 points a day that we have to be inside the Baring by 9:00 am. No moving of the class. The

 the boat. One day to take the bag in your system you have to just about fill the
 patient of the same medicine. I tried to study some arithmetic yesterday and my
 mind just refused to function. But they grew up on our bases. My paper had
 thought all of our bases distributed and gently improved to find things not to
 be expected. I hope to feel they long Col. Bremer for his understanding that since

29th: Had a new month still being put out but as yet I have had none. No sum of my
 collection on in Europe. I'll be coming soon as full on the plate but it's not what it
 was being one of the red reports now and giving someone to Carter who has a stiff knee &

 the hardest part for the air, but should demand 100 in 100 in front of front. No mail again today!
 Feb 27: Morning starting feel (was) out down to 30. Just steel beam & that has the top. Again no mail.
 Feb 28: Run down to station in morning but Capt Ellis said 5 letters yesterday, today, none at all.
 Had them in our eyes when they were read. I can see myself when I receive them. 1000
 men & less, leaving soon for parts unknown. Hope I get some mail, I need it.
 Feb 29: Got a receipt of a Japan detail leaving. This in addition to the motor detail. Rice very scarce
 & potatoes to get to get fully. Capt Ellis said 10 more letters from home to be here again. From a talent. Admiral
 may announce to have said naval operations and no longer be about a ship at. Philippines were not
 to give too, figure them to be in here by end of month. Headache still up's head today.
 Feb 10: Arrive here team by us ^{magical} (see on troops) (limited) hope having one out of the valley of the low here. This
 camp may be evacuated (on Sunday). No mail yet. God love I miss you. It's got to be soon dearest.
 Feb 11: Filipinos find 10 million pesos in old treasury. God shortage water. Many details around
 going out. That was on Christmas night. Had last of R.C. here today as a bit. Left in a little
 while. No mail for me as yet. God but it's hard to see others getting it. It's still some for me.
 Happy Valentine's day dearest. Hope to be with you soon, soon, very soon.
 Feb 12: Two outgoing det. being held up for some reason. Very little news and still no mail from
 John. Discouraged as no word for it. He'll be able to wait my time. Headache & nervous-
 ness still holding up me.
 Feb 13: No known landing in Mindanao & ship tops in Cebu (manila) wounded ship soldiers. "B" was
 out the other day (10) and no mail for me again. Saw a V for victory letter which was first
 turned down by Postal Authorities in the states & then finally sent from wonder of the
 low has been trying to send them to me & had them turned down. God, but I hope not.
 On a discouraged, please, as I have been in a long time and it still hasn't been
 a long time to go for us in this damn hell - eyes in prison camp and it's you
 away from Ide. It's a rather dead believe you me.
 Feb 14: The Capt. for days now for all hands. Something we should have had a year ago to pass
 Bluebird, day fast etc. God scarce as hell. Starting a large number of American on Cebu
 & Cebu. Inside fully coming to life on the same. King Kong supposedly follow and
 more mail & paper in Manila for us. Hope try at uniforming some after transport supposed
 to be pulled. Things otherwise things are no longer of nothing concrete to go out at all.
 Rain yesterday & night. Don't say anything, unusual. Sounds like City Chamber of Commerce.
 Feb 15: He heard again today. Himself. Headache King Kong follow to San. Stillwell & others
 many. Some may be killed and some coming for help? Despite all the former & it still hasn't
 received any word. In charge slip to leave Manila. 150000 up supplies & permanent stability
 possible. Day had the word flag. But still no word from Ide and home.

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Feb 20: Sunday and the usual routine. Headache raising hell. Got
 rid letter by his wife who said she was sorry he was a prisoner & had a dead hen for
 what a cheerful word to receive. She must have had visions of 1900!

Feb 21: Same routine and same headache. Lost 3" last wk. All hands
 follow 1st pay and promoted grades. all above promoted 1. Base pay for Pvt 500
 plus 100 for over 10 yrs plus 10% for foreign service. Some fine but I still
 wonder! Have been irritable and nervous as hell lately. The detail work of 1st Sgt.
 sometimes wears thin. Parties daily with the bunch of men representative of
 here. Most of the 79 are OK. but some few don't try at all to help. Still
 no mail for John Brown nation!

Feb 22: 25th Drives deep snow on. Bets in camp that yet will be here late in
 early April. Nice putting gun pits in @ main gate of Camp Red Fox for Philippine
 reasons. Might be. Chief goes red letter dated 2/11/43 for his sister he says
 but made his post a good deal better. Dear Green. Sister today. and blood
 down. Help headache. Severe but feel better tonight for long time. Wonders when
 my mail will be getting to me. Soon I hope. Too long if no word for 10
 days.

Feb 23: Fine nation in. ability & another day killed for food. wonder what people at home will
 say when they hear about it. Guinea pig, geese and various other types of meat for dinner?
 Probably be absent so early but hunger is no fun and meat is meat!

Feb 24: Personal page to be put out now. (Don't know) REMPT. taking over at Santa
 Tomas & wanting the Jap civilian admin. might improve things for them down
 there. Hope this on Page is true but still would rather receive a letter from
 John as could hear from him in other.

Feb 25: Sun - Mail dated left Mon 26th. & they did to have more mail, especially from
 Brown, Green, Ingers, Callahan, Stewart many others in this one. There are actually just
 page in. But had for us & plenty of mail. Stewart said will be home by late April. In yellow
 red letter from friend in States who was here on furlough from this post. but we couldn't
 even get off our positions & were hungry 1/2 of the time. And a difference. heard the

 Franklin left camp 11 & raised hell there.

