The story tapped out by that first faint radio signal justified the faith of Gen. MacArthur and all Americans in the Filipino people. In Gen. MacArthur's own words," I saw a people in one of the most tragic hours of human history, bereft of all reason for hope and without material support, endeavoring, despite the stern realities confronting them, to hold aloft the flaming torch of liberty."

Gen. MacArthur acted through the understanding assistance of the Navy. Arms, ammunition, medical supplies were sent in driblets at first, then finally four submarines were committed exclusively to supplying this patriot army.

News of the first of such shipments spread radidly throughout the Philippines to electrify the people into full returning consciousness that America had neither abandoned nor forgotten them.

Supported and guided from headquarters the resistance movement became deadly efficientand affected the military security of the whole Japanese position in the Southwest Pacific.
