1. There are approximately 500 cases of drivers in which the evidence submitted is not sufficient to reasonably determine their War Department employees; and even if they were determined War Department employees they would not come under the provisions of the Missing Persons Act because they are considered local labor casually hired (These drivers come under the 30 day clause).

2. Therefore, it is recommended that these individuals be given a negative determination and that the attached letters be sent to the individual concerned and the Adjutant General, Washington, D. C. respectively.

Discussion: The following contonement construction on Panay were
started about 5 September 1941 and work was suspended
approximately 15 December 1941 by order of the C.G.,
61st Div P.A.

Construction of Landing Fields on Panay began in January 1942 and
were located in the following provinces:

In Iloilo provinces:

Mandurriao
Santa Barbara
Sara

In Capiz provinces:

Dumarao
Pilar

In Antique provinces:

San Jose

Work started on above fields in January 1942.
Construction of these fields were never completed.
Civilian employees were not working at all fields at time of
Japanese invasion.

American Civilian Mining Engineers were construction engineers.
All technical work in the field was under the supervision of American
civilians.

American civilians only were on per annum or monthly basis and were
paid thru the Finance officers of the 61st Division.

Employees were casually hired on a daily basis. Payments to civilians employees (less American Civilians supervisors paid by 61st Division Finance Officer) were paid by Provincial or City Treasurers with monies furnished by USAFFE disbursing officers.

Employees were hired and fired on the basis of existing requirements for laborers.

Employees may have worked on more than one field.

BASIC: C/S fm Civ Sect. to Dir. Rec Pers Div.
dtd 16 Nov 45, subject: "Policy".

No determination can be made as to the number of times an individual employee may be hired and released from employment. For example: One day 5,000 workers would be needed, the next day 3,000 required. All surplus workers would be discharged. However, the following week it is possible the discharged workers would be hired.

Estimated 30,000 employees in Panay are involved by this policy.

Recommendation:

1. That all contonement construction employees at Anilao, Dingle and Pototan be determined negative, casually employed or intermittant work suspended.

2. That employees of all Landing Strips on Panay be determined negative - casual employment.

Except: Where sufficient evidence is furnished to prove claimant is a permanent War Department employee on a per annum basis.

3. That any Landing Strip on Panay inadvertently omitted in basic communication may be adjudicated under this policy.

Conclusion:

It is believed employees on Panay may come under Negative P. A. employees. However, due to the questionable decision and legal aspects involved in this determination, it is believed that a blanket decision of casual employment would suffice to eliminate these claims.

Redetermination of Pending Cases.

1. Reference is made to O/S 4 dated 2 February 1946 in which it is stated that "it was decided that it would be to best interests of the government in every way to make no effort to collect arrears in pay paid to claimant under the theater policy in effect prior to 12 November 1945. It is believed the claimants are legitimately entitled to keep what they have already been paid since the policy under which they were paid was approved and in effect at the time of payment."

2. When "serious deprivation policy" became effective, the Civilian Section had on hand approximately 800 cases in which settlement of backpay had only partially been made, that is, payment or transfer of leave credits had not been made. These cases were redetermined under the new policy for the specific purpose of invalidating any leave benefits which they had not yet received (Exh. A).

3. AFMSPAG Civilian Personnel Circular No. 16 (Exh. B) has been sent to War Department agencies. To date, approximately 50 Form SI have been returned to this headquarters. Several questions have arisen in regard to this disposition of leave credits. They are:

a. Should cases that have been only partially settled be redetermined for purposes of invalidating any remaining benefits that they would be entitled to from the original determination under the old policy?

Recommendation: That above be answered yes as at present time all 800 cases have been redetermined. For example, of 22 of the 50 cases for which Form SI's have been returned to this headquarters 19 have been found to have no pay due under the new policy. The average claim for leave amounted to approximately \$125.00.

b. Should a request for set-off against employee's retirement account be made in cases where leave was paid under old policy and a redetermination under new policy indicates an over-payment?

c. What is the employment status of persons after casualty status is terminated by reason of "serious deprivation policy" and prior to return to War Department employment?

d. Should all cases previously determined and paid be redetermined in order to place all men on equal basis for retirement purposes?

4. Prior to C/N 4 dated 2 February 1946, a check note dated 13 January 1946 from the Director, Recovered Personnel Division to the Civilian Section, subject: "Overpayment of War Department Civilian Employees," was received in which it was stated that "Action will be taken to establish an audit and collection unit in the Civilian Section . . . for the purpose of recovering any advance partial payments . . . found to be erroneous, including cases involving negative determinations."

5. The question has now arisen as to the interpretation of policy toward collecting partial payment in which part or all of the partial payment is due the government.

