I, EDWARD C. VALLEN, Filipino, of legal age, married, with residence and post office address at 1014 Pennsylvania Street, Manila, and presently a Commissioned Officer of the Armed Forces of the Philippines with station at Camp Barry, Quezon City, after having been duly sworn to in accordance with law, depose and say:

That I was the Assistant Chief of Staff, G-4, 11th Division, RA, USAFFE, from October, 1941 to the fall of Batavia on April 9, 1942;

That the Division CP of the said Division was located at Macabug, Pangasinan since December 8, 1941 and later moved, on or about December 23, 1941 to several places seaward until Batavia during the retrograde movement of the troops;

That on or about December 8, 1941, Col. Juan S. Moran, then Chief of Staff, 11th Division, RA, USAFFE directed me, and through me, all commanders of regiments and special and attached units, including all supply officers of lower units, to procure and/or commandeer motor vehicles, foodstuffs and other supplies which were so critically needed for the maintenance and operation of the units then on the field, on account of the critical supply situation then prevailing;

That pursuant to the said order, I, as Assistant Chief of Staff G-4, ordered Capt. Antonio Pares, then Asst. Division Quartermaster, 11th Division, to proceed to the rice regions of the province of Pangasinan like Angeles, San Leon, San Quintin, Yagay, Asingan, etc. and to seal and commandeer all the rice mills and warehouses having rice and/or palay contents for the use of the army troops during a long period of operations; that Capt. Pares was instructed to contact the owners of rice mills and/or warehouses and to enter and/or execute written contract or agreement with the owners concerned; (1) to sell to the army all the rice and palay found in the mill and warehouse premises at the current price in the locality, (2) to make an inventory of all the stocks of rice and palay found in the rice mills and warehouses and to make and sign and issue at once to the owners thereof, a receipt of commandering covering all the stocks found and inventoried and the unit prices agreed upon, (3) to require the owner concerned to continue the purchase of more palay in their buying stations, and to continue also the milling of all palay for sale to the army units at the agreed price per unit; that the army will furnish motor fuels for milling after the contract is signed; (4) to issue on receipt to all army units drawing rice or palay from the mill or warehouse any quantity of rice requisitioned, properly signed by the requisitioning officer or soldier showing the unit or organization, place, and date of operation; (5) Not to dispose, issue or sell any quantity of rice or palay to the civilians or civilian entities unless given permission to do so by proper army authorities; (6) to furnish quarters/accommodation within the mill and warehouse premises to army soldiers posted to guard and supervise purchases;

That Capt. Antonio Pares, on or about December 15, 1941, reported to me that he was able to seal and commandeer with a written agreement signed by him, a big rice mill and warehouse at San Quintin, Pangasinan, owned by Carlos Lopez alias Tan Long, and that soldiers were posted to guard the premises and to supervise the milling operations and to check the rice deliveries to army units;

That immediately after Capt. Pares reported to me of the commandering of big warehouse full of rice and palay at San Quintin, I instructed him to draw from all motor pools of lower units all motor vehicles available, with supply detail with which to haul, day and night, all the rice from the said warehouse and to utilize the train, if necessary;

That I know that plenty of rice were drawn from the said warehouses by the lower units of the 11th Division and other Divisions which occupied adjacent sectors;

That I know that the owner of the said mill and warehouses was never paid for the stocks of rice or palay taken or consigned for the use of the army;

That as such Adjutant General, it was my responsibility to see to it that all orders of the Division Commanding General, Brigadier General William Brougher and the Chief of Staff, the late Colonel Juan S. Moran, are channeled thru my office;


That I personally know and still remember that the Division Commander and the late Colonel Juan S. Moran, then Chief of Staff, ordered the Division G-4, Major, then Captain Simeon M. Valdez, and the other staff members of the Command to commandeer supplies and equipment for the use of the Division and other troops attached to it during the operations of the Division;

That I fully remember Major Valdez having been ordered to commandeer, which he did commandeer, supplies and equipment for the use of our Division; that our Division was logistically supported through the supplies and equipment commandeered from the time of its operations in northern Luzon up to and including the siege of Bataan;


