

- 1. The report of Major Ramsey on the organization operations of ECLGA has been gone over and made a matter of record. Major Ramsey unquestionably did a magnificent job under most hazardous conditions during the period of enemy occupation and he will certainly be recommended for the award of the DSC as soon as studies on awards for the guerilla movement, now in process, can be completed. I am getting recommendations from the Army commanders as to the manner in which guerilla leaders individually have dispatched their duties in connection with the campaign operations in order to give us a more complete guide to individual service than was possible while operating from Australia.
- 2. I am glad you called this matter to my attention although I cannot understand Major Ramsey's statement that he had been unable to see me as as far as I know since being in the Philippines I have seen everyone who expressly desired to see me - from the President of the country on down to the former houseboy of a friend's friend.
- 3. I will keep you advised of the matter of decoration awards as it progresses and may well have to enlist your support for a liberal policy in this matter.

SUBJECT : Data on activities of Edwin P. Ramsey.



- 1. Edwin P. Ramsey, 1st Lt., 26th Cavalry, Philippine Scouts, army serial number 0-368746, was a reserve officer called to duty in 1940 and came to the Philippines in 1941. He fought in the Philippine campaign 1941-42, and on 7 April 1942 was a member of the 2nd Squadron of the 26th Cavalry engaged along a ridge line above Lemay, Bataan. He was cut off from the main forces. He withdrew to the mountains and eventually made contact with Lt. Col. Thorp and joined the latter's organization on 20 April 1942.
- Adjutant to Capt. Joseph Barker who had been designated by Thorp as commander of the East Central Luzon Guerrilla Area for purposes of guerrilla organization. This area originally included Pangasinan, Nueva Ecija, Tarlac, Pampanga, Bulacan, Bataan and Greater Manila. Almost all Ramsey's subsequent guerrilla operations took place within this area. Following the capture on 11 January 1943 of Capt. Barker, Ramsey assumed command of the East Central Luzon Guerrilla Area and continued with the task of organizing and consolidating the area in accordance with Col. Thorp's original plans. Ramsey proceeded to Tarlac and personally organized most of Tarlac and Pangasinan. At this time Ramsey's organization may have numbered about 45,000, the majority of the members being civilians who lived at home.
- 3. His unit engaged in considerable fighting against the Communist Hukbalajaps in central Luzon and at one time in late 1943 Ramsey was reported captured by the Hukbalajaps and on the point of being executed but succeeded in escaping.
- 4. In November 1943, Ramsey proceeded to the area near Manila and established a semi-permanent headquarters. Ramsey moved freely in and about Manila on intelligence missions in addition to making numerous trips throughout central Luzon on intelligence missions. In Manila he maintained contact with various other guerrilla organizations and with General Roxas. Ramsey also contacted Peralta's agents in Manila and all Visayan and Mindanao guerrillas who had sent agents to Luzon.
- 5. Not having a radio until October 1944, he forwarded written intelligence reports to GHQ through Peralta, Fertig and Smith. In February 1944, Ramsey learned of Maj. Phillips' presence on Mindoro. In an effort to establish direct contact with GHQ, SWPA, Ramsey proceeded to Mindoro and arrived after the Japanese had raided Maj. Phillips' headquarters. It was Ramsey who instituted the search for Maj. Phillips, located his body and after exhumation definitely established identity. Ramsey returned to his headquarters near Manila in the late part of May 1944.



6. In October 1944 a radio belonging to Lt. Col. Edwin Andrews on Negros was set up in Ramsey's headquarters in Montalban, Rizal, and Ramsey was thereafter in continuous radio contact with GHQ. His unit became an important source of intelligence information having sent approximately 150 separate radio reports, many of which were in great detail.

7. Following the invasion of Luzon, Maj. Ramsey's unit like all other guerrilla organizations passed under operational control of 6th Army. Undoubtedly the 6th Army would have a record of the combat and intelligence activities of Ramsey's group during this period that would be significant for citation purposes. This section has no such further information.

8. In a general way the following should be noted: Relatively little was known of Ramsey's specific activities prior to October 1944 when radio contact was established. His work was carried on under exceedingly trying conditions because of several reasons:

a. His organization received very few supplies from GHQ and no recognition until a very late date in his activities.

b. His unit was opposed by the strong Hukbalajap Communist organization.

c. He was greatly hampered by lack of communication facilities.

In spite of these handicaps he kept the East Central Luzon Guerrilla Area together as a functioning intelligence and combat organization and had it ready when needed at the time of actual invasion. He demonstrated great personal courage in his many and extended trips throughout Luzon and to Mindoro as a guerrilla organizer.

Dear Douglas:



May 9, 1945

For some time I have been wanting to send you a line to tell you how happy we all feel that, thanks to you and the brave Americans who fought their way back into the Islands, the Philippines are once more in American hands. It has been a brilliant and a soul-satisfying achievement, and all America feels grateful for what you and the brave men under your command have achieved. One of these days I hope I shall be seeing you again. There are many things to talk over.

