The hen's beak is horny and sharp and acts as a pair of
nippers. It is used for striking into the soil to get
seeds or insects. The duck's beak is broad and flat and is
softer than the hen's beak. It feeds upon water insects and
plants. Ducks' and hens' beaks are used for cleaning and oil-
ing feathers and for self-defense.

The goose is a stately bird. The legs are longer than
those of the ducks. The long legs of the goose give propor-
tion when walking, and the neck, which is longer than the duck's,
gives an appearance of grace and dignity. The beak of the
goose is harder than the duck's and is not flat. Its feathers
are beautiful. The goose's eggs are about twice as large as
those of the hen. The goslings are beautiful with large eyes.
Geese feed more largely upon land vegetation than do ducks.
They do not eat insects and animals to a great extent. Geese
shriek in warning and make so much noise that it is unpleas-
ant to hear them. The ducks' and geese's webbed feet make it
easy for them to swim.

The heads of both the gobbler and turkey hen consist of
wrinkled skin, bluish white on the crown, grayish blue about
the eyes, and the other parts red. The wattle is found be-
neath the throat. The wings are large and powerful and be-
cause of this turkeys can fly high. Turkeys are great wan-
derers. They prefer to stay out of doors at night instead of
under a roof. The gobbler is proud of its feathers. He spreads
his feathers as much as he can and shifts them this way and
that. He moves attractively forward with slow steps and calls
"gobble" to attract his mate. Turkey hens are brave while
hatching their eggs. A good supply of food and water is need-
