- TO: Commanding General, Philippines Command (Air Force) and Thirteenth Air Force, APO 74 ATTN: Judge Advocate for Army Affairs
- 1. Major Thos. R. Horton, 0-16515 and T/Sgt James Baldassarre, ASN 598972, were both known to have been on Bataan during period in question. Najor Horton was the Quartermaster Construction officer for the Post of Manila prior to withdrawal to Bataan and T/Sgt Baldassarre was his assistant at same place. M/Sgt James Baldassarre retired from the service and is presently employed as a DAFC in the A.I.O. at Camp O'Donnell. Major Horton is deceased.
- 2. Retained cards this office and also those that were forwarded previously to your Headquarters show that one Venancio Garcia as a Carpenter, received \$2112.75 as arrears in pay, a Teodoro A. Parajino also a carpenter, received \$956.00 while Moises D. Garcia a Plasterer, received \$1440.00 arrears in pay under the Missing Persons Act. All are believed to be former employees of the QMC at Post of Manila.
- 3. It is thought the Lt. Hayes referred to was 2nd Lt. John C. Hayes, 0-374853, deceased, a former Quartermaster officer from the Post of Manile.
- 4. Records for the above have all been forwarded to the Chief, Demobilized Personnel Records Branch, AGO, Department of the Army, 4300 Goodfellow Boulevard, St. Louis 20, Nissouri.
- 5. Records this Headquarters indicate one Major Alberto N. Navarrete, 0-1463, was a member of the Off-Shore Patrol (PA) and was within the vicinity of Bataan from 1 January 1942 to 8 April 1942.
- 6. No file can be found for Dominador Sales but correspondence has been seen recently wherein it was alleged he was a member of the Army Transport Service.
- 7. It is known in this Headquarters that Mr. Tecdoro Parajino has instigated and assisted many of his former fellow employees to file claims against the United States Government.



Dear Colonel Scudder:

A claim has been filed by the Cebu Stevedoring Company, Mr. J. Martin, President, for expenses allegedly incurred under the terms of a contract had between the Cebu Stevedoring Company and Colonel John D. Cook, Commanding Officer of the Cebu Advance Quartermaster Depot. There are statements from both Colonel Cook and Mr. Martin concerning the existence of such a contract, but all records are alleged to have been lost or burned. It was stated, however, that the contract provided in part: "That the US Army would take over all Cebu Stevedoring Company equipment; that the Cebu Stevedoring Company would continue operating this equipment for the Army; that the Cebu Stevedoring Company would supply personnel and supervision for the stevedoring of all vessels; that the Cebu Stevedoring Company would supply personnel and supervision for the maintenance of a labor pool in connection with Quartermaster Depot activities; that payments would be made to personnel so employed by the Cebu Stevedoring Company; and that when funds became available, the Army would pay for all expenses incurred by the Company."

The Cebu Stevedoring Company now claims for recovery of expenses incurred in the amount of \$\sqrt{320,200.00}, \$\sqrt{25,000.00}\$ of which is for stevedoring and port terminal charges for the stevedoring of three ocean-going vessels, and \$\sqrt{295,200.00}\$ for salaries and expenses of personnel. It is alleged that the wages and cost of meals in the amount of \$\sqrt{2.40}\$ per day per man were expended for an average of 1,000 men for a period of 123.

In the consideration of this claim, any personal knowledge that you may have of pertinent facts will be very helpful. In this regard, a list of questions follows. Please make reference to the question numbers in reply:

- 1. Do you have any knowledge of the abovementioned contract or any such agreement?
- 2. Did such contract specify that the U. S. Army would repay actual expenses incurred or would pay normal fees for services rendered?
- 3. Did the Cebu Stevedoring Company actually furnish these services?
- 4. Was the Cebu Stevedoring Company engaged in any private business during this period?
- 5. Were any other companies or individuals furnishing similar services?
- 6. Can you estimate the number of laborers supplied by the Company or in any other way gauge the extent of services furnished?
- 7. Was any payment made by the U. S. Army to the Cebu Stevedoring Company or its laborers?
- 8. Were any payments made by Philippine Army Finance Officers from Philippine Army funds covering payrolls of personnel employed by the Advance Quartermaster Depot?
- 9. Do you know of any Department of the Army recordsor others - which might contain information helpful in the adjudication of this claim?
- 10. Do you know any other persons who might have personal knowledge of facts pertinent to this matter? (List names and addresses if known.)

Your cooperation in answering the above or in supplying any other information you may believe pertinent will be greatly appreciated.
