On Sept 27, 46, an AD HOC sub committee of committee
number 1; reparations, of FEC was appointed to con-
sider questions of deterioration of reparations assets,
a question raised in commission and reparation committee
on several occasions, particularly by members of Chinese
Delegation. Fol report, drafted by a sub committee which
included Chinese member, was unanimously adopted by com-
mittee at its 42nd meeting on 4 Oct 46, and in view
of its acceptance without objection, matter was not
referred beyond reparations committee:

"Sub committee has discussed question as to
whether a consultation should be sent to SCAP on
subj of deterioration of reparations assets and
recommends that no action be taken. It considers that
SCAP has done all that could reasonably be expected of
him to ensure protection of facilities designated
for removal under interim program. A consultation might
be of value if SCAP were to undertake a comprehensive
survey, but as sub committee felt confident that all
members of commission are aware that deterioration is
taking place, it did not consider that a detailed

survey at present time would justify work involved. Very shortly restitution and reparations teams will be operating in Japan and they will be able to inspect plants designated for removal and draw the attn of their govts to any cases in which deterioration is a particularly urgent problem. "Subcommittee considers that best solution of problem lies in removal of facilities from Japan rather than in any action by SCAP beyond what has already been done. This necessitates prompt action by commission." At time report was adopted US member also made fol statement, which was incorporate in minutes of 42 meeting of committee number 1: "SCAP 1 Oct issued directive to Japanese Govt clarifying previous instructions and outlining its responsibility for preservation and care of plant equip and records in industries designated for reparations. Directive broadens concept of preservation by oiling and greasing of machinery and equip to l of maint and repair to extent possible without substantial purchase of replacement parts. Sv and repair will include inspection and testing of existing replacement purchases for putting each item of equip in good operating condition and facilitating its ready use when moved. Japanese Govt also required to preserve and assemble specified engineering data, domestically obtainable, necessary for removal, reerection and opn of each plant.

Washington 29 Oct--"Undersecretary of State Acheson said today he had "Suggested" to the Secretary of War that civilian supplies sent to Korea be specifically stamped or be made to show that they came from the US. Acheson, in a letter to Senator Young, said the War Dept was responsible for the civilian supply program in Korea. Young, in a protest to the State Dept, said he had received information from an official of the US Military Government in Korea that 92,000 tons of wheat and 8,200 tons of flour had arrived in Korea from the US since August 1st and added: "I have also been advised that in very few cases are these supplies ever stamped or marked as coming from the US. In these days when there is so much misunderstanding and conflicting interests in areas throughout the world, I believe that it would be to our advantage and interest to clearly label the food supplies that are sent abroad from the US. I certainly do not advocate that food be used as a political whip but I do think that a better understanding would result from these people in Korea and elsewhere knowing the food they have received came from this country."

Acheson said it was the policy and practice of the War Dept to identify by country of origin all supplies sent to Korea where ever possible. He said

This radio in five parts.

Part 1. Reference your radio ZX 20952, to date no info, requested in WCL 49430 has been received in War Dept. Info required to evaluate situation.

Part 2. Cargo discharge and vessel demurrage situation Manila port requires immediate corrective action. Records indicate 8 trans-Pacific cargo vessels in port including the John Owen, since 26 June S L Cape Juby, Walter Wellman, Gretna Victory, and Anchorage Victory, Aug arrivals; Moses Brown and Eleazor Lord, Sept arrivals; and the Joplin Victory, arriving 10 Oct. The first 6 of these vessels have been spot discharged and cargo remaining aboard unknown, but assume 63,000 to S in port. Reference AFWESPAC GX 14344 GSDRD included these ships. Enroute Manila are the Short Splice, Coastal Sentry, Coastal Crusader, Bald Eagle, Herbert Croley, Britian Victory, China Victory, and Surprise, carrying predominantly QM cargo; also Oliver H Perry, Elwin F Knowles, John Wanamaker with lumber. Loading are the Appleton Victory, George Gipp, and Thomas Fitzsimmons lumber; and Waterville Victory ammo.

Part 3. Difficulty in operating on reduced budget fully appreciated however it is evident that no more supplies should be shipped until cargo can be discharged immediately upon arrival. Outloading of cargo for Manila excess to demonstrated ability to discharge cannot be justified. Pending definite advice regarding completion date of vessels now in

Part 4. San Fran reports 20,000 measurement tons now in port for Manila with 19,000 enroute due by 28 Oct predominately Ord and QM supplies. Therefore prompt advice of further action to improve situation is desired to avoid congestion at San Fran port with cargo scheduled for Manila.

Part 5. Priorities of items immediately required for health and welfare of AFWESPAC must be dispatched earliest date to San Fran POE to facilitate loading of troopers or reefers.

UP Washington 27 Oct. Gen MacArthur reported to the WD tonight that American-Russian negotiations to unify Korea had broken down because Russia refused to recognize the rights of free speech and opinion. He said that the Russian delegates had insisted that any Korean party representative who had ever criticized the Russian-American trusteeship should be barred from consultation on the formation of a Korean Provisional Government. He said that the American position was that such an interpretation would deny the rights of free speech. Gen MacArthur said that the Koreans wanted their own government, the abolition of the 38th parallel div of their country, the elimination of the trusteeship, control of their own economy and an end of Military Government. His statement was contained in a year end summary of the Korean occupation. It included his Aug monthly report and was released here by the War Dept.

