New York Herald Tribune (30 July) carries AP dispatch date-lined Seoul, July 29, which reports: "Korean Police fired into the air yesterday to disperse 2,000 persons whose demonstration outside the Provincial Courthouse delayed the trial of 17 persons on counterfeiting charges. National Police Director P O Chough announced the arrest of 25 persons".

New York Times (30 July) carries with same date-line a report from its correspondent Richard H Johnston, which gives a detailed account of the same incident. Johnston reports: "In a demand sent to Lt General Hodge in the form of a petition, the Communists advised General Hodge on how to conduct the trial, called for the immediate release of two defendants and insisted the Communist Party be allowed to send its representatives to interview the suspects.

"General Hodge sent on the petition to Major General Lerch, Military Governor, with a letter in which he declared: This petition is rather voluminous and makes several rather surprising statements and requests that indicate the Korean Communist Party has apparently the mistaken concept that it is intended to make the trial of the defendants in this large counterfeiting plot a trial of the Communist Party.

"I take this opportunity to repeat to you my former directive that the fact that several of the accused happen to be members of the Communist Party has no bearing upon the dispensation of justice, that the trial of the accused in this

"No United States Troops were used in quelling the disturbance."

New York Times, (30 July) carries AP story date-lined Seoul, July 29, which reports: "The first response to repeated requests over a period of 11 months for permission to visit the Soviet Zone of Occupation in Korea, has been sent by Col General I M Chistiakoy Commander of the Red Army in North Korea, to Lt General John R Hodge, Commander of United States Forces here.

"It says: 'In connection with the existing quarantine in North Korea and the limitation of movement due to the increase in cholera cases in North Korea, permission for a visit of American Correspondents cannot be granted.'

"The existence of cholera in South Korea has not hampered the movement of correspondents in the United States Zone."

The following directive, prepared by the State Department to implement the policy adopted by the Far Eastern Commission on 18 July 1946 under the provisions of Paragraph II, A, 1, of its terms of reference, has been received from the State, War, and Navy Departments for transmission to you for your guidance in accordance with Paragraph III, 1, of those terms of reference:

"1. Immediate steps should be taken to restore to Allied countries objects in the 4 categories listed below which are found in Japan and which are identified as having been located in an Allied country at the time of occupation of that country, and which were removed by fraud or duress by the Japanese or their agents. The fact that payment was made should be disregarded unless there is conclusive evidence that fraud or duress did not take place. Restitution of any object included in category (a) which follows should be deferred, however, so long as its retention is required for the safety of the occupation forces. In such cases the Supreme Commander for the Allied Powers (SCAP) should provide an explanation of reasons for retention and an estimated date of restoration.

- (a.) Industrial and transportation machinery and equipment.
- (b.) Gold, other precious metals, precious gems, foreign securities, foreign currencies, and other foreign exchange assets.
- (c.) Cultural objects.
- (d.) Agricultural products and industrial raw materials.

2. Steps should be taken to restore to Allied countries ships of all types and sizes found in Japanese waters which are identified as having been registered in an Allied country at the time of seizure or sinking by the Japanese or their agents, or at the time of acquisition by the Japanese or their agents by fraud or duress. The fact that payment was made should be disregarded unless there is conclusive evidence that fraud or duress did not take place. Restitution of such Allied vessels should be accomplished as rapidly as conditions permit and should be completed not later than 31 December 1946.

3. Within the limits of feasibility, ships damaged or sunk and found in Japanese waters, on the request of the claimant country should as a matter of priority be salvaged, repaired, or refitted as may be necessary to permit their return in a condition substantially similar to that at the time they came into Japanese hands. The costs of necessary salvage, repair and refitting in Japan should be borne by the Japanese Government but should be applied against the reparations apportionment to the claimant country.

4. The processing of claims for industrial and transportation machinery and equipment found in Japan should not be permitted in general to delay removals of machinery and equipment on reparations account, but no item for which restitution claim has been received by SCAP should be allocated on reparations account until the claim has been acted upon. On the other hand, no restitution claim should be recognized for articles already allocated to particular countries on reparations account.

5. The claimant government should take delivery at a point in Japan designated by SCAP except that in the case of Allied vessels subject to restitution SCAP may at his discretion make delivery at Western Pacific points outside Japan whenever delivery will thereby be facilitated. Expenses incurred after delivery to the claimant government should be borne by that government, except that in the case of delivery within Japan, relevant transportation expenses within Japan and any dismantling, packing and repairs necessary for proper transportation, including the necessary manpower, materials, and organization, should be borne by Japan and be included in restitution. The recipient government should indemnify SCAP against all claims made in respect of the property received.