That this affidavit was executed to confirm the order to Major Valdez to commandeer supplies and equipment and for him to delegate that authority to his subordinate officers;

That I vouch for the veracity of the order given Major Valdez and for him to commandeer supplies and equipment for the use of the 11th Division, USAFFE;

I, DEMETRIO P. TARIJE, Filipino, of legal age, married, and a resident with postal address at 38 Falcon St., Sta Mesa Heights, Quezon City, after having been duly sworn according to law, depose and say:

That I was the Assistant Adjutant General and Assistant G-1 of the 11th Division, PA, USAFFE from November 16, 1941 up to April 9, 1942 when the Bataan Forces surrendered to the enemy;

That I know that the Chief of Staff, 11th Division, PA, directed the Asst. Chief of Staff, G-4 to seal and commandeer all rice mills, warehouses and grocery stores in nearby localities in the province of Pangasinan and in Tarlac containing plenty of foodstuffs like rice, and/or palay, canned goods, and other subsistence stores for army use, enjoining thereof all the owners concerned to cooperate with the Army authorities in this regard, assuring them at the same time that everything taken for army use will be paid later by the army;

That I remember that Capt. Antonio Perez, then Asst. Division Quartermaster of the said Division was ordered by the Asst. Chief of Staff, G-4, 11th Division, pursuant to the orders of the Chief of Staff, to commandeer all the rice and palay from all rice mills and warehouses in rice regions in eastern Pangasinan to maintain the army troops in their operations in Pangasinan and Northern Luzon to repel the enemy;

That on two or three occasions, the Chief of Staff also directed me to help the Asst. Chief of Staff, G-4 and the Division Quartermaster in commandeering from local sources in Pangasinan vital materials and supplies then badly needed for the maintenance and operation of the troops, particularly, class (1) supplies;

That upon orders of the Chief of Staff of the said Division, I, in my capacity as Asst. Adjutant General and Asst. G-1, made periodical inspections and checking of the strength returns of the regiments and special units including the lower units by going to their respective cantonment and/or bivouac areas to determine their excess and/or shortage of personnel;

That on several occasions, in connection with my inspections of the lower units of the said Division when the troops were still operating in Lingayen Gulf Areas, I saw several truck loads of supplies of all sorts like foodstuffs, rice, canned goods, construction materials and supplies for beach fortifications then needed for field operations of the troops. These supplies were commandeered from local sources in the province of Pangasinan by the Asst. Chief of Staff G-4 and his staff officers;

AFFIDAVIT

I, ANDRES M. MADAMA, Filipino, of legal age, married, and residing at 230 Legat Street, Inco, Manila, after having been duly sworn to in accordance with law, depose and say:-

That since November, 1941, I was assigned for duty with the G-4 Section, 11th Division, RA, USAFFE, and was inducted together with other enlisted men assigned to the 11th Division Headquarters, 11th Division, RA into the USAFFE at Camp NOBLE, TRENTON, NEGROS by Capt. DONALD BLACKBURN;

That I have official knowledge of the fact that on or about December 8, 1941, Col. Juan Moran, then Chief of Staff, 11th Division, RA, ordered the Asst. Chief of Staff, G-4, to seal and commandeer for army use, all business establishments in nearby localities in Pangasinan and in Tarlac province, like rice mills, warehouses, grocery stores where subsistence stores like rice, palay, mango, canned goods, sugar, etc. were stored;

That I know that on or about December 8, 1941, the Asst. Chief of Staff, G-4, ordered Capt Antonio Perez, then Asst. Division Quartermaster of the 11th Division, RA to go to the rice producing localities of Pangasinan and Tarlac to survey or locate the rice mills, warehouses and grocery stores to be sealed and/or commandeered for the use of the army troops of the 11th Division;

