Organized originally at Camp 3 June 1942 by piece meal additions and transfers to Camp one the orchestra was reorganized about the beginning of the year 1943 and reached its present composition in Oct 1943. The Orchestra regularly appeared & performed as a background for all the Saturday Evening Shows at Camp one and in addition regularly played one full hour of entertainment on Wednesday Evening - In addition the orchestra played at the Camp Hospital, in the kitchen at evening meals and occasionally special numbers were played at Japanese celebrations a total of about a thousand different musical numbers were played during these various performances which included about a dozen original numbers composed and popularized by the members of the band. On Feb 10th at an original numbers contest the three most popular prize winners were "Moon Magic" composed by Beeches and Paul - (A Ballad) and sung by Harry Mock "I've never been in Love before" by McCarten - (A Ballad) "Please send me home" by Lt Kraft 200th GAO (Old Fashioned Waltz.)

A BALLAD OF O'DONNELL (PRISON CAMP)
BY
LT COL JOHN BALL, FIELD ARTILLERY

Written at Cabanatuan Prison Camp July 1943. O'Donnell was a Prison Camp, Bushido held full sway over many thousand starving men, whom fate had sent that way fifty thousand Filipinos, and nine thousand U. S. men. Took a lesson in Bushido in this rotten filthy pen. On the first day as we entered, we were greeted with a speech. From the bragging guarding Captain in his sniling hissing you are my prisoners he first told us, we are enemies this day and we'll shoot to death the prisoners who attempt to steal away. We have captured all the Islands from Luzon to New Britain. Then with frenzied heathen gestures, he continued on to say 'We'll be enemies forever, your' my prisoners from this day. Then they shook us down like bandits for the things they might have missed, in the shake down on the Death March, while they jabbered, clubbed, and hissed. They tore pictures of our loved ones, took our pesos and our knives, and for those who dared resist them, they demanded several lives. They took medicines and watches, searched for notes and hidden things. Even Bibles were not left us, not were canteens, pens or rings. When they finished with be-jacking, we could travel very light. They had even snatched our blankets, which we carried for the night. We were sick, footsore and tired, and with each day less rice to eat. But we dared not start complaining or they'd boyy us off our feet. We then straggled to the shelters built of bamboo, palms and grass, where we crowded with the others in a numb and hungry mass. There were those who had no mess kits, many more with no canteen, for the good-squad in their hold ups stripped their victims quick and clean. There was very little water trickling thru a half pipe inch fight. But to get a drink of water you most always had to fight. Many sick men could not make it, Their condition grew much worse, cause Old Hoss in his frenzy preached the punishment by thirst. They used bamboo for a tin cup, and for plates to hold their rice, and the plans for sanitation were devoured by crawling lice.

We lined up for drinking-water, so each would get his turn we stood their with hope and longing. 'Til our skin began to burn. Those barbarians of Bushido who had never learned fair play, ruled that water would be running, just two hours in every day. Many thirsting men had waited, only part could get a drink. They struggled off still thirsting, having lost the power to think. Rice was cooked in rusty oil drums and was dished up with a board, men were beaten by starvation, more than battling with the sword. Thirty thousand Filipinos and Two thousand U. S. men journeyed on to meet their maker, from the cruel and filthy pen. 'Twas survival of the fittest,' some poor soul was heard to say, but the ghostly horde of zombies was increasing day by day. 'Twas a constant troop of details, toting bodies to the graves. They were carried on old tow pecks, on long poles or bamboo stones. No last rites or burial service, for the many passing on thousands more were seen to follow, ere Bushido power was gone. Death was common all about us, we no longer were afraid, but while detd ls toted bodies, there were those who bowed and prayed. And a prayer that was quite common I have often heard them tell, was that these 'Barbarians Heathens will forever burn in hell'! They were men and mostly good men, driven to the Promised Land, by starvation, thirst and beating by Bushido and his land.

