HISTORICAL DATA OF THE 14TH INFANTRY, USAFIP, NL

- a. (1) The 14th INFANTRY, USAFIP, NL was originally designated as the FIRST GUERRILLA REGIMENT and then redesignated as 14TH INFANTRY USAFFE. Lt-Colonel EVERETT L. WARNER, the senior officer, became the Regimental Commander with Major MANUEL P. ENRIQUEZ (then a Captain) as the CO, HQ BN; Captain WARREN MINTO (Then a 1st Ident.) as CO, 1st Bn and Lt-Colonel GUILLERMO NAKAR (then a Captain) as the CO, 2nd Bn. This regiment was only authorized a total enlisted strength of 800 which was distributed as follows: HQ BN - 200; 1st Bn - 300 and 2nd Bn - 300.
- (2) This regiment was organized during the last week of December 1941 and the first week of January 1942.
- (3) Organized at Aritao and DUPAK, Nueva Viscaya.
- (4) By authority from CG, USAFFE.
- (5) The original members came from remnants of the 11TH, 12TH, 71ST AND 91ST INFANTRIES USAFFE, (PA), 26TH CAV (PI), PC COMPANIES and personnel of the 1ST MILITARY DISTRICT HQ (PA). These units were out of due to the rapid advance of the enemy and through no fault of their own could not join the forces in Bataan.
- b. (1) About the middle of February 1942, the regiment was reorganized and its units redesignated as follows: The 2nd Bn under Lt-Colonel Guillermo Nakar (then a Major) became the HQ BN and Major Nakar became the Regt'l Executive Officer as well as CO, HQ BN; Captain Warren Minto, still CO, 1st Bn; Major Enriquez was assigned CO, 2nd Bn and his original HQ BN became the 2nd Bn.
- (2) After the fall of Bataan, 8 April 1942, Lt-Col Warner and Capt Minton left the regiment and Lt-Colonel Nakar then took command. Capt ANHOLD then became the CO of HQ BN, Capt FERMIN OBINA, Actg CO, 1st Bn and Major Enriquez, CO of 2nd Bn. After the fall of Corregidor; Lt-Col Nakar, his officers and men refused to surrender and continued to harrass the enemy and at the same time endeavored to contact GHQ, SWPA. On June 30, 1942 radio contact with GHQ, SWPA was established and Gen MacArthur congratulated the officers and men of the regiment for refusing to bow their heads to the enemy. The regiment was given the mission to furnish 3-2 information as well as enemy treatment towards American and Fil-

DUMLAO was assigned CO, HQ BN; Capt PATRICIO DUMLAO CO, 1st Bn; Major Z. PAREDES, CO, 2nd Bn; and Capt P MABUNGA, CO, 3rd Bn. On 4 March 45, Capt. S. DUMLAO accidentally straffed by frindly planes at HAPID, died in line of duty and Major A. DINGCONG was assigned CO, HQ BN. On 1 March 45, Capt P. Dumlaol was relieved as CO, 1st Bn by Major B. GAPAYAS who was WIA at VIRA, Gamu on 6 May 45 and was later relieved by Major A. DAMIAN on 11 May 45. Major A. Dingcong was relieved as CO, HQ BN on 11 May 45 and assigned Ex-0 of the regiment. Major S. MENDOZA was assigned CO, HQ BN on 25 May 45. On 1 March 45, Capt P. MABUNGA was relieved as CO, 3rd Bn by Capt M. BALAUAG.

- (8) On 11 May 45, 1st Bn was attached to 11th Inf, USAFIP, NL, then to 37th Div, 6th Army on 20 June 45 and again to 11th Infantry, USAFIP, NL on 12 July 45.
 I Co attached to RAC Bn, 26 April 1945.
 K Co attached to USAFIP NL, April 1945
 M Co attached to 128th Inf, AUS on 24 February 1945
 M Co attached to GHQ, USAFIP, NL on 3 May 1945.
 14th Inf, USAFIP, NL (less 1st Bn and Cos I, K and M) attached to 6th Div, 6th Army, 1 July 1945.
- c. During the period of the war, many officers and EM came to join the 14th Infantry, most of whom were stragglers from various units of the USAFFE and quite a few were reserve officers and reservists who were not called to active duty when the war broke out. The 14th Infantry was therefore always at its authorized enlisted strength of 800 men and 64 officers sith some 200 PC soldiers and officers attached until this regiment was placed to war footing basis on December 1944. The following are the strength of the regiment from the month of December 1944 to June 1945:
1. December 1944 - 112 officers and 2067 EM or total strength 2179 officers and EM. Not increase for the month - 1315.
 2. January 1945 - 117 officers and 2103 EM or total strength 2225 officers and EM. Not increase for the month - 46
 3. February 1945 - 117 officers and 2077 EM or total strength 2194 officers and EM. Not decrease for the month - 31
 4. March 1945 - 124 officers and 2168 EM or total strength - 2292 officers and EM. Not increase for the month - 93
 5. April 1945 - 125 officers and 2626 EM or total strength - 2751 officers and EM. Not increase for the month - 459
 6. May 1945 - 123 officers and 2634 EM or total strength - 2757 officers and EM. Not increase for the month - 6

7. June 1945 - 122 officers and 2702 EM or total strength 2824 officers and EM. Not increase for the month - 67

- d. 1. When the regiment was organized in the latter part of december 1941 it was stationed at ARITAO, N. VIZCAYA and at about the middle of January it was transferred to BAGABAG, N. Vizcaya. Later at about the middle of February 1942, the regiment transferred to JONES, ISABELA. The following were the areas of operation of the different Bns:

ISABELA for the HQ BN; CAGAYAN for the 1st Bn and N. VIZCAYA for the 2nd Bn.

2. When Lt-Col M. P. Enriquez assumed command, after the capture of Lt-Col Makar, the 1st Bn was assigned to ISABELA, the 2nd Bn assigned to N. VIZCAYA and EASTERN PANGASINAN and NUEVA ECIJA, inclusive CARRANGLAN, NATIVIDAD and SAN NICOLAS and the 3rd Bn assigned to the SUBPROVINCE OF BENGUET.
3. After the surrender of Lt-Col Enriquez when Lt-Col R. A. Manriquez assumed command, there was no change in the areas of operations for the 1st and 2nd Bns, except that the 3rd Bn was assigned to EASTERN PANGASINAN and N. ECIJA inclusive SAN JOSE.
4. On December 1944, 1st Bn was assigned to operate all along HWY 5 from ISABELA-CAGAYAN boundary line to ECHAGUE inclusive, 2nd Bn assigned to operate along HWY 5 from ECHAGUE exclusive to BATU FERRY inclusive 2nd 3rd Bn from BATU FERRY exclusive to BALETE PASS. This Bns were assigned to these areas of operation until their respective areas were liberated except Cos I, K and M as they were attached to GHQ, USAFIP, NL.
5. When the regiment (less 1st Bn and Cos I, K and M) was attached to the 6th Army on 1 July 45, it was stationed at KIANGAN, Mountain Province and assigned to operate at PALAO-HALIAP-ANTIPOLO-AMDUNTOG Area with the 2nd Bn, 20th Inf, 6th Div and later on 6 August 45 with the 2nd Bn, 63rd Inf, 6th Inf Div.

e. Marches:

1. The march to Hones, Isabela.
- (a) The purpose of the march was to transfer the Regt'1 CP to a place in the interior for security.
- (b) Length of daily march was approx 40 kilometers.
- (c) The march was from Bagabag, N. Vizcaya to Jones, Isabela which lasted for two days in the early

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- (d) The National Highway No. 5 at that time was in good condition although some bridges and sections of the road were destroyed. The weather was generally fair.
- (e) Our men partly hiked and partly rode on trucks during the march. There were some Jap fighter planes that tried to straf some of our trucks while on the way, but were not able to do any damage as they were all immediately camouflaged when the planes were noticed.
2. The march of 2nd Bn to the area east of National Highway 5 in N. Viscaya via the mountain trails.
- (a) The purpose of the march was to transfer the Bn to its area of operation at N. Viscaya.
- (b) Length of daily march was about 30 kilometers.
- (c) The march was from Masaya, Jones, Isabela to Taban, Solano, N. Viscaya.
- (d) There were no roads but only trails with some sections which were very muddy. New trail was blazed through the mountains between Cordon, Isabela and Solano, N. Viscaya. The weather was generally fair but it rained in the afternoons.
- (e) Our men hiked all the way through with full packs and in some places they had to blaze our own trail through the mountains. The Bn was forced to take the mountain trails as the Japs were believed to make a drive towards Isabela through the National HWY 5 at that time.
3. The march from Ambaguio to Panupdupan.
- (a) The purpose of the march was to transfer the RHQ to a better location to improve the lines of communication.
- (b) Length of daily march was approximately 25 kilometers.
- (c) AMBAGUIO to 5-MC-1 Camp Morales - 220300 January 45 to 221200 January 45.
5-MC-1 to 5-MC-4 (Hablang) - 230600 January 45 to 231000 January 45.
5-MC-4 to PIEZA - 250900 January to 251900 January 45.
PIEZA to SOLANG - 260830 January to 261100 January 45.
SOLANG to PANUPDUPAN - 270900 January to 271230 January 45.
- (d) The mountain trails were very prominent as it was used by runners but were very muddy with leeches. The weather was generally fair with no rain during the period of the march.
4. The march from PANUPDUPAN to PULA (C-2) then to PULPOG.
- (1) The purpose of the march was to move the RHQ to another place for purposes of security and to move

- Our troops to new positions to enable them fight better the enemy superior in number.
- (b) The length of daily march was approximately 20 kilometers
 - (c) PANUPDUPAN to MONTIGUING - 301100 April to 011145 May 45
MONTIGUING to DIMONGAO - 020300 May to 021300 May 45
DIMONGAO to C-2 (PULA) - 021330 May to 021700 May 45
C-2 to PULPOG - 091000 May to 091630 May 45.
 - (d) The mountain trails which were followed in the March were very muddy and rugged with steep climbs. The weather was fair during the first day of the march but in the following days it rained almost continuously.
 - (e) The RHQ with the Hospital Co and Land Communication Co HQ were forced to move to new positions due to threats of superior enemy coming from four directions.
5. The march from PULPOG to LANTAP
- (a) The purpose of the march was to bring the RHQ with the HQ Service Co and Hospital Co to the liberated area of LANTAP near the 6th Inf Div which is located at BAGABAG.
 - (b) The length of daily march was approximately 30 kilometers.
 - (c) PULPOG to HALIAP - 030745 July to 031730 July 45.
HALIAP to BOLOG - 050715 July to 051830 Jul 45.
BOLOG to LANTAP - 061000 July to 061315 July 45.
 - (d) The mountain trails from PULPOG to BOLOG were very rugged passing through steep climbs and descends while the road from BOLOG to LANTAP was in good condition. The weather was generally fair during the march.
 - (e) Our men hiked from PULPOG TO BOLOG with full packs thru trails infested with Jap stragglers and from BOLOG to LANTAP the men rode on trucks.
6. The march from LANTAP to KIANGAN.
- (a) The purpose of the march was to move some of the equipments of the RHQ with some personnels to KIANGAN in order to establish our advance GP nearer to our zone of operation.
 - (b) Length of march for the day was approximately 40 kilometers.
 - (c) LANTAP to KIANGAN - 150745 July to 151330 July 45.
 - (d) The road from LANTAP to BOLOG was in fair condition while the road from BOLOG to KIANGAN was very muddy.
 - (e) Our men rode on trucks from LANTAP to DINAPUGAN and they had to hike from DINAPUGAN to KIANGAN due to the poor condition of the road and the bridges were not yet repaired.

He was imprisoned in Bayombong, N. Viscaya

in 1943 together with his wife and father-in-law some way or another he was able to escape and re-joined the 14th Infantry. He was known as one of open generosity to the hindling elements, his fearless bearing in combat, and unflinching faith in the cause which claimed his life on 19 January 1945 on a daring raid of the enemy at HWY 5 where he was shot and died on the spot. Dying a hero's death.

