1. Boiled down - Kangleon to Quezon:

a. Kangleon requests authority to print 2,000,000 pesos.

c. Concur with G-3 recommended action (para 2.c.2)), as modified by G-1 recommended action (para 3.b.1)), to omit references to C-in-C's assurance that loyal civil servants will receive post-war salary adjustments.

d. Do not concur with G-l recommended action (para 3.b.2)) - instructions to Kangleon reference new civil government officials to be appointed,
etc. Kangleon has, and will continue to have his hands full in Leyte. Approximately 20,000 enemy troops now occupy Leyte and Samar, the bulk of which are
located in Leyte. Believe that Kangleon's supervision and control of provincial government is more apparent than real. To instruct him to set up a civil
government, refer to codes, etc., will be asking more of him than he can do.

Re Action sheet 162 (KANGLEON's message No. 8)

- l. It seems doubtful whether the C-in-C should assure KANGLEON that "loyal civil servants who had remained faithful to their trust will receive prompt post war adjustment" of compensation in arrears. To see that such adjustment is made may be beyond his post-war responsibility and authority.
- 2. In accordance with the C-in-C's policy that military and civil affairs should remain separated when possible, and in view of KANGLEON's statement that provincial and municipal governments are functioning in the province of LEYTE, an effort should be made to return the provincial government to civilian officials. This could be accomplished if the officials designated by the administrative code to succeed the provincial governor and provincial board members in case of their disability or absence from the province were to assume office, as provided by the code.

3. Action recommended:

- a. That the assurance as to prompt post-war readjustment for arrears in salaries of loyal civil servants as recommended in (b) of the original action sheet be omitted.
- b. That KANGLEON be instructed that the provincial officials who would succeed the Provincial Governor and Board members under the administrative code should succeed to those offices and should be so notified by him unless conditions make such succession impossible. In that case he should be instructed to notify GHQ and recommend other civilian successors to vacant offices.

In re message of Colonel KANGLEON to President QUEZON. Precis:

In view of the delegation of commonwealth power by QUEZON to the Comment: C in C and the former's desire not to be burdened with administrative affairs this is a matter which should properly be disposed of by the C in C without reference to President QUEZON.

> By last reports practically all of the municipalities of LEYTE were occupied by the enemy. It is therefore difficult to see how LEYTE currency could be put into any extensive Provincial circulation.

In our message NR 252 we authorized FERTIG to supply MINDANAO currency to meet the requirements of LEYTE within the amounts previously authorized by the commonwealth government, to obviate the hazard attached to local printing and avoid the necessity for the direct supply to LEYTE of printing materials. He thereupon invited the Provincial officials of LEYTE to state their requirements. Nothing further has been heard concerning the matter.

KANCELEON must have funds with which to sustain the operations of his command and obtain information on the enemy situation as required by G-2. The extension of authority to him to print the currency as requested does not however appear to provide the proper solution. It is a situation in which the enemy military currency would serve a useful purpose - reasonable amounts of Philippine pesos could be sent in for application where enemy currency would not suffice.

Action taken:

FERTIG queried as to what if any currency he has sent to LEYTE.



However, the effectiveness of the message to the Commanders could be increased by having it repeated in the regular 4 July broadcast of the O.W.I. 2. After a good deal of thought, my feeling is that the first direct broadcast of the C-in-C to the Philippines might better be reserved for an occasion connected with some event of direct and immediate significance to the people of the Islands, rather than with the more general occasion of the American Independence Day. 3. I would suggest only two changes in the message proposed by G-3, should this message be used: a. In paragraph two interpolate the words "national independence and," between the words "toward" and "collective", making the phrase read, "guided them toward national independence and collective security," etc. b. Perhaps an academic quibble, but I would not recommend a split infinitive to the CoinoC: In paragraph four, third and fourth lines from bottom, place the word "to" after instead of before the word "resolutely". 
The effect of the return of your voice to the Filipino people would be electric. Not only the occupational troops in the Philippines would hear you, but also the Imperial Headquarters in Tokyo. Your message would reach the enemy at a time when he is forced to take stock of his waning position.

If you approve, the Psychological Warefare Branch will submit a suggested draft of a 4th of July message to the Philippines

It would undoubtedly be a fine thing for the C in C to address the Filipino people on the 4th and on other special occasions. He may feel though that it is not yet the appropriate time for him to do so and prefer to swait until the situation develops further. If he does take this view I suggest as an alternate move that he send a Fourth of July message via radio in the clear to the Filipinos through his "Commanders in the Philippines" as he did on last New Year's Day. That message made a profound impression and was widely disseminated - undoubtedly reaching the enemy and puppets as well as those to whom it was addressed.