Reurad G 14344 GSDRD. Port situation at Manila is cause of considerable apprehension in meeting transportation requirements for all Pacific Areas. The Maritime Commission will soon cease to exist as an operating agency and the Army must rely entirely on very limited fleet of Army transports and commercial shipping for all cargo shipments. Delay in turnaround of transports not only increases cost but means that fleet capacity is greatly limited. Delay in commercial vessels such as the Joplin Victory will cause increased cost and probable loss to operator which will be reflected in future rate negotiations. The Army has been able to negotiate some very favorable rates and we have been hopeful of future downward revisions. The Joplin Victory was scheduled to pick up a load of copra upon completion of discharge this month. Inability to meet this commitment not only delays movement of copra which is urgently needed but may result in this vessel having to be returned without cargo. Demurrage although expensive to the Army barely pays actual cost of ship. Therefore both government and the operator incur considerable loss because of vessel delay.

Reports of port activities indicating approximately 6,000 tons per week discharged are most disappointing. It is believed that the minimum average per ship is 500 tons per day. Informal advice indicates commercial ships in Manila have achieved the rate of 1000 tons per day. On the assumption that you have available 8 berths it appears that reasonable target would be between 3,000 and 4,000 tons per day. While improvements in discharge rate reported in your G 14344 are gratifying the results are still far short of that necessary to insure delivery of cargo at rate necessary to meet your indicated requirements. Will appreciate your comments of further action taken to improve situation with advice as to estimated date of completion of those vessels now in port and those enroute. Also request advice if sufficient lighters are available to handle lumber shipments and if not available, are LCTs or other craft on hand with OFLC which could be obtained by withdrawal of surplus declaration?

There follow two letters addressed to Secretary of War from Gen Bradley, Veterans Administrator: Letter dtd 16 Oct "Recent advices from our regional office in Manila indicate that difficulties of operation and morale maintenance are being heightened by restrictive actions taken by the Army as a part of current retrenchment activities in the Western Pacific. We appreciate, of course, that a retrenchment program will inevitably create difficulties, but it is our hope that their effect upon the activities of the Veterans Administration may be minimized.

Specifically, the restrictive actions have to do with the availability of surplus motor vehicles and the withdrawal of QM Store privileges and messing and billeting facilities from our civilian employees. The decision on such matters is, of course, the proper prerogative of the CG AFWESPAC. It would be of tremendous help to our employees in Manila, however, to know that they were being extended the same privileges as the Army extends, for example, the Foreign Liquidation Commission employees. It would be appreciated, therefore, if you would communicate to the CG AFWESPAC, a statement as to the importance of

full cooperation in achieving the goals of the program of the Veterans Administration.

We do not wish to urge specific requests upon the CG. We have, however, recently received evidence of the increasing concern of the President as to the effective functioning of the Veterans Administration in the Philippines, and we do wish to be assured that the CG is fully aware that the WD considers continued Army support of the Veterans Administration Program a matter of importance."

Letter dtd 25 Oct "With further reference to my letter of Oct 16, 46 concerning the cooperation of the Army authorities in the Philippines with the Regional Office of the Veterans Administration in Manila, I have just received a radio message reporting developments of critical concern to our program there.

It has been reported to me that billeting arrangements for Veterans Administration personnel in the Avenue Hotel and other locations currently under Army control are to be discontinued by Nov 1. Approximately 16 of our employees will be affected and according to the manager in Manila, it will be quite impossible for them to find type of housing facilities in the brief period allowed.

I appreciate the difficulties under which the CG AFWESPAC, is operating and, as I indicated in my earlier letter, I am hesitant to urge specific requests upon him. I must state, however, the Administration of Veterans Affairs in the Philippines is difficult at best. Since we employ civilian personnel we are constantly in danger of

losing their services if conditions of living become extremely undesirable. As you will recall, we have both recently received communications from the President expressing his concern for the proper care of Philippine veterans and asking for a full report on our respective benefit programs. The provision of an adequately functioning staff is, of course, the first essential in the discharge of our responsibilities in the Philippines.

Because of the critical nature of the Philippine veterans program at the present and because it is of the utmost importance that we avoid allowing any valid basis for further criticism of this Government in that respect, I am taking the liberty of requesting that you communicate to the CG AFWESPAC, some sense of the seriousness of this particular step with respect to the effectiveness in our operations throughout the Philippines."

Information and recommendations are requested in order that appropriate reply may be given.

AP Seoul 24 Oct, Gen Hodge charged today that criminals and agitators had instigated "Disgraceful riots involving horrible crimes" Southern Korea in the last few weeks in an attempt to smash a leftwing unification move for a coalition government. Gen Hodge said the goal of the agitators is "Despotic rule by those same few self-styled leaders who now are busily engaged in engineering the murder of their fellow countrymen."

AP Seoul 25 Oct, the United States Army today opened its file of secret, confiscated documents to support its statements that recent riots were inspired. Spokesmen at Gen Hodges occupation Hqs said the documents were "Completely reliable and confirmed" and were taken from "A Korean Communist" arrested Sept 22. The document said the Korean Communist party supported the Sept rail strike, signaled the start of the past months uprisings, and planned to connect the struggle "With the city peoples fight for rice and farmers fight for land reform and against the grain collection" system the US Mil Govt. American policy here was termed "Colonial slave driving."

