FULL TRANSLATION - EXTRACT FROM BLACK CODES AND WHITE WITNESS - SALAMANA

"BLOOD CARNIVAL"

29 March 1943 - All four of us, KUROKAWA, NISHIGUCHI, YAMATA and myself, assembled in front of the headquarters at 1500 hours. One of the two members of the crew of the Douglas which was shot down by A/A on the 18th, and who had been under cross examination by the 7th Base Force for some days had been returned to the SALAMANA Garrison and it had been decided to kill him.

TAI Commander KEMAI, when he came to the observation station today told us personally that, in accordance with the compassionate sentiments of Japanese BUSHIDO, he was going to kill the prisoner himself with his favorite sword. So we gathered to observe this. After we had waited a little more than ten minutes, the truck came along.

The prisoner who is at the side of the guard house is given his last drink of water. The Chief Medical Officer, TAI Commander KEMAI and the headquarters platoon commander came out of the officers mess wearing their military swords. The time has come, so the prisoner with his arms bound and his long hair now cropped very close, tatters forward. He probably suspects what is afoot, but he is more composed than I thought he would be. Without more ado he is put on the truck and we set out for our destination.

I have a seat next to the Chief Medical Officer -- about ten guards ride with us. It will not be long now. As I picture the scene we are about to witness, my heart beats faster. The truck runs along the stakere. Here and there we see sentries in the grassy fields. They must have got it in the bombing the night before last -- there are great holes by the side of the road full of water from the rain. In a little over twenty minutes we arrive at a big bomb crater and all get off.

TAI Commander KEMAI stands up and says to the prisoner. "We are now going to kill you." When he tells the prisoner that in accordance with Japanese BUSHIDO he would be killed with a Japanese sword and that he would have two or three minutes grace. He listens with a bowed head and then says a few words in a low voice. I heard the word "one" which means he wants to be killed by one stroke of the sword.

Now the time has come and the prisoner is made to kneel on the bank of a bomb crater filled with water. He is apparently resigned; the precaution is taken of surrounding him with guards with fixed bayonets but he remains calm. He even stretches out his neck and is very brave.

The TAI Commander has drawn his favorite sword. It is the famous OSABUNE sword which he showed us at the observation post. It glitters in the light and sends a cold shiver down my spine. He taps the prisoner's neck lightly with the back of the blade, then raises it above his head with both arms and brings it down with a sweep.

I had been standing with my muscles tensed but that moment I closed my eyes. SHII! It must be the sound of blood spurting from the arteries. With a sound as though something watery had been cut, the body falls forward. It is amazing -- he had killed him with one stroke. The onlookers crowd forward. The head detached from the trunk rolls in front of it. SHII! SHII! The dark blood gushes out.

1. I have not been heretofore advised that there was any specific authorized strength for this Section, nor consulted as to personnel requirements. At present, I am the only officer of the Army on duty with the Section (as distinguished from its field activities) and about one half of the time I am the only person above enlisted grade present to handle the not inconsiderable volume of work processed for the consideration of the G-2 and Chief of Staff. This is an unhealthy situation which would have been remedied earlier by the acquisition of additional officer personnel had such personnel with necessary qualifications been available.

2. Captain Higbee is such an officer. He has long been connected with the National City Bank of New York in the Far East, having been for some time manager of the Cebu branch of the said Bank. Through his experience he is familiar with both Philippine personalities and economy and can be most helpful in digesting and evaluating the great mass of intelligence material of a civil nature now coming out of the Philippines.

3. It is proposed to utilize the services of Captain Higbee in this field. He is intensely interested in Philippine problems and impresses me as an enthusiastic and energetic officer.