That on or about December 15, 1941, I was detailed by the Asst Chief of Staff, G-4, to accompany Capt Antonio Perez, to San Quintin, Pangasinan together with other enlisted men from the Division Quartermaster, and at San Quintin, Pangasinan, Capt Perez negotiated with Mr CARLOS LOPEZ alias TAN SOON a Chinese rice dealer, owner of a big rice mill and two warehouse located at San Quintin; that after their talk inside the rice mill, Capt Perez directed me to assist him and the Chinese owner to inventory all the cavanes of rice and palay found inside the rice mill and warehouse, and after we were through with the rice mill and the adjacent warehouse, we proceeded with the said Chinese owner to his other warehouse located at a nearby barrio in the same locality which was about two (2) kilometers away from the rice mill; All the contents of the other warehouse were also inventoried;

That after taking the inventories of all the cavanes of rice and palay from the rice mill and the two warehouses which amounted to several thousands of cavanes of clean rice and several thousands of cavanes of palay, both of which were of the first class rice varieties like elca-elca, and 1236, Capt Perez prepared and signed the commanding receipt covering all the cavanes of rice and palay inventoried in the premises, and gave the same to Mr. Lopez, the owner; After that, Capt Perez instructed me and other enlisted men to stay to guard the premises of the rice mill and the warehouses; to supervise the milling of all the palay found inside the warehouses; to check the deliveries of the rice to army trucks drawing rice from the premises; to check the records of the owner as to the quantity of rice issued to army units, time and date of delivery, name of requisitioning Officer or enlisted man, and their organization or unit and sector, and to see to it that the owner does not issue or dispose any rice or palay to any civilian without written permission from the proper army authorities;

That at about noon of the same day, several army trucks with army personnel from Camp Carayungan, Urdaneta, Pangasinan and nearby camps arrived at the premises to draw rice, and all their trucks were loaded with the assistance of the warehouse personnel; then more trucks with Supply Officers from various units followed, and we were busy at the mill and warehouse premises, day and night, from December 16 to 26, 1941 milling the palay and issuing rice to all trucks drawing rice for the army units in La Union Sector, Western and Central Pangasinan;

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That at about four o'clock in the afternoon of December 26, 1941, the two warehouses and the rice mill were practically empty except few hundreds of cavanes of palay which were left inside the warehouse and mill, not milled;

That we left the premises at about six o'clock in the evening of the same day, December 26, 1941 with the last truck, towards the south as the Japanese snipers were reported operating south of Tayug, few kilometers north of San Quintin, Pangasinan;

That I still remember that Mr. Lopez, the owner was never paid for all the stocks of rice taken or drawn by the various army troops, by Capt Perez or by any other officer including the Finance Officer of the Philippine Army or USAFFE.

PEREZ or any proceeds therefrom, I hereby assign to said System as sole security for said loan and interest thereon all right, title, and interest in and to said policy or any proceeds therefrom. It is hereby agreed:

A F F I D A V I T

I, LOPE A. CATUBIG, who being first duly sworn according to law deposes and says:

That I am a citizen and resident of Dagupan, Pangasinan where I have lived since birth. I am 41 years of age. Prior to the war with Japan I was engaged in the transportation business and operated in connection thru with the business of buying and selling foodstuffs.

That on or about 25 November, 1941, I was awarded a contract to furnish foodstuffs to the various units of the 11th Inf., Reg. which was at that time stationed at Bonuan, Dagupan. This contract was for food to be furnished during the month of December 1941. It was awarded as the result of a public sealed bid. The lowest bidder on the various items listed was awarded a contract to furnish those items.

That as a result of this contract I furnished and supplied to the various units of the 11th Inf. Reg., foodstuff amounting to ₱1,504.99. The various deliveries were made by the drivers of my trucks who was accompanied by my brother Dominador Catubig who was my representative. Upon making a delivery he secured a receipt from the various mess sergeants. These receipts are a part of the file.