Ralph Chapman, NY Herald Tribune correspondent, in a delayed dispatch from Ongjin, Korea, 17 Oct said that no American Army Combat Unit is farther from home shores than the detachment of 32nd Inf Reg troops located 4 miles East of this town. Chapman's article, given thirty column inches by the tribune, deals with his trip by land convoy through the Russian Zone and his short stay with the detachment. He said "Upon arrival at the Detachment Command Post outside Ongjin, we were greeted by the CO, 2nd Lt James Young of Mass. The twenty year old officer is Supreme Commander as far as Koreans of this peninsula are concerned . . . As I was sitting in the Detachment Orderly Room after lunch a telephone call was received from an outpost still farther west. Young took the message and cursed softly. AP Seoul Oct 22 "A US Army show of strength today was followed by two uprisings in which one Korean was wounded, 18 were arrested, and the Seoul Metropolitan Police Supervisors home was fired on. American tanks were rushed to vantage points, but did not fire. The short lived disturbances climaxed a long series of such outbreaks, directed chiefly against the police, in cities thruout the American occupied half of Korea. Officials blame the Communists, charging they are waging a campaign to drive Americans out of the country. Maj Gen Archer L Lerch, United States Military Governor, said the review and stationing of tanks "Was a show of strength, preparedness, and readiness" to quell the widespread disturbances. However, "The problem is one for Koreans to solve," he said, and added: "If the Korean Police are unable to handle the situation, the American Army can."

UP correspondent, Stanley Rich, from Seoul, 21 Oct, said that ... "Reliable American Army officials today disclosed the contents of a document reportedly giving in detail plans by which Korean Communists hoped to infiltrate a thoroughly trained "Army" of 500,000 into South Korea with the aim of establishing a Leftist Government. The document, said by an Army source to be "Completely reliable," was entitled, "Joint Soviet Communist master plan for Korea." It was said to have been written in Dec, 45. According to the plan, Korean Communists planned a two to three year course in their own Armies, Police organizations and schools for their members. "As many as possible of these trainees will be infiltrated into various Governmental agencies in South Korea, especially police agencies," the document said. The master plan allegedly provided the following objectives: 1 - - While the Communist Party in South Korea is striving for membership, it will set up branches in every administrative level, from province to township. 2 - - As soon as proper organization has been achieved, several moves will be carried out simultaneously.

Members will begin to go underground. Various Communist sponsored organizations will publicly disassociate themselves with the party. When the party has reached a certain peak and influence with the public and the American Military Government, it then will seek a compromise with the politically powerful Korean Right Wing, the plan further specified. The party seemingly will appear to be losing support, as many of its members will be underground, and presumably the Rightists will be more agreeable to a compromise. This done, the Communists will try to establish a Government as far to the left as possible. Although the Army source said the document was written last year, observers believed it had exceptional interests in the light of recent Korean political developments. Lyuh Woon Heung, leader of the Leftist Peoples Party, returned recently from a mysterious trip to the Soviet occupied zone of North Korea and signed a coalition with Kim Kiusik, a Rightist Leader. This agreement finally allowed the American Military Government to set up a Korean Legislative Council. Shortly afterwards, the Peoples Party, the New Democratic Party and revolting elements of the South Korean Communists Party announced formation of a "Socialist Labor Party." Communists allegedly revolted because they were unable to get along with their leader Pak Jeun Yung, who was appointed from North Korea last year. Disclosure of this document gives rise to the possibility that Lyuh - - regarded by many as an extremist - - may suddenly have agreed to the coalition only after his visit to North Korea. It also was believed possible that the so called "revolting" Communists, led by Kang Jin, may be pretending dissension with the party while they still continue to take orders from their HQ in North Korea."

New York Times Correspondent, Foster Hailey, from Seoul, 20 Oct, said Moon Eun Chong, Korean Leftist Leader, was arrested today. Two American Correspondents, Mark Gayn of the Chicago Sun and Charlotte Ebener of Newsweek, witnessed the incident ... they saw him taken away by Korean police who were assisted by several young men, one of whom identified himself as a member of the Great Korean Democratic Young Men's Association ... A police sergeant said the arrest was on orders of Lt Gen Hodge ... Gen Hodge subsequently denied this in a telephone conversation. He said he had heard that the police were looking for several Leftists Leaders for questioning but that he had not ordered the arrest of Mr Moon or anyone else ... whatever the reason for Moons arrest or for police fears, Seoul has the appearance of a wartime city. This Correspondent was stopped by police four times at intersections between the edge of the city and its center. What effect Moons arrest will have on the efforts of the coalition committee headed by Dr Kimm Kiusic to bring the Rightist and Leftist together in the proposed Legislature to form an Interim Government is problematical. Certainly it won't benefit such efforts, but whether it will be sufficient to intensify the Leftists distrust of the coalition to the point of withdrawal remains to be seen.

Following article by Richard Johnston entitled "US Manila Forces Held Slur on Army" appeared NY Times 22 Oct: "The unchecked deterioration in the conduct and appearance of the United States troops here is doing inestimable damage to American prestige as well as alienating the people of this nation.

With morale at its lowest ebb, their carelessness in dress, their unconcealed dislike for the Filipinos and their slovenly demeanor, the American troops on occupation duties in the Philippines are being openly referred to as 'Ambassadors of ill will.'

The principal factors responsible for this condition, according to both civilian and military authorities, are the failure of the average American soldier to understand why he is here, and the glaring failure on the part of officers of all echelons to inculcate into the GIs the most elementary pride in themselves, their units, the US Army or, for that matter, the US. There is no spirit among the troops of this area. American civilians out here adopt an apologetic attitude in attempts to explain to the Filipinos what has happened to the Army, so recently regarded by the Filipinos as friend, liberator and protector. That these conditions have given rise to more than gossip among both Filipinos and Americans is indicated in recent representations made by the highest

levels of the Philippine Government through Ambassador Paul V. McNutt, in which the Government pointed out that the privilege of extra-territorial rights enjoyed by the US Army made it impossible for the Government to curb reckless behavior on the part of troops.

With virtual immunity from the laws of this country, GIs are untouchable by the authorities for infractions that might be punishable by not less than a year's imprisonment.

