Sir :

1. We are worried about Chanuyan because we got no means of knowing his condition and moreover, we could not wait the return of Peciong. However, I hope Sir that you have recovered already from your illness.

2. Sir, HQS-1122 is always inquiring about the return of Chanuyan because Tayaban want to have personal interview with him. He even sent 2 of his men to Pang. to see Chanuyan last Sept. 25th but they return for obvious reasons. This connection, I am sending 3 of our men to follow Chanuyan to see what his present condition and the same time to bring some correspondence for our units in the South.

3. Sir, HQS-1122 desired that our Intelligence Information report covering the sector of the 14th Inf. be completed and accurate and be submitted without possible delay. Copy of Instructions dated Aug. 26, 1943 and copy of the G-2 report are in file.

4. Sir, if Chanuyan could not come yet due to obvious reasons, I suggest that the same runner will be sent back immediately with the missive of Chanuyan to Tayaban.

5. Duhat now known as Baliang is still in B. area. He did not return yet since he went down last Sept. 23rd. However, he is busy checking the Intell. Infor. in regards to B. area as Yacal and Valdez are not attending to their duty. They don't care to submit their reports since the captured of Dau. They even failed to notify this HQS of their whereabouts not until Tayaban notify this HQS about Valdez. At last, Baliang have contacted them. I am inclosing correspondence from Valdez to Tayaban for your information.

6. Sir, according to Baliang the money given to Dau before including your personal was not recovered. They said it was captured. Your things that Peciong returned here was sent back to Baliang for delivery to

Celastino with the instruction that Celastino will deliver same to \_\_\_\_\_.

7. Sir, the following is furnish for your information: The people of Latbang and Penayag surrendered to the Jap not long ago.

On the 21st of Oct. 50 Japs with some PC from Bayombong patrolled Mang-giyang, Nansican, Macdo and return to Bayombong on the 23rd. They have maltreated lots of civilians in Nansican and Macdo. They even abused 2 women in Macdo and after their animal desire they thrust the vagina with the point of the bayonet.

On the same date, 8 Japs with captured soldiers (their names unknown) from Pangpang patrolled Benallan, Benegbeng, Banao, Penayag and Latbang. They return on the 25th following the same route. They have maltreated lots of civilians in Penayag and Latbang. They even came to the extent of maltreating that one Boghong of Latbang was killed.

It was reported by a native of Pangpang to one of our men that the Japs in Pangpang are permanent detachment. They have deposited 20 cavans of rice right in the Mun. Bldg. and they are still gathering some more rice to stored thereat. They have constructed trenches around the Mun. Bldg. They are armed with MGs. (No. unkn.) automatic rifles (No. unkn.) and rifles. A Captain is incharge thereat. They are forcing the inhabitants of that place to attend classes. They have put also an outpost in Talmoy consisting of 7 Japs. Kayapa is patrolled once a week.

People of Latbang evacuated although they have surrendered to the Jap because they are aware that they will be maltreated again when the Japs come for the second time.

It was widely rumored and according to a native talked by one of our men said that the Mayor of Pinkian threaten the people of Benegbeng thus making them surrendered some rifles cal 30, shotguns, ammunitions and home made shotguns.

According to a native of this place whom I sent to Bored to buy some provisions some times last month said that the Mayor of Bokod was assassinated last Oct. 50. According to same native the Japs are busy patrolling Bokod area to locate the bandits who abduct the Mayor.

2. Your report re-intelligence mission was forwarded to 1122 as well. 1122 desires us to establish a communication system to facilitate contact. In view of the fact that some of the civilian population of San Nicolas have turned pro-Japs, May I suggest that your ~~area~~ come up to my area. We are not far from the old place so that I am positive your runners can find us easily. This is however a mere suggestion and if you think of any better idea, it will be O.K. with me.

3. Wonder if you were able to contact Major LapJam. The old men ~~XXXXXX~~ are hammering my ash regarding him. Please don't forget to mention about him by return mail.