6. Restitution claims for property other than ships should be made by the government of the Allied country from whose territory the property claimed was removed; and restitution made to that government. In the case of ships restitution claims should be filed by, and restitution made to, the government of the country whose flag the vessels were wearing or on whose register of shipping the vessels were borne at the time of sinking, seizure or acquisition as specified in Paragraph 2.

7. No items should be included in Japanese export program which SCAP considers as probably subject to restitution as defined above. If items found to be subject to restitution should be exported, equitable compensation should be made to that country to which the items exported should have been restored.

8. Without prejudice to other arrangements which may be made between the interested parties, the foregoing restitution policies especially those in Paragraph 6, are not intended to give the Allied government concerned the right to withhold from a person who is a National of another Allied Power any property as to which he may establish a legitimate title.

Cable of 8 July reported a New York Times article datelined Washington (7 July) as quoting the Korean American Council to the effect that Russia was draining her Occupation Zone of Korea for coal, food, machinery, steel, textile and smelting mills and railroad rolling stock and was increasing her strength there. Explaining the "Sharp variance" of its own report with that of Mr Pauley, the Korean American Council stated: "Mr Pauley has admitted his visit to the Soviet Zone was both curtailed and "Personally conducted" by Moscow agents. Army and Navy bulletin (20 July) carries the same report from Dr. James S Shinn, Field Director General of the Korean American Council, prefaced by notes from the bulletin editors. These notes include the following comments: "Dr Shinn's letter documents the observation made in this publications lead editorial of July 6th wherein we attempted to show the difficulty of having any adequate inspections under the Russian proposal for the control of Atomic Energy and its by products. We specifically pointed out the disadvantages which confronted Mr Pauley, special representative for President Truman for reparations in Korea." "It is true that great nations will not care to have foreigners sticking their noses into their uranium deposits or into any other part of their national domain."

"There is a small element of risk that these investigators may exploit their knowledge for the commercial gain of their own nation or its individuals. But this risk is not comparable to the greater risk that unless there is some policing of the newest instrumentality of mercy and destruction the world will continue to live in fear so over whelming that there will be little time for anything but the continued preparation for another war."

1. "Paragraph 5. The Government of the United States hereby acquires, and shall be deemed to have acquired as of September 2, 1945, full title, without qualification as to disposition or use (A) to all reciprocal aid articles transferred to the Government of the United States and not subsequently returned to the Commonwealth of Australia or lost, destroyed or consumed other than reciprocal aid articles which on that date were in the possession of the Armed Forces of the Government of the United States, and (B) to all reciprocal aid articles transferred to the Government of the United States between September 2, 1945 and Dec 31, 1945, both dates inclusive, and not subsequently returned to the Commonwealth of Australia."

"Paragraph 6 (C) The Government of the United States may, without restriction, divert any reciprocal aid articles now held by the Armed Forces of the Government of the United States to any uses in or outside the United States, but will not transfer, without the prior consent of the Commonwealth of Australia and without payment of any proceeds to the Commonwealth of Australia, any reciprocal aid articles held by the Armed Forces of the Government of the United States in the categories of arms, ammunition and other lethal weapons, to any 3rd country."

Regarding those items in the hands of the Armed Forces the United States is free to retain, consume, dispose of or divert to any use in or outside the United States all articles except arms, ammunition and other lethal weapons. The only restriction on arms, ammunition and other lethal weapons in that United States will not transfer these items to a 3rd country without prior consent of Australia and the proceeds of any such transfer will accrue to the Government of Australia. Any articles constituting a part of a US installation outside of Australia and its possession will be handled the same as any other item and thus is free to dispose of such articles as US surplus and the proceeds from such sales may be retained by the US.

World Federation of Trade Unions at its Paris Conference in September 45 voted to send Labor Survey Missions to Germany and to Far East. Mission in Germany has completed its work, and WFTU now proposes to send survey gp to Japan, Korea, Indonesia, Burma and China.

This labor survey would be similar to that made in Germany which inquired into reconstruction and democratization of trade union movement. Mission to Germany issued report which has been most helpful in supporting position of US MG in Germany in regard to its labor program.

Group would comprise about 10 indivs including representatives from USA, USSR, Austria, UK, China and France. US representative would be from CIO, probably Mr Kermit Eby, Ch of Dept of Educational Research. He was recently in Japan as member of Educational Survey Mission. Mission would plan to arrive in Japan some time in Oct 46 and stay approx 10 days in Japan and 8 days in Korea. Latter visit would include studies in Russian occupied portion of Korea.

"I assure the Korean people," General Hodge said, "That I will be consulted before any import-export trade arrangements are concluded for South Korea." General Hodge's statement was a reply to a press agency report reaching here yesterday from the US in which John W Stagers, President of the American World Trades Export Import Company, stated that export-import trade would be opened with Southern Korea within the next 30 to 60 days. "According to this report, Mr Stagers company has completed commercial contracts in the Far East that include Korea."

Under the leadership of its Secretary General, Pakheun Yung, the Communists in the past month have lost much prestige and influence. Since the Communists high point of activity, which coincided with the presence here of the Soviet Delegation to the Joint United States-Soviet Commission, the party has lost favor. The party is now reported in the throes of an internal dispute over the secretarys announced refusal to recognize or participate in the legislative body proposed by General Lerch. Disagreement among the leaders as well as among the rank and file of the Communist party is attributed to three opposing plans of action to one group prefers to join the body in an attempt to dominate or sabotage it. The second is said to want to give the question careful study, reserving decision. The 3rd group, led by Secretary Pak, holds to a literal adherence of the partys tactics of unswerving opposition to any move that will not guarantee Communist control. One observers here feel that the effort to hold to the adopted line will prove the supreme test of Mr Paks leadership and may ultimately cost him his position."

Only comment concerning Korea today is an editorial in the New York Times which states: "The plan announced by Gen Hodge (for a Korean Legislature) is a step forward. Especially noteworthy is the decision to hold elections. If the plan is energetically carried through - - that part of Korea will be that much better prepared for the day when the Koreans will be masters of their own affairs. Whatever is done, however, does not meet the essential problem, which is to unite the two areas now divided by the 38th parallel. There can be neither economic nor political health in Korea until actual physical unity is achieved. In fact, the formation of separate interim governments - - could very well lead to more serious differences than now exist. Who is chiefly responsible for the deadlock that has existed in Korea - - is a question viewed differently in Moscow and Washington. On the public record, the blame for the delays and frustrations rest largely on the Russians. It is difficult to see what Russia stands to gain by her intransigent attitude in Korea. Advantages secured by force are transient and make few friends. Propaganda picturing the Soviet as the only true friend of Korea surely will not be very effective on people who see their country stripped of machines and coal and food. The influx of refugees in South Korea from the Soviet zone would indicate that they prefer the US brand of Democracy, even of the military kind. The Soviet position in Korea is of too long duration to be blamed entirely on inept local commanders. It must come from Moscow. The Koreans have a right to

Special dispatch to the New York Times from Seoul (10 July) states: "Local Korean politician leaders and observers praised today Gen Lerch's proposal to create a Korean legislative body to assist the US Govt and give the Koreans administrative experience. With the notable exception of the Communist Party, which attacked the proposal, all shades of political opinion expressed approval of the move suggested by Gen Lerch, and approved by Gen Hodge. Since Gen Lerch's announcement was made public through the press, it has become abundantly clear that if the plan to create a legislative body never comes to fruition its suggestion has stirred the Communist Party in Southern Korea into open avowal to complete obeisance to its duty to prevent political inanimaty. However, the Communist stand has resulted in a 3 way split in the party."

New York Times article datelined Washington (10 July) stated: "The project for establishing a legislative body of Koreans was approved by Dean Acheson, Acting Sec of State today. Mr Acheson said it was a most constructive idea."

An article in the current Sat Eve Post (13 July) commends the Military Govt in Nara for an excellent job in training a 1st rate police force. The article, by Harry Forbes and datelined Seoul, begins as a feature story telling of the recent beating of a woman by her jilted fiance and his marriage broker. The article picks up with "Editor and broker were arrested by the Korean Police, whose report on the case remarked:

The article continues: 'Note this concern about peoples rights, for it highlights one of the most remarkable metamorphosis in the history of police organizations. The point is that almost overnight the US Army MG had to transform a police force habituated by the cruel and medieval methods of the Japanese into one dedicated to competence trustworthiness and the spirit of fair play. The organization which was inherited from the Japs had terrorist leaders whose task it was to control the thought and mode of living of the oppressed civilians. The job of replacing the vicious system with what Lerch recently called "One of the finest police forces in the world" fell upon Col Arthur S Champegnny. To begin with, he insisted that recruits he accepted from the 8 Provinces of Southern Korea fulfill severe physical, educational and personal background requirements. Then, under Lt Bochalter, 600 of them went through the toughest 4 weeks of their lives; through a curriculum that had been reorganized right down to basic conceptions. The abler men moved on into higher, more complex training. The climax of the story is that today Southern Korea's 'finest' are rapidly making a relieved citizenry proud of them and grateful for the presence of the police force which is out of politics and done with brutality.'

Forbes goes on to comment on the "natty" appearance and the efficiency of the new force, and continues: "The real test of the new force, causing some breathless moments for its American sponsor, came when angry demonstrations broke out after the Moscow Conference announced a "trusteeship" for Korea. Newsfile material: Chapman Tokyo July 11th charge that Russian proposal for Japanese labor legislation was Communist propoganda precipitated heated debate Wednesday at 9th session of Allied Council for Japan correspondent Ralph Chapman reported in copyrighted dispatch to today's New York Herald Tribune.

