1. Lever Brothers, the holders of 99 year lease for copra rights on Christmas Island from British Govt, subleased these rights to a Father Rougier, a French subject. The rights passed to the son of Father Rougier, a French subject. The

rights pass to the son of Father Rougier on the latters death. At the outbreak of World War II Rougier was in France and is reported to have fled to Germany, having been a collaborator. With this development the British Colonial Service stepped in to care for the copra rights pending apprehension of hougier, and have been on the island since.

2. In 1936 native strength under Rougier was 18. In 1942 approx 30 Ocean Island native laborers plus two corporals of his Majestys Colonial Constabulary were present. The corporals had their wives with them. These were the only women on the island. The same year the corporals and their wives were withdrawn. 1944 Ocean Islanders were withdrawn and replaced by Ellice Island natives. In December 1945 Ellice Island natives were withdrawn with the exception of 4 who volunteered to remain on Christmas. The Ellice Islanders were replaced by 40 Gilbert Islanders. Since that time 16 more Gilbert natives have arrived making present native strength 60. Maj Sinclair, the British Commissioner, a colonial Major, his wife and two daughters now live on Christmas.







This headquarters has received an inquiry from the British Commissioner at Christmas Island asking if there is any objection from COMGENMIDPAC to the British Government allowing native women to enter Christmas Island, women to be transported to Christmas Island on transportation available to the Brisish. The following is the situation as it now exists at Christmas Island:

A. Sovergeinty of the island is contested by both British and American Governments.

B. MIDPAC maintains a garrison force consisting of approximately 50 officers and enlisted men. Present plans indicate that this garrison will be maintained at this strength until 1 January 1947, when the force will be reduced to an overall strength of approximately 40.

C. British have increased native male labor from 44 to 60 in the past 90 days and contemplate a further increase in number of males to 200.

D. If the British are allowed to import native women, it is to be expected that the population of the island would increase and change from purely a labor force to what would amount to a Colony.

In view of the foregoing, this headquarters recommends non-concurrence with the proposal of the British Commissioner.



Orders were issued yesterday to the command that mass meetings would not be permitted in the future without approval of my headquarters. An orderly meeting of between 2- and 3,000 men was held at Fort Shafter Saturday afternoon. Today the committee presented to me the conclusions of their meeting. Among the proposals was a request to send a delegation to Washington to present the soldiers point of view to the subcommittee on Military Affairs of the Senate, alleged to be investigation demobilisation. I declined to consider this proposal. Secondly, they proposed to send a letter to the Marine Commander protesting his action in not allowing Marines to hold mass meetings. I refused to countenance such a measure and the men then voluntarily agreed not to dispatch such a message. I feel sure that the matter will have ended with the announcement of General Eisenhower's policy on demobilization. But in any event, I do not intend to permit further mass meetings or any public discussion of the policy once announced. There have been no untowardness and the meetings were conducted under the auspices of officers and non-commissioned officers. Bands were present which played the National Anthem and in all respects the meetings resembled football rellies. This for your information.

The meetings held on Cahu in protest to the Demobilization program have been orderly and under control of their officers rather than all indiscriminate demonstrations I authorized meetings with the understanding that they would be conducted in a manner dignified to the Army. To date such has been the case. The men were told that they could reduce their complaints to writing which I would forward to higher authority. Do you authorize me to forward their views directly to the War Department with copies to you or do you want them channeled to your headquarters.

(New Subject) United Press report states that I have forbidden the Stars and Stripes to publish stories critical of the Army. That is not correct. I have informed the Stars and Stripes editorial board that they may not make discourteous or derogatory remarks about the president, the Secretary of War, The Chief of Staff of the Army, or their commanders as individuals because in that case they would violate the 62nd Article of War. Other than that the policy is one of great liberacity. I have informed OPD today on Signaly of the above.

The recent announcement of the slowing down of the demobilization program with the resultant inability of the War Department to progressively lower the points has had a very intense emotional reaction in this Command as a result a mass demonstration was Upon receipt of this news scheduled to be held at Fort Shafter I directed every post commander to assumble his non-commissioned officers this afternoon and explain to them the impropriety of demonstrations as the Army provided an orderly method of presenting their rievances. I personally spoke to approximately 1,000 noncommissioned officers at my Headquarters telling them that I had no objection to a meeting to be conducted under orderly circumstances and the submission to me of any grievances which I would transmit to higher authority. A small gathering of approximately 400 met at Fort Shafter at which the demobilization program was discussed. It was orderly and without incident. Indications are that these meetings will be repeated as the tenor of remarks was to bring pressure upon Congress. The complaints of the men may be summarized as follows:

- (1) They desire the announcement of a definite program and policy which will include a progressive reduction of points or a progressive release from the Army based on years of service, to the end that each man waiting overseas can plan his future upon release. The men do not care whether it is good news or bad news but they are disturbed and some what bewildered by the lack of a definite War Department schedule of release projected at least 6 months into the future
- (2) There is strong resentment and a feeling of injustice that the War Department will declare surplus on the mainland men with less points than those serving overseas and feel that as long as the points of the men on T OCTRSECHVLESTPFTGS low they should be sent overseas to garrison the posts
- (3) There are men in the Command with 36 months of service who now see little chance of getting out of the service before July while press reports state that the War Department will not ship overseas men now in the United States with only 21 months service. The men refuse to accept any statement that lack of shipping prevents this