Thereafter on 19 Dec 1941, I furnished foodstuffs amounting in all to ₱7,343.32 which was delivered to the mess sergeant of the storeroom of the 11th Inf. Reg. At the time of this delivery I was informed that this foodstuff was to be used on the retreat and that my services would not be needed any more. This information was given me by 1st Lt. E.M. Sadang, Inf., VC-Med. Bn., with whom I had had all of my dealings pertaining to the contract. This was the last delivery made. The organization moved out 24 Dec. 1941. I attempted to make a collection of this account when Lt. Sadang told me that I was not to supply any more foodstuff. He simply told me that I would collect for the provisions but did not tell me how I would collect. I did not see the Lieutenant any more thereafter and do not know his present whereabouts. The soldiers were moving from place to place thereafter and I was never able to contact any of the personnel.

A copy of my notification of award for the month of October 1941 is made a part of the file simply as evidence. The prices expressed in the Nov. 25, 1941 award, a copy of which is made a part of the file was the price on which the contract for December supplies were furnished. I certify that the prices shown were wholesale prices and were in keeping with the prevailing prices current at the time the supplies were furnished.

To my knowledge there are only two available witnesses to the transaction which ~~xxx~~ are one of my drivers and my brother. One of my drivers, Urbano Vidal, went with the troops on the retreat to Patnan and has never been heard from since that time. I have made a diligent search for him but without success.

On 24 Dec. 1941, a Lieutenant Lacquiao came to me personally and stated that the Army needed certain barbwire, which I owned, to fence the beach as a defense in the landing of the Japanese. I told him that if the Army needed it he could get. On that date the Lt. was accompanied by about six other soldiers in an Army truck. The lieutenant had one of his companions execute a receipt which was given me. The man who executed the receipt was a sergeant and I knew his face, but did not know him personally. The original receipt is made a part of the file. I do not know the present whereabouts of either the sergeant or the lieutenant.

That there were no witnesses to the incident except Donato Ora who called me when the lieutenant came.

That I estimated the value of the barbwire to be more or less ₱1,350.00.

I, LOPE A. CATUBIG, of legal age, Filipino, married and and a resident of Dagupan, Pangasinan, after having been sworn in accordance with law hereby depose and say as follows:

That I am executing this affidavit supplementary to my affidavit of 26 March 1946.

That I was then a contractor to furnish foodstuffs to the USAFFE during the period from 25 November 1941 up to 19 December 1941. During this period, being a contractor, I delivered daily to different units of the 11th Infantry various foodstuffs for subsistence of the Army. Within this period, the foodstuffs delivered to the Army were under credit basis. I was issued daily receipts for the delivery of the said foodstuffs corresponding to the quantity and amount given or delivered. In case I get paid for the foodstuffs I delivered, the receipts issued to me would be surrendered to the paying agent of the Army. Receipts that are still in my possession indicating foodstuffs delivered to the Army were not yet paid. So far I have in my possession which I now submitted to the Claims Service, AFWESPAC, receipts that were not paid in December 1941. These receipts represented a total amount of ₱11,198.31.

That on 20 December 1941, I was paid the amount of ₱571.00 in check, (P.N.B. Check No. 45426). This payment I received was partial payment of the foodstuffs I delivered during the period of my contract with the Army. The receipts of the foodstuffs I delivered corresponding to this amount was surrendered to the receiving agents of the Army. This amount of ₱571.00 in check is not included in the amount of ₱11,198.31 which I am now claiming. I was also able to draw this said check, while the foodstuffs valued at ₱11,198.31 was not paid as it is shown in the receipts I have still in my possession.

AFFIDAVIT

DONINADOR A. CATUBIG, who first being duly sworn to an oath, do hereby depose and say:

I am a resident of Davao, Pangasinan since I was born. I am engaged in various business since 1941. I am a brother of Lope A. Catubig also a resident of Davao, Pangasinan who in 1941 was engaged in the contract of supplying foodstuff to the Army at Bonuan Camp, Davao.

