But while December 7 meant "Pearl Harbor" to most of the world, it meant "Clark Field" to the Filipinos and the Americans in the Philippines -- the date to them, halfway around the world and across the international date line, was December 8, 1941. At almost the same moment that the Japs hit Pearl Harbor, they made their attack on Clark Field in Central Luzon, only fifty miles from Manila. There they knocked out the American Far Eastern Air Force with almost the same devastating effect they dealt the U. S. Pacific Fleet 5,000 miles away.

The North Luzon Force, dispersed throughout the central and northern Luzon area, was commanded by Major General Wainwright. It included two units of the Regular Army, the 31st Infantry Regiment and the 192d Tank Battalion, a former National Guard Organization, as well as six units of the Philippine Scouts. These were the 45th and the 57th Infantries, (PS); the 26th Cav. (PS) and the 23rd, 24th and 88th F.A. Regiments (PS). General Wainwright also had the following Philippine Army Divisions:

The South Luzon Force was under the command of Brig. General George Farber. It consisted of one Regular Army unit, the 194th Tank Battalion; one Philippine Scout unit, the 86th Field Artillery; the 1st and the 2nd Philippine Constabulary Regiments, and three Philippine Army Divisions:

The 1st Regular Division under Brig. Gen. Fidel Segundo, PA
The 41st Reserve Division under Brig. Gen. Vicente Lin, PA
The 51st Reserve Division under Col. Albert W. Jones, AUS
The Visayan-Mindanao force was commanded by Col. William F. Sharp, with headquarters in Mindanao, and it contained no Regular Army units. It had one Philippine Scout Regiment, the 43rd Infantry; the 3rd Philippine Constabulary Regiment, and three Philippine Army divisions:

The 61st Reserve Division, under Col. Bradford G. Chynoweth, USA.

There were also elements of other divisions including the 2d Infantry, the 73rd Infantry and the 93rd Infantry.

The Harbor Defense Command, consisting of Corregidor and its satellite islands, was commanded by Brig. Gen. George F. Moore and was composed of two Regular Army Regiments, the 59th and 60th Coast Artillery; two Philippine Scout units, the 91st and the 92nd Coast Artillery Regiments, and the 4th U. S. Marine Regiment, which had just been moved in from Subic Bay.

Command headquarters feared that the single blow at Clark Field had virtually decided the course of the war in the Philippines. The 26th Cavalry, bombed out of Fort Stotsenburg, moved into the nearby mountains, prepared to strike at the first enemy beach landing wherever it might come. On December 9, Nichols Field, another key army air base at Manila was bombed almost to destruction. The Japs apparently hoped to catch that part of the FEAF which had gone there for refuge. Group installation destruction, however, was all they accomplished -- but that was complete.

Nichols Field was bombed again on Dec 11. The ground force troops had been at defense stations for weeks. The 11th and 21st Divisions were on the Lingayen Gulf beaches, with the 11th covering from Dagupan to the north and the 21st on the beaches around Bolinao to Viga, on Dasol Bay. The 31st Division covered the coastal plain from Dasol Bay to Subic Bay. One battalion of the 45th Philippine Constabulary was rushed to Bagac, on Bataan; the 71st Division and the 91st Division were held in Camp O'Donnell and Cabanatuan as USAFFE reserve. The 1st Division, Philippine Army was disposed to delay advance of the enemy force coming towards Manila from Legaspi; the 41st Division was disposed to oppose landings on the Cavite and the Bataan Coast. The 51st Division was set to meet east coast landings at Lamon Bay. The 61st Division went into position in the Visayan-Mindanao area with the 101st Division.