4. Presently our place is practically quiet and clear of enemies. There are sometimes Japs patrol but not in ~~big~~ numbers and they act friendly to the civilians unlike the previous reactions. News is getting better and better everyday. Hope it won't be long to keep us waiting for the M-day. Regards to all.

BAGUIO

1. Received yours of the 13th together with radio. Thank very much sending it  
as we will look it up tomorrow and if it works we'll be sending the news through regularly.  
2. Japs left the Antipolo area on or about the 23rd and returned to Manila. Cor-  
rection on previous report Japs did not go to Baguio. They went from Antipolo to Pala-  
nayan, remained there until the 23rd, then returned to Kibang and Antipolo.  
3. Japs, Baguio, Aug. 13th 80 Japs arrived at Kibang from Antipolo; went to Baguio, stayed  
there until the 13th; 13th proceeded to Logat (IAPCO Valley); returned to Baguio on the 14th.  
4. Agent report: Bontoc - 200 Japs, 50 P.C.; Banua - 50 Japs; No Japs between Bontoc and  
Banua; Kibang - 50 Japs, no Japs observed between Baguio and Kibang.  
5. Coun. Amnayo, Cagadag, states that Mo-og is forever suspecting the P.C. and the  
P.C. pres. N.A. of Amnayo as being spies. Amnayo wishes these men are captured, but  
you investigate at that end and if these men are OK advise Mo-og to that effect. Amnayo  
police man that carried a msg. for this office was also suspected as a spy. No hard done,  
just so Mo-og does bump off one of my men. I am glad to hear that you have the tools on  
your toes watching for these spies that the Japs have turned loose. If all areas were like  
that there would be less information getting to the Japs through spies. This was not from  
Amnayo request that I advise Mo-og not to fight Jap patrols when they come into that  
area. Don't know what this is all about - what is this Mo-og, one of our army?

TO : CHANUYAN. (Thru Duhst)

1. Received yours of July 17th and 24th. I hope by now you have contacted Chanuyan. I am anxious to get the information that I have requested of your Hqs. At the earliest possible time, I want your unit that is the furthest north to make every possible effort to contact units of Major Praeger. This contact to the north is extremely important and once this contact is gained a regular schedule of contact will be set up between your unit and Major P. This contact should be at least twice monthly.

2. I am also anxious for the return of Chanuyan in order that I may arrange with him to contact him personally during the early part of this month. \*(See P.S. over).

3. Your Hqs. will report to this Hqs. when Lt. Sajonia is taken care of that is eliminated. You will also report from time to time any progress that is being made within the areas covered by your units in undermining the P.C.(JAP) (see plans for action dated July 15th).

4. I hope that my liaison man has helped you in straightening out the trouble in our communication system. I am sure the trouble was due to civilians being entrusted by your Hqs. to carry the msg. to our meeting place. I hope in the future this trouble will be eliminated. High rivers also have probably caused delay.

5. I hope this msg. finds you and your command in the best of spirits. Even the last Jap. news paper that we saw in July encouraged us alot. I am sure that before too many days things will be happening in a big way. I think I mentioned it before but just in case I didnt, if you get any "Tribunes" please forward same after you are through with them.

In regards to meeting Enriques- I hope I'm not too late in advising you. Be very cautious where you meet him and the manner it as arranged- There are too few of us left so dont take any risk as for his command status- He has none. You are C.O. 14th Inf.- If Enriques is deserves of coop. With us on G-2 work that's O.K., but I repeat he has no command status. In case you do contact him- do not stay in the area that you contacted him in. Does not seem reasonable to me that the Japs would be allowing him to run around without strings.

1. Herewith please find communications for Chamyan. Please make every effort to RUSH these communications through to him. I want them to be sure and reach them before he leaves that area and starts back north.

2. Enemy Information:-

- a. The Japs came into the Antipolo area on Monday, Aug 9th. To date Aug 13th they are still in the Antipolo area. They are also holding the Pres. for further questioning. They asked about the trail to Hacking, but the Pres. told them it was a very hard trail up and down.
- b. A Jap patrol visited Punauiden on Monday, Aug 9th. They split the people into groups, questioning children, men and women separately. They found nothing wrong in that area and returned to Ibong.