In particular, the government complained of its inability to deal with violations of the traffic laws, from which soldier drivers demonstrate that they feel themselves immune.

The sight in Manila of an MP on patrol duty is a novelty and the Philippine police as well as pedestrians are harrassed by the Army drivers contempt for the speed laws as well as for the simplest forms of courtesy.

However, in the opinion of old residents of the Islands, it is not only GI contempt for local law that has given the Army a bad name; perhaps more important is the shocking conduct and appearance of the troops on the streets of Manila.

With utter disregard for personal neatness the troops here slouch along the streets or loll on the corners, caps askew, shoes unshined and clothing unpressed. This correspondent has been in Manila 20 days and has yet to see a US soldier salute an officer.

Many Manila newspapers editorialize several times a week on the unpleasant behavior of the GIs, and the question is continually being asked: 'What has happened to those friendly, helpful, capable soldiers who beat the

enemy and brought our freedom?' Plaintively the Filipinos ask if 'Those American soldiers cannot be brought back here to replace the brash, ill mannered, slovenly and contemptuous children you now call soldiers?'

At least a portion of the blame for the condition of the Army here, according to observers, can be traced to Officers, many of whom have settled themselves comfortably and are concerned only with their personal problems, and to Officers who are soon leaving for home and discharge, and feel that 'It is none of my business.'

"In addition, many Officers I have talked to declare that they regret the conditions and would do something to improve the situation except for the lack of interest in the problem in high ranks.

"One young Military Police Officer told me a few days ago that he had given up attempts at reforms because every time I made a suggestion the "Brass" cracks down on me--so what's the use.'

"Some of the older Officers complain that the basic training program of the new soldier is inadequate and that they are unable to "Make soldiers out of a bunch of juvenile rabble."

"Still others charge the American educational system with producing 'Smart aleck kids' who have learned to deride and abuse anything that they do not understand.

"Wherever the fault lies, the end product seems indeed to be 'Ambassadors of ill will who, in their own way, are doing more to under mine the position of the US in these occupation zones than all the moral, financial and technical assistance of the US can repair.

Following editorial entitled a failure in command appeared 21 Oct in NY Times: "First from Germany and now from the Phillipines come reports of the deterioration of our troops abroad. Possibly the situation in Germany has improved. In Manila, according to a dispatch from this newspapers correspondent, Richard Johnston, it is as bad as it could be. The Filipinos welcomed the troops of liberation who fought so splendidly. Now they ask if those American soldiers cannot be brought back here to replace the brash, ill mannered, slovenly and contemptuous children you now call soldiers. An Americans pride shrivels at such words. Yet part of the trouble, as Mr Johnston says, seems to be that the Officers of all ranks have failed to 'Inculcate into the GIs the most elementary pride in themselves, their units, the US Army or for that matter, the US.

These conditions cannot be ascribed to basic faults in the EM. Boys just like these, between 1941 and 1945, were turned into troops as fine and disciplined as any that ever wore shoes. When their country and their comrades were in peril they stood up. If they have failed to meet the morally more exacting tests of peacetime duty abroad the failure is in those who trained them and now command them. The responsibility runs all the way back to Washington.

1. It now appears that there will be a considerable number of officers surplus to Army requirements as of 31 Dec due to the heavy proportion of officers up grading in authorized categories. In view of this fact and to improve the general quality of the officer personnel of the Army, you are hereby authorized to return to the zone of the interior for separation as surplus to the needs of the Army, any non-regular Army officers regardless of category (A) who are in excess of your requirements and who have an efficiency index below 35 in company grades, or below 40 in the field grades. Method of computing the efficiency index is defined in War Dept Readjustment Regulations, RR1-5 appendix 1-A, except that efficiency indexes will be computed for all entries of performance for the period of active duty subsequent to 16 Sept 1940, to and including officers efficiency rating as of 30 June 1946. In view of the necessity for reducing the Army to within its authorized strength by earliest date possible, it is essential that you take all possible advantage of the separations authorized under this clause. Officers returned to the Zone of the Interior under this authority will be selected and placed on order for return at the earliest practicable date

The following decision of the Far Eastern Commission establishing, at the request of the US Government, the terms of reference of the Inter-Allied Trade Board for Japan was unanimously approved by the Far Eastern Commission at its 29th meeting on Oct 10, 1946; and was received from the State, War, and Navy Dept for transmittal to you:

Policy decision begins.

"1. At the request of the US Government the Far Eastern Commission hereby establishes the Inter-Allied Trade Board for Japan. The US Government will request each of the Governments represented on the Far Eastern Commission to appoint a representative to the Board. The Board will meet in Washington D. C.

2. The purpose of the Board is to provide easy and rapid means of consultation between the US Government as the principal occupying power and the other Governments represented on the Far Eastern Commission regarding the disposition of exports available from Japan and the furnishing of imports required for Japan, which lie beyond the scope of the Supreme Commander for the Allied Powers' own authority to arrange.

3. Within the framework of the Potsdam Declaration, policies established in accordance with the terms of reference of the Far Eastern Commission and the declared objectives of the occupation, the functions of the Inter-Allied Trade Board for Japan will be to make recommendations to the US Government on:

A. The disposition of commodities available for export from Japan;

B. The sources from which commodities shall be imported into Japan;

C. The best arrangements for facilitating Japanese exports and imports generally.

All recommendations of the Board involving matters of policy shall be subject to the approval of the Far Eastern Commission.

4. In the case of commodities which are in short world supply, the Inter-Allied Trade Board may use statistical data and consult with allocating authorities and other similar organizations.

