My dear Col. FERTIG:

Long before yet I contemplated to communicate with you to congratulate you as C.O. of the 10th Military District, so fortunate we are as under which falls the province of Lanao, but for fear of my letter being intercepted, I refrained from being so as further more I did not have any confidential man to carry such message. In view of this, in the absence of such contact, I understand I have been branded as a pro-Jap. For this reason, I am taking this opportunity to write you through Lt. Ben G. I cannot now tell you in writing, Lt. Hermosura will tell them to you personally.

It is true that before the organization of the guerilla or USFIP, together with my brother, Senator Alauya Alonto, Sultan sa Ramain, after the surrender of the USAFFE in the province of Lanao under Gen. FORT, tain peace and order for the protection of both lives and properties for the sake of my people.

Before the outbreak of the War, I was elected third member in the province of Lanao and by virtue of such position I swore upon oath to protect the constitutions of both the Philippines and the United States and to recognize American Sovereignty, which I have been holding dear to my heart. During the invasion of Lanao by our enemy, I had held position of confidence and trust under the late Gen. FORT as Commander-in-Chief of the Bolo Battalion in the "basac" region from Ramain to Sawir, farther Masiu, and even during the retreat of the USAFFE to the best I could, I had helped both Filipino and American civilians and soldiers from lawlessness against the natives, particularly the American missionaries and the families of all the Army Officers who evacuated for safety in my place at Rugan and Ramain, about which when I pay you my respects personally upon the return of Lt. Hermosura, I can and will present to you documentary evidences and also what I did even during the Japanese occupation in the province. What good I have done, I am doing at present, and will always do for my country and America. As a matter of fact my surrender to the Japs was a blessing in disguise as most of the firearms surrendered to the Japs are all now in our possession and I can assure you that we will use same, upon receipt of orders from you, to exterminate the Japs. My men are at your disposal and they are always ready at any time. It is only a question of organizing and linking them together so they will become part and parcel of your duly constituted organization now under your

In view of the foregoing, it is my desire to let you know that my surrender due to our defeat does not exactly mean that I am conquered here and thus together with my people I am a Pro-Japanese. I believe I am being misunderstood with regards to my stand. Is it a crime that I have to protect my people against lawlessness and cruelty of our superior enemy after the surrender of our outstanding army? If possible I do not want to mention about surrender as it tortures me much. As for me I consider nothing meaner and more vile than to yield to the enemy without fighting to the last ditch, but Tortured by worries, I have been patiently waiting for American aid and any other development as what we have at present and word from you as to My people are still intact with me not only Ramain but in the whole lake region. Body and soul they are for the Americans and the Allied Nations and the noble cause for which we are all fighting hard. I am just awaiting word from you and the authority to organize my men by the return of Lt. Her-I have here available a number of men to make even a division and what you cannot supply us now because of the limited number of firearms and ammunition, I can assure you that you are relieved with such a problem. When I move my people will sally forth to strive without failure for the redemption of our country. I can reat assure you just to leave Dansalan to us, it is just as good as taken about which Lt. Hermosura will explain it to you and as requested by me, he will tell you more of my plans which I trust would meet your approval and satisfaction. ** In conclusion, my personal regards to you with prayerful wishes that you will always be in the best of health together with all luck. I surrendered to the Japanese Imperial Forces after Gen. FORT together with his men submitted themselves to the enemy on that fateful day or May 27, 1942. Before the surrender, however, through my son, Domocao Al. Alonto who was then commissioned to the USAFFE, I assured the late Gen. FORT all the occoperation that could possibly come from me, and even after the surrender, I wanted to carry on the fight with my people who has been faithful to me and loyal to our cause and I have resolved then to stay in the forest which I could possibly do even for years. But with the Japanese threats to burn houses and harrass my people, after a thorough and mature deliberation, I had no other alternative except to surrender to protect life and property from lawlessness and cruelty of our enemy. As senstor-elect, it is my paramount duty and a sacred one above sverything else to render my people such service which service I have been executing day in and day out since that fateful day of my surrender for the sake of the civilian population especially women and children. *

Since my submission to the enemy, I have been for several times offered positions under the Japanese Imperial Forces, but somehow through tact and positions under the Japanese Imperial Forces, but somehow through tact and diplomacy I have been able to diplomacy I have been able to maintain peace and order here not because of orders from the Japanese. It is not only my duty but also my sincere desire to relieve them of their suffering. This can be done if you surrender peacefully.