Feb 26: Letter says we have many pleasant surprises when we reach home. about Laurel
 the daughter of P. L. - India. taken away due to lack of cooperation. Native promoting medals
 Council and go must be eliminated. so you have 400, 500, & 1000. This all means

March: Rumors still persist about 20 etc but still nothing concrete
 here. No mail for past 3 days while interpreter supposedly in Manila.
 We have had a large crew for starting roads but he had been
 warned so given he had no one to blame but himself. I have some
 duty today from the baby. total of 60 men & are getting down. Hope
 that 2nd gate back a piece and a bundle of mail for me from
 and home. And; how I would like to know from John. But
 scheduled to leave has been called off until Apr. (date by

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dinner only!) Headache, nervousness, ears ringing still, the
 latter despite being off Quinine for better than a month. (1)

March 2nd - 3rd - 4th Stacks of mail & pays came in for March today & I actually
 saw it w/ my own eyes. Boy oh boy a letter & pay for home! I was offered
 the 1st company of a line in the base area along w/ a P.C. detail. I would
 very, good but too many members of large details leaving, especially, & dys-
 detail, found it rather to be my chance of getting home into base in the P.C. Det
 mentioned on 1st to leave them in base again. They have all been very unkind and
 so would be hard for cold weather. Frequent physical checks by 3 doctors too, but fine at
March 20: One for Chief Engineer & the other's birthday, but not which left behind in
 detail. Detail mentioned on 1st to leave 2 AM tomorrow. Yet admitted on time and a
 one by the three, who has been extremely accurate on previous forecasts! My
 Baker came down for duty once & told me I had a pay!! He had seen the log on
 the mail bag wonder if he has or not? I think when I'll get it! Boy oh boy.

March 21: And today I am supposed to have 3 boxes at 11:45. I had left this AM. Mindless
 found this AM? Sounds good, but wonder. Navy supposed to have left this way also!

March 22: Started 2 AM detail for Malakal. So will miss the next duty detail which will
 be a clean one. Ocean on base today, no good. Russians over 20 mi or so
 with first-aid on Italian post. Two more islands to south of us. 1400 officers
 now detail returned in next future. Have read but none for me - wonder if I do & mother
 could possibly have not written? Too late thought. Wonder when those pages
 will be put out to us? Have heard tomorrow but I may be as busy on that
 score as on the mail. God forbid - was you'd do & now that it looks like
 the end of this is coming soon (we hope) I am that much more impatient to
 get out of here as to stand for him & you - what a hell this last few you
 have been! Maybe the future will be better for us both. Thought it may be a dream.

March 23: Friday, no pay, no mail - no news & damn little food and like hell. Piggies! Hell
 on Russian dogs who came out here 1940 as a P.C. (USA) and married a Japanese, raised
 a family & made a success of life because not expected to live thru the war. It's a pity his wife long.
 My mind the place where they could see each other & were occasionally with the hope
 stand for off. Hell has been much more of a gentleman than many many whites in camp
 and out. He has fought dys. & has, to live. A pity if he dies. Bought a watermelon for \$3.00. It
 would be easy for us to have better good things.

March 24: Sat & a miserable day until supper. Got this goose & 3 fangs & a duck @ 500 -
 stuffed it w/ rain preserved my garlic. Good view along side the dock too. You don't see
 had seen - cannot picture of group @ 200 half pint! Boy what a meal! But I'm had since
 procedure. Wish it would have been just the 2 or 3 as a horse as we used to be.

March 25: We had had at 12:15 today, very poor after today of our last visit. Hear that
 leave will be put out starting tomorrow PM. Two to a time, so suppose I will
 have to wait for 1 hell of a long time as with the mail. Duty detail leaving
 for upper area base, missed this time but will probably miss it next

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time as the log is going to be practically eliminated. Dr Schultz managed to keep the 8 of me here. Flight expensive but the log is long and in time the less were on the farm & airport. Didn't expect to stay this long, but fortunately I see thing after another has popped up. Goddard's deal. March 15th: Condenser removed, also has been very reliable. Has sold 4000 against 1000 (gold) and the 4 of I would be here by the 25th!
 Those started out but so slowly. Found my back - the English fell as hell fast rate. Wore an O.D. wool shirt & wooden drawers off the chest and still cold. This is the topic - Blah!

March 16th: Three and 300 some add men to duty. Another detail to go to, which will very probably just about eliminate the hospital. Capt Ellis on stiff and lame from his Arabian skate. I haven't felt my own tea much yet! Lost 1200 which was returned to me. Had sold my cigarettes to get the cash for food & it really hurt. Capt R. Biber gave the 4000 pesos in appreciation for the way I had handled the thing. Nighty view of how far we've come at outrageous prices - 250 pesos (not dirt 40) of very poor paper tobacco sells now for 200 - if you can get it. Wonder how prices at home are? Wish there were some way of getting more money to take together as we can't quite home about business in our 1 card every 2 months. Humiliation.

March 17th: Hesp seems to be now & at tomorrow's detail it will be like a margin. The dirty 20000 at A.G. Relieved Dr Schultz & am sending him to duty. He has been & still is the best & hardest working man in the service for a long. Staff officers may volunteer for war; Co. officers can volunteer for outside work, if you come to work under 23 pay grade down to work outside. This by summer. If time they are swinging to the Rules of land warfare & cleaning their shirts - wonder why. Hope it means Speedy release, dear, however: 1000 men detail to Japan.