Below are listed three cases, two of which have definite answers according to policies received. A ruling is desired on action to be taken in Example "C".

EXAMPLE A.

a. Juan de la Cruz received a partial payment of \$100 in June 1945. His case was adjudicated and determined to be positive, and he was entered on payroll and paid in September 1945 under the old policy to the amount \$900, giving him a total under the Missing Persons Act of \$1000. If his case was redetermined under the present policy it would be found that the benefits he would receive would be only \$50.

Under C/N 4 dated 2 February 1946 from Director, Recovered Personnel Division, the money actually owed to the government, \$350, will not be collected because of the time and expense involved.

EXAMPLE B.

b. Juan de la Cruz was given a partial payment of \$100 in June 1945. His case was adjudicated and found to be negative. He was informed of the same.

Under Check Note dated 12 Jan 1946 from Director, RPD, subject: "Overpayment of War Department Civilian Employees," this partial payment can be collected.

EXAMPLE C.

c. Juan de la Cruz received a partial payment of \$100 in June 1945. His case was adjudicated and found to be positive, and he was entered on payroll and paid in January 1946 under the present policy to the amount of \$50.

The question involved is whether the \$50 owed by the claimant to the government should be collected. Under Check Sheet dated 12 January 1946 it states that partial payments found to be erroneous can be recovered.

However, under C/N 4 dated 2 February 1946 it states that "claimants are legitimately entitled to keep what they have already been paid since the policy under which they were paid was approved and in effect at the time of payment."

C. A ruling as to whether the benefits to be received by the claimants in another section can be attached is also desired. That is, Juan de la Cruz owes the government \$100 due to receiving a partial payment and then after adjudication his case was found to be negative. This man now has a claim in the Philippine Army Section and it is desired that a ruling be made as to whether his benefits coming from the Philippine Army Section can be attached to off-set wholly or in part for the amount owed the government due to the partial payment.

b. Reference Paragraph 1.1 This is covered by (a) above.

d. Reference Paragraph 1.3: This matter is "O".

Reference Paragraph 1.2: None. These cases should be continued according to policies already established. U. S. claims filed in this country states under the Alien Tort Claims Act.

However, authority has been requested of 5-4, APPROVED to change this policy so that unless the overpayment will not be necessary, all cases of this character should be held in suspense until this policy is clarified.

1. Pursuant to our conference this date the following answers are given to the questions posed in Check Note #1.

a. Reference Paragraph 2: All cases should be determined completely under one policy or the other. To determine a man's pay under the old policy and his longevity and retirement benefits under a new policy would be wholly incongruous and would result only in confusion in the minds of both the Adjudicators and the claimants. Therefore, it is directed that all cases which have been paid under the old policy will be completely adjudicated for other benefits under the old policy. Those which have not been paid under the old policy will be completely adjudicated under the new policy.

b. Reference Paragraph 3.a: This is answered by (a) above.

c. Reference Paragraph 3.b: The answer is "No".

d. Reference Paragraph 3.c: None. These cases should be adjudicated according to policies already established which determine whether the claimant is in a casualty status under the Missing Persons Act or not.

e. Reference Paragraph 3.d: No. This would be in violation of the theory stated in (a) above.

f. Reference Example c.: Under present policies the over-payment is due the government and should be collected. However, authority has been requested of G-1, AFVESPAG to change this policy so that collection of the over-payment will not be necessary. All cases of this character should be held in suspense until this policy is clarified.

g. Reference Paragraph 6: Erroneous payments made to a civilian claimant can be collected from pay due him from other sources. This should be coordinated with the Finance Section.

Under C/N 4 dated 2 February 1946 from Director, Recovered Personnel Division, the money actually owed to the government, \$950, will not be collected because of the time and expense involved. Under the present policy it is suggested a partial payment be made after adjudication. His case was EXAMPLE B. negative. This man was a claimant in the Philippines War Section and it is desired that a ruling be made as to whether he is. Juan de la Cruz was given a partial payment of \$100 in June 1945. His case was adjudicated and found to be negative. He was informed of the same.

Under Check Note dated 12 Jan 1946 from Director, RPD, subject: "Overpayment of War Department Civilian Employees," this partial payment can be collected.

C. Juan de la Cruz received a partial payment of \$100 in June 1945. His case was adjudicated and found to be positive, and he was entered on payroll and paid in January 1946 under the present policy to the amount of \$50.

The question involved is whether the \$50 owed by the claimant to the government should be collected. Under Check Sheet dated 12 January 1946 it states that partial payments found to be erroneous can be recovered.

However, under C/N 4 dated 2 February 1946 it states that "claimants are legitimately entitled to keep what they have already been paid since the policy under which they were paid was approved and in effect at the time of payment."