I make this statement in the fact that I knew and I witnessed the contract of my brother Lope A. Catubig in supplying the Army with various foodstuff. At some spare times I did the deliveries of said foodstuff to Bonuan in order that I could help my brother in his job as a contractor of said foodstuff. My brother had a car for the delivery of the foodstuff and had also a driver and a delivery man to perform the duties of a driver and deliverer respectively. When the U.S. Army were quartered at Bonuan in 1941, the Army asked for a contractor to supply foodstuff for them. My brother did applied for the job and was accepted. Being a brother of the contractor, I knew how he supplied the Army with vegetables, sugar, salted fish and lard. I knew also that whenever there was a delivery made, a receipt was always issued to the delivery man and the delivery man also handed it over to my brother Lope A. Catubig for safe keeping. The deliveries of the said foodstuff to the Army were not the same in quantity and value. In one delivery of vegetables the car load, was valued at from P50.00 to P100.00 depending upon the kind of vegetables we delivered. There were 15 different ARMY companies whom we were supplying with foodstuff, and every morning since October, 1941 up to 15 December, 1941 we delivered to them different foodstuff without fail. We started at 5:00 o'clock in the morning to deliver the foodstuff from the first company and we used to finish at 4:00 o'clock in the afternoon until we supplied the last company among the fifteen companies. In one day of delivery we could be issued at least fifteen receipts. There were times when these fifteen companies asked for special orders and from that extra receipts would be issued also. In a week I used to accompany the delivery car but two or three times that is why I knew very well how the contract was made in supplying the Army with foodstuff. After every day delivery, I and the delivery man would report to the Regimental Mess Office and asked for the next day orders, and these orders we prepared it in the next morning. This, the delivery man and I did whenever I accompanied him.

I did not know how the collection of payments of these foodstuff be made but I understand it was my brother who made the arrangements to this. However, my job for my brother was like that of a supervisor. I used also to stay at the warehouse and inspect the stocks inside and see to it that no supply would be lacking in case needed by the Army. When I accompanied the delivery car it was because the delivery was in his quantity and I was afraid the driver the delivery man may not be able to dispatch the load of foodstuff.

PABLO ZUARES, who being first duly sworn according to law, do hereby depose and says:

I am a citizen and resident of Dagupan, Pangasinan, where I have resided for the past 26 years.

I know personally Lope A. Catubig in the fact that he is my barrio mate and because I have worked for him in 1941 in connection with his business. The business of Mr. L. Catubig at that time was a contractor of foodstuff for the U.S. Army. I started working for Lope Catubig in October, 1941 and I ended my job for him on 19 December, 1941 due to much confusion caused by the war.

Since October 1941, when the contract of Lope A. Catubig to supply the Army with foodstuff started I was the one who performed most of the deliveries of said foodstuff to the Army camps at Bonuan, Dagupan. The foodstuff consisted of different kinds of vegetables, sugar, fish and lard. We made at least one delivery every day up to 19 December, 1941. After every delivery is made a corresponding receipt was always issued by different officers and enlisted men. I can not and I did not know any of the officers and enlisted who issued me the receipts. Whenever I was issued a receipt, I always handed it over to my boss Mr. Catubig. It was Mr. Lope A. Catubig whom I think kept those receipts. I can not recall the exact deliveries we made from October, 1941 to 19 December, 1941 and I can not also remember how many receipts issued to me by the various officers and enlisted men.

At some deliveries I was accompanied by one brother of Mr. Lope A. Catubig, Dominador Catubig. This was done when the quantity of delivery was big so that I had a companion to check up how pieces of foodstuff we delivered and that we can save more time in our job. As a mere helper and only delivery man of Lope Catubig, I did not know how much the value of the foodstuff I used to deliver to the Army at Bonuan. At other times I delivered only vegetables of several kinds, but I had not even the idea of the prices of such vegetables, such as, mongo, eggplant, pechay, squash, cabbage and Baguio beans. As far as I can recall was that I and the driver of the delivery car used to start early every morning from the warehouse of Lope Catubig at downtown Dagupan where we load the foodstuffs and immediately after loading the car with foodstuffs we drove to Bonuan where we delivered same foodstuffs for the Army. That was my daily routine in October, 1941 to 19 December, 1941.