- (d) Recommended for - Award of decoration of the Distinguished Service Medal. (Posthumous)
2. (a) Engagement - Attack of enemy Garrison at Lamut, Kiangan on 11 January 1945 at 0900.
- (b) Name - Francisco Agunion, Pvt., F Co.
- (c) Act - During the raid at Lamut, Kiangan on 11 January 1945, Pvt. F. Agunion, disregarding personal safety above and beyond the call of duty, crept close to the enemy with his T3MG and with a burst, silenced 1 enemy MG saving the lives of his comrades who were pinned to the ground due to the enemy superiority in arms and number. The enemy then concentrated their fire on Pvt. F. Agunion and got him with a bullet thru his head causing his instant death.
- (d) Recommend for - Award of decoration of the Distinguished Service Medal. (Posthumous)
3. (a) Engagement - 1st Counter attack on Hapid Airfield on 1 April 1945.
- (b) Name - Rafael Paluero, Capt., CO H Co.
- (c) Act - During the counter attack on Hapid Airfield on 1st April 45, Capt. Paluero distinguished himself by his outstanding gallantry and bravery when he led his men against the enemy well entrenched and superior in arms. He was able to break the stiff resistance of the enemy forcing them to withdraw with heavy casualties. Unfortunately, while he and his men were mopping up the remnants of the enemy, he was shot by a sniper causing his death.
- (d) Recommend for - Award of Decoration of the Silver Star. (Posthumous)
4. (a) Engagement - Encounter at Panupdupan, Kiangan on 10 February 1945.
- (b) Name - Saturnino Dumlao, Major
- (c) Act - Major S. Dumlao was one of the few officers of the 14th Infantry. His last encounter with the enemy before his tragic death was at Panupdupan, Kiangan on 10 February 1945, when he decided to meet the enemy in big number who were heading for Panupdupan, then the location of the RHQ, and Base Hospital. The enemy had the advantage of superiority in number

- 3 and arms but his cool, calculating disposition and his courage in face of danger made it possible for the delay of the enemy advance and the safety of the RHQ and the non-combatant personnel. On 4 March 1945, Major S. Dumlao while building the Hapid Airfield, two friendly planes on reconnaissance patrol swooped down and strafed the field causing his death shortly after.
- (d) Recommended for - Award of decoration of the Distinguished Service Cross. (Posthumous)
5. (a) Engagement - Attack of the Japanese Garrison at Bayombong, N. Viscaya.
- (b) Name - Basilio Briones, 1st Lt.
- (c) Act - Lt. B. Briones has distinguished himself for his fine leadership and for his many deeds of valor and gallantry in action against the enemy. In the middle of Sept. 1942, the Jap garrison at Bayombong was attacked by a poorly armed guerrillas led by Lt. Briones, the first and most daring attack on the enemy occupied capital when everyone thought it to be impossible but was done by this young and daring officer. This was the beginning of a series of attacks and ambushing of the enemy until he was finally caught up in his hideout one fateful day in May 1943, while he was down with malaria. He was taken shortly after to Fort Santiago where he was beheaded shortly after.
- (d) Recommend for - Award of the Distinguished Service Medal. (Posthumous)
6. (a) Engagement - Engagement of Bauang, La Union on December 12, 1942.
- (b) Name - Guillermo Nakar, Lt-Colonel
- (c) Act - On December 10, 1941, Lt-Col Nakar, then a Captain and CO, 1st Bn, 71st Inf, USAFFE, leading his men with orders to stop at all cost the steady advancing horde of Japs from Bauang, La Union, found his unit practically cut off from all other friendly troops from the north. After one of the fiercest battles and bloodiest fight ever recorded during the period he was able to pull out his unit from sure annihilation. He was able to lead the remnants of his battalion through hunger, disease and exhaustion from Bauang, La Union thru the most hazardous inclines of the Cordilleras to Aritao, N. Viscaya in his efforts to join our forces at Davao. After 17 days of forced march, Lt-Col Nakar with his men, hungry, haggard and destitute, greatly withttled down by exhaustion arrived at Aritao, only to find out that San Jose, N. Feija had been occupied by the Japs and that there was no way for them to go to

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Bataan. There he and Major Manuel Enriquez, together with Col Everett Warner organized what was later to be designated as the 14th Infantry, USAFFE, the first organized unit to engage in guerrilla activities in the Philippines. When Bataan fell, Col Warner left the command to Col Nakar who was by then known as the guerrilla head of the Cagayan Valley. Corregidor fell; the Japs resorted to all possible means of effecting his surrender by dropping leaflets of Gen. Wainwright's order and personal appeal to him to surrender, with grand promises of his safety and mercenary assurances of his freedom, tempting fabulous financial rewards and grant any government positions of his choice, but instead he intensified operations against the enemy until captured on Sept. 29, 1942. While a prisoner, he never bowed down to the Japs, his faith and loyalty to the United States Army never failed and his resolve to stick to his oath of allegiance remained unshaken and is manifested in a speech to the public at Echague, Isabela while under custody, when, instead of appealing to the populace to cooperate with Japan as was the order of his captors, he defiantly denounced the cruelties, abuses and brutalities of the Japs, and urging the people to continue to fight assuring them that the forces of liberation will soon be back. Despite the daring denunciation, the enemy persistently offered his freedom if he would sign the surrender papers, but all their efforts failed when he said bluntly, "I sworn allegiance to the United States of American and my country and I cannot transfer my allegiance to Japan". Reliable information is to the effect that he was brought to Fort Santiago and that after all efforts to make him sign and accept the terms imposed on him by the enemy failed, he was promptly executed.

(d) Recommended for - Award of the Distinguished Service Cross (Posthumous)

7. (a) Engagement - Ambush of the enemy at Balete pass and other ambushes.
- (b) Name - Honorio Quinez, Capt.
- (c) Act - Capt. H. Quines was one of the early organizers of the 14th Infantry. With Cols E. Warner and G. Nakar he helped in the gigantic task of organizing an army in the Cagayan Valley in January 1942. He liberated the town of Carranglan, N. Cebu in March 1942, and one time, with a handful of selected men he ambushed two truckloads of Japs hurling the trucks into the steep, deep precipice of Balete Pass. He liberated the town of Digidig in April 1942, and led another successful ambush in Balete

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Pass in November 1942 and another in the same road in November 1943. During the tightest mopping up operations of the enemy, Capt. Quines (hide-out was located in Natividad, Pangasinan and was placed on custody on Feb. 13, 1944 in Tayug, Garrison. During his stay in Prison, he refused all and every offer of the Japanese cheap freedom and persistently avoided to sign the surrender papers, oblivious of his personal safety. "I was born once -- I had pledge my allegiance and loyalty but once and I cannot pledge another". these were the last words of Capt. M. Quines, an officer and a gentleman, when he was confronted with an offer that would have spared his life. With this violent opposition the Garrison Commander took reprisal. He was beheaded at 2300 hours on 24 March 1944.

(b) Name - Douglas Lopez, 1st Lieut., I Co.

(c) Act - On 6 March 1944, Lt Lopez was given a perilous order to contact the BC Comdr of San Jose, N. Ecija, Ganap infested town for any possible walkout en masse. He succeeded in contacting Lt. Hidalgo, head of the BC and relying upon Hidalgo's honest intentions, Lt. Lopez proceeded to the constabulary barracks where Hidalgo played Judas incarnate. There alone and unaided he was dragged desperate and deeper into the mire of Hidalgo's dragnet. With his hands tied behind his back, he was forced to drink a canful of water. They tortured him in the fancy they thought was regal, until his body racked with pain. Mutilated and emaciated in body, but steadfast in his spirit - in high resolves not to divulge anything concerning his companions and unit, Lt. D. Lopez died a Hero's death.

9. (a) Engagement -

(b) Name - Marcelo S. Quines, 1st Lieut.

(c) Act - Lt. M. S. Quines, while covering 3-2 assignment in Carranglan, and San Jose, N. Ecija, some Ganaps got wind of his guerrilla activities leading to his capture on 8 May 1944. In the face of the inevitable, Lt. M. Quines was forced to lay down his arms and the enemy punished him in a manner most convincing to their brutality, but he did not divulge any information concerning his unit. In the face of this contempt and defiance, the enemy tortured him to death.

- (d) Recommended for - Award of decoration of the Distinguished Service Medal. (Posthumous)

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10. (a) Engagement - Raid at Cabagan, Isabela
 (b) Name - Guillermo P. Santos, 2nd Lt. D Co
 (c) Act - Lt. G. Santos is one who had given the enemy enough worry and headaches in his strings of raids and encounters. During the day, he possess on the casual ways and habits of a harmless, simple common tao but at night he is a guerrillero striking back at the enemy with a sting. The enemy had been after him but he always evaded and outwitted them. Once, in broad daylight, he with a handful of picked men surprise-attacked the enemy garrison at Cabagan, Isabela inflicting heavy damage to the enemy.
 (d) Recommended for - Award of decoration of the Distinguished Service Medal.
11. (a) Engagement - Attack at Paniqui, Bagabag, N. Vizcaya on 25 February 1945.
 (b) Name - Marcelino Ludivico, Cpl, G Co
 (c) Act - Cpl. M. Ludivico has distinguished himself by his outstanding bravery in the face of superior enemy. During the attack at Paniqui, Bagabag, N. Vizcaya on 25 February 1945, about 50 Japs succeeded in braking thru our lines, 90 yds from the Bn Comdr's CP, and were poised to attack by surprise when Cpl Ludivico, together with Sgts. Sumaydeng, C Duly and S. Enero immediately opened fire on the enemy before they could make use of their heavy weapons. When the enemy began firing back with MGs and mortars, he with his 3 comrades stood their ground and defended the CP at all cost. This timely action checked the enemy advance and the enemy were forced to withdraw. This act resulted in the saving of the life of the Bn Comdr and some valuable documents from falling into the hands of the enemy.
 (d) Recommended for - Award of decoration of the Silver Star.
12. (a) Engagement - Attack at Paniqui, Bagabag, N. Vizcaya on 25 February 1945.
 (b) Name - Esdras Sumaydeng, St., HQ H Co.
 (c) Act - Sgt. E. Sumaydeng, distinguished himself by his outstanding bravery in the face of superior enemy together with Cpl Ludivico, Sgts. C Duly and S Enero, during the attack at Paniqui, Bagabag, N. Vizcaya on 25 Feb. 1945. He with his 3 comrades defended their CP at all cost disregarding their own safety and saved the lives of 3 officers and some valuable documents from falling into the hands of the enemy. On the counterattack at Rapid Airfield, he led his men through the enemy's lines and were able to retake from the enemy ammunitions stored at Rapid

Depot No. 1. His success greatly contributed to the recapture of Hapid Airfield.

- (d) Recommended for - Award of decoration for 2 Silver Stars.
13. (a) Engagement - Attack at Paniqui, Bagabag, N. Vizcaya on 23 February 1945.
(b) Name - Calixto Dulay, Sgt., H Co
(c) Act - Sgt. C. Dulay distinguished himself for his bravery when he and his 3 comrades, Sgts. E. Sumaydeng, S. Enero and Cpl. Ludivico, defended their CP on 25 February 1945, and saved the lives of 3 officers and some valuable documents from falling into the hands of the enemy.
(d) Recommended for - Award of decoration of the Silver Star.
14. (a) Engagement - Counter attack against the enemy at Hapid Airfield on 2 April 1945.
(b) Name - Fidel Manat, Sgt., Engr Co.
(c) Act - During the counter attack against the enemy at Hapid Airfield on 2 April 1945, Sgt. F. Manat then designated a section leader, distinguished himself of his bravery and outstanding gallantry. He led his men against the enemy superior in strength and arms and well emplaced at the most strategic points in the airfield, and were able to break thru the lines and attacked the enemy from the rear. His success greatly contributed to the recapture of the Hapid Airfield, before heavy enemy reinforcements arrived and thus saved the ammunitions which were then wanting.
(d) Recommended for - Award of decoration for the Silver Star.
15. (a) Engagement - Attack at Paniqui, Bagabag, N. Vizcaya on 25 February 1945.
(b) Name - Samuel Enero, Sgt., H Co.
(c) Act - Sgt. S. Enero, distinguished himself of his bravery in the face of superior enemy then he, with his 3 comrades, Sgts. Sumaydeng, Duly and Cpl. Ludivico defended their CP at Mangalisan, Bagabag, N. Vizcaya on 25 February 1945.
(d) Recommended for - Award of decoration for the Silver Star.
16. (a) Engagement -
(b) Name - Teodoro Zarate, 1st Lieut.
(c) Act - Lt. T. Zarate, has distinguished himself during his service with the USAFFE by his unusual decision embracing the cause of the United States of America after the occupation of the Philippines by

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the Japanese Imperial Army in 1942, and forfeiting all his rights to comfort and convenience of normal life. He determinedly refused to go under the tyrannical yoke of Nippon but instead preferred to live a life of hunger, disease and abstinence from the comforts of normal life. Lt. Zarate displayed such a fierceness and tenacity in dealing with the enemy that he has won the respect not only of his men but his co-officers as well.

- (d) Recommended for - Award of decoration of the Distinguished Service Medal.

17. (a) Engagement -

- (b) Name - Gregorio L. Domingo, 2nd Lt.
 (c) Act - Lt. G. Domingo has distinguished himself during his service with the USAFFE by his unflinching loyalty and devotion to the United States of America. A former, PC, true to his allegiance, he continued to defy the enemy with marvelous constancy. Lt. Domingo has always carried out the missions entrusted to him during the long four years when he was hunted by the enemy, with marked efficiency and the ferocity of a seasoned fighter.
 (d) Recommended for - Award of decoration of the Distinguished Service Medal.

18. (a) Engagement - Engagement at a camote plantation near the I Co CP on 24 March 1945.

- (b) Name - Pascual de la Cruz, 1st Lt., I Co.
 (c) Act - In the morning of 24 March 1945, at 1100 hours, hearing the presence of the enemy in a nearby camote plantation, Lt. de la Cruz immediately assembled his men and led them to the attack. A bitter fighting ensued for two hours with Lt. de la Cruz directing his men from every strategic position keeping them in high spirits. The enemy was forced to withdraw while he ordered his men to advance and gather the bottles and pursue the enemy. It was at this instance that he was hit by an enemy bullet injuring him seriously on the left leg. In spite of this mishap, the wounded officer kept on giving orders to his enraged men and succeeded in driving the enemy with heavy casualties inflicted on them.
 (d) Recommended for - Awards of decoration of the Silver Star and the Purple Heart.

19. (a) Engagement -

- (b) Name - Gervacio Reyes, 1st Lieut.
 (c) Act - Lt. G. Reyes has distinguished himself during his services with the USAFFE since he was inducted on 10 December 1941, up to the present by his

Unwavering faith in the United States Army. has continuously defied the enemy and had refused to surrender forfeiting his rights to all comforts of normal life. During the four long years when the Japanese Imperial Army did all it can to wipe out the 14th Infantry, he gathered his men and despite hunger, diseases and lack of bare necessities of life, continued to defy the enemy and at the same time kept his men intact. He was always under the command of Lt-Col Arnold until Oct. 28, 1944 when the remnants of the 14th Infantry was absorbed by USAFIP, NL.

- (d) Recommended for - Award of decoration of the Distinguished Service Medal.
20. (a) Engagement - Attack on Vira, Gamu, Isabela on 6 May 1945.
- (b) Name - Benito Capayas, Major
- (c) Act - Major B. Capayas has distinguished himself for his bravery and gallantry in action, for his coolness under fire and resoluteness in the face of imminent death as shown during the attack on Vira, Gamu, Isabela. On 6 May 1945, he personally led his 166 men to attack the enemy estimated to 200 in number at Vira, Gamu, Isabela. Coolly he directed his men to advance taking advantage of the enemy's confusion and inflicted heavy casualties on them. Meanwhile, during the engagement, enemy reinforcement of about 500 began pouring into the area, and against the maddened horde, Major Capayas and his men held fast for hours. It was during this fierce engagement that he was hit causing a compound fracture on his left thigh. In spite of his condition he continued giving orders to his men to hold the line at all cost.
- (d) Recommended for - Award of decoration of the Silver Star and the Purple Heart.
21. (a) Engagement -
- (b) Name - Patricio Dumlao, Capt.
- (c) Act - Capt. P. Dumlao is one of the first officers who preferred jungle life to normal life. He carried out his job by first breaking spy rings and disciplining the civilians that in a short time the people became conscious of the hiding elements who were fast growing into a silent army. Convinced of his leadership and bravery his CO, assigned him to Isabela where he rounded up the spies and Ganaps that infested the province. To the Japanese he was headache and a terror, to spies and Ganaps, he is unrelenting and merciless and to civilians he was a protector to the loyal ones. Ever since D and M Day

missions were commenced in Northern Luzon he has continuously harrassed the enemy in his movements and inflicting heavy casualties on the enemy. This is mainly due to his bravery and gallantry in action.

- (d) Recommended for - Award of decoration of the Distinguished Service Medal.
22. (a) Engagement -
(b) Name - Cristino R. Nery, 1st Lieut.
(c) Act - Lt. C. Nery, has distinguished himself during his service with the USAFFE by his unselfish devotion and unquestioned loyalty to the United States Army. He has defiantly refused to surrender and impelled by no mercenary motives or designs for fame and reknown, decied with unusual firmness of purpose to continue fighting to the end. His gallantry and bravery in action and exceplary conduct in many encounters with the enemy has contributed a great deal in bringing this regiment to its present status.
- (d) Recommended for - Award of decoration of the Distinguished Service Medal.
23. (a) Engagement -
(b) Name - Enrique E. Cruz, 1st Lieut.
(c) Act - Lt. E. Cruz has distinguished himself during his service with the USAFFE since Sept. 1, 1941 by his unswerving will and determination to fight the enemy even after the occupation of this country by the Japanese Imperial Army. True to his oath of allegiance and conscious only of final and ultimate victory of the United States in this war, Lt. Cruz refused to surrender and disregarding persuasions and appeals of former comrades gathered the handful of men under him and carried on the fight in the mountains. He has always been under Lt-Col Arnold until Oct. 28, 1941 when the remnants of the 14th Infantry, AUS was incorporated into the 14th Infantry, USAFIP, NL.
- (d) Recommended for - Award of decoration of the Distinguished Service Medal.
24. (a) Engagement -
(b) Name - Estanislao Licupa, 1st Lieut.
(c) Act - Lt. E. Licupa has distinguished himself during his service with the USAFFE since Jan. 26, 1942 by his untiring devotion to duty and his wholehearted faith and loyalty to the United States of America. He has stubbornly refused to surrender, defying the enemy wherever chance presented itself and embracing the dangers, suffering, and sacrifices of

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jungle life without fear of reproach. He is one of the few officers of this regiment who have done a great deal in bringing the 14th Infantry to its present state.

- (d) Recommended for - Award of decoration of the Distinguished Service Medal.

25. (a) Engagement -

(b) Name - Vicente A. Matias, 1st Lieut.

(c) Act - Lt. V. A. Matias was one of the officers of the 14th Infantry who, since the Japanese occupation, was never captured and never surrendered. He was called to the colors in Sept. 1941 and some way of another was not able to join the forces in Bataan. When he realized that the Army in which he belonged could not stem the onslaught of the invader, and that men like him were being hunted and killed like dogs, he fled to the mountains to join his comrades who were already there, and roamed the jungles evading the enemy here but ambushing him there. He patiently overcame all the hardships in the jungle, and exposure to the elements and mercy of jungle denizens. Whenever he got sick his only medicine was his will and determination to live and fight the ruthless foe, and kept the light of patriotism burning in the hearts of his comrades and his men. When the 14th Infantry was properly organized, under Lt-Col Manriquez, he together with the help of other officers, organized companies and succeeded. It was mainly due to the patience and efforts as well as the bravery of Lt. Vicente Matias that the 2nd Bn, 14th Infantry was fully organized.

- (d) Recommended for - Award of decoration of the Distinguished Service Medal.

26. (a) Engagement -

(b) Name - Pedro B. Vea, 1st Lieut.

(c) Act - Lt. P. Vea has distinguished himself during his services with the USAFFE by his unflinching faith and loyalty to the United States Army since Sept. 1st, 1941 up to the present. Spurning the appeals of his former comrades to surrender, he decided to continue fighting the enemy up to the present. He has always been with Lt-Col Arnold until Oct. 28, 1944 when the 14th Infantry, AUS, was incorporated into the 14th Infantry, USAFIP, NL.

- (d) Recommended for - Award of decoration of the Distinguished Service Medal.

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BRIEF HISTORY, 14TH INF

The 14th Inf is a group of scattered troops of the USAFFE consolidated in Nueva Vizcaya province on or about the first week of January 1942.

Gathering what was left of the 1st Bn, 71st Inf, 71st Div, Capt Guillermo Nakar, Commanding Officer of the gallant battalion, withdrew toward Baguio pursued by an overwhelmingly superior enemy force. Finding Baguio already captured and occupied by the enemy, this intrepid warrior proceeded across the Cordillera mountains overcoming all odds and difficulties that are inevitably attendant on jungle trails, and arrived at Aritao, Nueva Vizcaya, about 8 January 1942. Captain Nakar found that Capt Everret L. Warner and Capt Manuel P. Enriquez were already trying to organize stragglers from the 11th Division, 26 Cav (PS), the Headquarters of the 1st Military District who were unable to proceed to Bataan in view of the capture and occupation by the enemy of San Jose, Nueva Ecija, and with a few civilian volunteers who were also gallant leaders undaunted by their being cut off from the USAFFE troops at Bataan, pooled their men together numbering about 800 and formed themselves into a Unit which was temporarily designated 1st Provisional Guerilla Regiment by USAFFE HQ. Contact with USAFFE HQ was established by radio which was brought down from HQ, 1st Military District, Camp Henry T Allen, Banguio City by Sgt Jose Cabanero with the help of native cargadores.

This regiment as it will be seen later, was redesignated 14th Inf., USAFFE. The original set up was as follows:

Regimental Commander - - - Major Everet L. Warner
Ex O and CO, Hq Bn - - - Capt Manuel P. Enriquez
Regt'l Adj & CO, 1st Bn - - 1st Lt Warren A Minton
CO, 2nd Bn. - - - - - Capt Guillermo Nakar.

The location of the different command Posts were as follows:

Regt'l CP & Radio Station - Sto Domingo, Bambang, Nueva Vizcaya
1st Bn - - - - - Dupas, Nueva Vizcaya
2nd Bn - - - - - Comon, Aritao, Nueva Vizcaya

Radiographic contact was made with the General Headquarters of Gen MacArthur. Gen Mac Arthur's Headquarters cognizance of the existence of the 1st Guerilla Regiment and the courageous and unique motives which gave its birth, resulted in the promotion of Cpts Warner, Nakar and Enriquez to Major and the commission of Sgt Jose Cabanero to 3rd Lieutenant about the 3rd week of January 1942. The regiment was made to understand that its principal mission was to harass the enemy and gather enemy information but that it was to preserve its organization by discreetly avoiding direct contact with the enemy. In other words, its mission was combat intelligence. For this purpose the following assignments of sectors were made: Major Nakar and his battalion from Balete Pass to Bato Ferry; Headquarters and 1st Battalion - from Bato Ferry inclusive to Aparri. Itching for action, the 1st Bn on or about 13 January 1942, raided Tuguegarao, Cagayan. This raid was undertaken in conjunction with Capt Praeger's 26th Cav (PS), contingents of the 71st Inf, and few civilian volunteers among them was Francis A. Camp, later on commissioned. The splendid results of this action were the killing of not less than 100 Japs, and the

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destruction on the ground of 3 Jap planes. General Headquarters, USAFFE, was so pleased with the results that it commended and decorated all the Officers and EM that participated in the raid. There were minor subsequent engagements of the troops but casualties inflicted on the enemy could not be determined in view of the lack of means of verification attendant on hit-and-run tactics. Enraged by these intermittent engagements and fervently desirous to exploit the rich sources of food supplies in the Cagayan Valley, the Japanese Imperial Forces made a determined effort to push thru and destroy the USAFFE forces therest. This was about the 3rd week of January, 1942, and the 2nd Bn then under Major Nakar was occupying defensive positions from Bambang to Balete Pass. Then there were reports from Regimental Headquarters to the effect that the Japanese were coming to the Cagayan Valley in two columns, - one thru Highway No. 5 and the other thru the Baguio-Kiangan road. In the last week of January, minor contacts with the feelers of the advancing Japanese Columns up the San Jose-Balete Pass road were made by the outposts of the 2nd Battalion. At this time, there was an increase of aerial reconnaissance by the enemy. On or about the 25th of January, 1942, a message from Major Warner was received by Major Nakar, to proceed to Bayombong with all his troops to assume command of the regiment in view of the illness of both Major Warner and Major Enriquez. Major Nakar, seeing the great possibility of hitting the enemy hard from his vantage positions, requested deferment of the carrying out of the order. The order being repeated the next day was ignored by Major Nakar. A third order was received on or about the 27th in compliance of which Major Nakar pulled out his headquarters and men from San Fernando and all the position they occupied and proceeded to Bayombong, leaving only about a platoon under Lt. Januario Longno to cover the withdrawal.

