problems faced, the means employed and the success achieved in this highly important phase of our Engineer operations.

## TOKIO JITTERY ON RUSS MOVE

**TOKIO, May 28.**—(AP)—Russia's top official in Japan and bitter adversary of General MacArthur was en route home to Moscow today under peculiarly abrupt circumstances.

Authoritative occupation military sources were inclined to regard it either as a Soviet decision to use Lieut. Gen. Kuzma Derevyanko's knowledge of United States military strength for new pressure on Southeast Asia, or to punish him for failing to stir up chaos in Japan.

Either way, it was regarded as a significant maneuver in the cold war.

If the punishment speculation is correct, it is considered likely that there will be intensified efforts to plunge Japan into turmoil.

### CLEWS SOUGHT—

Diplomatic circles and the nervous Japanese are watching closely for clues.

In any case, the Japanese expect no reduction in the persistent Communist incitement to disorder within this country.

Derevyanko and his wife sailed suddenly Saturday aboard Soviet trawler 284 for Vladivostok, where they will take a train to Moscow. With them were fifty other Soviet mission officials, soldiers and dependents, including some wives and children.

Derevyanko did not make the customary farewell courtesy call on General MacArthur, although he has been associated with MacArthur's headquarters since May, 1945, when he was attached to the intelligence section in Manila to help co-ordinate the pending Soviet entry into the Pacific war.

### SHORT NOTICE—

The Russian notified American officials of his departure an unusually short time before sailing. No explanation for the abrupt move was given.

Col. Sevastyan A. Polyshenko, an obscure officer, was left in charge of the exceedingly active Soviet mission in Tokio. Even with the departures, it still numbers more than 100 officials.

prise. They noted that Derevyanko took his wife with him—something he has not done on the two other occasions in past years when he reported back to Moscow.

They also noted that the move left the Russian mission without any official of either military or civilian rank usual for such an assignment.

On one previous occasion the mission in Tokio was left in charge of Jacob Malik, who since has become a major Soviet figure in international diplomacy; on the other, when Derevyanko was away for an entire year in 1947-48, Maj. Gen. A. P. Kis'enko was

acting chief.

Today's mass withdrawal leaves only secondary men to run the large Russian delegation, which once totaled 400 persons but which now is of unknown size.

General MacArthur, supreme commander of the occupation, rebuked Derevyanko May 4 for asserting that American bases in Japan and Okinawa violated occupation policies. Noting that Derevyanko had been in Japan since the start (he signed the surrender aboard the Missouri), MacArthur called Derevyanko's charge "provocative impertinence."

MacArthur also twice in the past year has suggested that Japan might consider outlawing

the Communist Party, and has consistently pressed the Russians to account for some 370,000 Japanese prisoners of war that they have failed to repatriate.