6. A ruling as to whether the benefits to be received by the claimants in another section can be attached is also desired. This man now has a claim in the Philippine Army Section and it is desired that a ruling be made as to whether his benefits coming from the Philippine Army Section can be attached to off-set wholly or in part for the amount owed the government due to the partial payment.

1. Pursuant to our conference this date the following answers are given to the questions posed in Check Note #1.

a. Reference Paragraph 2: All cases should be determined completely under one policy or the other. To determine a man's pay under the old policy and his longevity and retirement benefits under a new policy would be wholly incongruous and would result only in confusion in the minds of both the Adjudicators and the claimants. Therefore, it is directed that all cases which have been paid under the old policy will be completely adjudicated for other benefits under the old policy. Those which have not been paid under the old policy will be completely adjudicated under the new policy.

b. Reference Paragraph 3.a: This is answered by (a) above.

c. Reference Paragraph 3.b: The answer is "No".

d. Reference Paragraph 3.c: None. These cases should be adjudicated according to policies already established which determine whether the claimant is in a casualty status under the Missing Persons Act or not.

e. Reference Paragraph 3.d: No. This would be in violation of the theory stated in (a) above.

f. Reference Example c.: Under present policies the over-payment is due the government and should be collected. However, authority has been requested of G-1, AFWERPAG to change this policy so that collection of the over-payment will not be necessary. All cases of this character should be held in suspense until this policy is clarified.

g. Reference Paragraph 6: Erroneous payments made to a civilian claimant can be collected from pay due him from other sources. This should be coordinated with the Finance Section.

POLICY RE PANAY BUREAU OF POST EMPLOYEES
AS APPROVED BY COLONEL MARCUS, DIRECTOR, RPD

21 December 1945

1. Civilian employees of the Bureau of Posts, Isle of Panay, remained employees of the Commonwealth Government regardless of their induction into USAFFE and did not obtain any status as War Department employees. They have no status under the Missing Persons Act.

2. These individuals on the Isle of Panay who served as "Volunteer Air Observers" have no status as War Department employees, and do not come under the Missing Persons Act.

PANAY AIRFIELDS POLICY

As approved by Col Marcus, Director, RPD 15 Dec 1945

1. The civilian engineers hired for the supervision of the airfield construction on the island of Panay will be considered War Department civilian employees and be entitled to the benefits of the Missing Persons Act provided their individual claims prove they meet all the requirements of the Act.

2. It is determined that for the purpose of the administration of the Missing Persons Act, employees of the Bureau of Public Works, were, in fact, employees of the Commonwealth Government and never were employees of the War Department insofar as the administration of the Act is concerned.

3. The "Cabo" leaders and their "gangs" will be considered either as independent contraction groups or local labor casually hired and not entitled to the benefits of the Missing Persons Act.

RECOMMENDATION:

1. That a claimant who states he was a driver during the Bataan campaign, regardless of whether he was assigned to a pool, or to a field unit (USA, PS, PC, or PA), and performed his duties until such were precluded by enemy action, be considered a War Department employee and as such entitled to the benefits of the Missing Persons Act, provided - -

a. He is carried on an official War Department payroll covering drivers in the field on Bataan. (This payroll data does not necessarily have to be for 30 day period, but merely establish that the claimant was on Bataan as a driver); or

b. He furnishes proof of his service in the form of credible affidavits from two persons in supervisory capacities; or

c. He furnishes a certificate or affidavit from his former employer, who has been recognized as such, stating he was taken to Bataan with the troops, and also furnishes his release papers from PW camp; or

d. He is carried on Major Darrick's inventory of the 91st Philippine Army Division drivers.

2. Claimants unable to furnish any of the above proof will be handled as special cases.

3. That drivers under the above policy be paid at the salary of \$25.00 a month unless official pay data shows a different wage.

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Adjudication Procedure of Cases Claiming
Internment or Sickness

1. In all cases involving internment or sickness or a combination of both, it will be necessary for claimant to prove same. The procedure which will be followed in this type of case is as follows:

a. As to internment:

- (1) A check will be made of the Tribune List of released Prisoners of War.
- (2) A check will be made of the Philippine Army extraction cards now on file with Philippine Army on 4th Floor, Trade and Commerce Building. After these two sources of information have been checked, information or lack of same will be noted in a prominent part of claimant's 201 file. If no evidence of internment is found from a check of above sources; the case will be suspended for the sending of a special suspense letter calling the attention of the claimant to the need for evidence of internment, and what is acceptable evidence.

b. As to sickness:

- (1) Proof of same will be required and acceptable evidence of same will be as stated in present policy, to wit:
 - (a) Doctor's certificate, hospital records, or affidavits from two responsible persons (Parish priest, mayor of town, barrio leader, etc).
 - (b) A special letter has been drafted and same will be used to inform claimants of fact that proof of sickness will be necessary before proper determination can be made and what evidence will be acceptable.

