1. In regard to Paragraph 2, basic communication, Pool #1 was commanded by Lt. Colonel Austin J. Montgomery, QMC, now in Tokyo as a witness in the Japanese war trials. Pool #2 was commanded by Lt. Colonel George E. Orr, QMC (CAC).

2. The other pool commanders, as far as I know, are dead. The following personnel, however, may be able to help you determine who the drivers were who served with us in Bataan.

- a. Mr. Robert Burke; last known address: 1580 Filbert Street, San Francisco, California. Executive Officer for the Commanding Officer of Pool #4.
- b. Mr. Ray R. Derrick, Major, AUS, who was in charge of reclamation under my command in Bataan. In civilian life he was the Manager of Pantranco at Cabanatuan, Nueva Euja, Philippine Islands. Believed to be in Manila.
- c. Mr. Max Blouse, Manager of the Batangas Transportation Company, now a resident of Manila.
- d. Mrs. Floyd Cottrell, widow of the Manager of Pampusco, at San Fernando Pampanga.
- e. Captain Richard F. Hedrick, who was last known to be living in Manila.
- f. Mr. Jose M. Luna, now on duty in the Claims Office, who was Chief Clerk of the Philippine Motor Transport Depot until the evacuation of Manila in December 1941.

In addition to the above, the records of the Luzon Transport Company, a government subsidiary of the Headquarters at Manila, should be of some assistance to you,

3. The rate of pay was, to the best of my recollection, fifty pesos a month and rations. It is doubtful that anyone drew any pay after 31 January 1942, for the simple reason that there was no way to spend any money in Bataan and there was no possibility of getting money out of Bataan to the families.

4. There are still living in Manila, Philippine Scouts who were under my command before and during the war; -- a 2nd Lieutenant Candido Flitane and Sergeant Victoriano Jagalino. They may be able to give you some information regarding those civilians who served under me.



1. At this time I cannot remember a Gonzalo Rubic by name, for during the days on Bataan we had several thousand Filipinos working for us. However, if Mr. Rubic has a certificate signed by Captain Deymek, he is undoubtedly due pay. Captain Deymek did not come to duty with me until after the evacuation to Bataan, and it was almost impossible for anyone to leave Bataan until after the surrender on April 9, 1942. It is my belief, therefore, that Mr. Rubic is entitled to payment for services until April 9, 1942.

2. In this connection, I would like to state that very few employees drew any pay while they were in Bataan due to the fact that there was no place to use any money and the money would have been of no value to them.

Dear Sir:

Reference is made to the claim for unpaid wages filed by Hilarion M. Espinosa for services allegedly rendered to the U.S. Army.

Claimant states that prior to the outbreak of war, he was a driver for the Manila Yellow Taxi Cab Company, whose services were commandeered on 8 December 1941 when the facilities of that company were taken over by the U.S. Army; that on 31 December 1941, he was sent to Bataan driving a truck full of supplies; that upon reaching Bataan, he was assigned to Motor Pool #1 until its surrender on 9 April 1942; and, that for services rendered for the period 1 January to 9 April 1942, he was never paid.

Available information indicate that you were in charge of Motor Pool #1 at Bataan. If you still recall subject claimant as having been assigned under your command, request verification of the foregoing allegations and certify, giving emphasis on his employment status, rate of pay and period for which he was not paid.

In addition, please furnish this office with your statement stating in detail your knowledge of the activities of Motor Pool #1, names of U.S. Army personnel assigned to that Motor Pool, names of responsible civilian employees who can certify to facts relative to that Motor Pool and other data that may help this office in processing of claims being filed by persons who alleged employment with that installation. Personal records you can forward to this office are most welcome and will be appreciated.

Relative to my affidavit filed at the office of base X civilian affairs on April 12, 1945, I beg to inform that on June 17, 1945, I received a letter from that office advising me that my status does not entitle me for pay during the period of Japanese occupation. Therefore, I beg to request that I be permitted to appeal and submit an explanation to wit:-

On December 8, 1941 I was connected with the Q.M.C. as civilian employee in the capacity of driver under Philippine Motor Transport Depot Station in Fort Area, Manila, P. I. Sometime on Dec. 12, 1941 the said Motor Transport Depot, was reorganized into seven different Motor Pools, and I was assigned to Motor Pool No. 1 and attached to 12th Q.M. Regt. (PS) U.S.A. under Major Austin J. Montgomery. On Dec. 27, 1941 the said regiment moved to Bataan, and civilian employees under the Q.M.C. were left behind under direct supervision of Mr. Steven and Mr. Handrick. On Dec. 31, 1941 Motor Pool No. 1 and No. 3 were joined in the Esposition Sight, Quezon, City, and on the same night we moved to Bataan, under Mr. Steven who become captain when we were in Bataan, as well as Mr. Handrick who later become 1st. Lt.

The following morning January 1, 1942 we were able to reach Bataan, but our group from Manila, was already disorganized and many of us were not able to locate our officers, Mr. Steven and Mr. Handrick. However, I joined the 12th Q.M. Regt. (PS) U.S.A. Station at Km 141 Orion Bataan, under Major Montgomery the Regimental Commander, Captain Tannehill the Executive Officer, and Captain Groves the Pay-Master, and Mr. Isidoro D. Dizon our foreman on the civilian section.

With the same arrangement on January 6, 1942 we again moved to Km. 146 Limay, Bataan, and the following morning Jan. 7, 1942, I was sent by Mr. Dizon, as per order of our Regimental Commander Major Austin J. Montgomery, to report to the Service Company 57th Inf. (PS) under First Sergeant Agcawili. There I stayed up to March 15, 1942. Once I was again given order to report to my former Organizations. I went again with the said Motor Pool No. 1 which was station at km. 161 point 8 Cab-caben Mareveles, Bataan, where I worked particularly in bringing ammunitions, foodstuffs, etc. to the forces in the front.

As additional information is required by that office to determine my status I beg to refer the following names of enlisted men whose address are in the direction of (PS) Det. AFPAC APO 500 G.H.Q. Manila

The above mentioned names are the men that can certify to my status as I was attached for duty with them in all activities, and they were also my co-comrades who sacrificed in the battle of Bataan.

Inasmuch as I was advised by that office that records as well as the Pay-Roll of employees connected with the Q.M.C. has already been located and now under the custody of that office, I beg to refer to that office the names of my co-employees whose back pays have been received by them and they are as follows:


