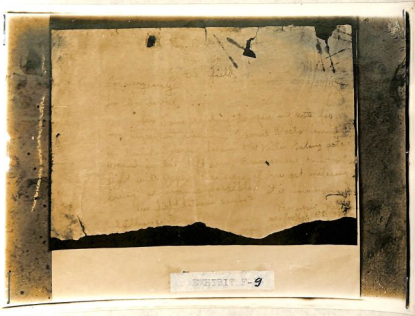

Unit commanders, from the highest to the lowest echelon, should have as many of the qualities mentioned in paragraph 1 above, and should be such that they can conduct the mission assigned to them, not by necessarily following the plan as decided upon, but by using their own initiative and judgment, and by being able to adjust their plans during its execution. It is not intended that any subsequent decisions not contrary to the original plan or plan as decided upon prior to its execution, shall constitute the mission they have set forth to accomplish.

3. District commanders, through their subordinate units and company commanders, will develop those qualities in all their unit commanders, especially in those of the lower echelons. These qualities can be developed by consistently demanding these leaders in particular exercises, making them assume their own responsibilities, closely supervising their subordinate activities, followed by personal criticism by the District commanders or their qualified representatives. These inspections will be made in such a way that the unit commanders are not aware of the inspection until the inspection is completed and an official criticism of the unit commander is issued. These inspections, made by the representatives, or a result of these inspections, will be the responsibility and jurisdiction of all their unit commanders.

4. My having unit commanders who possess the above qualities, the district commanders are advised to have, maintain and efficient units capable of accomplishing their mission whatever situation or conditions that may be imposed upon them.

SUBJECT: Enemy captured
BY : Gen. HQ.

February 12th, Sgt. Guilmo Gering, Pending, and Pape Gering patrolled the area they were assigned by their captain. When they reached the Ma-lele creek, they saw a Japanese soldier with no clothes. They told him to surrender but he would not. So Sgt. G. Gering shot him with a bow and arrow and struck him on the left eye and dropped dead. Evidence of same is shown by a finger brought by above man.

The next day several of our soldiers were sent to patrol the same area; a few meters from the spot of the dead soldier they saw some identification cards and other properties supposed to be belonging to said Jap soldier. Said identifications were turned over to Lt. Badess of the American forces assigned to this area.

SUBJECT: Enemy captured
BY : Gen. HQ.

1. The men fighting the Japs reported by Lt. Westlake's Battalion under my command are Pape Gering, Sgt. Guilmo Gering, and Pape Gering. Our area are the Jap rifle and 30 we recently captured in our operations previous to this. Last Edward Johnson Japs we later given by Lt. Felipe Pineda in the late afternoon. The Capt. Edward Johnson's mention here is the plaintiff of the 1st P.M.D. Our line of operation was in 12000 altitude in the field.

2. Our company of fire started at 2000 AM up to late in the afternoon at 4:00 PM when we said in 7 P.M. brought us some grenades. The Japs were able to reach some in the cave which has caused us difficulties in getting them from our rifle lines. Out of the five men grenades given us only two (2) exploded.

3. I am taking all necessary precautions with my men, but a suspect from Lt. Jose J. Paine and his men came at 4:00 PM operation at 12000 with one American soldier with them. We began firing and later decided to take the Japs by all means. Sgt. Westlake, Lt. J. Paine, and the American soldier and my men volunteered to take them in the cave. Upon approaching at the entrance of the cave a burst of fire from the Japs suddenly through instant death to Sgt. Westlake hitting him at the neck and Lt. J. Paine who followed him was hit on the right hand and between his chest & back. Upon seeing this I the American soldier with them. The Japs then turned their fire on us and when we were in the American soldier in reaching Lt. Jose Paine and taking him only. Immediately I made a report personally to get in emergency for Lt. J. Paine and to get some reinforcements from the 1st P.M.D.

4. At 12000 in a few seconds under the direct command of Col. Mario Westlake among the soldiers this time to get Jose Paine. The exact time is already forgotten but the Japs took advantage of the darkness. They were able to kill Paine a very narrow position or within arms for the rest of the Japs. This killing took place without from his rifle a member of the Japs was at the rear stood at him hitting him on the chest passing thru the column which caused his present condition. Immediately why something was then could never occur. At that time I was at 12000. Immediately we took up to the top to the field at 12000. Our men will move this Japs tomorrow morning. This Japs could not go further into the field.

5. In the cave the Japs left hand, shoes and very other items and articles they could not carry to their camp. To get them they shot Paine's arms, but got a pair of shoes for us only. It is best to then carried their weapons as a trace of blood leaving to the cave have been noticed. The 1st P.M.D. very close to the cave was seen at 12000. Lt. J. SUBJECT: Demolition and Sabotage Work

TO : Engineer Officer

1. Pursuant to TO No. 1 and GO. No. 1 (Demolition and Sabotage), Headquarters, Luzon Guerrilla Forces, USFIP, Demolition and Sabotage Units will be formed in the areas under your command. Only one unit (a company or a platoon) should be formed in each municipality, and the unit shall function under an officer designated by you and to operate only within the boundary or the municipality to which they belong. A squad may consist of one sergeant and nine men and a platoon may be under one officer and two or three squads. The men to be organized must be carefully selected, generally those who are intelligent, cool, those who are willing to assume responsibilities, and take risk, disciplined and loyal; age of 25 years or more, and who will not permit family ties and personal interest to interfere in demolition and sabotage work. Conference should be held with local commanders with respect to the selection and organization of those men in order to avoid duplication of work. Any unit already organized may be used for sabotage work provided understanding and proper coordination are made with local commanders of organized combat units. Men who were already inducted and who have taken the oath may be selected. A roster should be prepared and the date of the roster in which the men's name appear will be considered the date of his induction. Only one copy of the roster will be made and then forwarded to chief Engineer, Luzon Guerrilla Forces, USFIP.

2. The Demolition and Sabotage unit will be formed for the purpose of destroying enemy properties, interfering with troop movements, severing communication lines, placing obstructions on roadside and derailling trains.

3. Engineer officers in charge of a municipality will make a survey and prepare plans for demolition and sabotage of all enemy installation in his area, such as supply dumps, ammunition dumps, fuel and gasoline store building occupied or can be occupied by enemy troop, railroad line and bridges. No demolition work will be undertaken unless ordered by higher command. Bridges on national ROAD SHALL not be destroyed unless ordered to do so. Ordinary sabotage work may be carried out this time, such as losing of tools, misplacing vital parts of trucks, tractors, locomotive engines. Instructions should be given to all members of the unit to take advantage of all opportunities to carry out the above types of sabotage work. Instructions should also be given to all members on the use of expedients and the most expeditious or effective demolition and sabotage work. After positive knowledge that friendly (American) troops have landed or upon orders, the plan previously approved will be carried out. Upon arrival of the American troops in his area the Engineer Officer will report to the highest officer present and should be prepared to identify himself as an Engineer Commander. He will then submit the following report:

- a. Number of men available.
- b. Condition of road, bridges and landing fields.
- c. Condition of other routes.
- d. To furnish to American troops.

4. A biweekly report on the progress of your organization, survey and plans of the sabotage and demolition work within your area should be submitted to this headquarters. Reports should preferably be ~~XXXXXXXXXX~~ accompanied with maps, sketches or diagrams so as to acquaint this headquarters of the situation in your area.
5. Further instructions as regards demolition works will be issued from time to time.

1. Quoted hereunder is message from Gen. MacArthur received on four January at zero four two zero zero six:

Quote * It is desired that all available means be taken to destroy enemy wire communication, magnetic of mainline, power lines, ground routes, working circuits, traces, spurs, towers and other means of information gathering land, air and sea. Every effort must be made to destroy all such means available to restrict the movement of enemy forces on the island of Luzon against your vigilance for the enemy intelligence or sabotage and for the effect of your communication facilities. In addition all possible destruction of plants concerned in dispersion of enemy and oil, ammunition and other supply dumps is desired. In furtherance of the campaign of liberation and patriotic movements of the people and the United States Navy, the opportunity to capture and/or destroy vital communication lines is desired. (10 Captains and Marines).