I am writing you particularly at this time with respect to a request which the Y.W.C.A. has brought to my attention. The National Board of the Y.W.C.A. in this country is anxious to send to Manila one of their Secretaries, Miss Anne Guthrie, and the Y.W.C.A. in Manila has asked for her help. I knew Miss Guthrie in Manila; she is quite an unusual person. She was Advisory Secretary of the Y.W.C.A. in Manila for three or four years, from about 1935 to about 1939, and did an outstanding piece of

work. She is a college graduate, speaks Spanish fluently, and is one of the most able and beloved workers in "Y" work. She thoroughly understands the Filipino people. She seeks not to play a dominant role in directing the work but rather, through advice and winning the confidence of the Filipino people, to cultivate leadership among them. The Foreign Division of the National Board of the American Y.W.C.A. hopes to have her remain in Manila in an advisory capacity until the Manila organization can get onto its feet and function smoothly again.

I quite understand that due to the tragic conditions in Manila you do not want supernumerary women to come there, who would add to the food problem and prove a hindrance. Miss Guthrie, however, is distinctly not one of these. I feel confident that in assisting the Manila Y.W.C.A. back onto its feet she would prove a blessing and a help. I understand that she is at present in India serving the Indian Y.W.C.A. She has now completed this tour of duty, however, and is presumably in Calcutta waiting for permission to go to Manila. I hope that it will be possible for you to grant her permission to enter Manila, so that the State Department may authorize the granting of a visa to her.

Betty received a letter from your wife several days ago and was delighted to hear from her. We have had many letters from our friends in Manila and feel heavy hearted over the tragic destruction of life and of property which the Japanese were able to wreak before their departure.

With every good wish, and the hope that the entry into Tokyo will not be long delayed, believe me,

This point has interesting implications: many guerrillas or associates have in the past drifted into G-2, usually stranded and not knowing where to go; some immediate attention and assistance was necessary; they arrived destitute; this has happened here and in Tacloban and Tolosa. I set up an officer to route these people to USAFFE and the Philippine authorities and furnish them, initially, with some funds, subsistence and shelter. Recently Major Benedicto came in from Cebu to pick up some of his former operators, stranded in Manila. I had to do extensive phoning to get the man started. No one in the Philippine Army or USAFFE seems to know. 2. I note that Ramsey has not received any recognition for what has been a hazardous enterprise, in the area most closely controlled by the Jap. l Incl. All organizations listed as East Central Luzon Guarilla Area were organized and are under the overall commend of the undersigned, as substantiated by official records on file. 1.2. Equipment, supplies and funds for operations previous to landing of American Forces of Liberation were obtained mainly upon the subscription of the people. Except for Lt.-Comdr. George Howe, USBE, and Lt.-Col. E. Andrews, who lent us radio sets and equipment, no other sid was received from CHQ, STPA, either directly or indirectly. 1.3. Experienced USAFFE officers composed my staff, and most of the District and Division Commenders. The unit, as a whole, was organized and operated strictly in accordance with military procedure and regulation. 1.4. The Intelligence Unit, organized as indicated in accompanying chart # 2, is centrally controlled and coordinated. It provided counterchecked, sifted and evaluated information of immediate operational importance or land, sir, and sea movements, including enemy i entifications, data essential to long range strategic planning, and counter-intelligence. 2. SUMMARY OF OPERATIONS SINCE 1942 TO DATE. 2.1. Intelligence Activities. 2.1.1. A cross section of the activities of the ECHIA, (substantiated by official records on file) reveal the prodominance of land, naval, aerial, and miscellaneous military intelligence, and counterespionage operations accomplished by our Intelligence Nets as apread out in Pangasinan, Tarlac, Mueva Roija, Bataan, Bulacan, Pampanga, Rizal, Cavite and Har From these sources, vital information on the enemy's installations, concentrations, strength and dispositions, location of airfields, dispersal area, depots, factories, axis of communication, identifications of units, movements by land, air and sea, tactics and methods,

were delivered to my headquarters then atop Mt. Balagbag, (by couriers and/or radio) where they were sifted, classified and evaluated properly, then transmitted by radio to GHM, STPA, and dispatched by couriers for delivery by submarine thru Colonels Pertig and Peralta (until September, 1944) and Lt.-Codr. George Rowe, USNR, in Mindoro, since October, 1944. Aircraft warning and naval sighting observation posts were set up at Mt. Balagbag (which overlooked Manila Bay) with the aid of a telescope. Pin-point observations on effects of Allied bombings were also reported from these observation posts.