The 2nd Battalion troops arrived at Bayombong in the morning of the 28th and Major Guillermo Nakar immediately assumed command. A brief conference of the Regimental Staff developed to the issuance of an order to move the troops to Isabela. In view of the meagerness of the means of transportation, the available trucks and other vehicles shuttled the troops to Isabela. On the 29th of January, the advance party of the Jap column was engaged by Lt Longno and his men at Bambang, destroying one truck and one command car and killing 49 troops (Nips). While this engagement was taking place, the movement towards Jones continued. On the same day, Nipponese reconnaissance planes flew over Bagabag where Nakar's troops were still in bivouac. The following day 7 planes bombed Bagabag and Bayombong, hitting the Home Economics Building and the market. Fortunately the troops were already far on their way toward Isabela having moved at night on 28 January 1942.

Upon arrival at Jones, Isabela, on or about 2 Feb 42, the regimental headquarters was established at Maaya where Lt Col Warner assumed command, putting back into operation the Radio Transmitter therest. The 1st Battalion under Capt Minton encamped in Sinauangan, the 2nd Battalion under Major Nakar at Daligan. Radio contact with the USAFFE Headquarters was resumed upon which a message was received directing Lt Col Warner to cease the use of 1st Guerilla Regiment and designated the unit as the 14th Inf. USAFFE.

Shortage of arms, ammunition, medicine and other supplies was beginning to affect the operations as well as the health of the regiment. In response to radiographic appeal for supplies, two planes dropped on 16 February 1942,

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a box of medicine, 2 boxes of ammunition Cal 30, two pairs of shoes for Col Warner and Capt Minton and an envelope containing a CODE and other instructions. Telephone communication for intelligence purposes was established in the provinces of Isabela, Nueva Viscaya and part of Cagayan under Lt Ambrocio operated and manned with members of the Regiment and in some places by volunteer guards.

The 1st Bn under Capt Minton which was mostly composed of civilian volunteers spent its time in training its men. The HQBN under Major Enriquez sent out a few combat reconnaissance patrols and guarded the Regt II CP. The 2nd Bn under Major Nakar was busy harassing the enemy and maintaining Telephone communication.

The following important events happened between February 15, 1942 to the fall of Bataan, April 9, 1942:

A. - HQBN under Major Manuel P Enriquez:

1. - Maintenance of radio contact with HQ Gen MacArthur and later with Gen Weinright and sending in important intelligence information gathered by the intelligence and combat patrols.
2. - Recapture of Beyombong and killing of Miyamoto, Japanese Military Administrator for Nueva Viscaya province on the middle of March, 1942.
3. - Gathering of arms and ammunition from civilians.

B. - 1st Bn under Capt Minton:

1. - Training of Men.
2. - Collecting of arms and ammunition.
3. - Constructing an airstrip at Palacian, Jones, Isabela.

C. - 2nd Bn under Major Guillermo Nakar:

1. - Sending combat intelligence patrols.
2. - Capture of 5 Japs at San Luis, Gorden, Isabela by a patrol led by Lt Ferdin Obina, Lt Bueno, and Acting Officer Ricardo Ambrocio, later on commissioned.
3. - Raids by the Men of Lt Januarico Longno, Lt Mabunga and Lt Rosario between Aritao and Sta Fe on the following dates; 30 January 1942, 12 February 1942, 18 March 1942 and 7 June 1942.
4. - Second raid in Tuguegarao under Lts Obina, Dingoong, Reyes and 24 men on or about March 24, 1942. Result: Jap Guard House was burned, killed and wounded an undetermined number of Japs.

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5. - Capture of 1 Jap soldier south of Aparri by Lt Francis A Camp in the last week of February 1942.
6. - The killing of the 6 Jap prisoners by Lt Col E Warner and Capt Minton for attempting to escape during the 1st week of March 1942.
7. - Collecting of arms and ammunitions from civilians.
8. - Redesignation of Units, 14th Inf in the Middle of March 1942:
 1. - Regt'l Commander still Lt Col E L Warner.
 2. - The 2nd Bn became the HQBN and Major G. Naker became Regt'l Ex O and CO, HQBN.
 3. - The HQBN of Major Enriquez became the 2nd Bn under Major Manuel P. Enriquez.
 4. - The 1st Bn under Capt Minton (no change).
 5. - The Regimental CP moved to Usol, Jones, Isabela.
 6. - The 2nd Bn under Major Enriquez moved to recaptured Bayombong, Nueva Vizcaya.

Capt Robert H Arnold, SC (USA) reported and was assigned with the 14th Inf as S-2 and Signal Officer on 10 April 1942.

As a result of the surrender of Bataan, Lt Col E. L. Warner, Capt Minton and some of the 1st Bn Officers and Men left on 12 April 1942 for Casiguran, Tayabas, after Col Warner had sent a radiogram requesting Gen Wainwright to send a destroyer to pick him up at Casiguran Bay. Gen Wainwright radioed back directing Col Warner to stay with his command. This message was sent by rush messengers to Casiguran but Col Warner, Capt Minton and other Americans had already boarded a reconditioned Jap launch with the intention to go to China.

Major Guillermo Nakar was promoted Lt Col on or about 13 April 1942 and assigned CO 14th Inf by Gen Wainwright; Capt R H Arnold became the CO HQBN; 1st Lt Obina, Actg CO and Ex O, 1st Bn and Major Manuel P Enriquez, CO, 2nd Bn. 2nd Lt Arturo Dingocong was assigned Regimental Adjutant and was promoted 1st Lt on or about 25 April 1942 together with 1st Lt Edmundo Navarro, Ex O, 2nd Bn on same date by Gen Wainwright.

On the fall of Corregidor, no radiographic instructions were received from Gen Wainwright. Our Signal Off. Lt Jose Cabanero reported that the Radio Station at Corregidor stopped all of a sudden and was no longer on the air. Radio broadcasts from KGEI, San Francisco, commented that the order of surrender of Gen Wainwright which was broadcast did not sound like the

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natural voice of Gen Weinwright and further said that if it was Gen Wainwright, he was forced to do it or that he did it under duress. Jap planes dropped surrender leaflets addressed to Lt Col Nakar. Lt Col Theodore Kalakuka was sent to contact Col Nakar in order to make him surrender but Col Nakar had already decided to continue to fight and never to surrender. At this time the HQBN, less one Company was in the Regt CP at Qimallabasa, Jones, Isabela with "A", "C", and 1/2 of "D" Company in around the surrounding barrios of Jones. One Company of the HQBN under Capt Alfonso Baguno was in Cabagan, Isabela, the other half of the "D" Co. under Lt Francis A Camp was at Tuao, Cagayan, and "B" Company under Lt Januario Longo was at San Fernando, Bambang Nueva Vizcaya. The whole of the 2nd Bn under Major Enriquez was spread out from Santiago, Isabela to Bambang, Nueva Vizcaya with headquarters near Bayombong.

In view of the scarcity of food, the lack of sufficient arms, ammunition and medicine, and in order to easily hide the men and at the same time facilitate the gathering and relaying of enemy information for higher headquarters, Lt Col Nakar ordered that the Officers and Men not actually needed in the Regt CP, be tactically dispersed. Each Officer sent out was given a list of the men under him. The men were instructed to report secretly to their Officers at least thrice a week or as often as situation demands. The Officers were instructed to submit S-2 information at least three times a week to the nearest contact station. A series of contact station was already in operation where they were going to. All a Station knows is that it will only relay a message to the next station and nothing more.

On 13 May 1942, the Regt Staff, Radio Station, and around 70 E^M and 10 Off moved upstream the Cagayan River and established its headquarters in a small clearing about 5 Kms from Dombato, Pinappagan, Nueva Vizcaya on 15 May 1942.

The period from 15 May 1942 to 15 June 1942 was devoted to the setting up of Radio transmitter and receiver under Lt Jose Cabanero with the help of Capt Arnold and Sgts Lebroje and Domingo. Officers who were assigned in the gathering of S-2 information were sent out to perfect the intelligence set up as well as the contact and relay station system. In the meantime the units under Lt Camp in the Cagayan and northern Isabela province and those under Major Enriquez and Lt Longo in the province of Nueva Vizcaya were destroying bridges and harassing the enemy who by this time had become too free and careless in their movements making him an easy prey to our small mobile patrols.

On 16 June 1942, the Radio transmitter set was set into operation and the delicate task of contacting a friendly station began. After long and careful deliberation on the procedure to be followed and the messages to be sent in order to deny an enemy station from knowing our real identity and location and at the same time positively determine that we are in contact with a friendly station, the following plan was put into action: Our station was given a call name which sounded like a Java word. It was to send a general call and upon contact with another station, it will ask for the time and then give a message asking the name of the wife of an officer whose ASN was sos and so. (This ASN was the SN of Capt Robert H Arnold, USA) It will further request that the word Mabuhay be broadcast over station KGEI, San Francisco. In the last week of June 1942, contact was made by our Station and the above procedure was followed. The time given by the station we contacted pointed

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Darwin, Australia as its location. However, we were still in doubt. But, about two days later, the name of the wife of Capt Arnold and the word MAUHAY was broadcast over KGEI in the evening. This was followed by a radio message from Gen MacArthur received on 29 June 1942 which partly read as follows:

"LT COL NAKAR:
THE COURAGEOUS AND SPLENDID RESISTANCE MAINTAINED BY YOU
AND YOUR COMMAND FILLS ME WITH PRIDE AND SATISFACTION STOP IT
WILL BE MY PRIVILEGE TO SEE THAT YOU AND YOUR OFFICERS AND MEN
ARE PROPERLY REWARDED AT THE APPROPRIATE TIME STOP X X X X X
MY AFFECTION AND BEST WISHES.

MacARTHUR"

In a radiogram, Col Nakar reported the strength of the regiment which was as far as I can remember 62 officers and 960 enlisted men plus 3 Officers and 140 enlisted men of the Philippine Constabulary who were attached.

In one of the first messages from Gen MacArthur the mission of the 114th Inf was specified and that was to obtain and transmit intelligence information to GHQ, SWPA. In order to accomplish this end, Col NAKAR asked for \$5,000.00 to be spent solely for intelligence purposes. This request was approved by Gen MacArthur. On the strength of this authority, civilian S-2 agents were employed with salaries ranging from \$50.00 to \$150.00. However, these agents were never paid on account of fact that no funds could be obtained locally. Intelligence coverage was expanded to include as far south as Manila and as far north as Aparri. S-2 reports were sent to Gen MacArthur covering all kinds of information about enemy movements, installations, concentrations as well as the kind of treatment the Filipino and American prisoners of War was receiving in the concentration Camp. The men and officers sent out for S-2 work also carried with them a one-page mimeographed newspaper called the "SPIRIT OF BATAAN" and signed MATANGLAWING (Hawks Eye). This paper did not serve only as the only means by which the people were informed of the true happening of the war but also warned the civil population from aiding the enemy in any form.

On 14 July 1942 a message from Gen MacArthur was received directing Col Nakar that he may induct the PA troops under his command into the Army of the United States effective 14 July 1942. This same radiogram contained the pay and allowances of US Army personnel from Pvt to Colonel. Same Radiogram also had the ASN Block for Officer and Enlisted Men to be assigned to the 114th Inf AUS which as follows: - For Officers - O-388670 to O-388169; for Enlisted Men - 10626000 to 10626999. This was immediately circularized to the officers and men of the regiment (See inclosure) and the officers and men in the regimental Command Post and vicinity were immediately inducted into the AUS and given ASN. Capt. Fermin Obina and Lt Julian Perdeguiros were delegated and sent out for the induction of the men and officers of the HQBN and 1st Bn while Manor Manuel P. Enriquez was delegated to induct the 2nd Bn which was at that time spread out in Nueva Vizcaya and eastern Pangasinan. In view of the distance there and the difficulties of transportation and communication the induction was slow and delayed specially in the units of the 2nd Bn. Col Nakar however, in order to be fair to all ordered that all induction be dated 14 July 1942. Because of this he sent a message to SWPA stating that

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ALL officers and men were inducted into the AUS on 14 July 1942. Lists of all Officers and Enlisted Men inducted into the AUS with their ASN were kept in the Regimental CP together with the oaths of Office for Officers.

The present discrepancies in the assignment of ASN for Officers can be traced in this manner; In the first place the officers ASN as was first received by us had only two 8's or only 0-88070 - 0-88169. Take my case as an example, I was given ASN 0-88079 as a First Lieutenant and was recommended for promotion with the same ASN. When the correction was made to 888070, I was already promoted Captain and another seniority list was made. I was this time assigned ASN 888075. I was therefore using ASN 0-888075 until I was given an extract copy of my SO promoting me to Captain wherein my ASN was 0-888079. This is true with almost all the Officers. The only thing to do now is to inform all the officers to use the first ASN given them adding one more 8 or to reassign serial numbers to officers whose serial numbers were not reported by radio to GHQ, SWPA.

In the last week of July 1942, a radiogram from GHQ, SWPA was received inquiring as to where personnel could be landed to contact the 14th Inf AUS. This message was answered requesting information as to how the personnel will be landed - by parachute from a plane or by submarine. Meanwhile a patrol was immediately sent to Casiguran, Tayabas to establish an outpost and a reception point to receive the personnel if they will be landed by submarine.

Radiogram was received promoting the following officers effective 2nd August 1942 to ranks as follows:

One of the last messages received on 12 August 1942 from GHQ, SWPA before the Radio Station was dismantled due to the reports that the enemy had located the station and was sending patrols to capture it was one which asked for the order of battle of the Japanese Army in the Philippines. This message was never answered. The radio set, after SWPA was duly notified that contact will be resumed on the 27th or 28th of August 1942, was dismantled and together with complete set of records was placed in a big Galvanized Iron tank and buried in the ground near the edge of the forest. Two other sets of records were oiled

placed in small cans, and buried about 200 to 300 yards inside the forest.

Beginning the first of July 1942, the Japanese Imperial Army after it failed to get any results in inducing Col Nakar to surrender, launched the most intensive and systematic mopping up operations against the troops of Col Nakar in the Gagayan Valley. These operations were conducted by Infantry troops, planes, Japs and Filipino MP's and Ganaps and was marked with indiscriminate bombing, imprisonment of suspected persons, torture, and atrocities of the highest order. However, the Japs did not gain much headway in the gaining of correct information about the whereabouts of Col Nakar and his troops. In retaliation of the atrocities committed by the Japs and partly because of the increased obstacles to be overcome in the securing of valuable S-2 information, our patrols had to fight it out with the Japs resulting to more torture and brutalities and later on during the last week of July some civilians and Enlisted Men who had a little more knowledge than they should have concerning the 14th Inf AUS were captured. Lt Leandro Rosario one of the few officers who were able to visit Col Nakar in our Reg't CP at Domabato, Pinappagan, Nueva Viscaya surrendered to the Japs in Bayambang and was reported to have been very close to the Japs. These events lead to the dismantling of the radio station and the burying of the records as was previously mentioned. On or about 25 August 1942 approximately two companies of Japs occupied Pinappagan, Nueva Viscaya. Two days before the arrival of the Japs however, Col Nakar issued orders that no fighting should be done in Pinappagan and that everybody should pretend to be civilians. Lt Jose Cabanero was left near the place where the radio and records were buried and I with Major Arnold, Lt Heib, two other American soldiers and around 35 EM about half of whom were sick of Malaria, encamped about 5 kilometers from our regimental CP. A day before the Japs arrived at Pinappagan, Col Nakar left for a barricade near Jones, Isabela. His intention was to watch the Japanese more closely in order to be able to determine what the Japs knew about Pinappagan and their plans. On 28 August 1942 the Japs left Pinappagan for Jones but returned two days later with a bigger force and with Lt Antonio Castro and another soldier by the name Colcol as prisoners. On the 13 of September our old regimental CP was raided by the Japs guided by Colcol. Finding the Camp empty, the Japs burned all the shelters. My group moved out to another secret place known only to 2 or 3 civilians. But one of our contact men by the name of Del Rosario, a PC soldier, was captured without our knowledge and after he was tortured, he guided the Japs to our bivouac area on 14 Sept 42. Early on the morning of 15 Sept my camp was raided and after a short encounter between the Japs and our men that covered our withdrawal, I and 2 of my soldiers who were sick were surrounded in a thicket and taken prisoners. Sgts Pablo Villanobles and Mayoga who were too sick to run stayed behind and fired at the Japs until they were killed. Casualties on the side of the Japs could not be determined.

I was taken to the Jap garrison at Pinappagan and was investigated and tortured as I refused to give any information. Only the people of Pinappagan Major Arnold, and Colonels Warner and Kalakuka who later on visited me in my cell could tell how I was tortured as a result of my refusal to give out the secrets of the regiment. On 17 September 1942 Lt Leandro Rosario arrived at Pinappagan with Co Ide and a regiment of Japanese soldiers. Rosario delivered speeches telling the people that they should cooperate with the Japs and reveal the secrets of the 14th Inf.

An important fact here has to be mentioned as it was responsible for the capture of Col Nakar, the radio, the records, and the surrender of some of the officers and men. This fact was that Lt Rosario founded the town of Pinappagan and his words were very much respected by the people. However, the people tried hard to keep the secrets of the 11th Inf until Rosario and the Japs gave out an ultimatum that all will be killed if no one will tell the truth about the radio and Col Nakar. The people softened and with the squealing of an Aglipayan priest by the named of Castillo the radio was located and dugged out by Rosario and the Japs on or about the last week of September 1942. The capture of Col Nakar in a cave near Minuri, Jones, Isabela on 29 September by the Japs with the help of Sabaluca, (chief of police of Jones) and 300 Ganaps followed. Lt Rosario once boasted to me in my prison cell that he was going to get a medal from the Emperor for the capture of Col Nakar and his radio. Lt Rosario and his co-spies who received medals for the capture of Col Nakar and the radio did wear their medals but they all disappeared before the US Army returned to the Philippines to give them a chance to assert that they were not spies, traitors nor collaborators.

The other two sets of records buried in the forest were according to reliable information also found by the Japs in one of their excavation patrols to our CP in which Colonels Warner and Kalakuka were present. The Japs in these excavation patrols used from 200 to 300 civilians with an equal number of Japs and with crowbars and sharpened sticks combed the vicinity of our old CP for buried records, supplies, equipment, and valuables. They did this for almost two weeks and at the end of this period, they got practically everything except the buried can where the radio tubes, crystals, codes, and other important parts of the radio set were placed. This can was later on accidentally dug out by civilians about 2 years after but the contents were already decayed.

On 23 October 1942, all the Japs in Pinappagan moved down to Jones, Isabela with all their prisoners namely: Lt-Colonels Warner and Kalakuka, lieutenants Zeigler and Antonio Castro, the two soldiers who were captured with me, Judge Catalino Valbuena of Pinappagan who was our S-2 agent and who never squealed in spite of the severe torture he received from the Japs, and myself. Judge Valbuena and the two soldiers were bayoneted on the way 5 kms north of Pinappagan and before we reached Jones, Lt Castro and I were taken each by four Japs their rifles with fixed bayonets to the Cagayan River. When the Japs were about to bayonet me, I broke loose and ran. I heard four shots and then I dove to the river and swam with with the current downstream. I successfully evaded the Jap and Ganap guards on the way and reported back to the camp of Major Arnold the following day 24 October 1942 at Pinappagan, Nueva Vizcaya. From 24 October 1942 to September 1944, Maj Arnold commanded the remnants of the 11th Inf, AUS who were hiding and had never surrendered between Jones, Isabela and Pinappagan, Nueva Vizcaya. This group consisted of 8 officers namely: Major Arnold, Lts Harley F Heib, Leonardo Galima, Gervacio Reys, Enrique Cruz, Pedro Ves, Benjamin Aviles, myself and about 60 enlisted men. This group under Major Arnold was always busy evading the enemy. This was because in the rosters that the Japs were able to capture, they could tell that there were many more officers who were not yet accounted for including Major Arnold, Lt Heib, and Pvt Mangemelli all Americans. The enemy which sometimes reach as many as 800 Japs and Ganaps were always busy patrolling Jones and Pinappagan until August of

1944 when the last garrison of Japanese and PC soldiers was pulled out of Pinappagan. In this extended mopping up operations the Japs suffered much as many died of malaria and equipment and supplies were destroyed or lost especially when they have to cross the rivers during floods.

Units of the 14th Infantry under Lt Juaquin Duncan fought the Japs in the Mallig region of Isabela until the middle of 1943 when it had to suspend its operations due to lack of arms and ammunitions. Lt Francis A Camp in Cagayan also carried on the fight until he was captured sometime in 1943. The 2nd Bn under Major Manuel P Enriquez continued defying the Japs in eastern Pangasinan and Nueva Viscaya. When Maj Enriquez surrendered to the Japs at Baguio on 13 April 1943, Capt Romulo A Manriques who had joined the 2nd Bn and was at this time the Ex O, assumed command of the 2nd Bn. The 2nd Bn under Capt Manriques (now a Lt-Colonel and studying at Fort Leavenworth) continued the fight and grew into a little less than a regiment so that when Col Russell W Volekmann organized the USAFIP, NL command, the 2nd Bn, 14th Inf, AUS became the 14th Inf, USAFIP, NL.

In January, 1944 Major Arnold received a message from Col Volekmann requesting him to report to Col Volekmann's Headquarters. Major Arnold, however, was not able to get out of Pinappagan due to the presents of large enemy troops still around Pinappagan and Jones. In the first week of October 1944 situation eased up and Maj Arnold seeing the need for more men, inducted around 40 men into the Army of the United States. These men were picked in recognition of their loyalty and the great sacrifice they had made for the preservation of the 14th Inf, AUS.

Sometimes in the middle of October, 1944 Maj Arnold left our unit in Pinappagan and Jones in order to confer with Col Volekmann as to who should command the 14th Inf. Maj Arnold's intention was to get back the command of the 14th Inf. inasmuch as he was the most ranking officer left after Col Makar was captured. The outcome of the conference was however, the assignment of Maj Arnold as CO, 15th Inf, USAFIP, NL and the incorporation of the remnants of the 14th Inf, AUS, which were under me at that time into the 14th Inf, USAFIP, NL on 28 October 1944. From hereon the activities of the remnants of the 14th Inf, AUS who had joined the 14th, 11th, 66th, and 15th, Inf Regts of USAFIP, NL can be gathered in the battles that these regiments fought in the liberation of the Cagayan, Isabella, Nueva Viscaya, Pangasinan and Iloos provinces of Northern Luzon.

The 14th Inf, AUS lost its identity with the organization of the USAFIP, NL as the scattered officers and men could no longer be grouped together in view of the presence of spies and Japs, the need for immediate action, and in order to avoid friction among the different regiments to which officers and men of the 14th Inf AUS had joined. In my humble opinion the officers and men of the 14th Inf, AUS under Col Guillermo Makar had made a worthy contribution in the organization and successful operations of the various units of the USAFIP, NL command under Col Volekmann especially in the 14th, 11th, and 15th Infantry Regiments.