Subject: GENERAL INSTRUCTIONS.
To: All USFIP Units.

1. All USFIP units in Batang, Pangasinan and South Tarlac, should, in the absence of specific orders to the contrary, immediately undertake the destruction of all telephone and power lines in their respective areas. In the destruction of all telephone and power lines the wire should be cut preferably in the open country away from inhabited places and long sections up to 100 meters or more if practical of the wire should be rolled up and taken away so as to avoid quick repair. Telephone poles also should be destroyed by felling.

2. Several lengths of rail, 20 to 30 lengths, preferably taken near bridges or culverts, shall be removed from every kilometer from the main line and all principal spurs particularly serving Cagayan, Stoceros or any other enemy installations. In order to accomplish the removal of the rails, attach wire to the unroved rail. This will serve to prevent automatic block signal equipment from indicating a break in the track. All rail so removed should be carried some distance away and dropped into the nearest river or otherwise securely hidden.

3. Entrance to all barrier roads leading from main highways are to be rendered impassable to Japanese tracks by flooding, by trenching, by blowing or by any other means available.

4. Sections of telephone wire or other wire including barbed wire are to straggle across main highways at night between trees on opposite side of the road and twisted least 4 to 6 level part 2 or 3 feet above the ground. If telephone wire should be used for this purpose, 4 or more strands should be twisted together. These wire obstacles should be strung away from inhabited places.

5. All gasoline, ammunition and other supply dumps in your area are to be destroyed. In most cases, this may be accomplished by using one or more "Molotov Cocktails." Wooden bridges on all main and secondary highways are to be destroyed by removal of the timbers, by cutting away wooden support, by burning or by any other means which may be accomplished quickly and effectively within the discretion of the local officer concerned.

6. Whenever possible enemy trucks and other transportation equipment shall be destroyed. "Molotov Cocktails" are efficient against trucks and personnel in trucks in small numbers.

7. All guerrilla officers should have their men secure at least one "Molotov Cocktail" per man. Hereunder are instructions for making a Molotov Cocktail:

Secure a large glass bottle one quart to 1 liter size. Mix 3 parts of gasoline with 2 parts of crude oil or lubricating oil. Fill the bottle. Insert a strip of rag or wick to the bottom of the bottle allowing about 4 inches of one end extending outside the bottle. Cork the bottle. When the Molotov Cocktail is to be used, ignite the free end of the rag or wick and hurl the bottle against the objective splashing the liquid over the objective. In case crude or lubricating oil is not available coconut or tangerine oil may be used in the proportion of 50% oil and 50% gasoline.

8. All above listed instructions may be accomplished by men without arms and all guerrilla personnel should make every effort to comply with the above instructions by applying them to any new Japanese installations which may be established in your area subsequently. The fact that there are no arms to equip all guerrillas at this time should be no bar to the above listed instructions and with proper precaution and the initiative on the part of local leaders this objective may be attained with heavy damage to the enemy fighting ability and morale with a minimum loss of life on the part of the guerrillas. In fact properly planned sabotage missions in carrying these instructions should be accomplished without the loss of any personnel.

9. As rapid as arms become available, recognized guerrillas will be equipped according to priority and to the demands of the situation. Specific instructions for special missions will be issued as necessary.

1. It is requested that you issue the necessary instructions to all units under your command to take no further action in the sabotage of bridges and highways in the province of Pampanga. It is further requested that where possible your units prevent the enemy from accomplishing the destruction of bridges and roads.

2. It is also requested that all units be advised to be on the alert for any land mines laid by the Japanese and that the location of same be immediately reported, to the undersigned together with sketches exact location. In addition these units should be instructed to post guards on all roads to provide these and other information in their particular area to any American patrols they encounter.



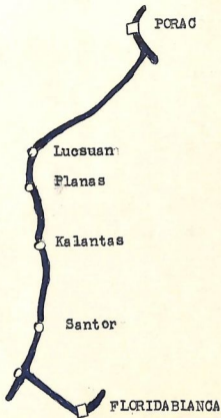