2.1.2. Particular attention is drawn to intelligence operations in Manila and suburbs right under the visitant watch of the Rempei-

tions in Manila and suburbs right under the vigilant watch of the Tempei-Tai and in a territory infested with enemy troops and spies. The largest counter-intelligence net of the BCIGA also operated inside Manila. Operatives worked as laborers and employes in airfields, communication centers, supply depots, railroad terminals, shipping yards, Port Area, government offices, factories, Japanese Military Administration offices, including Fort Santiago, and rendered daily reports on their missions, took census of salient details of installations, seizing or duplicating secret maps and sketches, determined the enemy's intentions, traced his communication lines, studied his tactics and methods, evaluated his squipments and at opportune times, sabotaged his installations and liquidated his counter-intelligence agents. During the Leyte campaign, this net successfully identified enemy units, including high-ranking Commanders, dispatched to Leyte as reinforcements. Daring intelligence agents rubbed elbows with the Japanese MP, and in this role, they helped in the rescue of apprehended guerillas, and gave timely warning of possible raids on guerilla headquarters by the enemy. Frior to the battle of Manila, when Japanese counter-espionage activities reached threatening proportions, operatives laboring under extremely precarious and hazardous circumstances, stuck to their assignments at the risk, and in many cases, the cost of their lives, and turned in detailed and highly reliable information on the enemy's defense plans in Manila, supplemented by maps and sketches of pillboxes and fox-holes, street barricades, mined streets, bridges and buildings, gun emplacements, troop strength, dispositions, and movements, and other tactical information. From September, 1944, when the first Allied air-raid struck at Manila, the Manila Intelligence unit played an enviable role in spotting enemy air defenses and maneuvers, plane dispersion areas, naval activities, troop billets and potential military installations, contributing largely to the accurate bombing, and the consequent destruction of military objectives in and around the City. Casualties among operatives were heavy and many were tortured to death by the Kempei-Tai, all in line of duty.

2.2. Sabotage Activities.

Directives issued by this headquarters coordinated sporadic raids and sabotage activities, although seriously handicapped by lack

Balagbag from chemicals and local materials smuggled from Manile and slipped through strict vigilance by the enemy. Intrepid saboteurs swam to enemy vessels anchored at Wanila Bay on June 16, 144, and managed to set afire a tanker loaded with gasoline. The fire spread out to another transport and cruiser anchored nearby. In Pampanga, Bataan, Bulacan, Mizal, Pangasinan and Tarlac, enemy communication lines were tampered, small patrols ambushed, supply dumps were raided, bridges were burned, rice stock and alcohol of the "BIBA" were diverted to guerillas with the sid of USAFFE officers holding key positions in the "BIBA", as directed by my G-2, who held a ranking position there. Arms were obtained by raiding enemy dumps or small garrisons and waylaying army trucks. On 25 July 144, a steamship anchored at Pasig River, loaded with rice, crude oil and other supplies, was set afire. On 15 July14, part of Piers 5 and 7 were burned, also some bodegas of the National Devalopment Company and the Philippine Refining Company. 2.3. Propaganda Activities.

These consisted of dissemination of news broadcasts from San Francisco and the "Voice of Freedom", posting wrappers of American made chocolate bars with the words "I SHALL RETURN - MAGARIHUR" and typewritten thereon "COMPLEMENTS FROM THE VOICE OF THE MISGUIDED ELEMENTS" on bill-boards, inside toilets of first class theaters, street-cars, busses and other places on June 20 '44. On or about 15 June '44, a large sign was written in charcoal on a bulletin-board inside Fort Santiago, reading "Marching - THE AMERICANS ARE COMING".

2.4. Combat Operations.


2.4.1. Encounters with "Hukbalahaps" in Pampanga, Bataan, and Bulacan, were forced by the former on our units in the provinces mentioned. As per official documents turned over to C.I.C. and G-2, Sixth Army, several atrocities were committed against our men, and endangered the security even of my Headquarters in Mt. Balagbag.

2.4.2. Cur troops were engaged with the enemy in Meycauayan, Bulacan, three days before the 37th Division advance guard reached the town. Members of our units in Pangasinan, Tarlac, Nueva Ecija, Bataan and Pampanga, readily and immediately reported to beach-heads since landings were made in Pangasinan, and have been assisting actively in combat operations of the Sixth Army. By-passed enemy pockets of resistance, specially in the vicinity of Meycauayan, Bulacan, were mopped up by our troops. The conduct of the various districts under the command to his headquarters is not surprising, considering that on or about october 144, all elements under this command were issued warning orders and detailed directives pertinent to expected

Le This headquarters having received communications from Major Ramon Ruffy, Inf. Commanding Officer. Minders Unit and the late Major L. H. Philipps desire for a conference with the undersigned. Upon receipt of the order of the late Major L. H. Philipps the undersigned proceeded at came to Minders leaving his Headquarters East Central Lumen Guerilla Area, February 23, 1944.