Proposal had been put on agenda by Lt General Kuzma Derevyanko Russian Council member. It was 22 point program for basic laws including 8 hour day child labor regulation sickness and disability benefits and similar measures.

George Atcheson Junior Chairman and American member of Council attacked proposal by reading prepared statement in which he noted many of Russian recommendations were already in effect and there would be no purpose in placing them before council as something new. He added that attempt to dictate rules in minute detail would revive "Dictatorial Govt in Japan in direct contravention of Potsdam Declaration." "In light of all circumstances surrounding them" Atcheson continued "These recommendations have color which we have seen before. I regret I have to say it but there are readily discernible here familiar signmarks of propoganda. I very much regret that any issue involving Communism or Communist influence in Japan has again risen before us. But it has-we might as well act with candor. I do not cavil against Communist system in its home country\*\*\*but we are not pledged to further Communism in Japan".

Dispatch added that Atcheson said danger to Japans labor movement was regimentation of workers. By this he said he meant Communist regimentation as well as Fascist regimentation.

"Neither Communism nor Fascism has any rightful claim to leadership of labor" he said. "They do not lead labor they destroy labor".

Acheson then asked Derevyanko series of questions to show that regulations in Soviet proposal are non-existent in Russia. In his reply Derevyanko said Achesons speech was "of an intentionally propaganda character" and added: "I am sorry about Chairmans attempt, not for first time to force his understanding of Potsdam Declaration and make use of Allied Council for propaganda for his political conceptions. I categorically deny Mister Achesons assertion to effect that recommendation submitted by me is not of constructive nature but is dictated by some other intention. I categorically protest against such statement"

Dispatch said council took no action on Russian proposal which now is "apparently off agenda." Acheson earlier argued with W. MacMahon Ball British Commonwealth member over question of "integration of repatriates into national life of Japan." Ball held problem was too involved with entire economic setup of Japan for recommendations on this phase alone but he made 8 general suggestions. Derevyanko and Lt General Chu Shiming Chinese member insisted Japanese Govt submit plan for consideration.

Derevyanko Chu and Ball refused to discuss 4 agenda items submitted by General Douglas MacArthur. They were maritime quarantine measures taken to prevent disease in Japan pure food and drug legislation and laws regarding food handlers and food distributing agencies. Except for Acheson council members agreed these were matters for experts and not for council.

Derevyankos recommendation that MacArthur direct Japanese Govt to dissolve commission set up to investigate causes of War and Japans defeat was overridden by opposition of other members.

Richard Johnston cabled to the New York Times essentially the same story reported by UP wire service covered in yesterday's cable. Johnston gave a factual and almost complete coverage to General Hodges statement approving General Lerchs plan, and concluded his story with the following comment: "With a pointed reference to the communists, who have been conducting an all out campaign of non cooperation with the Military Government or with other Korean political groups, General Hodge said: "Of course, it is to be expected that some inspired groups, with high held interest, may do all they can to prevent the attainment of unity. If such groups persist, they can be regarded by the people as being anti Korean." Immediately after the announcement of General Lerchs plan last week the communist party's General Secretary declared to the press that neither he nor his party would participate in or condone such a legislative body. The avowed purpose of the communist party here is to prevent any semblance of political unity, sabotage the Military Government and provide to the world proof that Korean can reach political unanimity, recover economic health, and emerge an "Independent Democracy," Only with the help and guidance of the Soviet Union. Towards this goal the party continues to labor. Consequently it is ever cautious not to align itself with political unity groups or with movements that it cannot dominate. For this reason, and in view of the fact that the party line in opposition to General Lerchs Legislative body plan has been publicly and officially voiced, it is now expected that the communists and fellow travelers will open up an immediate attack in an effort to discredit the plan.

(Summary of 1st 2 articles were sent via Thesels Monday) Atkinson said in part "In one respect we and leaders of Soviet Union heartily agree: that maintenance of peace depends upon peaceable relations between them and us. In view of their many problems, their war weariness and wounds of war that have not yet healed they are eager for peace. Although they do not give us much credit for our share in victory that is no reason why we should withhold from them credit and admiration for their magnificent war record. Nor should we forget for a moment that their people have suffered painfully and are suffering still" Atkinson said USSR would welcome loan for reconstruction purposes and to advance 5 year plan but pointed out that such loans cannot buy friendship in Soviet Union or anywhere else. Shortage of construction materials in the US is so critical that extremely drastic action is being taken to enable urgently needed housing construction to proceed, especially for veterans. Governmental agencies acting under emergency delegations of authority are closely controlling building construction projects as well as materials used in construction field. Activities of Federal agencies are not exempt from such control.