In considering the disposition of other commodities which may be made available for export from Japan, the Board shall consider any evidence or arguments which may be presented to it by its members and shall recommend that the commodity be disposed of at the discretion of the Supreme Commander for the Allied Powers or shall recommend an allocation of the commodity which in its opinion, shall further the objectives of the Allied Powers with respect to Japan as stated in the Potsdam Declaration and insure the equitable distribution of the supply

8. In considering procurement of commodities which are required by Japan, the Board shall either (a) decide that the commodity can be acquired at the discretion of the authorities making the purchase or (b) shall recommend the source of the commodity in such a manner as, in its opinion, shall further the announced objectives of the Allied Powers with respect to Japan and provide for the equitable distribution of purchases among the supplying countries."

Policy decision ends.

be made only in cases when in the view of the United States Government acceptance of a recommendation would be inconsistent with the attainment of the objectives of the occupation.

The US Government notes the last sentence of paragraph 3 which requires that recommendations of the Board involving matters of policy be approved by the Far Eastern Commission. Since all actions of the Board are recommendations to the US Government, the US Government is not, by this provision, precluded from taking action on matters of urgency pending consideration by the FEC. This position is in line with the terms of reference of the Far Eastern Commission which permit the US Government to issue interim directives in cases of emergency, subject to subsequent review by the Far Eastern Commission." The State, War, and Navy Depts further state that in accordance with the above terms of reference the U.S. Government has transmitted a note to each of the Governments represented on the FEC requesting the appointment of a representative to the Inter-Allied Trade Board for Japan and enclosing the terms of reference.

Latest figures indicate 32 have departed from Seattle, 34 from New York, 21 awaiting port call, 14 being processed and 6 positions to be filled.. Total requisitioned 107. Due to unsettled conditions at the POE, daily drop outs and resignations caused by delays in shipping, the status of personnel requisitions is very fluid. This requisition has been completed several times but as a result of the conditions mentioned above there are positions still open. Every effort is being made to complete this requisition and have it shipped by first of Nov 46.

New York Herald Tribune today carried story from Washington dtd 16 Oct: Henry A Wallace was placed on the record today as advocating an independent Korea free of Russian or American Domination. This clarification of the former Commerce Secretary's views coincided with a report by Major General A V Arnold, former Military Governor of Southern Korea, that Russia is delaying the Independence of that Nation. General Arnold discussed his charges against Russia after turning in a report to Pres Truman at the White House. He attributed the political and Economic Chaos in Korea to a Russian "Iron Curtain" between the Russian and American occupied Zones in Korea. General Arnold held the Russians responsible for complicating the Korean problem by withdrawing from the commission on May 6th. He said that their action postponed establishment of a provisional Korean Government indefinitely and indicated that there could be no solution until Russia returned to the Joint Commission. General Arnold said the principle Russian objection to the Commission was that the US insisted on hearing from Korean Political Leaders who advocated Independence and opposed a Trusteeship. Acceptance of the Russian position, he maintained, would violate Basic American Principles of Freedom of Speech and Press.

Mr Wallace was drawn into the dispute over Korea as a result of his Madison Square Garden Speech on Sept 12, which led to his dismissal as Commerce Secretary.

He warned that if this were the case World Peace would not endure. Mr Wallace, in his reply, denied that his speech implied Domination of Korea by any Great Power and said he supported the principles of the Cairo and Moscow Declarations promising Independence.

The Korean Commission honored General Arnold last night at a Cocktail Party here in Washington, local papers merely gave guest list.

AP San Francisco 16 Oct, bearing the 1st Korean Government Passport issued in 40 years, Kim Dong Sung, President of the Korean Press Association, arrived today from Seoul aboard Marine Jumper. Mr Kim foresaw long difficulties for the Korean people so long as Korea is split into at the 38th parallel.

AP Seoul 15 October: Major Gen Lerch today approved an ordinance creating an interim assembly to give South Koreans practically complete but supervised control of their government. The assembly will have 90 members-- 45 elected from Seoul and the provinces and 45 appointed by the United States Occupation Commander, General Hodge, "so as to represent equally and fairly major democratic elements of Korean life, economical, political and intellectual." The United States Military Government retains power to dissolve the assembly, approve new members and require new elections. General Lerch recently told a press conference he would give a free rein to the assembly, vetoing only laws attempting to legislate the United States Command out of Korea, placing unfair responsibility on Americans, or endangering Korean economy. The assembly will legislate "on matters affecting the general welfare and interest and on matters referred to it by the Military Government." It also will review past appointments to the Military Government and confirm and consent to future appointments. One of the first considerations will be universal suffrage, whereby the assembly will establish the machinery for succeeding itself with an all elective body.

Special to New York Times from Moscow 15 October United States Troops and Police are assisting in the "brutal repression" of Korean strikers in the Southern Zone of Occupation, a Tass Dispatch, published in all today's newspapers, reported. Strikers meetings are frequently dispersed by

NY Herald Tribune Correspondent, Ralph Chapman, from Seoul 14 Oct, "A warning against further disorder in the American zone and a plea for cooperation by all Koreans with the Occupation Forces were voiced today by General Hodge in a statement that was broadcast. The American Occupation Zone Commander said that past, and possible future trouble was planned by "Dangerous Anarchists, Criminals and Agitators." It has been known for some time that American Military Intelligence has been keeping occupation authorities more than abreast of plans of Leftists Leaders, but this is the first time that it has been publicly announced that the Military is aware of future moves by these elements. General Hodge made it clear that his Headquarters was well informed and able to decide in advance the proper steps to take to offset efforts to create disturbances.

