Summary:  
1. On 20 Jun an enemy task force appeared 600 nautical miles east of LUZON. In view of the situation at SAIPAN and the pressure of enemy air attacks against the PHILIPPINES, strict security measures are necessary in every sector to maintain peace and order and strengthen air defenses.

2. The bandits calculate that an AMERICAN landing is gradually becoming imminent. They are becoming more and more active, especially in espionage and propaganda. Strict precautions are necessary. Such typical bandit projects as the destruction of the North LUZON railroad and the CAVITE Naval Construction Depot, must be kept always in mind.

3. The appearance of new enemy wireless stations is as frequent as before. In particular the enemy has recently brought in many small-type wireless sets which are used for communication within the islands. Wireless communication has increased considerably. The bandits seem to have learned about our interception and plotting for they are skillfully concealing their stations and are successfully preventing interruption of communication by our punitive units. Station MACH alone is equipped with 10 to 20 wireless sets. More accurate information must be collected to destroy these stations.

4. Enemy submarine activity has increased considerably along with enemy task force operations at SAIPAN. Damage to shipping, especially in BASHI Channel, MINDANAO Sea, CELEBES Sea etc, must not be disregarded. The enemy submarine situation up to the end of Mar is shown on Attached Maps I and II.

5. Important successes and losses from Jan to May are shown on Attached Chart No 1.

6. Important results of engagements fought by various groups during the first 10 days of Jun are shown on Attached Chart No 2.

Northern LUZON Area, SHUN Group.

1. No attacks on military vehicles were made by defeated bandits for a considerable period, but on 31 Mar about 20 made an attack in the mountains about 14 km northeast of SAN JOSE and inflicted some damage.

2. On 3 Jun Maj RASHICHIRIGO\*SHOGAJINRA\*, CO of 157 Co, AMERICAN-FILIPINO Army, and 44 of his men voluntarily surrendered, bringing 38 rifles, and two pistols.

3. On 5 Jun BONGABON Garrison Unit, MATSUDA (#1) Punitive Unit engaged Capt ANDERSON (AMERICAN) about 30 km southeast of BONGABON. ANDERSON's subordinate Capt SARIATTO\*, was captured.

4. On 10 Jun, 1st Lt BORUHE\* tried to lure away our main strength by sending a small number of men to a village just before engaging us, at the same time placing most of his unit in ambush. Strict precautions must be taken against this type of warfare.

5. On 16 Jun, 13 BACNOTAN police were surrounded approximately 2 km north of BACNOTAN by about 50 of the defeated bandits. The equipment of the police was seized. On the following day, the 17th, 12 LUNA City police were taken captive by about 30 defeated bandits. All their weapons were captured. Careful consideration should be given the matter of stationing FILIPINO police in areas where bandits are active or areas far from our garrison units.

6. On 18 Jun the iron bridge one km south of BAUN was destroyed immediately after the passing of the MANILA-bound train. Investigation showed clearly that the criminals were 12 inhabitants of BAUN Village commanded by Capt BARNETT. The objective was to interrupt our punitive operations and disrupt our communications. A sharp lookout for secret contact between the inhabitants and defeated bandits is necessary.

7. The situation of the main punitive operations by the group is shown on Attached Map No 1.

Central and South Area, LUZON KEN Group.

1. Following are the observations of 1st Lt Bernardo RUFO\* and Sgt Sotero ESUPERON\* of PHILIPPINE Constabulary Hq regarding personnel of the PHILIPPINE constabulary units:

a. The majority of the present officers of the constabulary units are former guerrilla officers and as before are pro-AMERICAN.

b. The attitude of the officers toward co-operation between the PHILIPPINE Republic and JAPAN is not sincere.

c. In the event of an AMERICAN landing the majority of the police officials will not co-operate with the JAPANESE. They will take refuge in the mountains temporarily and will resume co-operation with the AMERICAN Army.

d. The majority of the NCOs and EM are pro-guerrilla and hence do not like to fight against the guerrillas. Their attitude is: If guerrillas cause disturbances we will arrest them. But we will not arrest them if they do not provoke trouble, even though we know they are guerrillas. (Spy Report: Reliability B.)

2. The bandit chief ABENARU\*DOCAHO\* of LUBAO Sector, PAMPUNGA Province, was killed in action at SANTO DOMINGO on 1 Jun. The CO of 96 Co, Anti-JAPANESE Peoples' Army, FURILANSOTO\*, is thought to have been killed in the battle of CADAPIT on 3 Jun. (Reliability B.)