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





In regard to the recent complaints from Colonel FERTIG in retransmission difficulties through Station KAZ (Darwin) investigation by the Chief Signal Officer, both at Darwin and at the Filipino Training Camp (Tabragalba), has disclosed that the fault does not lie, as originally thought, with the Filipino operators at KAZ nor in the selection of personnel by the organization concerned. Resulting from such investigation the difficulties are now ascribed to extreme impatience and unreasonable treatment by FERTIG's operators, with professional high speed experience, and a consequent loss of self confidence by Filipino operators at KAZ. Technical difficulties due to blocking effect on station's frequency by some high power transmitter is also being investigated.

LT FERGUSON From: 1. An inspection of the 978th Signal Service Company was made this date by Lt. Ferguson, Lt. Lowney and W/O Steiger, representatives of the 978th Signal Message Center, Hq. USASOS and Base Section USASOS, respectively, for purposes of locating six (6) qualified fixed station radio operators to be employed at radio station KAZ. 2. This inspection revealed that no such operators are presently available or assigned to this organization. Operators presently assigned have code speeds of not more than 18 words per minute. These operators have code training only with a pencil and are all classified as field radio operators. Facilities for training fixed station radio operators within this organization are at present, not on hand. No typewriters are available for this purpose but have been requisitioned. There is no code practice equipment available at the 978th other than keys, an oscilattor and headsets. 3. It is recommended that the following procedure be followed in order to train qualified fixed station radio operators in this organization; a. Furnish necessary equipment to the organization for training fixed station operators. This should include code practice equipment type ME-94-B, typewriters type MO-88 and a qualified instructor in touch typing. 4. As a temporary measure, in order to provide qualified fixed station operators for immediate use at KAZ, it is suggested that such operators as are necessary be provided from other units, on a temporary basis, until operators can be trained by the 978th Signal Service Company. 5. It is estimated that fixed station operators can be trained by the 978th in approximately three months, provided the equipment outlined in paragraph 3 above is furnished immediately. Major Brown has just advised me by telephone from Darwin that the difficulty at KAZ is due to: a. The lack of a certain amount of leadership, which could be taken care of by sending a Lieutenant Filipine Radio Officer new assigned to the 978th Signal Service Company in Brisbane. b. A question of confidence as operators are not given a fair break in all cases and due to unreasonable treatment from the other end have not had an opportunity to develop the necessary amount of confidence to do good radio operating work. c. A question of patience. Major Brown reports that he has listened in on both sides of the transmission and that the people in the Philippines are very unreasonable, extremely impatient and very masty with the operators at KAZ. There is only one station which has been giving any trouble and that is MLI (Furtig). 2. Major Brown advises that he will be able to release the four operators temperarily borrowed from the 126th RI Detachment without having to replace them at KAZ. However, it will be necessary for him to stay there a while longer and help get the station properly organized and on a satisfactory operating basis. 3. Major Brown advises that the rear echelon of Base Section 1 will be closing up at an early date and will move to Darwin and that it will be necessary for station KAZ to take care of its own messing and other "house keeping" functions. It is considered that KAZ should stay where it is in view of its permanent installations and also for security reasons. However, consideration will be given to the desirability of moving it to Darwin at a later date. 4. Recommendations: a. That the Philippine Radio Officer be air-shipped to KAZ immediately se as to arrive before Major Brown leaves for Brisbane.

- b. That sufficient "house keeping" personnel be sent to KAZ.
- c. That action be taken to institute an appropriate Signal training program with the 978th Signal Service Company. Detailed recommendations will be furnished tomorrow, based on results of investigation made today.
- d. That the Philippine Regiments and other tactical units not be canvassed at this time for radio operators.
- e. That a radiogram be sent to Furtig requesting him to instruct his radio operators to be more considerate and cooperative in their dealings with KAZ operators and that Furtig be advised that his recent radiograms on this subject are considered to be very unmilitary.

Late May 1944, Capt. Ball, Major Smith's agent at Baler, Tayabas, contacted 1st. Lieut. Robert B. Lapham, 0379114, and McKenzie, a civilian connected with a mine near Baguio before the war. McKenzie had been commissioned by an American leader of a Luzon guerrilla band. Both requested clarification of their status. The identity of McKenzie is unknown at this time. Believe his status should wait until more information is available concerning him and his activities. 2. Lieut. Robert B. Lapham was with a unit of the 26th Cavalry in Central Luzon at the time of surrender, and retreated to the hills with other members of the unit. He was with Col. Claud Thorp's guerrillas (remnants of the 26th Cavalry) who were active until dispersed by the Japanese in September 1942. Nothing more was heard from Lapham until an agent from Central Luzon arrived in February 1943 at Major Praeger's Headquarters in northern Luzon and reported that Lapham with other officers of the 26th Cavalry was alive and active with guerrillas in Central Luzon. Lapham was not heard of again until December 1943 when Primitivo San Agustin reported that Lapham was leading guerrillas in Tayabas. Ball contacted a Lapham agent in early May 1944 and Lapham himself arrived at Ball's headquarters several weeks later. 3. From all indications Lt. Lapham has served honorably and has been in constant service with Luzon guerrillas since the time of surrender. This in itself is no mean accomplishment. Believe that Lt. Robert B. Lapham has well earned a promotion, and further that this would be a fine gesture of support from this Headquarters to the Luzon guerrilla movement. 