1. THIS HQ IS ENGAGED IN DETERMINING THE STATUS OF THE 14TH
INF REGT, A GUERRILLA ORGANIZATION ORGANIZED ON NORTHERN LUZON DURING
THE SUMMER OF 1942 AND ALLEGEDLY FEDERALIZED BY AUTHORITY FROM SWPA

1. Your communication on the above subject has been received and reviewed. I believe that the rosters are substantially correct. Actually the original rosters of the 14th Infantry were destroyed in 1942 when their capture by the enemy appeared imminent. I did note, however, two discrepancies: Lt. Emilio Madarang (No. 18) was not, to my knowledge, authorized for induction into the Army of the United States, and the officer along side of No. 23 under the caption "Officers Known to Have Been Killed" whose name is Leandro Rosario was actually killed by members of the 14th Infantry for repeated treason and espionage for the Japanese. A number of other officers and men on these lists were, it is believed, also guilty of collaboration with the enemy, and a number surrendered voluntarily to the enemy and were later given their freedom when they took oaths of loyalty to the Japanese Government in the Philippines. I am not now in a position to identify these names, but they can be accurately determined, it is believed, if investigations are made in Northern Luzon by loyal officers in the Philippine Army.

2. It may be of interest and value for you to know that after the fall of Corregidor I was Commanding Officer of the Headquarters Battalion 14th Infantry, P.A. In the latter part of June 1942 we were able to establish radio communication with the Headquarters SWPA. Actually, at this time, the largest part of the 14th Infantry, P.A. had been disbanded upon orders of the regimental commander, so that when a radiogram was received from Australia signed "MacArthur" authorizing the induction into the A.U.S. of the personnel of the 14th Infantry, P.A., it was impossible to induct all of the members who had formerly been in this regiment prior to the wholesale disbandment that had occurred. The number of officers and men listed in the roster you mailed me is approximately correct.

3. Insofar as the original rosters are concerned, it is believed that Major Arturo Dingcong, who served loyally under my command, is the best authority, but as regards the subsequent loyalty of these men and officers, it is recommended that further check of these records be made to determine if said personnel is entitled to the same treatment accorded other A.U.S. personnel.

The Chief, Adj Br, recommends that:

- a. All PA enlisted men who served with the 14th Inf in Jul 42 and can submit acceptable evidence indicating induction into the AUS be confirmed as AUS personnel.
- b. All PA officers on duty with the 14th Inf in Jul 42 be processed as AUS personnel, provided that incontrovertible evidence of appointment and/or subsequent promotion is presented, irrespective of the fact that their names may appear on one of DINGCONG'S rosters. Burden of proof will at all times rest with the claimant.
- c. Any enlistments in the 14th Inf made after Jul 42, when it is clear that such enlistments were effected without authority, be regarded as PA inductions and processed accordingly.
- d. Enlisted men confirmed in the AUS who later accepted guerilla appointments be allowed to choose between continuance of AUS enlisted status or acceptance of appointment in PA.
- e. Upon confirmation, new army serial numbers from blocks authorized to this Division be assigned to Each person concerned.
- f. In order to expedite processing of 14th Inf personnel, the Chief, Adj Br, be granted authority to determine grades of 14th Inf officers claiming AUS status on the basis of evidence submitted without forwarding each case to the Dir for consideration and approval.
15. While processing of 14th Inf personnel whose names are available in this Div is under way, this Branch will continue its investigation to determine actual strength of 14th Inf and number of AUS inductions effected in Jul 42, as suggested in pars 10 and 11, above. Upon completion of same, appropriate action will be taken.

6. Lt Col Makar was captured in the late fall of 1942, and his radio with him. After that time the majority of his force broke up, some surrendering and the others breaking away to go home or join other units.

DISCUSSION

1. The 14th Infantry was authorized by GHR, SIFA in July 42, and all personnel formerly PA became AUS. There is no indication that civilian volunteers, if any, had other than PA status.

2. Records of strength as of July 1942 are available and list of certain officer promotions are available. The roster of the organization was kept by Lt Col Makar and is presumed lost.

3. Radio quoted by subject person was transmitted and is, in meaning, correctly restated.

4. The letter of 26 April 1945 to TAG, PA cannot be located.

Dear General MacArthur,

Sir, I have been waiting for a chance to see you personally but because I do not seem to have any hope of having that chance, I dared to write you this personal letter.

I was the CO of the Hq. & Hq. Co., 1st Bn., 71st Infantry, 71st Division under the then Capt. MALAR (Bn Comdr). On 21 Dec. 1941, we retreated from Bauang, Ia Union to Nueva Viscaya thru the Caraballo Mountains. We gathered the disorganized forces of the 11th, 13th and 71st Infantries and formed them into one Regiment subsequently called the 14th Infantry as per radiogram of Gen. M., USAFFE. After the fall of Bataan and Corregidor, attempts to contact the General Headquarters, USAFFE, Australia, were constantly made and succeeded on July 1942. The first radiogram that we received from Station WDM, Port Darwin, North Australia, was as follows: - "Lt. Col. MALAR, Your splendid resistance fills me with pride and admiration. It will not be a long time that you, your officers and men will be amply rewarded. (SGD) MACARTHUR".

In view hereof, may I please be informed at your earliest convenience in the manner and form you deem proper whether orders of army rank promotions sent thru this Station were valid and confirmed. This information will be of great help to my request for rank verification dated 26 April 1945 addressed to The Adjutant General (PA) and to similar request made by other Officers and Listed Men of the said Regiment because I happened to be one of those Officers in said Regiment whose order of promotion was believed to have been sent thru this Station.

Lt. Col. WARDNER, PA, USA, Maj. ARNOLD, MC, USA, Capt. LENTON, Cavalry, USA, Sgt. REID, USA, and several other American Reserved Officers of the USA then working in the Mines were with us, we offered resistance against the Japanese in the Cagayan Valley, part of the Pangasinan Province and Mt. Province for five months after the fall of Corregidor. When our radio transmitter and Regimental Commander were captured and in obedience to memorandum received by me from Lt. Col. MALAR, I surrendered with my unit to the Japanese Imperial Forces at Bayambang, Nueva Viscaya.

Ever since the organization of the 14th Infantry, I was the CO, Hq. & Hq. Co., 1st Bn., 14th Infantry, 11th Division and 3-2 at the same time, thus, I was well informed of all outgoing and incoming official communications.

When Gen. MARSHALL and Gen. VALDES visited the 2nd Repl Bn (PA) Camp Calasiao, Pangasinan, I asked Gen. MARSHALL the same question but

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I was not very much clarified of his answer. So Sir, I dared sending this letter to you for a definite and clear statement for the sake of the Officers and Men of the 14th Infantry who have now reported to duty.

1. Summarized below is the story of the 14th Inf (PA), based on a narrative of Capt ARTURO BINGGONO, former Regtl Adj, attached hereto (Incl 1, Tab A). The following developments in the organization's history are pertinent to a proper determination of its status:

a. In the early part of Jan 42, remnants of various PA units withdrawing from northern and western Luzon met in Aritao, Nueva Vizcaya. Cut off from the USAFFE forces to the South, these units pooled their strength of some 800 men and were reformed as the 1st Provisional Guerrilla Regt under Lt Col EVERETT L. WARNER. Subordinate officers were: Maj MANUEL P. ENRIQUEZ, Ex Off and CO, Hq Bn; Capt WARREN A. MINTON, Regtl Adj and CO, 1st Bn; and Lt Col GUILLERMO NAKAR, CO 2d Bn.

b. In Feb 42, Gen MacARTHUR's hq redesignated the unit as the 14th Inf (PA).

c. Upon the surrender of Bataan, Lt Col WARNER and a few of his officers and enlisted men left for Casiguran Bay with the intention of making their way to China. The Regt was thereupon placed under the command of Lt Col NAKAR by order of Gen WAINWRIGHT.

d. Following the surrender of Corregidor, officers and men not actually needed in the Regt CP were "tactically dispersed" and instructed to gather and transmit intelligence to designated officers. About 70 enlisted men and 10 officers accompanied the Regtl Staff when the hq was moved to Pinappagan on 13 May 42. Meanwhile, mobile patrols in the Cagayan, Northern Isabela and Nueva Vincaya provinces, under Maj ENRIQUEZ, Lt CAMP and Lt LONGO, were engaged in sabotage and harrassing the enemy.

e. On 29 Jun 42 rad contact was established with Australia. SWPA outlined the unit's mission as one of gathering and transmitting intelligence. The current strength of the Regt was reported as follows: 62 officers and 960 enlisted men, 3 officers and 140 enlisted men of the PG attached.

f. On 14 Jul 42 Col NAKAR received a rad from Gen MacARTHUR authorizing induction of the PA personnel under his command into the

AUS. Some had authorized issuance of army serial numbers from the following blocks: 10626000 to 10626999 for enlisted men and O-988070 to O-988169 for officers.

g. Some difficulties were encountered in completing the induction process because units of the Regt were scattered over a wide area. According to Capt DINGCONG:

"...the officers and men in the regimental Command Post and vicinity were immediately inducted into the AUS and given ASN. Capt FERRIN CHINA and 1st JULIAN PEREZBURRO were delegated and sent out for the induction of the men and officers of the 1st Bn and 1st Co while Major HANSEL P. BULLOCK was delegated to induct the 2nd Bn. which at that time was spread out in Nueva Vizcaya and eastern Pangasinan. In view of the distance and the difficulties of transportation and communication the induction was slow and delayed, especially in the units of the 2nd Bn. Col HAKAR, however, in order to be fair to all, ordered that all inductions be dated 14 July 1942. Because of this he sent a message to USA stating that all officers and men were inducted into the AUS on 14 July 1942..." (Note: The three officers mentioned in quotation have not survived.)

h. Errors were also made in the assignment of army serial numbers, particularly in the case of officers, so that numerous discrepancies now exist.

i. In Jul the Japanese forces launched an offensive against the 14th Inf and succeeded in capturing the Regt CP, rad apparatus and records. Some of the officers and men surrendered along with Col HAKAR on 29 Sep 42. Capt DINGCONG himself was ambushed and captured on 15 Sep 42.

j. Following HAKAR's surrender, the organization dispersed, a few of its component units operating independently of each other. The hq group, consisting of some 60 enlisted men and 7 officers, came under the command of (then) Maj H. H. ARNOLD, the ranking AUS officer. Upon his escape from the Japanese on 23 Oct 42, Capt DINGCONG reported to Maj ARNOLD. This unit remained intact though relatively inactive in the vicinity of Pinappagan until 28 Oct 44, when it was incorporated within the reorganized 14th Inf under DRAFT, M. About 40 additional enlisted men were inducted into the AUS by Maj ARNOLD during the FAXA unit of Oct 44.

k. Other 14th Inf units operating independently were: a group under Lt JOAQUIN DUNOAN which fought in the Mallig region until mid-43, when operations were suspended because of a shortage of arms and ammunition; and a unit under Lt FRANCIS A. CAMP in Cagayan, active until its CO was captured some time in 1943.

1. A larger group consisting of remnants of the 2d Bn, 14th Inf, continued resistance in eastern Pangasinan and Nueva Vizcaya under the command of Maj MANUEL P. BERRIOZUEZ until his surrender on 19 Apr 43, when it was taken over by its ex Off, (then) Capt ROMULO A. MARIQUETE. This unit gradually developed into almost full regt strength and, in Oct 44, was reorganized as the 14th Inf under USAPIP, HL. It was at this time also that the eastern branch of the Regt, which had been under ARNOLD's command, was incorporated within the reorganized 14th Inf.