War Dept is being pressed to release stocks of construction materials down to the minimum required for immediate and urgent needs. Purchase are difficult or impossible to accomplish and detailed justification is being demanded. As a matter of policy responsible civilian authorities oppose export of critical building materials from Zone of Interior in face of situation here.

Critical materials include lumber, nails, plywood, gypsum and other composition boards, asphalt roofing, cast iron pipe, radiators and fixtures. Even cement supply is now expected to prove inadequate.

This matter is being brought to your personal attention because of seriousness with which problem is viewed by highest authorities. The War Dept ability to meet your essential needs for construction materials will be greatly strengthened by effective measures to:

A. Exploit use of overseas sources of building materials including full use of available substitutes.

B. Where possible defer construction which necessitates use of critical materials.

C. Carefully review requests for materials to be shipped from ZI as to immediate necessity and quantity.

"In attempt to establish workable relations with  
government of Soviet Union we have to abandon familiar concepts  
of friendship. Friendship in sense of intimate association  
and political compromise is not possible and is not involved.

political machine and human approaches like those implied in

There are no freedoms inside Soviet Union. As far as I know the government is not imposed on the people against their will, nor is it a corrupt government \* \* \* my impression is that people of Soviet Union generally trust and respect wisdom and integrity of their leaders \* \* \* but by nature, government is a machine for generating power inside Soviet Union and as far outside as power can be made to extend; and all attempts to deal with it in terms of friendship are doomed to failure. Although we are not enemies, we are not friends; and most we can hope for is an armed peace for next few years.

Where our interests lie, we have to apply equal pressure in opposite direction. This is most reactionary way of arranging world affairs. But spirit of Soviet Government is fundamentally reactionary as its attitude toward defeated nations and behaviour of Red Army in Manchuria suggest. Accustomed to use of force inside Soviet Union, Soviet Government instinctively thinks of force in its external affairs \* \* \* "

Atkinson continued with explanation of origins of Soviet Police State through revolution of 1917 stating that success of revolution was in part due to organizations discipline and secrecy, including doctrine that end justifies the means- which Atkinson says has not released workers in worlds 1st Socialist State from slavery but has reduced them to totalitarian slavery which includes the mind. Atkinson cited some instances of opposition to regime particularly in Ukraine where "Certain circles" believe they paid too high a price for war and where active antisemitism exists. He also mentioned not all Moslems are satisfied with present government but despite these opponents Soviet Government and Communist Party are in strong position with masses by virtue of victory in war against powerful foe. Atkinson also says Soviets minimize contributions of other

Atkinson continued "Part of our difficulties with Soviet Union are owing to ignorance of Soviet Leaders. Very few of them have been outside Soviet Union is antiforeign. Ever since bloody purges of 1936 there has been a nameless terror about foreigners who are regarded as spies and enemies of Soviet Union \* \* \* even Mister Stalin who is regarded as having more common sense and balance than most Soviet Leaders does not understand freedom or democracy. In addition to his training in doctrines of Marxism he probably develops his ideas about foreign countries from prejudiced and incomplete information supplied by Soviet Diplomats and Journalists.

Soviet Leaders are victims of their own isolationism. Although they have access to an enormous amount of information from abroad, they lack experience to analyze it \* \* \*

Atkinson says that after Moscow Conference of last December many foreigners believe Politburo made a deliberate decision to return to prewar status quo and to regard foreign nations with a capitalist economy as inevitable enemies of Soviet Union. He adds that whatever basis this may have in sincerity such a program makes it easier for dictatorship to rule people who believe outside world is hostile to them turning to intellectual and cultural life.

Atkinson said "Since I know nothing about science I have unfortunately no way of judging results of one of most industrious activities of Soviet Union, although I do know that general level of medical practice is low. But from personal observation I feel competent to report that general level of theatre art and music is low, and I suspect that many writers actors and musicians realize it \* \* \* there is no vitality in the arts; they are moribund and reactionary under dead weight of political control; there is little opportunity for individual enterprise and experiment".

Atkinson discusses role of Communists Party line which now emphasizes the "Monopoly capital 1st" nature of western powers and line up of that phrase to Marxian Dogma that these states are bent on destroying socialism.

Concerning relations between Soviet Diplomats and those of western powers Atkinson points out that Soviet Leaders see themselves in role of representatives of "Broad Masses of peace loving peoples of world" while others are agents of monopoly capitalism. Atkinson reveals how stories in Soviet press are delayed or interpreted in interests of politics and cites Churchills Fulton Missouri speech which was held back several days and then released in hysterical manner. He explains that press is very dull and clings rigidly to party line.