He said he was well aware that food stocks are low in southern Korea, but he pointed out that other countries are in far worse condition. Answering widespread rumors to the contrary, General Hodge insisted that no food has been exported from Korea. He said that American troops are not eating locally grown products. Stories to this effect, he said, are politically inspired. Absolving the general public of any blame in the recent riots General Hodge declared "Dangerous criminals" are responsible for "Many deaths and the destruction of much

valuable property." Their effort, he added, "is designed to throw all South Korea into turmoil and strife." Concerning the present labor question, General Hodge said present Labor Legislation is "Second to none in the world." He said that "Complaints and demands purely political in character presented by non worker agitators allegedly in the name of workers inherently denude these demands of authenticity and tend to throw suspicion upon good and legitimate workers."

He made no reference to Communists or the Russian Occupation Zone, but it is well known here that Military authorities lay full blame for recent troubles to agitators infiltrating from North of the 38th parallel.

NY daily worker of today, in usual bellicose manner, said "The Army came in to reinforce Korean Police, who are "Legally " shooting down strikers. These Korean Police, now employed by American Occupation Authorities, are the same hated organization that used to run things for the Japanese. General Hodge issued the Martial Law Order Oct 5, a day after police had precipitated widespread violence by opening fire on pickets who had tried to stop a SCAB train. American newspaperman, under Army control, are reporting the situation from Headquarters because they have been given no facilities to reach the trouble spot.

"When no commercial transportation is available within a reasonable time, civilian personnel and cargo desired by overseas area Commanders may be shipped by Army controlled vessels on a space available and reimbursement basis, upon approval by the overseas area Commander or the Chief of Staff, if such movement is determined to be of benefit to the Government. For such purposes, 60 days from the date of availability for movement of such personnel or cargo will normally be considered to be a reasonable time."

Washington Post UP 11 Oct: "Sporadic rioting in Southern Korea was continuing today, as Military Government Hq reported suspension of the Chief of Police of Taegu for his failure to control the race riots in which several persons were killed last week.

American troops and Korean police moved into the hills near Yangsan in an effort to capture 600 rioters who attacked 2 police stations yesterday, killing 2 policemen and capturing a small quantity of ammunition. Other US Forces were sent to the Island of Cheju. Po to investigate unconfirmed reports of rioting there.

Maj Gen Albert B Brown, a member of the American Soviet Joint Commission, met 48 leading Koreans at the courthouse. He told them that disorders in Kyonsan Pukto Province must cease. He urged cooperation among leading Koreans toward democracy, and decried the activities of minority leaders and agitators.

Washington Star Editorial 12 Oct: The long mounting troubles in the American Occupied Zone of Southern Korea have reached a pitch which betokens not merely a local crisis but threatens Soviet American Relations. The immediate aim of the Communists is to produce such chaotic conditions that the native government slated for inauguration in our zone cannot function. That Moscow appears bent on eventually gaining control of all Korea becomes apparent

NY Times 11 Oct, from Washington 10 Oct, Soviet American relations are stalemated in Korea, and there is no hope of lifting the "Iron curtain" that divided the country unless it can be accomplished on a high diplomatic level, Maj Gen A V Arnold, until recently the Senior US Member on the Joint American Soviet Commission in Korea, asserted here today. The American Authorities at Seoul are chafing under their inability to get anything done in the situation. The Koreans, Gen Arnold said, are suffering physically and economically. The Russians, however, are benefiting by gaining "More time to carry out their program in Northern Korea."

Following the Moscow decision of 27 Dec 45, by the US and Russia, looking toward a provisional govt for all Korea under a 5 year American Russian Trusteeship, the Joint Commission of 5 Americans and 5 Russians was created and directed to consult with Korean groups in setting up the provisional govt. But the trusteeship proposal was violently unpopular with independence-hungry Koreans of both right and left factions. The hitch came when the Russian Members of the Commission would not agree to calling in for

consultation members of any Korean Party that had opposed the trustee proposal. The Americans took the position that all parties had a right to be heard. The Joint Commission ended its meetings at Seoul last spring in a stalemate. Gen Arnold said, "There must be some way of effecting reconciliation for the good of the country, it should be done as quickly as possible. But I can see no hope of accomplishing it on the occupation level in Korea. We have done all we can; we feel we cannot recede in the principle of freedom of speech. If anything is done, it must be on a higher level." By this, he amplified, he meant the State Dept and the Soviet Foreign Ministry.

UP Seoul 9 Oct, Lyuh Woon Heung, Korean Leftist Leader, reappeared at his home last night after a one day absence, and asserted he had been kidnapped and "persuaded by numerous people" not to cooperate too keenly with American efforts to form a Democratic Govt in south Korea, reliable sources reported today. Lyuh was taken to an Army hospital to be treated for "nervous shock," an informant said. The Korean leader of the Leftist Peoples Party had been missing since Mon, shortly after he and Dr Kiusie Kimm, Rightist Leader, had signed a coalition agreement that was expected to aid American efforts to form a legislative council for the US occupation zone. A young acquaintance came to Mr Lyuh's house early Mon with a message that Ho Hun - former president of the Communist Sponsored Peoples Republic - wanted to see him, it was reported.

World report 15 Oct, "Korea today is an unhappy example of how Russia and the US do not get along together - Japan surrendered before US troops reached Korea. Local patriots, mostly communists and socialists, set up a Provisional Govt and ran the country until outside help arrived. Russian troops, upon entering their half of Korea, cleaned out the Japanese, jailed the collaborators and appointed Korean officials from Korean communists and local patriots educated under Russian supervision. US Forces, not prepared for the sudden surrender, used Japanese temporarily to keep order in southern Korea until reliable Koreans could be found.