2. The undersigned arrived last March 23, '44 in Mindere finst after the Japs penetration, and contasted the C.O., Mindere Unit, learning from the CO. Mindore unit that the late Major L. H. Philipps is still unheard of. On April 72, 1944, the undersigned met Mr. L. B. Wise, Communication Officer to Maj. L. H. Philippa" party to the Philippines. and same no report yet from Major L. B. Philipps. On April 5, 1946, the undersigned tegether with his efficers and mem and Mr. B. L. Wise's party left for the supposed place of Maj. L. H. Philipps. Arriving in one of the northern towns of Mindere the undersigned learned that a certain American Maj. Philipps had been shet and was buried by the Jops in the Municipal comentary of Abra de Fleg. Mindore, last March 15, 1944. Investigation of the case was at ence ordered. All persons who has knowledge of Majo Philipps' death were summened for investigation Still in doubt of the identity given, the undersigned ordered one of his officers with two other man to the town of Abra de Ileg to get all information available and to exhume the bedy of Maj. L. H. Philipps for verification and to establish the real identity of the corpse. The undersigned ordered the efficer to look for and got the golden tooth in the left upper jaw which was described by the efficers and men who had been with and seem Maj. Philipps.

So The serpse was identified and was buried again preparly in the same grave.

the exhumed and examined the body of Maj. Philippe and the signed testimeny of the guide who guided the Japs on the panetration. In a separate package tegether with this report are the gold teeth taken from the faw of the deceased.

SUBJECT: Report (The Examination of late Maj. Philipps).

In the morning of April 11, 1944, I received a verbal erder from Haj. Edwin P. Ramsey, OO, RCIGA in Cabasingan, Mana de Ileg, Mindere to exhume the bedy of doubted Maj. L.H.Philipps believed buried in the sementery of Abra de Ileg, Mindere. Due to complicated informations and rumers about the death of Maj. L. H. Philipps, we planned to exhume the bedy for examination in order to verify and prove his death.

Rames (soldiers of Lts. Bernabe & Eamilla) who were especially assigned to me, we went by beat from barrie Cabasingan to barrie Matabang, Abra de Ileg and stepped in the house of Barrie Lt. to take our lunch. After a few hours, we proceeded to the house of Mr. La Rosa. The American being killed (whom he was also in doubt) was given a sermal military burial by the Jap's captain formerly the Garrison Commander in that town, who happened to be a Catholic.

That night the Jap's P.C. were having a good time serenading around. Taking our chances, we slipped away to the bedega of the Municipal Bldg. where we were able to secure tools thru the help of Mr. de la Resa. I noticed that the cementery is isolated from the residential buildings, except two government buildings nearby. Back of the school town, facing the Municapal building and opposite the town church. All these building are around five hundred (500) yards away from the comentery.

It was very dark and bushy around and we had a hard time locating the grave. The grave was marked by a wooden cross, about five (5) feet high and three(3) feet across with letters written in black paint as follows:

Upon the grave was a long wooden stretcher almost covered by dry deaves falling from the trees meerby/ We pulled it out and we started digging After an hour Cpl. Mateo Sise, whispered that the ground he was stepping was already soft. I immediately lighted a match to find it out. The bedyy was wrapped by the carabao hide and being buried about 5 Reet Melew. The body was already very decayed, so that all the human bones are expessed and completely beyond recognition. More or less the deseased was around & feet long. I completely epened the carabae hide being covered and noticed that several ribs was fractured probably due to bullet bits. The skull was partly separated from the body. Finding no available things to be taken from the bedy for identification, I spade out the skull from the hele and examined its Findings are mentioned belawa

(a) The skull was completely hairless

(b) Set of teeth on the lower jaw, complete.

(c) One gold teeth on the right molar,

(d) Three sets of gold teeth attach from the left melar to the wisden teeth, upper jaw.

It was impossible to take off the whole set of teeth which were attached to jaw bone. Instead I teek of the gold teeth alone. (Submitted to Hajer Edwin p. Ramsey, C.O., ECIGA, and Mr. Wise, Warrant Officer, USA) on my return to Barrie Cabasingan Abra de Ilog, Mindore on April 12, 1944.

1. A further need for intelligence funds for use in Mindanao has practically ceased. Approximately \$150,000 unexpended balance remain in my possession and in that of the Finance Officer of this headquarters. It is requested that authority be granted to allow the deposit of these funds with the Finance Officer, X Corps, APO 310. The receipt obtained for the funds deposited would be forwarded to your headquarters together with the reported expenditures for the month of April.

- 2. In order to continue minor intelligence work during the month of May it is requested that authority be granted to exchange \$15,000 in mutilated Philippine Treasury Notes for an equal amount of Victory Notes. This authority should also be granted for action by the Finance Officer, X Corps.
 - 3. This letter confirms previous radio on the same subject.