3. I feel they must have some suspicion on the Antipolo area don't know what it could be.

4. I am anxious to hear thru you from your units around B. I hope things have quieted down in the area.

5. I hope your news about Quezons speech delivered on July 4th is true. That's just about the time that I figure things will start happening around here. The worst of the rainy season will be over by that time in the greatest part of Luzon.

6. In regards to that radio. Mo-og is reported to know where that radio is hidden. In case you do locate it please send it up.

SUBJECT: WEEKLY EXCHANGE OF INFORMATION:  
TO: : CHAUYAN

1. OUR COMMUNICATION HAVE BEEN SOMEWHAT SLOWED UP DUE TO THE JAPS. On or about August 9th, 10 Japs came to the Barrio of Antipolo. They spent about a week passing out propaganda and investigating the leaders. Around the 16th they were replaced by 20 Japs. These 20 went to the Barrio of Punlahudan on the 18th. The following day they went to Chauyan and as far as I know at present they are still in that area.

2. Received your report dated August 6th, together with road census report. In the Road census report they failed to indicate which column was the north traffic and which was the south. In order to keep a more accurate check on troop movements and supply movements that station will report night traffic as well as day traffic.

3. Inform this Headquarters by special runner when Chauyan returns in order that I may arranged to contact him.

4. Enemy information reported by the 14th is falling way short of that turned in by other units. Your office is must be advised of the importants report everything pertaining to the Japs I have received no report from you concerning your unit area to the north of here. You report you have units operating around Marsat - - I have seen no report indicating that those units are doing their job. See what you can do to give them a Little spark.. Request further information on Japs movement toward Casaguran, as reported by your Headquarters sometimes ago.

5. The following information was sent in by Inf. covering part of your area. You will have this info verified and report results to this Headquarters as soon as possible.

BAYUMBONG JAPS HQS formerly 160 men; sent to Apparri; no mention of what is left.

BAMBANG outpost; 80 Japs w/4mgs; trenches; no artillery.

CHUPAX P.C. HQS 60 P.C.; 4mgs; trenches; no artillery.

IMUGAN no Japs patrolled once a month.

SOLANO Outpost; 20 Japs, 1 mgg trenches; no artillery.

BAGABAG Outpost, 15 Japs; 2 mgs, trenches, no artillery.

KAYAPA No Japs.

PINKIAN Patrolled once month

PAMPANG No Japs.

LT. COL. EDE is garrison commander of N. V.

BALATE PASS: Man reports seeing 15 Japs there. There was no date to indicate when this report was taken. In this connection all in the future will indicate the date the information was taken on.

5. Coun. Ananayo, Camandug, states that Mo-og is forever suspecting the Pres. and the Vice Pres. N.A of Ambagiw as being spies Ananaya vouches these men are ok. I am glad to hear that you have the people on their toes watching for these spies that the Japs have turned loose. If all areas were like that there would be less information getting to the Japs through spies. TO : CHANUYAN.

1. Received your of 8/21/43. I regret to learn that the C.O. of your second Bn. was captured. I hope you have been able to replace him so that his loss will not effect the unit. By closely patching him you may be able to regain his service after he is released.
2. The radio you sent up failed to function. Can't figure out what is wrong with it. I have spare tubes for that type of set but could not get it working.
3. Agent just returned from the low-lands reports that a rumor is going around that Vargas has been imprisoned because he did not want independence next month as urged by the Japs but wanted it put off until December. Reliability of this rumor unknown. However, if this is true, it may mean that Vargas and the rest of the politicians have some inside hope that things are going to break here on or before December.
4. South Ifugao quiet at the present time. North Ifugao being patrolled by small debts.
5. Japs at Bagabag are reported digging air raid shelters and trenches.
6. Request more detailed information on the trail reported in your previous report being constructed in the Pampanga area. Include in your report so far as possible, places connected by this trail type of trail being constructed, and any fact is that can be obtained as to its probable use.

CHANUYAN:-

1. Have not received any word or reports from you for over one month. I hope you are well and safe. Chief Int. Sec H.L. reported that he contacted you sometime ago. It was no doubt when you were with C.F.
2. It is my desire that if you have finished your urgent business in the south, to return to our Mag. center and there arrange to contact me. There are many things to be settled but I am holding up on issuing orders covering same until I have had a chance to talk to you.
3. I understand Langley was captured. Sorry to hear this. I am glad to hear that I am through Ok.
4. I hope you have been able to set up a chain of communication with the units under Lapham. So far we have had very little into out of his area. In this connection I enclosing some copies of instructions put out by the Int. Off. N.L.
5. A loyal civ. official reports that the election of Pres. is to be held the 20th of this month. I look for Ind. about the 1st of next month, and of course followed with the usual declaration of war.
6. The recent news looks mighty good things are brighten up on all fronts and it looks like they have the Axis plenty worried where the next blow will fall. I think we can figure on things looking very bright by the 1st of the year.
7. I am sending two men through with this letter to you. They have instructions to check on the line of communication with Lapham if one is already established and if not to establish one. Any way you can aid them in locating Lapham will be greatly appreciated. Do not discourage them from going on due to Jap activity in any area. I am trying to train the men of this Mag to go any where regardless of Japs. They are not known in that (not legible) as soldiers and they carry civilian credentials so they can get through. I am extremely anxious that the contacts in that area be put on a weekly schedule.
8. (not legible) the event you did not succeed in placing Int. Div. Fang. under Lapham also (not legible) men to contact them and so that a line of comm. may be established. In the (not legible) you have already established this line of comm. make it know to them so that they (not legible) here to duplicate your work.
9. In a previous letter to you, I asked you to arrange to deliver our future G-2 (not legible). This is already being done through Chief Int. Sec. H.L. I am anxious to hear the units of your contact with E. (By the way info reached the Kiangnan Gar. that you moved (not legible))

2. Heavy patrolling in Ifugao for soldiers, arms and Major Henriquez, two Americans. Our man, are good, 10/3/43.

3. R. Buguilat, ex mayor of Kiangan, working hard with the Japs. Our man R good D.S. 10/3/43.

4. Out man overheard Gov. talking with the P.C.- Japs from Beng., Hungdun, Kiangan, Ibong an Bayambang to converge and meet on border of Ifugao and N.V., R good, D.S. 10/3/43.

5. A patrol of seven (7) Japs and three (3) P.C. led by Joaquin Dulman (Ex CAPT. 14th Inf.) came from Bontoc to Kiangan 9/28/43 this patrol went to Bolog (barrio of Kiangan, and then crossed the Mount. by a back trail to Haliap. In the barrios around Haliap the people were investigated for Major Henriquez. Two American soldiers and arms. J. Dulman investigated severly the Pres. of Haliap throughout the night of 9/28. On 9/29/ Japs continued to investigate the barrio leaders around Haliap. J. Dulman and one P.C. went ahead to the Japs to the Antipolo area. In the barrio of Dugio (Antipolo) when the P.C. was away from J. Dulman of P.A. I have more than 200 men and four lts. Lt. ---- 30 men in N.V.; Lt ---- 40 men in Isabela; Lt. ---- 80 men in Isabela; Lt. ---- 60 men in Isabela. We have come ahead of Japs to drive away P.C. and P.A. if you have any here. Tell the mother of Carlos (P.C.) to hide any mil. war or equip. Don't say a single word in reply to the Japs questions except the word None. It is a matter of a few days or months more before the Americans will come here."

9/30. the Jap patrol went to Antipolo. 1. They started for Tinoc via Jayo. In addition to the uniforms that they wore each Jap soldier carried complete civilian outfit. Reported by our man, R. good.

6. During the last week in Sept a Jap patrol went to Pinduphan. Here they torture a man until he was forced to give up his shot-gun. The (illegible) A man by the name of Brucio of Ibong informed the Japs about this man (illegible) gun and led the Japs to Pin. B. our man, R good, D.S. 9/30/43. (Brucio in Ibong should be taken care of.)

7. Two of my men that have been trying to contact you have just returned. I have been attempting to contact you for the past two months but without much success. I am going to try this time in another direction.

Due to the fact that I do not know how many of my men, have gotten through to you during the past two months, I wish to repeat- as soon as you find it possible return to your Hag. Center do so. Or arriving there notify this Hqs. and I will (illegible) arrangements to contact you personally.

I understand that you have been sick in the south. Hope by this time you are well and in shape to travel. Looking forward to seeing you soon.

S i r :

1. We are worried about Chamuyan because we got no means of knowing his condition and moreover, we could not wait the return of Pecieng. However, I hope Sir that you have recovered already from your illness.
2. Sir, HQS-1122 is always inquiring about the return of Chamuyan because Tayaban want to have personal interview with him. He even sent 2 of his men to Pang. to see Chamuyan last Sept. 25th but they return for obvious reasons. In this connection, I am sending 3 of our men to follow Chamuyan to see what his present condition and the same time to bring some correspondence for our units in the South.
3. Sir, HQS-1122 desired that our Intelligence Information report covering the sector of the 14th Inf. be completed and accurate and be submitted without possible delay. Copy of Instructions dated Aug. 26, 1943 and copy of the G-2 report are in file.
4. Sir, if Chamuyan could not come yet due to obvious reasons, I suggest that the same runner will be sent back immediately with the missive of Chamuyan to Tayaban.
5. Duhat now known as Baliang is still in B. area. He did not return yet since he went down last Sept. 23rd. However, he is busy checking the Intell. Infr. in regards to B/ area as Yecal and Valdez are not attending to their duty faithfully. They don't care to submit their reports since the captured of Deu. They even failed to notify this HQS of their whereabouts not until Tayaban notify this HQS about Valdez. At last, Baliang have contacted them. I am inclosing correspondence from Valdez to Tayaban for your information.
6. Sir, according to Baliang the money given to Deu before including your personal was not recovered. They said it was captured. Your things that Pecieng returned here was sent back to Baliang for delivery to Celistine with the instruction that Celistino will deliver same to \_\_\_\_\_.
7. Sir, the following is furnish for your information: The people of Letbang and Pansyag surrendered to the Jap not long ago.  
On the 21st of Oct. 50 Japs with some PC from Begombong patrolled Mang-giyang, Nansican Maedo and return to Bayombong in the 23rd. They have maltreated lots of civilians in Nansican and Maedo. They even abused 2 women in Maedo and after their animal desire they thrust the vigins with the point of the Bayonet.  
On the same date, 8 Japs with captured soldiers (their names unknown) from Fangyang patrolled Benalisan, Benegbang, Bense, Pansyag and Letbang. They return on the 25th following the same route. They have maltreated lots of civilians in Pansyag and Letbang. They even came to the extend of maltreating that one Bog-hong of Letbang was killed.

I at once went to our sector passing through S. Nicolas and there I met our runner to deliver a msg. to you and to Major Lapham, I help the runner and waited for him. We want to know whether you got that msg. of last Oct.

2. At present our Dist. Co. is 1119, but I stayed with 336.

3. We sent two of our men to get info. about the whole Pangasinan. Had your reports arrived on time, our men of course are cancelled.

1. Enclosed herewith is a message from 1122, dated as of November 4, 1943.

2. Your report re-intelligende mission was forwarded to 1122 as well. 1122 desires us to establish a communication system to facilitate contact. In view of the fact that some of the civilian populating of San Nicolas have turned pro-Japs, May I suggest that your (not legible) come up to my area. We are not far from the old place so that I am positive your runners can find us easily. This is however a mere suggestion and if you think of any better idea, it will be O.K. with me.

3. Wonder if you were able to contact Major Lephm. The old men are hammering my ash regarding him. Please don't forget to mention about him by return mail.

4. Presently our place is practically quiet and clear of enemies. There are sometimes Japs patrol but not in big numbers and they act friendly to the civilians unlike the previous reactions. News is getting better and better everyday. Hope it won't be long to keep us waiting for the M-day. Regards to all.

TO : CHANUYAN.