3. The undersigned was the Regimental Mess Officer in addition to his other official duties as Infantry Officer of the said unit.
4. All foodstuffs delivered to the regiment by contractors on fixed prices as a result of public bids had been made through the different Company Mess Officers.
5. Payments were either paid in cash upon delivery or weekly, depending upon personal agreements made between contractors and Company Mess Officers.
6. The undersigned had no connection or knowledge of pending payments to contractors incurred by the different Company Mess Officers of the 11th Infantry Regiment.
7. If the Catubig brothers had some deliveries unpaid they should have in their possession receipts duly signed by the respective Company Mess Officers who received the foodstuffs for their units.
8. Records of the P.N.B. Branch at Dagupan, Pangasinan shows that P.N.B Check No. 45426 dated 20 Dec 41 in the amount of P 571.00 was issued to Mr. D. Catubig in payment of foodstuffs which was cashed by him on the same day.
9. If receipts in acknowledgement of foodstuffs delivered to the 11th Inf. Regt. could be produced by him it should be considered as prima facie evidence of an existing obligation which the undersigned would recommend for settlement.

Colonel Glen R. Townsend, having been duly sworn, deposes and states:

That from September 1, 1941, he was assigned and on duty as Commanding Officer of the 11th Infantry, Philippine Army;

That from on or about October 15, 1941, this regiment with a strength of approximately 1800 officers and men was stationed at Bonuan Gueset, near Dagupan, Pangasinan, Philippine Islands;

That some time in November 1941 he entered into an arrangement with Mr. Meliton Lejano of Dagupan, to establish a store in the regimental camp to serve the troops in place of a Post Exchange;

That he agreed with Mr. Lejano to provide store space and to collect at the pay table for goods sold to the personnel of the camp, on credit;

That Mr. Lejano on his part agreed to maintain a stock of toilet articles, cigarettes, soft drinks and other items required for the health or comfort of the personnel of the camp and to sell such items at fair prices approved by the Camp Commander, and to contribute ten per cent (10%) of his gross receipts to the regimental and company funds of the 11th Infantry;

That in accordance with this agreement Mr. Lejano did, late in November, open one main store and two or three branch stores, equipping these stores with counters, cabinets, record books, charge slips, and other furniture and equipment necessary to the conduct of the business, together with a stock of merchandise in accordance with his agreement;

That due to the outbreak of the war on December 7, 1941, and to the subsequent abandonment of the camp at Bonuan Gueset on or about December 24, 1941, in accordance with orders of the Commanding General, Northern Luzon Force, it was impossible for Colonel Townsend to carry out the agreement made to collect for goods sold on credit;

Further that upon withdrawal from the camp some of the remaining goods on hand were taken over by the Regimental Supply Officer for use of the troops, and certain other goods were abandoned due to lack of transportation;

6 Colonel Townsend further states that he now has no record of the amount of goods supplied by Mr. Lejano, nor of the expense incurred by him, but that to the best of his present knowledge and belief ten thousand pesos (10,000) or five thousand dollars (\$5,000) represents a fair and reasonable estimate of the probable losses sustained by Mr. Lejano in the transaction.

That on 7 December 1941 he was stationed at Bonuan Gueset, near Dagupan, Pangasinan, Philine Islands, as Commanding Officer of the 11th Infantry, Philippine Army;

That immediately after the outbreak of the war with Japan he authorized Second Lieutenant Timothy J. Wholey, then attached to the regiment as Motor Transportation Officer, to commandeer from civilian sources such motor vehicles, including trucks and passenger cars, as were required and essential for the military operations of the regiment;

That to the knowledge Lieutenant Wholey, assisted by certain other officers whose names are not now recalled, did commandeer and take over from civilian sources in Dagupan, Pang., or vicinity, a total of approximately forty vehicles of various types, chiefly trucks; and that these vehicles were used in the military service.