Discussing role of ideology in international affairs Atkinson said "Whether Soviet Government and Communists Party, which are virtually identical, are promoting revolutionary changes in United States and Britain is not circumstantially known, although there is reason to believe they are meddling in politics of France by subsidizing and advising French Communist Party. But one of causes of Soviet Russias tenacity in international affairs is that it regards socialism as the must. Soviet Policy logically becomes thru to work peace by reactionaries who are defending a dying economic organization".

Atkinson discussed religious nature of Communism which is to be accepted by the faithful on faith as well as reason and pointed to huge iron like statues of Lenin and Stalin that are everywhere.

Richard Johnston cabled the following story to the New York Times from Seoul (7 July): "The United States Military Government's National Economic Board has recommended the breaking up of the New Korea Company, Ltd, created to take over the vast holdings of the Korean Branch of the Monopolitic Japanese-owned Oriental Development Company. With capital stock of 100,000,000 Yen, divided into 50 yen shares and held by the Military Government in trust for a future Korean Government, the Organization was once an integral part of Japan's sprawling industrial Empire. It was organized 30 years ago. (The Company) acquired virtually complete control of Korea's resources and indirectly controlled the lives of about 28,000,000 Koreans. The once entirely Japanese controlled organization's stock was taken over by the Military Government in October. The Company was reorganized in February under 10 directors chosen by the Military Authorities--The (National Economic) Board, after a study of the Company and its holdings, has urged the sale of small Industries to Koreans and a redivision of the Company branches under appropriate Government Departments. Only Koreans would be eligible to buy holdings."

A New York Times article datelined Washington (7 July) stated: "The Korean-American Council asserted in a statement today that Russia was draining her Occupation Zone of Korea for coal, food, machinery, steel, textile and smelting mills and railroad rolling stock and was increasing her strength there. The Council said that it realized its report was in "sharp variance" with the initial report of Mr Pauley. It added,

however, that "Mr Pauley has admitted his visit to the Soviet Zone was both curtailed and "personally conducted" by Moscow Agents."

An editorial in the Washington Star (8 July) states: "The American decision to act immediately to give a measure of self Government to Southern Korea may be viewed in the Soviet Union as a unilateral departure from the procedure agreed upon at the Moscow Conference last December. Actually, however, it has been dictated by the fact that since May 8 the Russians have kept severely to themselves, refusing to join us and running things their own way on their side of the 38 parallel. Meanwhile, there has been a kind of political paralysis on our side, and it is this paralysis that our new policy would seek to end. Accordingly--General Hodge will institute measures permitting Koreans of all Political persuasions to vote in local and Provincial elections. He will create a Native Advisory Council to help him in his difficult task of administration. The purpose of this is not to set up a Southern "Government" as a rival to the one run under the Russians in the North, but to give the Korean people a chance to learn something about Democratic processes and self rule. --Virtually no progress has been made along the lines agreed on at Moscow, largely because the Russians have refused to have anything to do with Korean elements on record as opposed to the Moscow arrangement, while we have insisted that they have a right to be heard. The 2 Power Commission thus has been completely stalemated. In such circumstances to keep on doing nothing politically in the American Zone would be to deepen the disillusionment of the people there and perhaps plant the seeds of serious future unrest. On the other hand, by introducing the Southern Koreans to Democratic processes, General Hodge may be able at least to satisfy part of their aspirations. Beyond that, the move may impress the Russians enough to persuade them to cooperate again in the Commission with a view to putting the Moscow Agreement to work. In any case, unless its liberation from the Japanese is to prove meaningless, Korea must

The following statement of policy, adopted by the Far Eastern Commission on 2 July 1946 under the provisions of paragraph II, A, one of its terms of reference has been received from the State, War and Navy Departments for transmission to SCAP as a directive for his guidance in accordance with paragraph III, one of those terms of reference. SCAP should take appropriate steps consistent with the directives transmitted in W 82394 and WCL 43814 to insure that any constitution adopted by the Japanese conforms to the principles set forth in this statement:

"1. The Japanese constitution should recognize that sovereign power resides in the people. It should be so framed as to provide for:

A. A representative government based upon universal adult suffrage consisting of:

(I) An Executive deriving its authority from and responsible to either the electorate or a fully representative legislative body;

(II) A legislature, fully representative of the electorate, which should have full legislative powers, including full control over raising of public revenue and expenditure of public funds;

B. The establishment of an independent judiciary;

C. The guarantee of fundamental civil rights to all Japanese and to all persons within Japanese jurisdiction. All Japanese shall enjoy equal rights before the law and no special privileges of particular social groups such as the nobility shall be allowed;

D. The popular election of heads of institutions of local government such as prefectures, cities, towns and villages;

E. The popular election of local assemblies such as prefectural, city, town, and village;

F. The adoption of constitutional amendments in a manner which will give effect to the freely expressed will of the Japanese people.