2. Inclosed statement of Lt Col R. H. ARNOLD (Incl 2, Tab B), former CO of the Hq Bn and leader of the eastern branch of the Regt following NAKAR's surrender (see par 1j, above), contains these additional data:

a. After the fall of Corregidor, Lt Col NAKAR was persuaded not to surrender. As an alternative, he disbanded "all but about 200 of his 800 men and some of his approximately 80 officers."

b. When BPA, as a reward for his refusal to surrender, authorized NAKAR to induct the personnel of his command into the AUS, about 200 men and 40 officers were so inducted.

c. After NAKAR's surrender, ARNOLD "assumed command of all soldiers and officers who were not yet disbanded or captured or killed." The statement continues: "In June 1944, I heard of another branch of the 14th Infantry operating under Major MARIQUETE who was under Col VOLKEMANN. Contact was established as soon as possible. I understand that Major BERRIOZUEZ, who had been C.O., 2d Bn., 14th Infantry, PA, did not surrender until a later date and, after the capture of Lieut. Colonel NAKAR, claimed to have been the C.O. of the 14th Infantry. I do not know how many troops he had initially but I do know that most of his troops, except the Visayan soldiers numbering about 60, had been disbanded upon orders from Lieut. Col. NAKAR immediately after the fall of Corregidor."

3. Confirmation of statement referred to in par 1f, above, is contained in C/N, dated 25 Jun 42, which originated in the CA Sec, USAFFE TG (Incl 3, Tab C). In par 3 thereof, a message from MacARTHUR to HAKAR, dated 12 Jul 42, is quoted as follows:

"ALL OFFICERS PHILIPPINE ARMY YOUR FORCE APPOINTED OFFICERS ARMY US IN PA GRADES NOW HELD EFFECTIVE ON DATE OF ACCEPTANCE STOP ALL THIRD LIEUTENANTS APPOINTED SECOND LIEUTENANTS STOP YOU MAY ENLIST ALL PA SOLDIERS YOUR FORCE IN ARMY US IN GRADES NOW HELD IN PA STOP..."

In par 4 of same C/N, reference is made to HAKAR's reply, dated 15 Jul 42, stating: "Officers of 14th Inf PA accepted commission in USA and 21 of this regiment all enlisted in USA as of July 14, 1942."

4. In reply to an inquiry by this Div, the only information re the 14th Inf available at GHR APPAG is a rad from MacARTHUR to HAKAR, dated 16 Jul 42, stating that the organization "retains designation as 14th Inf PA despite the fact that personnel now belong to Army of the United States" (Incl 4, Tab D).

5. Incls 5 and 6 (Tabs E and F) represent memoranda to officers and enlisted men of 14th Inf, dated 14 Jul 42, signed by (then) 1st Lt ARTURO BINGONG, Regtl Adj, and Lt Col GUILLERMO HAKAR, GO, respectively, announcing that authority had been received to enlist all enlisted men and appoint all officers in the AUS. Incl 7 (Tab G) is another memo of 14th Inf Hq, dated 5 Aug 42, outlining the procedure to be followed in enlisting personnel in the AUS.

6. While it seems clear from the foregoing that the personnel of the 14th Inf on active duty on or about 14 Jul 42 was given AUS status as a reward for continuing its resistance against the enemy, no authentic information is available as to the exact or even approximate strength of the Regt at that time. Data now in our possession contain these discrepancies:

a. There is the testimony of Capt BINGONG (see par 1e) that on 29 Jun 42, when rad contact was established with Australia, the strength of the 14th Inf was reported to be 62 officers and 960 enlisted men. The fact that about two weeks later GHPA issued a block of 1000 army serial numbers for enlisted and 100 for officers lends support to this allegation.

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Status of 14th Inf (PA) (Cont'd.)

b. Lt Col ARNOLD contends that after the fall of Comregidor all but 200 of NAKAR's 800 men and some of his 80 officers were disbanded (see par 2a, above). Capt BINGCOG's version of the same development is stated thus: "In view of the scarcity of food, the lack of sufficient arms, ammunition and medicine, and in order to easily hide the men and at the same time facilitate the gathering and relaying of enemy information for higher headquarters, Lt Col NAKAR ordered that the officers and men not actually needed in the Regtl CP be tactically dispersed..." (page 6, Incl 1).

7. Even greater confusion exists as to the number of enlisted men and officers actually enlisted or appointed in the AUS. The most concrete evidence of such indications now available exists in the form of six rosters prepared in the course of the past few months by Capt BINGCOG (Incls 8, 9, 10, 11, 12 and 13, Tabs H, I, J, K, L and M). After cataloguing the names on these rosters and eliminating duplicate listings, they were found to total about 398 enlisted men and 69 officers. It is believed that for the most part this group can be considered as eligible for confirmation as AUS personnel. Because of the confusion involved, it is not considered wise to confer AUS status automatically upon all personnel whose names appear on BINGCOG's rosters. While the rosters may be used as a guide, each individual's affidavit and supporting documents will have to determine the decision made in each case.

8. One of these rosters includes the names of 62 enlisted men "recruited by then Maj ARNOLD" (Incl 12). Presumably, this group is the same one referred to by Capt BINGCOG in par 1j, above, as having been enlisted in Oct 44. Lt Col ARNOLD did not have the authority to recruit or enlist men in the AUS. Unlike the case of Trp C, 26th Cav (PA), which was authorized by SFA to maintain its strength and therefore enlist replacements, the only authority SFA extended to Lt Col NAKAR in Jul 42, as clearly stated in the rad itself (see par 3 of Incl 3), was to induct enlisted men and appoint officers in the AUS already under NAKAR's command. Had SFA intended to grant authority to enlist personnel in the 14th Inf as replacements were needed, it is believed that the 12 Jul rad would have been as clear on the point as the rad to Maj FRASER of Trp C, 26th Cav (PA). It is therefore recommended that the group of men enlisted by Lt Col ARNOLD, as well as others who were not under NAKAR's command on 14 Jul 42 but were inducted later, be processed as PA and not AUS personnel.

Status of 14th Inf (PA) (Cont'd)

9. In addition to the six rosters submitted by Capt DINGGONG, two others have come to the attention of this Div. One (Incl 14, Tab H) is an original roster representing the make-up of Co "B", 1st Bn, 14th Inf, under Lt J. A. LONGO, as of 30 Jun 42, or about two weeks prior to the receipt of authority from SHPA to enlist 14th Inf Personnel in the AUS. Only 18 names on this list appear on any of DINGGONG's rosters, but it is conceivable that men in this unit may have been enlisted in the AUS. The second list (Incl 15, Tab O) contains names of military personnel now serving with PA units who claim to have been "regular members of the 14th Inf (AUS)." Of the persons listed, only 7 names are to be found on one or more of DINGGONG's rosters. It is believed that in the case of these two groups the wisest course to follow would be to consider each case on its merits with the view of determining whether or not the individuals involved were actually inducted into the AUS. Such a determination will be greatly simplified after their affidavits and all supporting documents are available for study. The burden of proof, however, should rest with the claimant.

10. It is apparent that a wide discrepancy exists between the number of men allegedly on duty at the time red contact with Australia was established and the number accounted for in the rosters described in par 7, above. Further investigation will be necessary before this discrepancy can be removed. The problem to be solved is the exact strength of the 14th Inf at the time authority was received to enlist its personnel in the AUS and, complementing this, the number of men, if any, who were on duty in areas removed from the Regt CP but who may have been enlisted at a later date on the basis of the same authority.

11. This Div has already contacted Lt Cole ARNOLD and MARLENE, each of whom commanded remnants of the Regt independently of the other after NAKAR's and MARLENE's surrender, in order to gain a clearer perspective of the history of the 14th Inf and, particularly, to reach a definite conclusion as to the exact number of men actually inducted into the AUS. Unless this is conclusively determined, this Div may find itself swamped with claims to AUS status from personnel in the 14th Inf who joined that organization after Jul 42. It will be noted, in this connection, that the Station List of recognized guerrilla units, 10th MI, dated 5 Jan 45, gives the strength of the 14th Inf after 9 Jan 45 as 110 officers and 2648 enlisted men. It is therefore believed that while the group of men listed on rosters now in the possession of this Div can be processed at this time, further investigation must be made to determine the actual number of enlistments in the AUS made in

Jul 42. After the necessary data is obtained, appropriate action can be taken in all cases still unprocessed. In the course of processing the first group, undoubtedly additional light will be thrown on the problem of whether AUS enlistments were actually effected in units separated from the 14th Inf Regt. CP.

12. It is to be noted that among the personnel now ready for processing, some officers and enlisted men were given promotion after contact with Australia was broken and after the 14th Inf was reorganized under USAFIP, HL. It is believed that all claims to promotions should be adjudicated on the same basis as that employed in the case of other AUS personnel who served with the guerrillas. In the case of enlisted men, acceptable evidence of promotion will be submitted. In the case of officers, each claimant will be required to submit admissible evidence of promotion and proof that duties performed were commensurate with grade claimed. Claims of officers will also be verified with guerrilla leaders concerned. In the case of enlisted men duly inducted into the AUS and later appointed officers in the guerrillas, it is believed that such persons should be offered the choice of retaining their enlisted AUS status or accepting their guerrilla appointments in the PA.

13. Because of the errors made in the assignment of serial numbers to officers of the 14th Inf, and because some of the enlisted men have forgotten their army serial numbers, it is believed that further confusion will be avoided by reassigning army serial numbers to those officers and enlisted men whose status in the AUS is confirmed from a new block of serial numbers.

14. In view of the considerations set forth above, the Chief, Adj Br, recommends that:

a. All PA enlisted men who served with the 14th Inf in Jul 42 and can submit acceptable evidence indicating induction into the AUS be confirmed as AUS personnel.

b. All PA officers on duty with the 14th Inf in Jul 42 be processed as AUS personnel, provided that incontrovertible evidence of the fact that their names may appear on one of DEBOSSING's rosters. Burden of proof will at all times rest with the claimant.

c. Any enlistments in the 14th Inf made after Jul 42, when it is clear that such enlistments were effected without authority, be regarded as PA inductions and processed accordingly.

d. Enlisted men confirmed in the AUS who later accepted guerrilla appointments be allowed to choose between continuance of AUS enlisted status or acceptance of appointment in PA.

e. Upon confirmation, new army serial numbers from blocks authorized to this Division be assigned to each person concerned.

f. In order to expedite processing of 14th Inf personnel, the Chief, Adj Br, be granted authority to determine grades of 14th Inf officers claiming AUS status on the basis of evidence submitted without forwarding each case to the Dir for consideration and approval.

15. While processing of 14th Inf personnel whose names are available in this Div is under way, this Branch will continue its investigation to determine actual strength of 14th Inf and number of AUS inductions effected in Jul 42, as suggested in pars 10 and 11, above. Upon completion of same, appropriate action will be taken.

1. In compliance with paragraph 3, basic letter, the following is a summary of action taken by this headquarters regarding the 14th Infantry project:

a. A roster of 14th Infantry personnel who have been recognized as the bonafide members of the organization and were inducted into the Army of the United States in Jul 42 has been compiled. Claims of individuals who allege to have been inducted into the Army of the United States are being accepted and to date there are approximately six thousand claims on hand with an average receipt of six daily. It is estimated that from the six thousand cases only three hundred have bonafide claims. Considering this small number, a careful review is now in progress which involves a close examination of each individual's case to insure that only the bonafide members are confirmed.

b. It would appear on the surface that utilizing the roster mentioned above would automatically eliminate every individual who does not appear; however, many false claimants have submitted claims under names appearing on the roster with substantiating evidence in the form of affidavits, while others have submitted numerous affidavits explaining why they were omitted from the roster and why they should be confirmed personnel of the Army of the United States. These claims must be carefully scrutinized and disposed of in a manner satisfactory to both the claimant and this headquarters.

c. There has been no determination of status and grades for 14th Infantry living personnel forwarded to your office subsequent to Apr 47 the date action was suspended to secure additional evidence and serial numbers.

d. It is expected that claims which are positive will have determinations of status and grades completed and appropriate reports forwarded to the interested agencies by 30 Jun 48. Individuals whose claims are determined negative are now being notified.

2. After 30 Jun 48 this command will furnish your office a roster of individuals who have status in the Army of the United States by virtue of their service with the 14th Infantry together with a complete summary of the project.