1. Following will be used as a policy to determine cases where sickness is claimed as result of action in field or from recognized established internments or concentrations:

a. Sickness:

- (1) The place sickness was contracted is an important factor in determining a claim of sickness. Civilian employees of the War Department who worked on Bataan and Corregidor or who were interned at Camp O'Donnell, will have a service connected claim. Persons who claim sickness, but were employed at a different location, such as Port Area, Manila, or Fort Stotsenburg, cannot be assumed to have a service connected sickness. In such cases supporting evidence of claim will be required.
- (2) In cases where subject claims sickness for any period during the occupation he will be required to present acceptable evidence to support claim of sickness as follows:
 - (a) Doctor's certificate or affidavits from two responsible persons (Parish priest, mayor of town, barrio leader, etc).

b. Evader in hills:

- (1) If subject claims guerrilla activities, name of organization is needed and must be obtained before determination is made.

Status of DIANA R. HILL and Similar
WD Employee Cases.

1. Attached claim of DIANA ROSE HILL is one of several similar cases of former civilian employees of the War Department. Miss HILL was employed at Nielson Field as a stenographer from 21 September 1941 until 24 December 1941 when enemy action made further service impossible. Subject employee then remained at home until ordered interned in Sto. Tomas Internment Camp on 6 January 1942.

2. After being interned for 10 months, Miss HILL together with her mother was released temporarily to the Hospicio de San Jose for a period of seven months, to take care of her mother who was in poor health.

3. Miss Hill was reinterned on 19 May 1943 and remained at Sto. Tomas until return to War Department control.

4. Suggest that subject claimant and claimants in similar cases be considered, to have been in a beleaguered status from 8 December 1941 to 24 December 1941 and in a missing status from 25 December 1941 until 3 February 1945, date of return to War Department control.

Interpretation of Missing Persons Act

1. The following is quoted for the information and guidance of all concerned:

"Check Sheet - FROM: DC & C/S TO: Rec Pers Div

1. As a result of the conference held in my office, attended by the AG, the A C/S, G-3, representatives of the PA Section, G-3, the Recovered Personnel Division, AG, and Plans Division, the following policy is furnished for your information and guidance:

2. Under the policy of this Headquarters, determination of casualty status and entitlement to pay under the Missing Persons Act will be as follows:

a. A person missing in action (whereabouts unknown) or captured and imprisoned or interned by the enemy until his recovery by United States forces, will be determined to be in a casualty status with entitlement to pay for such period.

b. A person who evaded capture, or fled to the hills, or actively joined guerrillas, or actively participated in the anti-Japanese movement, or remained in hiding to avoid capture, until his return to military control, will be determined to be in a casualty status with entitlement to pay for such period.

c. A person who evaded capture, but returned to his home and continued a normal mode of living, will be determined not to be in a casualty status and not entitled to pay from the date he returned home until he actively joined guerrillas or actively participated in the anti-Japanese movement, or returned to military control.

d. A person who was captured and imprisoned or interned by the enemy, but was thereafter released will be determined not in a casualty status and not entitled to pay from the date of his release until the date he actively joined a guerrilla force, or actively participated in the anti-Japanese movement, or returned to military control.

e. A person whose active service in or for the military forces of the United States was terminated as a result of the enemy occupation and who was permitted to return to his home and pursue a normal mode of living, will be determined not in a casualty status and not entitled to pay after the date of termination of such active service.

f. A person falling with c, d, or e, above, who can prove that material restraint was imposed on him or that he suffered "serious deprivation," to an extent greater than the restrictions, inconveniences, and lowered standards of living generally suffered by other residents incident to the Japanese occupation, as a direct result of his former official status under the U.S., will be determined in a casualty status with entitlement to pay for the period such condition existed. The burden of proof rests with the claimant.

Processing of PA and PS Personnel

1. Under authority contained in C/N 4, DC & C/S to AG-RP dated 22 Dec 45 and C/N 5, DC & C/S to AG-RP dated 22 Dec 45 subjects "Philippine Scouts Loyalty Boards" and "Philippine Army Loyalty Status Boards" respectively, all Philippine Scout and Philippine Army cases will be processed under the Missing Persons Act without regard to the action of the Loyalty Boards concerned.
2. The names of persons suspected of disloyalty will continue to be submitted to the respective Loyalty Boards for investigation and report of findings and recommendations. Such action will be for the purpose of determining whether or not disciplinary action should be taken, and will not effect the individual's standing under the Missing Persons Act.