Though the ultimate form of government in Japan is to be established by the freely expressed will of the Japanese people, the retention of the Emperor Institution in its present constitutional form is not considered consistent with the foregoing general objectives. Consequently, the Japanese should be encouraged to abolish the Emperor Institution or to reform it along more democratic lines.

If the Japanese people decide that the Emperor Institution is not to be retained, constitutional safeguards against the Institution will obviously not be required, but the constitution will have to conform to the requirements of paragraph one and shall also provide:

A. That the legislature shall have sole authority over financial measures and any other organ shall possess only a temporary veto power over other legislative measures;

B. That the Prime Minister and the Ministers of State, all of whom shall be civilians and of whom a majority, including the Prime Minister, shall be selected from the Diet, shall form a cabinet collectively responsible to the legislature. If a form of government is adopted whereby the Chief Executive is elected to that office by the people, the provision that a majority of the cabinet members shall be chosen from the legislature should not necessarily apply;

C. That the legislative organ shall have the power to meet at will.

If the Japanese decide to retain the Institution of The Emperor, the following safeguards in addition to those enumerated in one and three above will be necessary:

A. When a cabinet loses the confidence of the legislature it shall either resign or appeal to the electorate;

Following article by James E Werner from New York Herald Tribune 5 July quoted for your information: Title "New U S Policy to Give Vote to South Koreans". "The United States has adopted a new policy for democratization of the American Occupation Zone in Southern Korea to give Koreans a voice in administration of that Zone High Official Quarters disclosed here tonight.

The American action has been taken unilaterally, without waiting for resumption of deadlocked negotiations with the Russians, who occupy Northern Korea. It was emphasized, in the strongest terms, that the new American move is not to create a "South Korean Government" in opposition to the Russian rule in the North.

The purpose of the American plan is to give Koreans all possible experience in self-government, it was explained. Such experience will be most valuable to the Joint United States-Soviet Commission when it reconvenes to the 4-power trusteeship envisaged at the Moscow conference and, ultimately, to an independent Korea, it was pointed out.

Under the new program Lt General John R Hodge United States Army Commander of the Southern Zone, which includes 2/3 of Korea's 22,600,000 population, will take the following steps to give Koreans a Democratic voice in administration of the American Zone:

1. Arrange for local and provincial elections, in which all Political Parties will participate.

2. Create an advisory council of Koreans to assist him in administering the Zone. Some members would be named by General Hodge, the remainder by Koreans themselves.

Details of these steps have not been fully worked out.

Some Koreans have been vehement in their opposition to the 4-power-United States, China, Russia and Great Britain-Trusteeship over Korea for 5 years agreed upon by the Moscow conference. It was Russian refusal to consult with Korean Political Leaders or groups which had expressed any opposition to the Moscow decision that cause breakdown of discussions in the Joint United States-Soviet Commission. The Americans opposed the exclusion of such Koreans on the ground that this action would deny Koreans freedom of expression, fundamental democratic right.

On this disagreement the Joint Commission recessed on May 8 a meeting which began March 20. The Russians returned to their Zone and nothing further has been heard from them, although General Hodge stated he was ready to resume the talks whenever the Russians were ready.

The Moscow agreement created the Joint Commission for the purpose of formulating proposals for a provisional Korean Government. These proposals were to have been submitted to all 4 Governments. Discussions members of the United States-Soviet Commission were directed by the Moscow agreement to "consult with the Korean Democratic Parties and Social Organizations". After the Provisional Korean Government was established the Joint Commission was directed to work out a plan with it for a 4-Power 5-year trusteeship over Korea and to submit that plan to the 4 powers for approval.

James F Byrnes, Secretary of State, said after the Moscow conference that it might be possible to modify the Trusteeship plan. The current American view, however, is that the Trusteeship will be necessary, for Koreans, during the intervening months, have not shown the capacity for Democratic self-administration of their affairs after 50 years of Japanese rule.

Nevertheless, the United States view is that Koreans- possibly some trained in the Southern Zones to arrange new American Policy-should be used "to the fullest possible extent" in the Trusteeship.