SUMMARY OF THE 14TH INFANTRY PROJECT

26 Jul 1948

- I. The following is a summary of events related strictly to the administration of claims under the Missing Persons Act of 14th Infantry (PA) personnel who were inducted into the Army of the United States in July 1942 under the authority contained in radio from MacArthur to Nakar (Incl 1, TAB A).
- II. BACKGROUND

In order to have a complete understanding of the 14th Infantry Project, it is felt advisable to include a brief historical account of the unit's activation and related activities which will serve as an introduction to the recognition and processing period after liberation of the Philippines.

In the early part of Jan 42, remnants of various Philippine Army units withdrawing from northern and western Luzon joined forces in Aritao, Nueva Viscaya. Realizing that communication was severed with the USAFFE forces to the south these units pooled their strength of some 800 men and formed what was known as the 1st Provisional Guerrilla Regiment under the command of Lt Col Everett L. Warner. Key subordinate officers under Lt Col Warner were:

Capt Guillermo Nakar, CO, 2d Bn (promoted to Major Mar 42)
Capt Manuel P. Enriquez, Regimental Executive Officer
1st Lt Warren A. Minton, CO, 1st Bn

In Feb 42, Commanding General, USAFFE, redesignated this unit as the 14th Infantry, Philippine Army.

Upon the surrender of Bataan, Lt Col Warner with a few officers and enlisted men proceeded to Casiguran Bay. General Wainwright

then placed Nakar in command with rank of Lt Col. Following the surrender of Corregidor, officers and men other than those required in the regimental C.P. were ordered to "tactically disperse" each unit with a specific mission, i.e., gathering information for intelligence sources, sabotage and harassing enemy installations. On 29 Jun 42 radio contact was established with Hq SWPA located in Australia and at that time the unit's mission was outlined. On 14 Jul 42 Col Nakar received a radio from General MacArthur authorizing the induction of the Philippine Army personnel under his command into the Army of the United States (Incl 1, TAB A). Personnel in the vicinity of the Regimental C.P. were immediately inducted and various officers were delegated to proceed to the dispersed units with the mission of accomplishing a mass induction. During the month of September the Japanese launched an offensive against the 14th Infantry which resulted in the capture of the Regimental C.P., radio facilities and records plus the capture of Lt Col Nakar. Upon the capture of Nakar, Major R. H. Arnold assumed command of the remaining units in the vicinity which remained intact while one Capt Romulo A. Manriques assumed command of the 2nd Battalion after the subsequent surrender of Major Enriquez. It appears that Major Arnold and Capt Manriques commanded various remnants of the 14th Infantry simultaneously and independently of one another until Oct 44, when such remnants were combined and operated as the 5th MD, 14th Inf, USAFIP HL under Manriques. This unit remained in operation until November 1945.

III. PROCESSING AND ADMINISTRATION OF CLAIMS.

The initial processing of personnel started in Mar 46, after various narrative histories were submitted by certain officers who

were allegedly a position to know the vital files and statistics of the unit, copies of which were inclosed herewith (Incl 2, TAB B; Incl 3, TAB C).

On 1 Mar 46, a messageform was dispatched to The Adjutant General, Washington D. C. (Incl 4, TAB D), forwarding a roster of personnel allegedly inducted into the AUS (Roster was prepared by Maj Arturo Dingcong, former Regimental Adjutant, 14th Inf. This roster was, however, not complete), requesting verification by Lt Col Arnold (former Major) and in addition requesting a statement of the status of the unit. The reply of Col Arnold is inclosed herewith (Incl 5, TAB E). In reference to Col Arnold's statement relative to disbandment of the 14th Infantry prior to the receipt of MacArthur radio, this was qualified by further records which tend to indicate that it was not a disbandment but a dispersment for security reasons and to facilitate underground activities. On 25 Mar 46, certain policies were established by the Director, R.P.D. which were to be used in adjudicating individual claims of 14th Infantry personnel.

The basic criteria for administering such claims were as follows:

1. All PA enlisted men who served with the 14th Infantry in Jul 42 who could submit acceptable evidence indicating induction into the AUS, be confirmed AUS personnel.
2. All PA Officers on duty with the 14th Infantry in Jul 42, be processed as AUS personnel, provided that incontrovertible evidence of appointment and/or subsequent promotion is presented. Burden of proof rest with the claimant.
3. Any enlistments in the 14th Infantry made after Jul 42, where it is clear that such enlistments were effected

without authority be regarded as PA inductions and processed accordingly.

4. Enlisted men confirmed in the AUS who later accepted guerrilla appointments as commissioned officers be allowed to choose between continuance of AUS enlisted status or acceptance of appointment in PA.

5. Upon confirmation, new army serial numbers from blocks authorized to this division were to be assigned to each person so confirmed.

6. Claims of personnel of the 11th Infantry to commissioned status on the basis of evidence submitted were forwarded to Director, R.P.D. in form of staff study for consideration and appropriate action.

Attached herewith is copy of c/n setting forth the foregoing policy (Incl 6, TAB F); (The basic policy used in determining casualty status was of course the Missing Persons Act and the War Department Plan for Casualty Administration Upon Reoccupation of the Philippine Islands).

It should be noted at this time that the actual number of personnel inducted into the Army of the United States was not known. Some reports state that about 200 enlisted men and 40 officers were inducted, this being the minimum number reported, while a station list of recognized guerrilla units in the 5th Military District dated 5 Jun 45 reports the strength of the 11th Infantry as 110 officers and 2648 enlisted men, this being the maximum number reported. On 29 Jun 42 an unofficial report established the strength on the 11th Infantry at that time as 62 officers and 960 enlisted men. In the radio which authorized the

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induction (Incl 1, TAB A), a block of 1000 Army serial numbers for EM and 100 for officers was set aside for assignment to the inducted personnel. Therefore, it was estimated that 1000 plus enlisted men were inducted and approximately 100 officers.

Due to the confusion which resulted from the conditions existing at that time the assignment of the Army serial numbers to the inducted personnel were in many cases duplicated and in some instances no serial number was assigned at all and of course the destruction of certain records prior to the capture of the Regimental C.P. left very meager records and the exact assignment of serial numbers could not be ascertained. In view of this inadequate administration it was deemed advisable to reassign serial numbers from the clock previously authorized in the radio, however, clearance was secured from The Adjutant General to insure that such numbers were not already assigned (Incl 7, TAB G).

The procedure was set up whereby teams processed personnel returning to military control and claiming AUS status, at the various replacement depots and the pertinent papers were forwarded to this headquarters for the appropriate determination.

During the period from Mar 46 until Mar 47, this headquarters was engaged in adjudicating individual claims and determining the status under the Missing Persons Act of all recognized members of the AUS. Many complex and disturbing problems arose during this period, the major problem and the one which caused the project to be suspended being the discovery of false evidence submitted to facilitate recognition. Considering that 969 enlisted members and 75 officers had their AUS status already confirmed plus the fact that approximately 2,000 claims were still to be processed, it was deemed advisable to suspend the operation and immediately attempt to secure rosters,

extract information from the archives and review the entire procedure. Therefore, no further claims were adjudicated after Apr 47. However, this command continued to accept claims and advised the claimant to proceed to his official address where he would be advised of the results at a later date.

To elaborate on the aforementioned statement relative to the submission of false evidence, reference is made to paragraph 1 and 2, page 3, wherein a part of the established policy was that 14th Infantry personnel can submit acceptable evidence to prove induction, and for the most part the burden of proof would lie with the claimant. (Acceptable evidence being affidavits from officer personnel with whom there claimants served or other individuals who were in a position to know the facts of the particular case) Many affidavits submitted were bought, some were the results of force and many were forged. It involved no effort whatsoever to secure numerous affidavits in support of a false claim. Many denials were based on the fact that the claimant's name was not included on the roster which was being used at that time; this resulted in numerous rosters being submitted, some in original form and other copies authenticated by responsible officers of the 14th Infantry. One of the most reliable sources of information was the former Regimental Adjutant (Major Arturo L. Dingcong) and a statement with his signature was not disputed, however, this was readily publicized and statements with his forged signature began to appear.

In the initial stages of this project an individual was carried in a casualty status within the purview of the War Department Plan for Casualty Administration Upon Reoccupation of the Philippines, when he proved service-incurred illness. After it was realized that more benefits would

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acrued by reason of such claim many claimants appealed on these grounds when in previous evidence there was no mention made of illness. It goes without saying that many other appeals relative to the pay status of a confirmed AUS member came about usually based on contradictory or inconsistent evidence.

It should be brought out at this time that the necessity for a specialized handling of 14th Infantry claim was not readily apparent as claims to PS and War Department civilian employee status were being handled on a large scale simultaneously with claims to AUS status and the workload was tremendous at that time.

The period from Apr 47 until Dec 47 was utilized in extracting information from archives, compilation of rosters, reviewing of claims and consolidation of 14th Infantry reference material. In Dec 47, the suspension was lifted and claims were again processed and determined. The services of Major Dingcong were secured and he was placed in charge of the "14th Infantry Recognition and Processing Team." When this project reopened there were on hand approximately 6,000 claims to be studied, reviewed and processed. The master roster which was compiled during the interim period consisted of every known member of the 14th Infantry who was inducted into the Army of the United States. This roster was studied and verified by Major Dingcong and it was established that unless an individual appeared on this roster he had no bonafide claim to status in the AUS. All cases which were held in abeyance as a result of the suspension and unpaid were forwarded to the recognition team for appropriate action. Any claim previously confirmed AUS which did not meet with the approval of the team was redetermined negative and the claimant so notified. Approximately 2,500 claims of the aforementioned

6,000 were completely eliminated within a comparatively short time. In some cases reliable records showed no military service prior to the alleged induction, while others were duplication of previous claims filed and many filed under an alias name. The division again experienced a repetition of what was previously related in paragraph 1, page 6, but not to such a great extent. Certain claims were determined negative when a review of Philippine Army affidavits and supporting evidence revealed direct contradiction with the evidence submitted for confirmation of AUS status and in some instances the contradictory evidence was from the same individual.

By 30 Jun 48, this headquarters had confirmed 164 enlisted men and 2 officers which brought the total number of confirmed AUS enlisted men to 1133 and 76 officers. There are 60 cases still questionable by reason of inconsistent evidence and if satisfactorily clarified these 60 men will be confirmed as AUS.

1. After due study and careful weighing of the pros and cons of the subject, it is the decision of the Commanding Officer, Lt. Col. Gold, as well as of the undersigned, that the following criteria should be applied in determining eligibility of veterans for AUS status, 14th Infantry.

That it be conclusively shown:

- a. That the veteran had legal military service in the Philippine Commonwealth Army (USAFFE) preceded by formal induction, as per policy now used by the Veterans Branch in determining USAFFE service.
- b. That the veteran served with the 14th Infantry (PA) on or before 14 July 1942.
- c. That the veteran was legally and formally inducted into the 14th Infantry, AUS, between the dates of 14 July 1942 and 31 July 1942, both dates inclusive.

2. Each of the above criteria must be met by the veteran to qualify for AUS status, 14th Infantry. Seemingly meritorious cases falling outside the requirements above must be made the subject of a staff study to be submitted to the Commanding Officer, AGRD, for decision.

3. The above criteria will be applied to cases already determined under other policies as well as to cases yet to be adjudicated.

Transmitted herewith copy of radio from GHQ, SWPA dated 12 July 1942 to NAKAR (Lt Col GUILLERMO NAKAR, Infantry PA) authorizing the induction of enlisted personnel then on duty with the 14th Infantry Regiment (PA) and the commissioning of the officers of that unit. No authority was invested by SWPA to activate the 14th Infantry Regiment (PA), as an Army of the United States unit although the personnel were to receive AUS status and allowances for their continued resistance movement. Since the 14th Infantry Regiment (PA) is a unit of the Army of the Philippines this headquarters has no authority to inactivate same.

2. Inclosed is copy of radio number 12 from MACARTHUR to PRAEGER (Capt RALPH B. PRAEGER, Cav, AUS) dated 19 July 1943 and a roster of personnel who have received AUS status as a result of their duty with Troop "C", 26th Cavalry (FS). Last sentence of inclosure two indicates that Troop "C", 26th Cavalry (FS) was not redesignated as an AUS organization, but AUS personnel on duty with that organization were attached and not assigned.