At that time Filipino operators from the 978th Signal Service Company were installed to handle the traffic. These operators while trained in the United States had had little procedural experience and their speed of reception (limited to 12-16 words per minute) was not such as to permit them to readily handle Philippine traffic from highly trained American or Filipino professional operators employed in the several Philippine districts at control stations. Coupled with this the stress under which operators in the Philippines are working does not lend itself to patience in such matters. 2. Colonel Whitney advises that he informed you in conference the other day that he would cooperate in every way in any shift of personnel from the 978th Signal Service Company believed essential to strengthen this situation. It would appear desirable that any such shift result from your study of personnel qualifications and approval rather than upon the selection of the organisation commander, in view of your primary responsibility in this matter. 3. It is believed, however, that the operators on duty at KAZ are representative of the material available in the 978th Signal Service Company and it would seem desirable that investigation be made of the operating comditions at KAZ before determining that the remedy necessarily lies in higher sulcetivity of operating personnel available, although a prior survey of such meterial would of course be helpful. 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

However, of the 30 officers and 236 men presently within that category, 5 officers and 107 men are now undergoing training at the Australian Jungle Training School; 6 officers and 30 men are undergoing training at the Fraser Island Commando School and 8 men are being trained as weather observers at Amberley Field and Archerfield weather stations. 2. Resulting from the above there are presently only 19 officers and

2. Resulting from the above there are presently only 19 officers and 81 men within the volunteer group now at the Camp, of which 60 men are formed into selected training parties scheduled for overseas movement within the next the course of the USAFFE Intelligence School scheduled to open on 18 June.

3. Recommend that if provision is made for the attendance of commissioned personnel at the School, 10 officers be selected to undergo the training starting on 18 June and that thereafter for the next course timely arrangements be made for the assignment of a larger group for such purpose. It is not believed, however, that, pending study of the purposes of G-2, USAFFE in the light of other projects and available forward transportation, any definite decision or commitment should be made with respect to the future employment of personnel undergoing the course of training indicated.

- 2. To accomplish the above, it is requested that one hundred selected men from the Filipino troops now at Tabragalba be made available for this training and assignment.



1. Hereunder is draft of message prepared by Colonel Whitney for insertion in the next issue of FREE PHILIPPINES as requested. Colonel Whitney suggests that as the Filipino people look to the C in C so completely for guidance, important European and other developments having a bearing direct or indirect upon the Philippine situation should be referred to in such a statement.

2. It is suggested that the statement of the C in C for insertion in this publication be left until the final hour before press in order to take full adventage of military developments up till its actual release.

"PATRIOTS OF THE PHILIPPINES:

Since I last addressed you through the medium of FREE PHILIPPINES, greatly increased military pressure has been brought to bear against Japan and her European ally.

In the Southwest Pacific with the landing of American troops on Biak Island the New Guinea campaign, for strategic purposes, was brought to a successful colse and the forward elements of the forces therein engaged now stand within 800 miles of Philippine soil. In the Central Pacific ______

By the successful culmination of these two operations you will observe that the enemy's much waunted "impregnable" parimeter of outer defenses has not only been breached but has been strategically shattered, leaving the heart of the Japanese Empire exposed to our direct military action.

On the European scene, the opening of a Western front, the fall of Rome with the advance of Allied forces far beyond that Eternal City, the unrelenting and violent Russian blows on the Eastern front, and the devestating strategic and tactical bombing of German military installations and objectives have

reduced Japan's European ally to a most precarious and unhappy position.

All of these forces brought to bear upon Axis military power serve to speed the day that I shall return with the full weight of American might to lead an united Filipino people, scourged by a savage foe but yet unconquered, in a final shattering blow to oust the invader forever from Philippine soil and restore peace, happiness and security to Philippine homes."

PATRIOTS OF THE PHILIPPINES:

When American troops recently landed on Biak Island, which dominates Geelvink Bay on the western tip of New Guinea, we secured command domination of Dutch New Guinea, except for isolated areas where enemy forces have been trapped and now face death or surrender.

For strategic purposes the Bisk landing marked the practical end of the New Guinea campaign. We have also reached the final stage in the offensive initiated in this theater on June 29, 1943. During this campaign the Solomons, the Bismareks, the Admiralties and New Guinea have been reconquered or neutralized. Scores of thousands of enemy troops have been abandoned by their superior officers and left to their certain doom.

From the forward point reached by the Japanese we have advanced our front apporximately 1,800 miles westward and 700 miles to the north. In addition to the great tell we have taken of Japanese fighting strength, we have effected a strategic penetration of the conquered empire Japan was attempting to consolidate in the fouthwest Pacific. To you, the loyal Patriots of the Philippines, this means that we have secured, during an 11-month campaign, bases of departure for the advances to the Philippines. The winding up of the New Guinea campaign was a necessary prelude to the liberation of the Philippines.