I ask you to surrender now and cease hostilities. I guarantee you protection. If you are afreid to surrender to the Nipponese authorities, you can come with the bearer to Dansalan and meet me here. If this is impracticable, you can surrender in Iligan where I have my Special Delegate who is acting Provincial Fiscal Francisco Obach,

I might add that the Philippines will have her independence this year. Since there is now no other justifiable reason for your resistance, except that you are fighting for the independence of our country, you should now surrender because such independence is already assured.

Please answer this letter and let me know your stand.



to be with the USAFFE in Misamis before the invasion of Lanao in April, 1942. Some of our present USFIP soldiers recognised him, and although they had to retreat because of the greater number of Japanese plus airplanes and cannon, yet they remained long enough to kill Captain Vasques. The Japanese did not care for his body, they just let it lie without attention under a house, so the dogs ate Captain Vasques when his body rotted.

Now the pro-Japs, the amigos, the traitors must all think whether they want to be eaten by dogs. They must think if their sons sent to Manila or Davao to study will really become students or only become rotten meat for the dogs.

On the Lanao side the Japanese failed entirely. They landed about 100 men to try to rescue the Japanese prisoners, but the prisoners had already been removed to another place. Instead, Colonel Morgan and his men ambushed these Japanese and killed about thirty. The rest retreated to their transport and went away.

At Kolambugan a Japanese cruiser fired about Pl000 worth of shells and then landed some soldiers. Our soldiers had an ambush prepared for them, but the Japanese instead of advancing entered only one house right on the beach, broke open a trunk and took P6 from it. They caught two chickens and then returned to their ship. Altogether they did not stay 20 minutes. Thus, at a cost of Pl000 the Japanese captured two chickens in Kolambugan. It is very sure that this great victory has been reported to Emperor Hirohito.

This news is for our loyal friends and supporters, both civilians and MMF. It is not intended to convince amiges, pro-Japs, traitors and pretenders. We do not need them for our aid is near enough now so that we can say the longest part of our hard time is past. In less than a year our friends in Lanao will be rowarded and our traitors punished. And in less than two years Japan itself will be crying for mercy from its bombed cities. Last week, Paramushiru, the first island of Japan in the north was bombed heavily by American planes from Attu.



LOCAL NEWS

The Japanese attacked Misamis on June 26th with 12 airplanes (3 at Tuauran, 4 at Misamis, 5 at Oroquieta and Dipolog), one light cruiser, seven or eight armed transports, between 1500 and 2000 mixed Japanese and Korean or Formosan slave soldiers, and a few Filipino traitors. With this large force they were able to occupy and still hold the towns of Tukuran, Pagadian, Misamis, Oroquieta and Dipolog. In order to assemble this large force they had to exert all their efforts by taking troops from Dansalan, Iligan, Cagayan, Zamboanga, Davao, Cebu, and perhaps Iloilo and Manila.

Except for occupying the towns mentioned above they accomplished very little. They did not destroy our forces and they did not capture any of our military supplies except a few sacks of corn. One month after, our soldiers are still fighting and have successfully ambushed them several times. Our total losses are only five killed and twelve wounded. On the other hand the Japanese have already lost over one hundred in killed alone. At Polot Market in Misamis our soldiers caught them by surprise with hand grenades; the Japanese needed three bull carts to carry away their dead, piled together like sardines in a can. At Tambulig, the Japanese were ambushed with a machine gun and 22 men were killed. They have no trucks and have to patrol by hiking and are always ambushed. As a result, their patrols have become fewer and the Japanese are now confined to the towns. They can hardly go out, like in Ganassi. They can hardly get food; for very few of the people have surrendered, and all of the Misamis officials have remained loyal. Our provincial governments in Lanao, Misamis and Zamboanga are still functioning as well as 10th Military District Headquarters.

During the fighting in Pagadian, some of the Maranac kidnappers took advantage of the trouble and went to Dinas and Margosatubig. But they were caught by our USFIP soldiers and eight of the kidnappers were killed at Tikala Island. This will happen to all kidnappers in Lanac in less than one year, for the Americans are again driving the Japanese further out of the Solczons and New Guinea and now are nearer the Philippines right through the strongest defense line of the Japanese.

When the Japanese landed in Misamis last month, one of the Filipino traitors who guided them was Captain Ruperto Vasquez. Captain Vasquez used