- (4) Now that the wer is over they feel they are not doing constructive work on the various islands of the Pacific despite anything that might be told them.
- (5) The statement made by General Marshall that men with 2 years of service would be discharged by the end of late winter has been so widely publicized throughout the Pacific that they find it impossible to reconcile this statement with the recent announcement of the retarding of demobilization and the inability of the War Department to stand by what the men regard as a promise.
- (6) The present method of handling emergency furloughs is most detrimental to morale. The concentration of this power in the hands of the Adjutant General causes delays that at times make the furloughs non essential when permission arrives particularly in case of deaths. Every effort has been made and is being made in this Command to present the facts to the men and the difficulties confronting the War Department, instructing them of the commitments of our government and telling them that as they are a part of the people responsible for the peace they must choose between winning the peace which means acceptance of the demobilization program or losing the peace by an insistence on heedless demobilization.

I feel it my duty to present the facts as stated above and to add that this agitation and emotionalism will continue until the War Department issues a schedule of demobilization embodying progressive reduction of points and providing for release under a program of diminishing length of service overseas in such detail and projected into the future for at least 6 months so that the men may make their plans for positions in civil life. In my judgment it makes no difference whether the decision to demobilize is rapid or slow but the announcement should be definite covering a fixed period into the future. This future forecast is of utmost importance. It should then remain unchanged. The above conclusions have been obtained from innumberable conversations and meetings with the men of this Command by me personally.

Dear General MacArthur:

I and the members of my staff who accompanied me to Washington have now completed our work here and will return shortly to Honolulu. However, I thought it desirable to inform you of the progress we have made therein while here in the War Department.

As you will recall, in my radio of 10 October I forwarded to you the list of the general subjects which I proposed to discuss. Of these subjects, I decided to eliminate any discussion of the discontinuance of a special application of selective service in the Hawaiian Islands. The remaining matters, I believe, have been covered both to the benefit of the War Department and to our own advantage as is set forth briefly as follows.

The matter of permanent military construction in the Hawaiian Group for the post-war period together with the matter of condemning certain properties, required by the Army, requires special consideration. While the present budget is being drastically reduced in an effort to present an economical program to Congress, I believe we have so presented our problem to the War Department that we will be able to meet our minimum requirements in this respect.

Another closely allied item is the arrangements necessary for the acquisition or use of territorilly owned airfields to support the very long range bombardment group, which the Army Air Forces contemplates moving into the Hawaiian Islands.

While we were under the impression that four groups were to be moved in at an early date it now appears that the CG AAF is considering keeping all VLR's in forward areas.

Regarding the disposal of surplus property, the matter of responsibility for the disposal of Army Air Forces type equipment, including aircraft, has been particularly knotty due to the anomalous position of the Hawaiian Air Depot as an element of the Air Transport Command. I believe we have presented our problem to the War Department in such a manner that they will look favorably

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returning the depot to my control in order that this property may be expeditiously disposed of.

We have made some headway in the matter of providing for the movement of dependents from the mainland, not however, along the precise lines which I had visualized. It now seems that the War Department contemplates a circular of general application which will be enlarged upon for each area by a letter of instructions applicable to that area only. My staff has assisted in the preparation of a letter pertaining to the Middle Pacific which, if it is published will generally meet our requirements.

On the matter of reestablishing the Office of the district engineer, Honolulu, the War Department now plans the beginning of the next fiscal year as the target date. While this is slightly earlier than anticipated, I believe it will be satisfactory.

In line with my radio to you I discussed with G-1 the desirability of relaxing the War Department restrictions that prevent the promotion of reserve component officers whose release from the service is imminent. The War Department is undertaking a study on this matter and it appears now that promotions may soon be permitted for exceptionally deserving officers prior to their separation from the service. Who will exercise this authority has not been determined but I of course recommended that it be delegated to overseas commanders.

Many minor matters were also covered during our stay. Among these I might mention the substitution of Japanese prisoners of War now on the mainland, for our Italian Prisoners whom the War Department is desirous of returning to Italy about the first of the year. The Japanese prisoners will be brought to the Island in the same shipping that will return the Italians directly to Italy. This arrangement will assist in meeting our labor requirements.

While the designation of post-war bases in the Pacific was not included in my agenda, I found upon arriving that JCS 570/40 had just been published, defining categories of post-war bases. I understand also that it is contemplated that subsequent papers will define the missions of these bases, allocate troop strength thereto and will define the primary interest, by service, of each.

I believe that the trip has been well worth our while, particularly as our conferences here have undoubtedly given a clearer insight into our particular Pacific problems while plans are being formulated.

(CAX-52196) This requires a rapid and effective movement of Army units, supplies and equipment from bases in the Pacific to the mainland. In many cases units must be removed from the active list without regard to mission or location thereof. The procedure established in CINCPAC ADV radio 240600 Z May 1945 is too slow and cumbersome to permit the adjustments necessary to effect the above. Recommend that the provision reference radio be cancelled and that all Army Porces now under CINCPAC control be released to control of COMGEN AFMIDPAC and AFPAC immediately.