Colonel Townsend further deposes and states that, in accordance with orders of the Commanding General, Northern Luzon Force, having taken command of all American-Filipino forces in the Cagayan Valley on or about December 16, 1941, he authorized Mr. Bartolome Puzon, District Engineer of Isabella Province, to commandeer for military use certain motor vehicles then in the possession of civilians;

That in accordance with this authorization approximately thirty motor vehicles of various types were taken over and used in the military service.

Dear Lieutenant McGree:

Your letter of 11 March reached St. Louis during my absence in Mexico which accounts for the delayed reply.

The statement of Captain Simon L. Guillermo as outlined by you is correct in some particulars but erroneous in many details. The pertinent facts, briefly stated, as I recall them, are:

On 15 December 1941 I received orders from headquarters Northern Luzon Force (General Wainwright) to turn over command of my regiment, the 11th Infantry, Philippine Army (then at Bonuan Cuset near Dagupan, Pangasinan) to my second in command and to proceed at once to the Cagayan Valley and upon arrival to assume command of all military operations in the Valley.

Pursuant to these orders I arrived at Palatao, Isabella Province, about noon on 16 December and assumed command of the some 2,000 troops of various units located at various points in the Valley. The enemy at that time occupied the northern portion of the Valley as far south as and including Tuguegarrao. My executive and second in command was Captain (later Major) Eulogio Balao of the Philippine Army. Major Balao is still on active duty and would I believe, be able to furnish reliable information concerning the claim of Mrs. Sadang.

Finding the troops in the Valley in need of much equipment, including motor transport, I arranged through provincial and municipal civil authorities to take over all available motor vehicles suitable for military use. Prior to evacuation of the valley we had collected, as I now recall, some 70 or 75 vehicles, including several passenger cars and ten or twelve passenger busses which we subsequently used as personnel carriers.

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On 23 December I was directed by General Wainwright to withdraw all military forces from the Valley immediately. The enemy then occupied Tayug and threatened to cut the Balete Pass-Cabanatuan road at San Jose. I had all the vehicles available at Palatao immediately loaded with gas, oil, tires, rice, canned goods and other supplies which were available in the warehouses maintained by the Philippine government at the Malig Agricultural Experimental Farms near Ilagan. These trucks were dispatched to Balete Pass with instructions to unload and return to transport personnel.

All military forces in the Valley, with the exception of a bridge demolition detail and rear guard under command of Captain Balao, were assembled at Balete Pass early on 25 December. On the night of 25-26 December the convoy moved south through Balete Pass, San Jose and Cabanatuan to Mexico, Pampanga, where, in accordance with orders the units were assembled early on 26 December. Under my direction the evacuated units were then reorganized and integrated with the remaining units of the 12th Infantry (PA) and occupied a defensive position at Arayat. Captain Balao with the rear elements reached Mexico on 27th or 28th December. On 31 December I turned command of the reorganized regiment over to Lieutenant Colonel Martin Moses (later executed by the Japanese at Fort Santiago) and that same evening rejoined and assumed command of the 11th Infantry which was then at Magalang, Pampanga.

In view of the forgoing facts I can state definitely that if any goods or supplies were obtained for military purposes in Bayombong, Nueva Vizcaya, on or about 24 December 1941, it was without my knowledge; although not necessarily without my authority as I had delegated to certain of my responsible subordinate officers authority to seize any property needed for military purposes, giving hand receipts therefore. Officers to whom such authority was delegated included Captain Balao and Captain Manuel Torrejos, regimental supply officer, later killed in action at Lubao. I do not recall that such authority was given to Captain Guillermo.

It is quite impossible that any such amount of supplies as 70 or 75 truck loads was obtained at Bayombong. I would certainly have been informed of any such large seizure. Moreover, on 24 December, there were not more than seventy-five vehicles of all kinds under my command including those with the demolition detachment and rear guard under Captain Balao. And we had previously seized all available vehicles in the Cagayan Valley both because they were essential for the conduct of military operations and to keep them from falling into the hands of the enemy. These vehicles were all loaded prior to arrival at Bayombong, either with the supplies taken from the Malig warehouses or with personnel. I also recall that it was necessary to unload some of the trucks and to "cache" the supplies at Balete Pass in order to provide

sufficient personnel carrying capacity.