Korean leaders who came from exile abroad clashed with the local left wing groups. Attempts to bring political parties together failed. At the Moscow conference last year, the Big Three promised Korea speedy unity and independence, delayed, perhaps, by a trusteeship for five years. Most Koreans condemn the trusteeship idea. Meanwhile, unity between the parties and the zones has made no progress."

Time 14 Oct issue, "Monumentally ill equipped at wars end to occupy or govern Korea, the US is still trying to live down initial errors: the bad feeling created by retaining Japanese police, however briefly, as a temporary control force; a willingness to string along with doddering Korean elders, instead of young competent and popular leaders; the crowning fiasco of abandoning rice rationing, which soon resulted in a critical shortage, a black market and inflation. That the Russians were making mistakes, too, in the northern sector was evidenced by the thousands of Koreans attempting to flee to the south. In Washington, Reparations Representative Ed Pauley prepared a report for President Truman recommending that the US pull up its socks in Korea: as in Germany, there was no point in simply waiting for Russian cooperation of unified control of the country. Japanese reparations to Korea must be sped up, machinery moved into the US zone of Korea and economic aid supplied, so that the whole area will develop into a unit capable of independent govt. The US, said Pauley, has a clear opportunity and responsibility to demonstrate to Koreans that democracy will work better than communism.

(B) Hardware and appliances: A critical shortage of steel and wire prevents manufacturers from meeting more than a small percentage of their requirements. These items are generally not available in the civilian market. Many companies have closed because of labor problems. Those without labor problems of their own have been slowed down through inability to obtain adequate deliveries from their suppliers. (C) Food: There is a severe shortage of processed foods of all types because of the lack of basic products such as meat, fat and shortening, tins and bottles are in short supply and further aggravate the problem. The Overseas Sect in your Par 7 B cannot furnish exchanges with information concerning procurement action. This information must come from AES NY and is now being accomplished as follows: (B) Information on status of requisitions is now being furnished the ports on WDAGO form 449. Copy of this form is furnished theaters by the ports. Information as to procurement action is contained in copy of purchase order furnished to the theater by AES NY. Copies of invoices are mailed by AES NY to the theater on the same day that they are received in AES NY. Shipping document and ships manifests are mailed by the ports to the theatres at the time of ships sailing. (C) AES has an expedite sect including production specialists to follow up purchase action and to insure shipment to the ports. (D) AES is aware of the dangers represented by the failure of supply of PX items and is utilizing all possible facilities to purchase and ship items needed and desired. Unpredictable delays such as transportation tie-ups and works stoppages and other establishments continue to occur at a high rate of frequency. To combat these and other causes of shortages, additional procurement personnel has been employed. (C) Food: There is a severe shortage of processed foods of all types because of the lack of basic products such as meat, fat and shortening. Tins and bottles are in short supply and further aggravate the problem. (D) Exchange operating equipment: Manufacturers no longer place our requirements in advance of domestic orders and are reluctant to make delivery even on rated orders. Steel and other materials are in short supply both from the standpoint of raw materials and production of reconversion equipment.

AP Seoul, 7 October, A Korean coalition of Rightist and non Communist Leftists asked US Military authorities today for permission to establish a Legislature for American occupied Southern Korea, looking toward eventual unification and independence of the entire country. Gen Hodge already has approved the step in theory. The coalition proposed a Legislature of 90 members, half to be elected by popular vote and half by the coalition committee. It advocated later unification of Leftists and Rightists in both the southern zone and Russian occupied Northern Korea and reconvening of the American Soviet joint commission, plus a program of land distribution and freedom of assembly, speech and travel...Communists have been blamed for a wave of strikes and violence in Southern Korea aimed at discrediting the American Military Government.

AP Seoul, 8 October, US troops reinforced Korean police in the Fusan area of Southeast Korea today in the wake of sporadic violence which killed 16 civilians Monday. The Americans succeeded in restoring order without firing a shot, and there were no further casualties. Seoul police remained silent on the fate of Woon Hyung Lyuh. His friends feared that he had been kidnapped by Communists after he signed an agreement with Conservatives. The agreement set up a coalition which promptly asked American permission to establish a legislature for the American zone as a first

Follow messages dated 3 Oct 46 addressed to Secretary of War: from Earnshaw's Docks and Honolulu Ironworks, Manila "We appeal to you to review the decision of your local Commander Major General J. G. Christiansen whereby he has refused to return to us our iron foundry and slipways located in the Manila Harbor Area. These properties are vital to Philippine rehabilitation program as before the war our company was the largest ship repair firm and installed approximately 75% of the sugar factories and refineries in the Philippines. Although we have many times appealed to the local Commander he continues to refuse to return our property and has posted armed guards to deny us entrance. Today our manager who previously had a pass to inspect the property was summarily escorted to the Guard Officer and his pass taken. The Guard Officer threatened that if he should again endeavor to enter the property he would be arrested as a trespasser. The Army has no lease or legal right to be on our property and we consider the Commanders action to be a serious invasion of our civil rights. Our full position was outlined to the Commander in our letter to him dated 27 Sept. The entire property with its iron foundry and ship facilities is lying idle since the Army is only using a portion of the property for a motor pool and a few Military Police shacks. We believe

AP Moscow 6 October, A Tass dispatch from Genzan, Korea, said today that mass arrests of leaders of outstanding parties and organizations had been ordered in cities and villages of Southern Korea ... the dispatch said that information received at Genzan indicated that US and Korean Police were especially brutal toward Communists, and had ordered the shooting of all Communists resisting arrest.