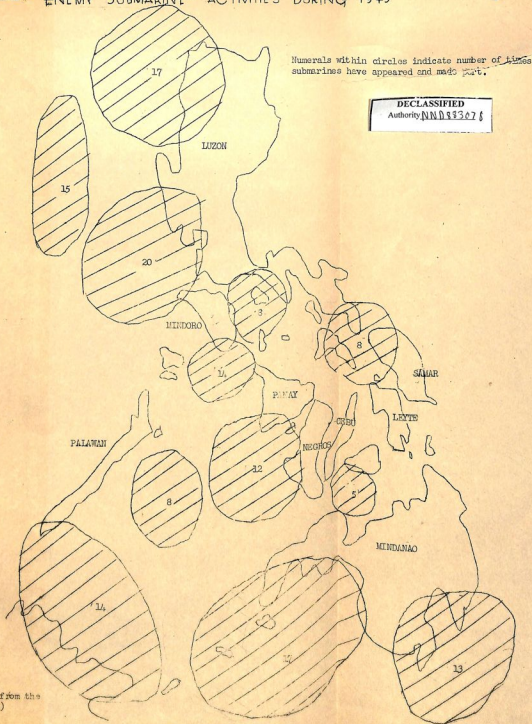

## ENEMY SUBMARINE ACTIVITIES DURING 1943

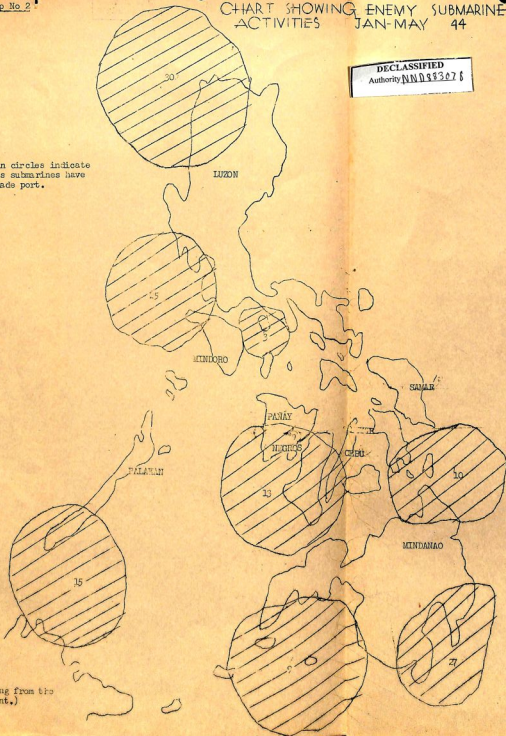


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CHART SHOWING ENEMY SUBMARINE

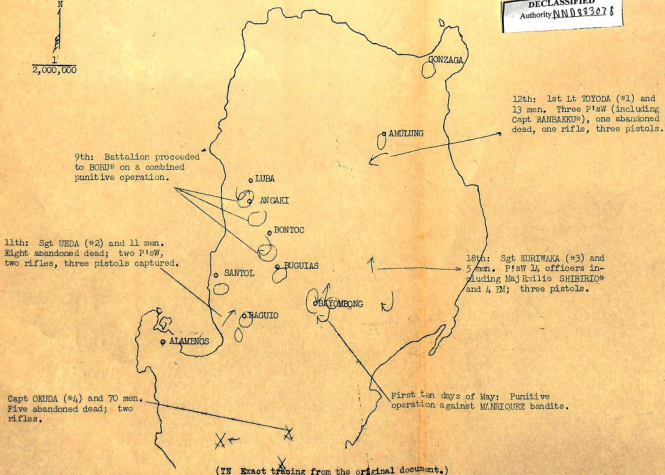

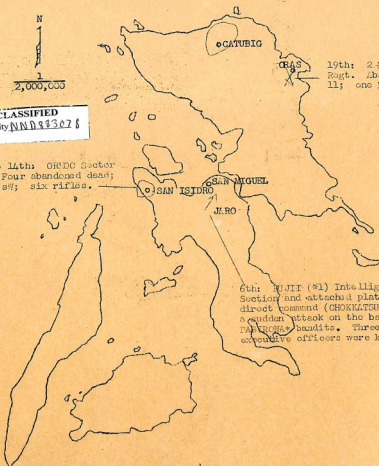

Summary:

1. In conjunction with enemy counterattacks, the bandit groups in the islands have become more and more active.
2. Under the direction of the AMERICAN Army, enemy agents, propagandists and fifth columnists have grown active, and their organizations have come more and more into the open.
3. Activities of enemy submarines have greatly increased as a consequence of the military situation at SAIPAN. It is estimated that 16 enemy submarines operated in the PHILIPPINES Area during the last ten days of Jun.
4. Results of engagements of each group during the second ten days of Jun are shown on an attached chart.
5. The bandit situation at the end of Jun is shown in Attached Map No 5.

Northern IUZON Area, SHUN Groups.

1. It appears that the remnants of BARNETT bandits in the western sector are moving from the mountainous regions to the plains before the rainy season sets in. (Reliability B.)
2. Bandits under Maj MANRIQUEZ in the northern BAYAMBANG Sector began to extend their base towards ISABELA Province.
3. East Sector Garrison Unit captured the battalion CO, 13 officers and four EM of 11 Regt, 11 Div (ISABELA Sector) of the Reconstructed AMERICAN-FILIPINO Army on 18 Jun about 35 km north of SANTIAGO.
4. Approximately 500 of the 22, 36 and 45 Anti-JAPANESE Communist Bandit Companies were dispersed early in Jun among the mountain villages in the vicinity of IBA and SULA, approximately 20 km west of TARLAC. They apparently plan to hide in these areas for a long period. (Reliability B.)
5. A part of the bandits under Capt JIYANIODE\* have infiltrated into the IUBA Sector. It appears that they are engaged in conciliating (\*1) the natives. (Reliability B.)

Page 5 Central and South LUZON Area, KIN Group

1. At 0200 hrs, 25 Jun, about 100 bandits attacked MUNTINGLUPA Prison, seized arms and ammunition, released 17 prisoners and fled. It is especially necessary to stress the instructions concerning weapons possessed by PHILIPPINE authorities.

2. At 0430 hrs, 27 Jun, about 100 bandits attacked an airfield construction unit, engaged in construction work south of MABATOBATO (South of CAMARINES, 11 km east of PILE). Lately obstruction of airfield construction work has increased; hence special vigilance should be maintained by the individual units.

3. Capt BERUNAFUORU\*, an adherent of VICENTE and Capt DERARA\* surrendered to LAMPON Bay Sector Guard Unit. According to the former, the VICENTE group numbers approximately 200.

4. Maj BOONE (AMERICAN) of UNITED STATES FAR EASTERN Commando Unit in BATAAN Province, under orders from RUMSAY (AMERICAN), has organized four regiments of comandos. (Reliability B.)

5. The situation of the main punitive operations of the group is depicted on Attached Map No 2.

VISAYA Area: KAKI and NUKU Groups.

Page 6 SAMAR Island

1. BARI\* bandits, hiding in the vicinity of BARAHIKA\*, have recently shown signs of confusion. The staff left the island and seemed to be shifting between HOMONHON, DIRAGAT and MINDANAO Islands.

2. KOSHIN\* bandits seem to have their principal hideout north-west of BASEY. They are limited in their activities.

3. Station MACA is skilfully evading our punitive unit and continues communication.

LEYTE Island

Several bandit groups which harass the northern part of LEYTE have scattered, due to the mopping-up actions of KANAZOE (\*1) Punitive Unit. They have hidden themselves in the neighborhood, however, and continue to spy out our military situation and to communicate with each other. They seem to be regaining strength.

2. KINGLEON's bandits of southern LEYTE are powerful. The inhabitants are not cordial to us. The entire populace has fled.

Page 7 BOHOL Island

1. Punitive action against BOHOL Island by the NUKU group began on the night of 24 Jun. The following morning it captured CARMEN Barracks. The force is still in action; but the bandits seem to have escaped and hidden.

2. The bandit chief of BOHOL Island, Maj INGENIERO, seems to have escaped to MINDANAO Island early in Jun. (Reliability B.)

3. The inhabitants are generally docile. Influenced by enemy bandit propaganda, they fled into the mountains. They returned suddenly and now are co-operating with us.

NEGROS Island

1. MATA bandits are lately harassing us with all their power, and are increasing in strength.

2. SMITH, an AMERICAN, entered the ranks of MATA bandit group and is now taking part in the planning. He seems to be communicating with forces both on and outside the island.