A BALLAD OF BATAAN (ON THE FALL OF BATAAN)
 Written by Lt Col John Ball, field artillery at Cabanatuan
 Prison Camp July 1943.

We were sitting in the bahay reminiscing of the past. And the subject turned to bodies that had traveled very fast. Spoke an old and grizzled soldier, who had hiked up from Bataan, we saw truly faster movements in our rucks with Japan (disorganized, confused conflict). Then he took his issue paper and tore off the proper size. Which he filled with state tobacco, that he guarded as a prize. Soon the smoke rings started rolling and his thimble began to stray. To the fastest moving objects which had passed him at Limay.

As he opened up his story in a timid sort of way all the gang began to listen for the words that he might say. It was in the month of April in the year of Forty Two when MacArthur's battling bastards left their lines without adieu. We were living on half rations so the rice was non to good, for the filling up of bellies as an army ration should. And though eyes will off deceive you, I was there and saw it all, there were many 'lost companions' ere Bataan began to fall. They were ready with an answer when you asked 'from whence they come.' They were 'seeking their companions, and had thrown away their gun'. You have heard of many runners, who record their time as 'fast', but MacArthur's Battling Bastard, tied their records to the root. First there-came a few old busses, just a chuggin down the street. They were loaded with the runners. Who forgot the things to eat. Soon we heard, a distant chatter which became a growing noise. They were coming by the hundreds Old MacArthur's Battling Boys. Some had rice and some had roosters, some had other kinds of loot. There was not a single runner had a gun with which to shoot. From the front lines at Abucay as their mob began to swell. They knew not that they were running, toward the very jaws of hell.

They were stopped at Mariveles, by their savage silent and eyed friends, and were herded by the thousands to the filthy prison pens. They abandoned all equipment, that was useful in the fight, and departed with the rations that were brought up in the night.

You have spoke of fast time runners and the records they have won, but MacArthur's battling Bastards gained their laurels in the run. Tho the words used here may check you they were coined while in Bataan. I can quote the rhyme verbatim as they ran and ran and ran. "No Papa, No Mama, No Uncle Sam, Poor little Bastards of Bataan".

Comdr. indicates part of front on which main effort is to be located, direction in which it is to strike the hostile position, and object to be attained. Scheme of maneuver of command as a whole.
- (2) Time of attack is given to 'secure unity of effort of all units. Antithesis of coordinated attack is piecemeal attack-The efforts of all assault units are not coordinated and result in disjointed action.
- (3) Units are not coordinated and result in disjointed action. Piece meal attacks, are used to take the offensive before all assault units have had terrain arrive and attack. Coordinated attacks are more frequently employed.
- (2) Specify hour of attack, have all units report when in position ready for attack; the commander may then arrange rocket signal or fix definite hour. The subordinate unit farthest distance may fire rocket signal when ready. All units start attack on signal or so many minutes after or farthest unit launch attack and other units join when they hear that of farthest unit. An attack is started early enough to give chance of reaching a decision before dark. May deploy under darkness, attack at daylight. increase surprise. To determine earliest hour - the earliest moment at which all assault units can march to and be ready to cross line of departure; and minimum time required by commander & sub commanders to make reconnaissance formulate detailed plans & issue attack order.
- (3) Formation with units in depth is flexible, easily controlled, facilitates flank security & commits initially only small fraction of entire command. A formation of 2 units abreast and one in reserve gives greater initial impulse than in column.
- (4) LCD is designated to coordinate time of attack of assault units. The LCD is a line on the terrain which the leading units cross at a specified time. Should be as near to enemy as consistent with requirement - should be perpendicular to direction of attack should be recognizable on the ground, should provide cover from hostile observation, should provide cover from aimed fire. Sometimes a line of departure is indicated for each assault unit.
- (5) Direction of attack; Maintenance of direction is essential. Direction

are maintained by assigning zones of action outlined by boundaries, by compass direction, by designating well defined terrain features or combination. The boundary between attacking forces is so prescribed as to result in continuing the attack in desired direction. This is done in initial orders for the operation.