UP Seoul, 7 October, American Troop reinforcements were rushed today to an area roughly 50 miles North-east of Taegu to prevent "expected disorders" by Left Wing "rebels" similar to uprisings in Taegu which resulted in the massacre of 5 Korean Police Officers. US Army officials reported that quiet had been restored at Taegu and nearby Waegwan but revealed that 5 Korean constables, assisted by an American Army Patrol, were attempting to liberate 4 other constables believed captured by Communist inspired strikers and "terrorists." Military Police and CIC men raided a building in Taegu Saturday and confiscated 50 Jap rifles, 3 machine guns, 8 grenades, a number of swords, a considerable quantity of ammunition, Army officials reported today.

Washington 7 October, the WAR Department made public today a telegram from the chairman of the Democratic party of Korea urging that Lt Gen Hodge be retained as Commander of American Occupation Forces in that country. The telegram, addressed to Gen Eisenhower, and signed by Kim Sung Soo, said the party had learned with "surprise and regret" that Rep Sheridan had recommended the removal of Hodge. "We can assure you that the morale of the American soldier in Korea is excellent and that they are well taken care of. The Korean people at large have great confidence in Gen Hodge. Under his wise, progressive and democratic leadership, great improvement both in policies and in economy has been made since last fall," the telegram said.

Seoul 7 October, American hopes of forming a representative government in South Korea were severely jolted today with the disclosure that Lyuh Woon Heung, leader of the Leftist peoples party, disappeared and may be the victim of kidnapers. The disappearance posed a serious threat to the delicate political balance in the American Occupied Zone of Korea that had appeared on the way to settlement over the week end with signing of a 7 point coalition agreement between Lyuh and Dr Kim Kiusic, Rightist leader... the news of Lyuh's disappearance leaked out when he failed to appear for a conference with Kim and Gen Hodge... although Lyuh has "disappeared" twice during the last 6 months under dubious circumstances, Kim told reporters he believed that kidnaping was a legitimate theory in this case. "The WD situation overseas requires that WD civilian officials and employees be assigned overseas in considerable numbers to supplement or replace military personnel of various ranks and further requires that many employees of other agencies Federal and otherwise be assigned overseas to further that mission or other objectives.

2. "In view of the foregoing it is deemed necessary to establish comparable categories for civilian personnel. These comparable categories are to be used only as a standard for furnishing supplies and services as authorized in appropriate WD Directives.

3. "For the purposes of this Cir the following comparable categories are listed: CAF 15, CAF 14, P 8 and P 7 comparable to General Officer. New York Times correspondent R J H Johnson, from Tokyo 29 Sept, said "After spending 1 year in Korea and then returning to Japan this correspondent was strongly impressed by the sharp contrasts brought about by the vigorous, forthright policy of the US in Japan as opposed to the results of the uncertain, fumbling, confused policy on Korea...while fundamentally the Koreans dilemma lies in the decisions that led to the division of the country between the US and the Soviet Union, Lt Gen Hodges has had to move, day to day, along an undefined course. He has been hampered on the one hand by vigorous and unceasing interference from the Soviet inspired Communists in South Korea and on the other hand by Washington's refusal or inability to give him clear cut directives from dealing with the basic causes of the failure of the Americans to achieve greater success in Korea... Korea, by comparison, would appear to be in the grip of lethargy. Torn by political strife in the South, and strangled by a Soviet imposed Communist regime in the North, Korea awaits a second "Liberation." Of the conditions in North Korea enough is known to indicate that political freedom is non existent. But political freedom, encouraged by the US, has resulted in political turmoil in which the Soviet directed Communists continue to devote their entire energies to discrediting the US and preventing unity among the Koreans there.

Despite the urgings of the military government authorities that they bestir themselves toward reconstruction, the Koreans in the US zone continue to take an apathetic view toward Allied intentions and prefer to "Wait and See."

AP Tokyo 29 Sept. Gen MacArthur declared today that "notable progress" was made in July in Korean labor legislation, political planning, public safety and education. His report also noted that Seoul Police had repulsed Korean Communist efforts to free a group of accused counterfeiters, and that the Korean press was clamoring for independence.... Shortages of technicians, machinery, parts and materials, and labor unrest, impede industrial recovery.

Rep Short, of the Military Affairs Sub-Committee, in an interview over station WINK last night said, "Into Korea and from their occupied Northern half of Korea into the South half of Korea which is occupied by American forces and Gen Hodges has had a difficult task of sending those Japanese out of Manchuria and Korea back to Japan. The Koreans would like for both the Russians and the Americans to get out of Korea because they want their freedom and independence and no one can blame them. The Americans would get out tonight if the Russians would but the minute we pull out, we know the Russians would swallow Korea and that's the only reason we're not out of there now."

AP today repeated yesterdays release in which 3 members of the House Military Affairs Subcommittee denied Sheridans claim that the group had recommended the removal of General Hodge as Commander of United States Troops in Korea. Todays release added the following statement by Rep Johnson, "I disagree with the Chairman. I think Hodge is doing a good job, considering the obstacles he has to contend with."

UP release mentioned in yesterdays cable repeated in paper today.

UP correspondent, -Dean W Dittmer, in undated article about OCCUPATION in Korea said "The 38th parallel is something you may hear more about, but the Army certainly hopes not. It may mean bad news if you do. About 40,000 American Troops are sweating it out below the parallel while Russia has from 4 to 5 times as many troops above the line. The Soviet Union has not agreed to cut down the size of its force. On top of that the Koreans dont seem to like the presence of Foreign Troops 1 high ranking army leader said the United States has 3 possible moves in Korea, sit tight and see what develops, pull out, or send in a bigger force. Withdrawing our force would mean turning the entire country over to the Russians, he said it is generally believed in the Orient that Russia is attempting to spread her influence throughout the GFLP East as much as possible, and Korea, like China, is a fertile field the morale of American Soldiers in
