We have two engines which need new engines. One of these has been out of commission for several months with broken crank-shaft. The one in use is in very poor condition. These engines can be loaded in deck lockers of submarine if ports are well plugged. The launches have been of inestimable value in the distribution of supplies. With launch we had made overnight trip to Sorsogon and be back to hide out in Balicuartro islands before dawn.

RADIO REQUIREMENTS:

1 Dutch Bicycle Set, 2 Teleradios, 2 Chargers, 8 Batteries, 10 ATR-4 sets, with five batteries each, 1 c/s spare parts for radio and chargers including tubes, 10 reams cross-section paper, 10 reams message forms, 1 gross pencils, 12 Binoculars, 1 portable typewriter.

SUPPLIES REQUIRED:

Complete jungle equipment for 50 men, which includes complete soldiers outfit plus:

Hammock, Watch, Sidearm, Flashlight with 12 batteries,

Pocket compass, medical kit, carbine or TSMG.

CLOTHING:

Shoes and toilet articles should be sufficient for 6 months

MISCELLANEOUS SUPPLIES:

1 unit medical supplies "E", 10 c/s cigarettes, 2 c/s coffee, 2 c/s milk, 20 c/s rations.

PERSONNEL REQUIREMENTS:

15 operators trained with set they are to use, 5 officers trained in actual radio station operation, 2 American officers trained in G-2 work (Most important) All men coming in should be given training in military intelligence work.

Some control of Wave length used by each unit should be exercised. I recommend each unit be supplied with crystals for two frequencies only, and differing from those of other units.

Our heart felt thanks for the supplies which you sent us. Eleven men and one third of cargo received has already been landed in Luzon. Was unable to ship as much as desired to east coast due to one boat cracking upon reef. Will send 2nd load there as soon as enemy quiets down.

Enemy started push on us 28 May. Cornered us near Nagooacan on 5 June and we had to fight. ---**They hit us at an inopportune time as we were still busy dispersing the new supplies. Some of Merritts are guide for the enemy. They did not find out about the sub until 7 June. Have gone

wild since. At least 500 in these mountains and still increasing. I have had to destroy some of the equipment and the enemy will no doubt locate some of my caches. I d

do not believe they can find

do not believe they can find enough to hinder the accomplishment of my mission . To knock MACA out they must hit over a wide front and get not only me but Ball and Stahl as well.

The port of Barongan which has a pier could be used to land supplies if necessary. On east Coast I have available one launch with a reliable engine and several launch cascos which could be towed. Unloading supplies will have to be done by my party with civilian help as the Merritt gang cannot be depended upon.

I hesitate to recommend the shipment of large quantities of supplies here. For the protection of Station MACA it will be necessary to send in some supplies to this force and grant recognition in some form or other.

Supplies sent to SAMAR should consist of mostly of arms and ammo with a little quartermaster and medical supplies.

Malaria is not prevalent here. ...All have had technical trouble with their equipment and have had no training along this line. In future believe advisable to send two complete sets with each party as these men are in locations where it takes weeks to get supplies to them with present transportation facilities.

I would like to get all the supplies needed for the Eastern

anchor radio net into the interior of Samar before the enemy closes in on the coast. If we can get the supplies cached in interior, my party can promise that we will be ready to supply you the information you need when M day arrives.

For the information of Col. Whitney and Lt. Col. IND:

Please congratulate the Dutch on the excellent radio set they have furnished us, also on the service of station DJF. They are on the ball, and we have never failed to make contact within a few minutes. I would like to get two more Dutch sets for my party. They solve the power problem. Advise them that we need for this set a complete set of tubes, especially neon lights. Batteries brought in by me for ATR4 sets have not stood up. Forty percent tested bad on "B" side, and twenty percent on "A" side. Examination indicates only one or two cells bad. Operators sent in with these sets should be instructed in the repair of the battery; also use of makeshift hook-up with other type

batteries.

Please send in a greater selection of crystal frequencyies. The present frequencies of 4,010, 6,765 and 6,900 are so crowded it sounds like a bunch of squirrels chattering. I have five small sets on my net at present, and between crowded frequencies and bad batteries it is almost impossible to get a message through. We need additional equipment before extending the net into Luzon. Would like to have the SSTR-1 set with Charcoal brazier and hand chargers. Wet money packed in tins should be wrapped in paper first, as it tends to rust to side of tins.