3. According to an enemy officer captured in northern CADIZ, NEGROS Island, a conference of bandit chiefs of the VISAYAS Area convened on 29 Jun at MOLOCABOC Island (North of NEGROS Island). (Reliability B.)

Taking the PACIFIC war situation into consideration, strict measures are necessary to prevent future bandit activities.

CEBU Island

1. The No 2 SHINSHU MLRU (#1), attached to the NUKU Force was attacked and sunk by an enemy submarine 20 km off the southwest tip of CEBU Island on 21 Jun at 0630 hours.

The situation of the main punitive operations of the group is specified on Attached Map No 3.

MINDANAO Area, HYO and KYO Groups.

1. On 24 Jun at 1200 hrs about 200 MORO insurgents under DATOMOROGU\* in a single concerted uprising made a raiding attack on the MALABANG Detached Unit and fled to the mountainous region in the north. The MORO uprising was confined to MALABANG; there was no AMERICAN instigation. The MORO families in COTABATO and LANAO Provinces have not responded to the uprising and are quiet at present. Attention must be paid to the fact that the uprising was caused by bad treatment of MOROS during construction of airfields.

2. The BUKIDNON Sector Garrison Unit dispersed about 250 insurgents under Lt Col TAGA\*. 18 - 24 Jun: 16 captives, nine abandoned dead. The hostile intentions of the enemy have decreased and AMERICANS and others are already fleeing into the mountains.

3. The BUKIDNON Province bandit group, commanded by Lt Col GURISUTETO\* and based at TALLAKAG, is throwing our IG into confusion, disrupting all our construction work and taking great interest in our reconnaissance and military affairs.

4. The bandit group of eastern DAVAO Province is not very active. It is chiefly concerned with improving liaison between the city of DAVAO and the LAURETIA\* bandit base.

5. One part of the DAVAO Province bandit group is constructing temporary roads in the sector which they expect us to attack. Thus it is necessary to beware of enveloping attacks and to guard carefully against mistaking the road of advance and going astray.

6. WERTIG's force, as before in MOUSAN Province and northern DAVAO Province, is judged to be a latent force which might arise and co-operate with a landing AMERICAN Army.

7. The natives of southern MINDANAO, SARANGANI and BALUT Islands are friendly and gradually becoming more peaceful.

8. At irregular intervals there has been brisk enemy submarine activity in the coastal waters of DAVAO. DAVAO Bay in particular must be guarded. On 20 Jun the HIBI MARU (#1), en route to DAVAO, was sunk in SARANGANI Strait.

9. Enemy submarines have been skilfully using the gaps between our guards. The probability of their entry into the ports of COTOBATO and ZAMBOLINGA Provinces has increased.

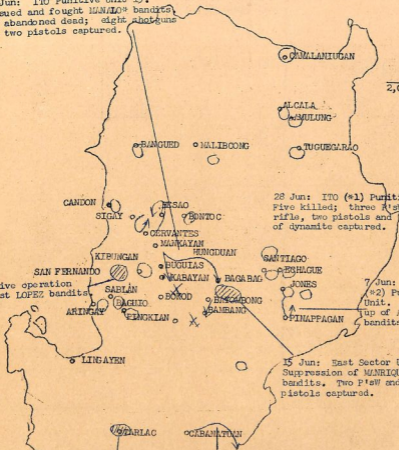

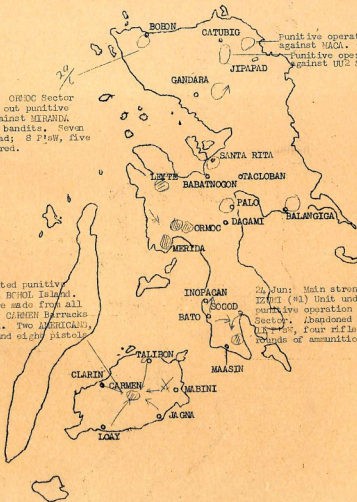

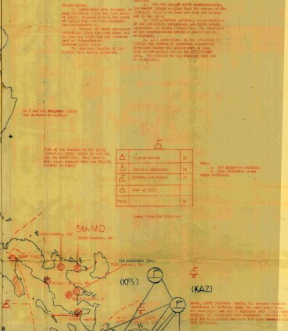