1. Received yours of the 19th. Glad to hear things quieted down over your way.

2. My agents report that about one hundred Japs are preparing to come from M.V. (probably B.) to Casuyan. From there I dont know which way they are planning on going. This report may or may not be true, but I would'nt doubt it because they have been talking about going to Casuyan for some time.

3. That report I sent you about Japs in Tinoc proved to be false. Instead of 80 Japs, two Am. and eight Filipinos passed there. Have'nt any idea who they were. To date as far as I know, the Japs have not yet been to Tinoc.

4. Information from Mt. Trail area indicates the same thing is taking place along Trail as you reported on this side. Jap troop movement north. Reports also indicate that all garrisons along Mt. Trail have been reduced and some eliminated. Number of Japs in the Baguio area still high.

5. Information from Kiangan states that Col Enriquez was reported to have passed through Maysyo Headed north. The Japs sent details there from Kiangan, Bensus. I dont know the reliability of this report. However may be that rumor you heard was true.

6. I have no further information on M&N. I'm still hoping that it is not true, but agents from Bontoc swear that it is true. Bontoc by the way is reported strongly Pro-Jap. Bontoc is reported to have had four black-outs recently.

7. My men report that the flight of eleven planes that went over this area on or about the 22nd were American planes. I did not see them myself so cannot say.

8. The following is some news brought out of Kiangan. source? reliability?

- a. Manila bombed five times during the month of June. Manila has been having blackout since the middle of May. (we also heard from another source that Ft. Santiago was bombed).
- b. All the islands of the east Indies have been retaken by the Allies. Burma has been retaken by the British.
- c. The Chinese and British are making big gains in China. Both Germany and Japan are now being bombed continuously day and night. (We have heard from several sources that Manila has been having blackout since the middle of May so I guess that maybe correct. We are assembling the water wheel and the gear star that our men brought back from Beng. so should be able to give you the news regularly soon. I would appreciate it very much if you would send those batteries to the meeting place of our runners. The one I have at present is just about shot.

9. I will forward you a copy of the S-2 report for June as soon as all the reports get in. I am waiting on some from the other side. Make every effort to get them through to the North to Major F. I will have my men try to get through also.

10. In regards to the list of men that you want to promote as officer, give them certificates of promotion stating thereon, "Subject to approval by Higher (not legible) I am trying to eliminate as much administrative details as possible. (not legible)

ENRIQUES:-

You msg caught up with me while I was on my way north. I am going to see if I can't straighten out this area that M & N were formerly in. Since their capture, the area has gone to the winds.

There seems to be some misunderstanding on command in regards to the 14th Inf. when you surrenders. I was given authority as liaison Officer for M & N. I, being the confirm that the command of the 14th Inf. passed to Major Manriquez on April 12th the date of your surrender. There could be no question about this on your part nor any hard feelings, for your know as well as I, that a surrendered of captured officer loses automatically his command status. This is not only true in your case, but also in the case of the Cols. Since their captured I am no longer obliged to comply with any orders that they might issue in the future and I am likewise at liberty to change any orders of policies that they may have issued prior to the date of their capture. This as you undoubted-ly know is in accordance with the RULES AND ARTICLES OF WAR. Even if I wanted to act differently on this matter, I could not. I am compelled by the THE RULES AND ARTICLES OF WAR TO ACT as I have done.

In regards to your acting in a G-2 capacity, this is another question. I am perfectly willing and more than glad to have your aid and support from a G-2 angle. In this connection I wish to remind you to be mighty cautious, because if you are discovered it will go mighty hard with you. Your status as far as the Japs would be concerned would be that of a spy. After considering this angle, you are still willing to cooperate on intelligence work I will have the Chief Int. Sect. N.L. send you are G-2 reports for trans. I am waiting on the next reports at the present time. The last report as forwarded through other Channels. The (not legible) have on sending put these reports the better. I like it. For your information have good prospect for another means to contact Mac.

In your next msg. to Mac. you might include the capture of M. & N. June 2nd and O-19537 assuming command of N.L. as of that date.

The clouds are beginning to clear from where they are looking and I feel that it won't be long now before the sun will again be shining brightly.

I hope things are going all for you and your family. My best regards to you and your family.