On December 20, the scheduled landing was made by one reinforced Japanese regiment at Davao, on Mindanao. This landing of the Sakaguchi Detachment was virtually unopposed. General Sharp had more than 1500 miles of shore to defend and no air reconnaissance to indicate where the Japs might strike. His 81st Division, just then being organized, was in Cebu. He had started the organization of the 101st Division only a short time before. General Sharp, therefore, had to depend primarily on the 61st Division, Philippine Army, the 3rd Philippine Constabulary Regiment, and two companies of the 43rd Infantry, Philippine Scouts. Supplementing these he had one regiment from each of three divisions -- the 1st, the 71st and the 91st -- of the Philippine Army in Luzon. It had been planned originally that these three regiments would join their divisions in Luzon, but the sudden outbreak of the war prevented this, and so they remained under General Sharp's control.

Once again a Philippine commander was faced with the prospect of opposing enemy artillery with rifles. Within five days after the landing at Davao, another artillery-reinforced company landed on the island of Jolo, on General Sharp's southwestern flank. This little island is almost exactly halfway between North Borneo and Zamboanga on the end of Mindanao, dividing the Sulu from the Celebes Sea.

The 2nd Infantry, organically part of the 1st Philippine Regular Division but which had been unable to get from Mindanao to its parent command after the war started, was attached^x to the 81st Division and put on the beaches at Farang, just below the 61st Infantry. General Sharp also had the 101st Division in the western half of Mindanao, containing the Japs at Davao and establishing strong points at other likely beachheads. Most of the other elements under his command were disposed in the interior.

History: The officer nucleus and the enlisted man cadre of the 101st Med Bn were trained at Ft Wm McKinley for almost three months beginning September 1941. On or about 20 Nov 41 the personnel of the 101st Med Bn ordered to Cotabato arriving thereat on or about 27 Nov 41. In Cotabato, Cotabato the companies of the Bn were organized and the entire unit was inducted by Lt. Richardson. On or about 4 Dec 41, we were sent to Malaybalay Mobilization Camp. On or about 19 Dec 41, Collecting Co "A" was sent with the 101st Regt to support the latter. About 8 Jan 42, Division area was Bombed and Collecting Co "C" was temporarily bivouac in Kustuan while the rest of the units were bivouac at the vicinity of Malaybalay. Few days after the bombing, the Med Bn less two Collecting Co's were transferred to Pinmalay lake, Bukidnon and a platoon of the Clearing Co's was sent to Kabakan junction to put up a temporary hospital at said place. This was later moved forward to Malsila, Davao. On early part of February 1942, the 101st Med Bn less one Collecting Co was bivouac at 117 Cotabato. Here a hospital with a capacity of 500 patients was operated under the direct supervision of the Division Surgeon. While in this place relief of "A" Collecting and later on "B" Collecting by the "C" Collecting took place. Collecting Co was later transferred to the

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Northern Mindanao to serve the Provisional Brigade until the surrender. On latter part of March 1942, the 101st Med Bn and hospital was transferred to near Cotabato-Bukidnon border (Probably Km 137) and later to Km 72 Bukidnon where there were temporary hospital built by the personnel of the 101st Med Bn. Rear echelon of the 101st Med Bn were transferred to K 72 Bukidnon at about the last week of April 1942 till the surrender on 10 May 42.

History: 102nd Medical Co. organized and inducted 2 Sept 41 in Davao City. Almost immediately after organization the 1st platoon under Lt Vicente Lagrosa was sent to Surigao; the 2nd platoon under Lt Babista was sent to Cagayan, Misamis Oriental; the 3rd platoon under Capt Arca was sent to Zamboanga City. Lt Halili, the second in command was sent to Malaybalay. The Headquarters group under the CO was sent to Cotabato City to accompany the Headquarters Co of the 102nd Inf Regt. under Lt Col R. J. Nelson USA. As fighting went on and replacements were needed, the 1st and 2nd platoons, including Lt Halili were sent to Digos from near Davao. The Hq group of the Medical Co moved in Jan 42 to Midsayap, Cotabato where a surgical hospital was established under the CO of the Medical Co with the provincial Hospital doctors and nurses assisting. This existed until 30 April 42 when about two weeks after the surrender followed.