(6) Zone of action: - This corresponds to sectors in defense. Usually indicated by designating its lateral limits, naming district unmistakable and easily recognizable topographic features. Boundaries are designated from rear to front. Begin at rearmost combat elements and extend thru hostile position as far as action is anticipated. Zone of action of interior units is designated by giving both lateral boundaries. A unit operating alone has no exterior boundaries.

Example: - The 1st Bn form with right resting at Rj 508 (a point on LCU) and attack covering a front of 800 yds. Direction of attack: - 310° mag. azimuth. The frontage of a given unit is the width of its zone of action. The basis for computation in determining Bn frontage is the front actually occupied by a deployed was strength platoon. This may be taken as 120 yards. Such a platoon is made responsible for frontage of 120 - 250 yds and attacks in column of sections. It operates in squads or section groups between which intervals covered by fire, observation, and patrols, a company attacks in 2 platoon fronts or in column with 1 platoon is reserve. A Bn at war strength in main effort is assigned a zone of action varying 400-800 yds. A Bn of 400 yds can furnish max density of rifles needed by a division in a decisive attack in major offensive.

(b) Mission or objective-scheme of maneuver, direction & zone of action. Special instruction as to liaison, flank protection, routes of advance, and assembly positions. For fire units-missions, positions, and instr. to scheme of fire. Details for reserve incl. - composition, position, special mission such as flank protection, support by fire of assault units. When artillery, Cav, aviation, tanks, Engrs or chemical Warfare service troop are present, their tasks are indicated. Action of security detachment during deployment. Instructions as to reconnaissance, security, A.S. protection, liaison, relief of units prior to attack, priority on roads hour movement must be completed, essential elements of enemy information required. Details of this part of plan indicate what each subordinate is to do but not how he is to do it.

(c) The groups of administrative details & supply details of a plan include the instructions to carry out the scheme of administration & scheme of command.

THE ATTACK ORDER: - THE BATTALION CONSIDER DEPLOYED IN.
 by means of an attack order (Inf may come from Regt)

1. All information of the enemy not already known by the subordinate comdr, with special reference to latest information obtained by reconnaissance & from higher authority. All available information regarding supporting troops, adjacent units & friendly artillery.
2. A brief statement of the plan for the Bn as a whole incl details as its scheme of maneuvers, objective, zone of action, line of departure, compass azimuth or direction points, time of attack, and formation.
3. The combat mission of each company & attached unit including scheme of maneuver, forming position for attack, attack objective, direction of attack, zone of action for assault companies, firing positions & targets for fire, units, initial location for reserve units & other details.
4. Instruction regarding supply & administration details, such as trains, and

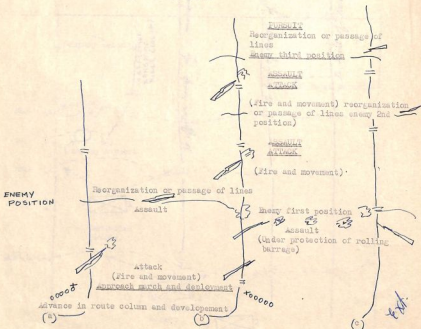
location of ammunition distributing point & En, and station.

5. Location of battalion axis of signal communication and command post or where messages will be sent.

REGT:- The conduct of the Regtl Approach March is controlled by the Battalion and special and attached unit commanders. The post of the Regtl Cnd'r is with or in advance of the leading Bn. He deploys his Regt. By means of an attack order. The Regtl order is more often written than in the Bn order. Usually one platoon of the Howitzer Co is attached to each assault Bn. The Howitzer company platoon not so attached & the machine gun units of the reserve battalion all under control of the Regtl Cnd'r support the initial phase of the attack (main effort) provided they can do from positions which permit them to join the reserve Bn when it is ordered to action. Tank Platoons are attached one to each assault Bn. Accompanying guns attached to a Regt are usually attached to assault Bns. Accompanying batteries are held under Regtl control.