The following dispatch, cabled from Seoul (2 July), appeared on the New York Times: "Colonel General Chistiakov, Russian Commander in North Korea, has not replied to 2 letters from General Hodge urging a meeting of the 2 or an early reconvening of the United States-Soviet Commission for Korea, it was learned today from reliable military sources. The 1st letter was written May 9, a day after the adjournment of the Joint Commission, and the 2nd was sent on June 15. It was learned that General Hodge enclosed in the 1st a transcript of his discussion of the break up of the Commission conferences with the Chief of the Soviet Delegation, Colonel General Shtikov. The 2nd note reminded General Chistiakov that it had been more than a month since the 1st letter and that no answer had been received. Repeating a desire to reconvene the Commission, General Hodge told the Soviet Commander that the Americans awaited an opportunity to implement the decision of the Moscow conference of Foreign Ministers in accordance with the principles of freedom of expression guaranteed by the Atlantic Charter. The Soviet Delegations refusal to agree to consultation with all Korean political leaders, excluding from both the consultation and participation in the provisional government those who had voiced opposition to the Moscow decision, led to the break up of the Commission meetings." No other press or radio comment.

Richard Johnston cabled the following story to the New York Times from Seoul (1 July): "United States Military Govt Hqs this morning made public a letter from Major General Lerch, Military Governor of Korea, to General Hodge, recommending the establishment of a Korean Legislative Body, partly elected and partly appointed. This body would have the power to enact ordinances and assist the Military Governor in the administration of South Korea. Declaring that such a body would in no way be a "Separate Government", General Lerch said: "Gradually the body should become more and more elective in nature and would take from me more and more of the responsibilities of enacting ordinances." General Lerch in his recommendation envisaged a setup composed of an undetermined number of representatives of the 5 Provinces in the United States Occupation Zone. "They would have the power to enact ordinances," General Lerch wrote, "which, when approved would have the force and effect of law. They would also have the power to screen past appointments of Koreans to responsible jobs in the Military Government and to confirm future appointments." General Lerch based his recommendations on General Hodge's "Desire and the desire of the President of the United States that the Military Government in Korea be administered as democratically as possible." Pointing out that ordinances in the past had been suspended by the Military Governor upon the discovery that the Korean people voiced strong opposition, as in the case of Ordinance 72, a stringent edict dealing with offenses against the Military Government, the common welfare, and the circulation of rumors detrimental to the Military Government, which by the direction of Gen Lerch was recently suspended, the Military Governor declared to General Hodge: "Without some sort of legislative body, it is impossible for me always to determine the wishes of the Korean people."

General Lerch added that it had been the intention of the Military Government "To give effect to the desires of the Korean people."

Johnston continued by quoting from General Lerch's letter, without comment, then concluded by saying: "The publication of General Lerch's letter came as no surprise to observers here. The discussion of the possibility of the creation of some type of legislative body or "State Council" has been the subject of discussion for weeks. Only the Communists have been bitter in denunciation of the plan, declaring that it would foil the intentions of the Moscow decision. The plan has been the particular target of the Reds propaganda. Underlying the Communists attack on the establishment of a Korean body with legislative powers are 2 things: 1st, such a setup would include, if at all, only a minuscule representation of the Communists; 2nd, it would be a serious threat to the continuous Communist campaign to maintain dissension and confusion among the political groups here. That General Lerch's recommendations would meet with speedy approval was expected here. Although General Hodge today had no statement to make, it was believed that a full approval of the plan would be issued by the United States commander soon.

Eff 1 July 1946 Pay Readjustment Act 1942 as amended is further amended by act apvd 29 June 1946, to provide pay increase for pers of the Army as stated hereafter. Monthly base pay of EM shall be: 1st gr 165 2nd gr 135 3rd gr 115 4th gr 100 5th gr 90 6th gr 80 and 7th gr 75. Retired EM heretofore or hereafter retired with credit for 30 years service and has served beyond continental limits US between 1898 and 1912, such service having been computed under previous laws as double time toward retirement, shall be entitled maximum retired pay now provided for the grade in which retired.

Base pay of 1st mates and asst engrs of amp service shall be 2340 per annum and CWO except masters and chief engrs of amp service shall be 2520 per ann m. When total pay and alws of warrant off shall exceed rate of 550 per month, amount of alws shall be reduced by amount above 550.

Annual base pay of Brig Gen shall be 6600 Maj Gen 8800. Annual base pay of officers of 1st period including WOJG shall be 2160 2nd period 2400 3rd period 2760 4th period 3300 5th period 3850 and 6th period 4400.

Pay increases resulting from amendments made by this act shall be applicable to active duty or retired pay of all persons whose pay is governed by sections of Pay Readjustment Act 1942 as amended which are amended by this act.

No pay increase for any period prior 1 July 1946 shall accrue by reason of enactment this act.

All items of pay which are computed as a percentage of base pay will be computed on the new base pay rates listed here. Other items of pay and alws remain unchanged.

Monthly pay tables being furnished finance officers. Pertinent AR and TM's being changed. It is desired that continental Army commanders so inform immediately all installations including class 2 and 3 installations within the geographical limits of their commands.