Based upon the forgoing facts, the dates specified and in so far as the forces under my command are concerned I am wholly unable to support the claim of Mrs. Sadang as set forth in the statement of Captain Guillermo and in the absence of more definite and substansial evidence I recommend that it be disallowed.

If I can furnish any additional information of value I will be glad to do so.

P.S. - I should perhaps state that I recall Captain Guillermo only slightly and that he never came to my particular attention in either a favorable or in an unfavorable light. Of Mrs. Sadang I have never previously heard. I did, however, have an officer of that name, Captain Estaban Sadang, in the 11th Infantry. Wheter or not the Mrs. Sadang who makes the claim is any relative I do not know. -GRT.

TESTIMONY GIVEN BY MAJOR VICENTE P. MADELLA (Retd) (ex) QM OFFICER, 11th DIV., P.A., USAFFE, BEFORE CAPT NICHOLAS MCGREE AND MR. V L SHUMAKER ON 18 DEC 1948 AT 437 ALABASTRO, SAN ANDRES, MANILA.

Maj Madella was inducted 1 Oct 1941 at Baguio, at which place he attended QM school. Arrived in Pangasinan and assumed duty as QM Officer of then forming 11th Division, P.A., USAFFE, under Gen. Brougher, c/a 15 Oct '41.

Drew subsistence, except rice and vegetables, from Col. Laurence from 15 Oct 41 to 22 Dec 41. Such supplies were drawn from the Advance Depot, which opened at Dagupan and move successively to Umingan, Tarlac, and finally San Fernando, Pampanga, as bombing and Japanese advance forced USAFFE Units back toward Bataan. Had several assistants, namely, Maj Perez (deceased); Dr Dijanico (MC); Lt Capili, QMC; Capt Ramos, CE; Lt Blando (deceased; and one or two others, names no longer remembered. Maj Perez was the Ex. Officer, and sometimes assisted in purchase of supplies. The other assistants distributed supplies drawn to subordinate units of the 11th Division. Supplies (Class I) were issued on a 3 day basis, except to 11th Infantry Regiment at San Fernando, La Union, and 12th Infantry Regiment detachments in N. Vizcaya, Isabela and Cagayan. Supplies were issued to those units (except rice and vegetables) on a longer period basis.

Supply to 11th Infantry Regiment ceased about 20 Dec 1941. Supply to 12th Infantry Regiment ceased about 15 Dec 1941.

Rice and vegetables were procured by Maj Madella, and sometimes by Maj Perez through open market purchases. No other Officers assigned to Div QM were authorized to purchase supplies. Remembers only one large supplier, a Mr. Cojuangco, from whom he purchased approximately 1,000 cavans palay (P6.00 per cavan), and who was unable to receive payment due to lack of time to prepare vouchers for Finance. Mr. Cojuangco offered his entire warehouse, but Madella had no trucks to haul the rice.

The only commandeering he knew that was authorized was the commandeering of vehicles, orders concerning which he received from a Col Moran. He knew of no orders or authority for commandeering any other items until after 22 Dec 1941, when he started the move of Div. Trains to Bataan. Was unable to commandeer anything, as he had no transportation to haul additional items. Alleges to have dumped and destroyed several truck loads of supplies previously drawn or purchased, in order to carry troops. Was not aware of the order of Gen Drake dated 24 Dec 1941 authorizing units to commandeer subsistence and bring it to Bataan until later.


Stated he supplied all subordinate units (except 11th and 12th Regts) with all subsistence, including rice and vegetables, in the standard ration allowance, from 15 Oct '41 to 22 Dec '41.

Payments were made for purchases by vouchers drawn on Finance. Stated he signed all vouchers for purchases by Div QM. Stated he later heard CO's of subordinate units signed some vouchers for purchases of unknown character by the subordinate units.


